## Village Voters Split Ballots; Favor Lyndon Johnson, McKenna, Republicans for Other Offices

### Races for Attorney General, Congress, Senator Close Here

#### TOTAL OF 736 VOTES CAST NEAR RECORD

A total of 736 votes were cast in Tuesday's election in the village, just 14 short of the record vote in the last presidential election in 1960 when 750 ballots were cast. There were 234 straight Republican votes and 170 straight Democrat. Other ballots were split to make very close races for several of the offices.

Village voters followed the trend in the county by giving President Lyndon B. Johnson a good margin on the Democratic ticket but favoring Republicans for the other offices. The lone exception was for the county office of district attorney in which Roger W. McKenna, a Kewaskum candidate, outpolled the incumbent GOP DA, Richard Becker, 398 to 322. However, the races for lieutenant governor, attorney general, senator, congress and county coroner were close in the village.

The Democrats were much more successful throughout the state. Besides President Johnson swamping Senator Barry Goldwater in the state and nation for president, Democrats were elected to the offices of lieutenant governor, attorney general, U. S. Senator and congress in the sixth district. This was the first time the state of Wisconsin went Democratic since former President Harry Truman defeated Thomas Dewey in 1948.

In Wisconsin, incumbent Democratic Governor John W. Reynolds lost to Republican Warren Knowles in a tight race, the outcome of which wasn't settled until the next day. But in a quirk of politics, Republican incumbent Lieutenant Governor Jack Olson lost to Democratic Patrick J. Lucey.

Republican incumbent Attorney General George Thompson was defeated by young Bronson LaFollette, a Democrat. For U. S. Senator, Democrat William Proxmire was re-elected over Wilbur Renk. The other state Republican incumbents were re-elected. Veteran Republican incumbent Congressman William K. Van Pelt was beaten by Democrat John A. Race in this, the Sixth District, in a surprise. Van Pelt has served in congress for 12 years.

In Washington county Republican Frederick Schroeder defeated his two rivals for the office of assemblyman, Charles A. Johnson, Democrat, and Ray Bast, Independent candidate. Republicans were also elected or re-elected to all other county offices.

## Adult Recreation Program Will Be Sponsored Here

### SCHOOL TO SPONSOR FREE SPORTS ACTIVITIES FOR MEN, WOMEN THIS WINTER

The Kewaskum Elementary school will sponsor an adult recreation program beginning in November and extending through March.

The program will be free of charge and will be open to any and only adult residents of the Kewaskum Elementary school district 18 years of age or older who are no longer attending high school. High school students and/or other children will not be allowed. This is intended to be an "adult" program for the elementary district. Adults will have an opportunity to get some recreational physical exercise through basketball, volley-ball, badminton, possibly ping-pong, and it is hoped instructions in golf very early in the spring.

Beginning on Nov. 18 and 19, Wednesdays from 8-10 p. m. will be for men and 8-10 p. m. on Thursdays for women. Locker-room and shower-room facilities will be available. Participants will be responsible for their own towel, soap, etc.

It is hoped that the adults of the district will avail themselves of the program during the winter months ahead when other recreational activities are curtailed.

## Companions Melvin Klein, son Donald Injured in Mishap

Jack Wilson, 39, of 1256 Meadow Lane, who came to Kewaskum 18 years ago and was associated with Regal Ware, Inc. in the shipping department since, was killed and two companions injured near Chadron, Nebr. Friday afternoon, Oct. 30, in a crash when a tire blew out on their car as they were returning home from a hunting trip in Wyoming.

Wilson was pronounced dead of head injuries at the scene of the mishap about eight miles west of Chadron on Hwy. 20. His two hunting companions, Melvin Klein, 55, of the town of Wayne, R. 1, Allenton, residing about five miles west of Kewaskum and his son, Donald Klein, about 25, of the village of Kewaskum were taken to Chadron Municipal hospital. Both sustained back injuries and suffered from shock but were not seriously injured and returned to their homes here earlier this week.

The sheriff's office at Chadron reported that Melvin Klein was driving the car which was pulling a two-wheel trailer. The trailer was laden with three deer and three antelope in addition to hunting equipment and supplies. The car was also heavily loaded, the sheriff's office reported, and the weight might have been responsible for the blow-out of a front tire.

The car went out of control, ran up a high embankment, rolled back down the embankment, turning over several times, and landing in a ditch. Officers said the accident occurred about 4:45 p. m. Mountain Time Friday. Scene of the accident was about 75 miles east of the Wyoming line and only about 15 miles from the South Dakota border. The weather was reported as clear and the highway dry.

Wilson's body was brought back Saturday via private plane to Miller's Funeral home, personally escorted by Edw. E. Miller, who flew to Chadron Saturday morning.

