Interest in Election on Tuesday, Nov. 3, Mounts As Time for Balloting Nears

NATIONAL, STATE, COUNTY OFFICERS TO BE ELECTED; RECORD VOTE IS FORESEEN

Interest on the national, state and county level continues to mount as the time approaches for casting ballots on Tuesday, Nov. 3, in the presidential and general elections. A record vote is anticipated throughout the county and nation. Polls in the village will be open from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. in the municipal building. (See separate notices in this issue for polling hours in the towns of Kewaskum and Auburn).

Voters will go to the polls to choose a president and vice-president of the United States, a governor and complete slate of state officers, congressional officers, and a complete slate of county officers. Keen interest and speculation on the presidential race is evident everywhere. The vigorous campaigns being conducted by both parties have aroused voters. State and county candidates have also been conducting active campaigns.

Much interest on the county level will be focused on the assembly race. Frederick C. Schroeder (R) who defeated eight other candidates to win the nomination in the Sept. 8 primary, will be opposed by Charles A. Johnson, the Democratic nominee, and Ray H. Bast, defeated by Schroeder in the primary, who has entered the race on the independent ticket. Washington county will also elect a new sheriff. Raymond W. Jeffords (R) and James A. Helmer (D) are seeking election.

For president and vice president of the United States, the Democratic candidates are Lyndon B. Johnson and Hubert H. Humphrey and the GOP candidates are Barry M. Goldwater and William E. Miller. In addition, minor candidates are Clifton DeBerry and Edward Shaw of the Socialist Workers Party and Eric Hass and Henning A. Blomen of the Socialist Labor Party.

Seek Bids for New Post Office Building Here

The Post Office Department is seeking competitive bids for a new or improved building to house its postal operations at Kewaskum, Postmaster General John A. Gronouski announced last week.

Under the department's lease construction program, a contract will be awarded to the bidder who designates a building suitable to the department's needs and agrees to improve it according to departmental specifications, or provide a new building, and then lease it to the department for a basic period of ten years with four 5-year renewal options.

The building should be located within the general area of Main st. between W. Water st. and Fond du Lac ave., Fond du Lac ave. between 1st st. and a point approximately 100 yards north of Prospect st.; 1st st. between Fond du Lac ave. and a point midway to Water st.

The department's capital investment will be limited substantially to postal equipment. The building will remain under private ownership, with the owner paying local real estate taxes.

Bidding documents will be available on or about Nov. 9, 1964 and may be obtained from Mr. R. W. Van Sickle, Regional Real Estate Officer, 7440 W. Greenfield ave., Box 2673, Milwaukee, Wisconsin 53214. The Real Estate Officer will supply bidding forms, specifications, lease provisions and other information. Bids must be submitted to the real estate officer by Dec. 4, 1964.