Wilson was born June 28, 1925 at Salem, Ala., a son of the late Jessie Morgan and Ulva Cornelius Wilson. He was married to the former Alice Irene Wagner at Dundee on Oct. 18, 1947.

In addition to his wife he is survived by three children, all at home. They are Ruby Lee, 16, a high school junior, Robert Allen, 14, who is in the eighth grade, and Margaret Ann, 12, a seventh grade pupil. Further surviving are five sisters, Estelle Thompson of Birmingham, Ala., Mrs. J. J. Manderson, Mannie Arnold and Mrs. E. V. Christian, all of Naperville, Ala. and Irene (Mrs. Charles Reigle) of Kewaskum, and six brothers, Louis, Horace and Raymond Wilson, all of Birmingham, Ala., Marvin Wilson of Naperville, Ala., J. P. Wilson, of Pensacola, Fla. and Roland E. Wilson of Salem, Ala. One brother, James, and his parents predeceased him.

The left side of Kleinke's auto was damaged.

In another mishap which took place a short time later, at 1:30 p. m. Friday, three cars were involved in a collision on Second st near the intersection with Railroad st. in front of the Regal Ware plant. As Michael Fierke, 16, Kewaskum, made a right turn onto Second st. he said the accelerator of his auto stuck and when he glanced down at it he lost control of his vehicle momentarily. His car struck auto owned by Byron Beisbier, 45, R. 3, Campbellsport, and shoved it into a third vehicle which was parked and owned by Jacob Bruessel, Kewaskum. The right front of the Fierke car, the left rear fender of Beisbier's machine, and the rear bumper of the Bruessel vehicle were damaged.

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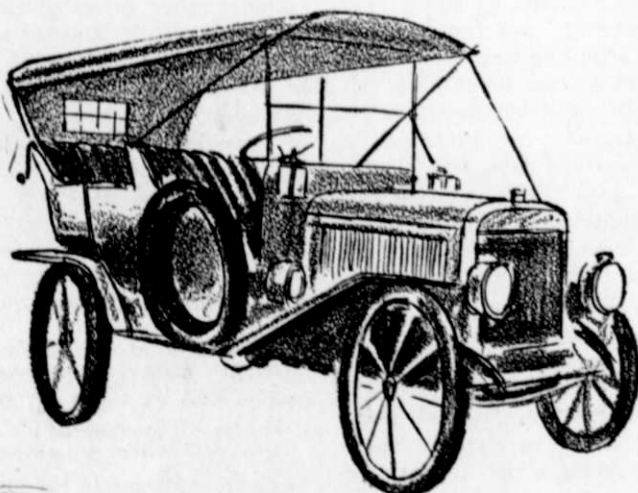

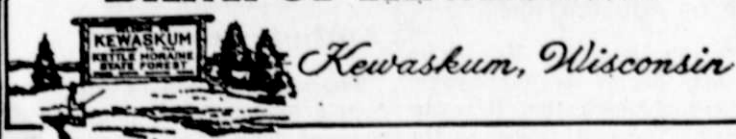

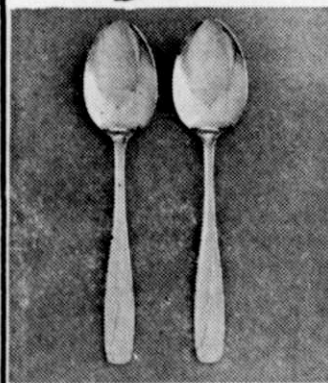

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Tessar presiding and all board members present except Trustee Kral.

The minutes of the two previous meetings were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Merwin, seconded by Trustee Geidel and duly carried.

The proposals for the purchase of a new snow plow were opened by the President, read aloud and tabulated as follows:

Central Engineering Co., Milwaukee, Root plow with Husting quick hitch complete \$1,655.00  
Drott Tractor Co., Milwaukee, Drott plow with quick hitch complete \$2,150.00.

Paynter Equipment Co., Milwaukee, Meyer plow with Husting quick hitch complete \$2,175.00

Aring Equipment Co., Milwaukee, Wisconsin plow with pin type hitch complete \$2,250.00.

Since the proposal of Central Engineering Co. seemed the most advantageous to the Village, motion was made by Trustee Merwin, seconded by Trustee Geidel and duly carried that said proposal shall be accepted and that the President and Commissioner are authorized to issue purchase order for said plow.

The Board informed Myron Belger that it wishes to exercise their option to purchase Lot 1 in Block 41 for the purpose of extending Stark Street southward to Main Street.

The resignation of Elsie Schleif, as librarian of the Public Library, as presented by the Library, Board, was accepted and the following resolution introduced.

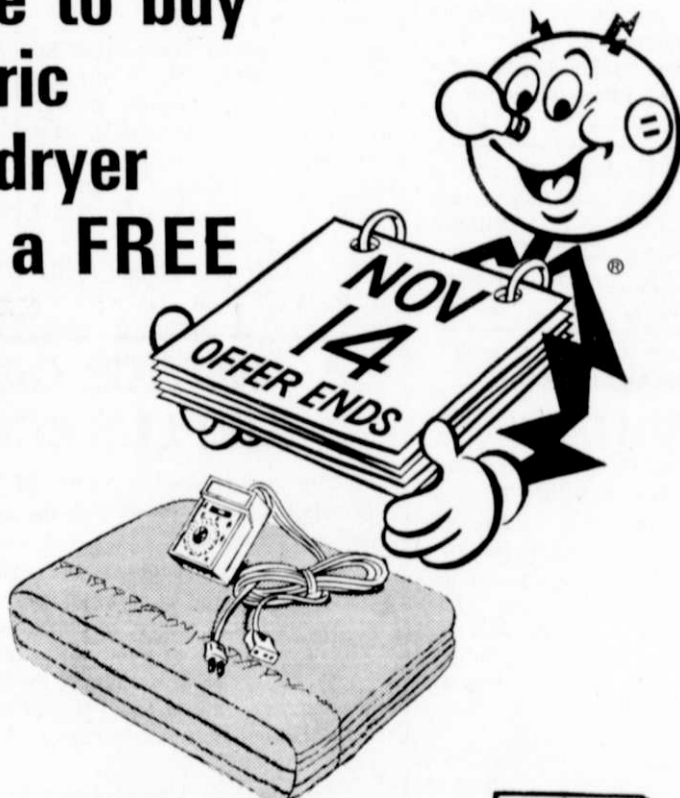

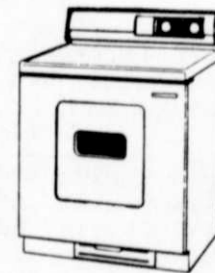

## Questionnaires for Agriculture Census Mailed to Farmers

Questionnaires for the 1964 Census of Agriculture are now being mailed to farmers of Washington county, County Agent Maurice Hovland reported this week.

The forms are expected to reach the farmers within a few days. This will allow a period of time to consult 1964 business records in order to answer questions on the forms, before census enumerators begin calling on the farmers to collect the forms. Best estimates for the year will be sufficient to answer questions in cases where complete records for the year are not available, according to the county agent.

The visits by enumerators will start on Nov. 9 in Washington county. Enumerators will call on every farmer in the district under his or her supervision, the county agent explained. At the time of the call, the enumerator will help the farmer complete answers to any questions in the form that the farmer was unable to answer, and will review the form to see that it is completely filled out.

By mailing the forms ahead of the visits, officials of the Bureau of the Census, an agency of the U. S. Department of Commerce, hope to save both time and effort.

The Census of Agriculture is taken every five years in the years ending in "4" and "9" to gather needed, up-to-date information on United States agricultural resources and production. Such information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the U. S. economy. Data gathered includes the number and size of farms, number of persons living on farms, acreage and harvest of crops, a livestock and poultry inventory, information on farm equipment and facilities, and on income and some production expenditures.

## Third Meeting, Tour Of Kettle Moraine Study Group Held

The third meeting of the Kettle Moraine study group was held Saturday, Oct. 31. This was a field trip around Washington county. County Agent Maurice Hovland took charge of the tour, and Keith Schmude of the Soil Conservation Service briefly discussed soil profiles.

Following this there was a discussion of the plant life of the Kettle Moraine, with Dr. Jacob Shapiro of Wisconsin State University at Oshkosh, and Norbert Underwood of the Wisconsin Conservation Department.

These men covered a great deal of information, including an explanation of the transition stages of a lake to dry land, how there is a natural succession of plants that starts with the underwater algae and ultimately becomes an area that will support hardwoods, such as hard maple. They explained that all plant life and animal life uses the many resources such as chemicals during the time they are living. When these plants and animals die, these substances are

released again for something else to use them. They also explained that soil and water are very closely related. The study of plants and animals growing in their environment, as explained by Dr. Shapiro and Mr. Underwood, is truly a wonderful subject.

The final meeting of this study group will be held Tuesday, Nov. 10, at 7:30 p. m., in the extension office, court house annex, West Bend. Dr. Shapiro will again be present to show slides and talk about the plant growth of this area. If you are interested, please attend.

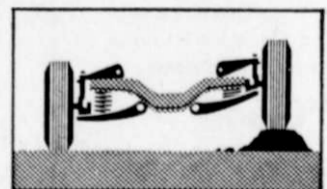
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
