Kewaskum to Host WIAA Regional Basketball Tournament Finals

WINNERS OF HORICON AND GRAFTON SUB-REGIONAL MEETS PLAY FINALS HERE

Kewaskum Community High school has been assigned to a WIAA regional finals basketball tournament on March 6, 1965. Host schools were selected and all teams assigned for the 1965 tournament plan of the WIAA by the board of control which met last weekend in Stevens Point.

Kewaskum will begin tournament play in the Horicon sub-regional on March 2 and 5. Teams assigned to this tournament are Kewaskum, Campbellsport, Horicon and Slinger. The alphabetical draw this year for four-team meets is 1 vs. 2 and 3 vs. 4. Therefore Kewaskum will meet Slinger (which team they defeated last Friday, 68-50) in the opening game and Campbellsport will be paired against Horicon.

The Kewaskum regional finals will consist of the winner of the Horicon tournament and the winner of the Grafton sub-regional. Teams assigned to the Grafton tournament are Cedar Grove, Grafton, Oostburg and Random Lake.

The Kewaskum regional finals will consist of one game. The winner of the finals here will advance to the sub-sectional at Port Washington on March 9, and play the winner of the Homestead regional. Teams in the Homestead regional will include Hamilton, Hartford, Homestead, Menomonee Falls, Port Washington and West Bend.

Tickets for the Kewaskum regional will not be available until after the Horicon sub-regional.

Regional tourney activity is scheduled for March 2, 5 and 6, followed by sub-sectionals on March 9 and sectionals on March 12 and 13. The state meet will be held March 18, 19 and 20.

All officers were re-elected as follows: Assistant chief, William Martin; captain, Bob Ours; lieutenant, Ollie Staehler; treasurer, Harry Koch; secretary, George Koerble. The chief is not elected but is appointed by the village board.

As no bids were made by any of the member departments for the annual summer tournament and parade of the Badger Firemen's association at the recent fall meeting of the association held in Kewaskum, the local department voted to put in a bid for the event at Thursday's meeting.

Two new members were admitted to the department. They are Dennis Konkel and David Nigh. They replace Leroy Keller, Jr., who moved into his new home outside of the village, and Arvin Merwin, who resigned. These new members must now pass the first aid course and a physical examination before they can officially be admitted to the department.

It was voted to increase the rates on ambulance calls and out of town fire calls. An auditing committee was appointed and a refreshment committee named for the firemen's annual "stag" party Jan. 9. The firemen who will participate also signed up for singles, doubles and team events in the annual bowling tournament of the Badger association to be held at Campbellsport starting in January.

Will Leave for Malawi to Serve In Peace Corps

TRAINING IS COMPLETED BY RAY WIEDMEYER AT SYRACUSE UNIVERSITY

Raymond H. Wiedmeyer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond F. Wiedmeyer, R. 1, Theresa, is one of 105 Peace Corps volunteers now on home leave prior to leaving for Malawi on Dec. 30. Ray is a 1959 graduate of Kewaskum Community High school and attended the University of Wisconsin, Madison.

They will participate in two projects: cooperative management and secondary education—joining approximately 100 Peace Corps volunteers already at work in the new African republic. Present Peace Corps projects in Malawi include secondary education, health programs and lawyers.

Agricultural cooperatives are a vital factor in Malawi's economic growth. They enable the farmer to get a fair price for his goods, and to obtain credit for purchasing machinery, improved seeds, fertilizers and other farming supplies. Peace Corps volunteers will assist in the administration of the cooperatives, and in training Malawi co-workers.

The majority of these volunteers will teach in secondary schools and teacher training colleges. Subjects will include math, science, English, history, economics, geography and home economics.

The group trained for 14 weeks at Syracuse university. They studied the history and culture of Malawi, United States history and institutions, and world affairs. Although their work will be conducted mainly in English, the trainees also studied some of the local languages spoken in Malawi. The teachers were also instructed in teaching techniques, procedures and the Malawi curriculum and examinations, and the volunteers who are to work with cooperatives studies bookkeeping and general business practices.

Some 9,000 Americans are now serving as Peace Corps volunteers in 46 nations of Asia, Africa and Latin America. More volunteers are needed; requests for them pour into the Washington headquarters daily. Applicants interested in winter or spring training are urged to complete Peace Corps questionnaires (available at your local post office) and take the Corps' placement test, given the second Saturday of each

Donna M. Rauch, 11, Killed by Car

Donna Mae Rauch, 11-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Rauch, R. 4, West Bend, former residents of Kewaskum, and a sixth grade student at Holy Angels school in West Bend, died of injuries received when she was struck by a car on Wednesday evening, Dec. 2.

The girl was reported walking west in approximately the center of the eastbound traffic lane on Hwy. 33 about an eighth of a mile west of West Bend when a car driven by Mrs. Ione Gadow, 56, of West Bend, traveling east, hit her.

There was a light snow falling at the time, about 5:32 p. m., reducing visibility. Mrs. Gadow reportedly swerved her car in a futile effort to avoid the girl, but the right front of the vehicle struck her. Donna Mae was pronounced dead upon arrival at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend.

The death was the 28th fatality on highways in Washington county this year.

The girl was born in Fond du Lac county on May 29, 1953, and later moved to Kewaskum with her parents. The family moved to Allenton six years ago, in 1958, and came to the West Bend address about a year ago.

Surviving are her parents, a 14-year-old sister, Marjorie, a 15-year-old brother, Rodney, and another brother, 5-year-old Curtis. She also leaves her paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Rauch of Campbellsport, and her maternal grandmother, Mrs. Margaret Wolf of Milwaukee, along with other relatives.

Funeral services were conducted at the Schmidt Funeral home, West Bend, at 9 a. m. Saturday, Dec. 5, and at Holy Angels church at 9:30, with the Rev. Rayner Hausmann serving as the celebrant at the solemn Requiem High Mass with the Rev. Jerome Ziegler as deacon and the Rev. Nicholas Goebel as sub-deacon. Burial was in the parish cemetery.

Judge Robert Stoltz Announces Candidacy For Re-Election

Judge Robert J. Stoltz has announced that he is a candidate for re-election as county judge of Branch 2 of the County Court of Washington county. The election will be held next April 6 and nomination papers are now being circulated throughout the county on the judge's behalf.

Judge Stoltz first took office upon the creation of Branch 2 of the County Court in June of 1960. It was the first of such courts in the state and, now, the same pattern has been adopted in many other densely populated counties.

Judge Stoltz practiced law in Washington county from 1935 to 1960. He was clerk of the West Bend school board from 1947 to 1959. During most of that period he was delegated as the spokesman for the board during their formal presentations of planned development of the educational program and physical facilities in the district.

He is well known throughout the state as a public speaker and those talents have frequently been utilized by almost every community group in the county. Such appearances have been particularly frequent before youth and service groups. For many years he has

been a director of the West Bend Savings and Loan association and the State Bank of Newburg, of which he is also vice-president.

Judge Stoltz has served on numerous administrative committees of the state and Washington county Bar association, State School Board association and the County Judges association of Wisconsin. He received the 1960 Distinguished Citizen award of the West Bend Kiwanis club. He is a member and served three terms as Grand Knight of the West Bend council of the Knights of Columbus. He is a past president of the Chamber of Commerce. He is a member of the West Bend Moose lodge.

Judge Stoltz graduated from the Marquette Law school in 1935, married Kathleen Kullmann of West Bend in June of 1940. They have three children, John a junior at Notre Dame, and twins, Jane and James, sophomores at the West Bend High school.

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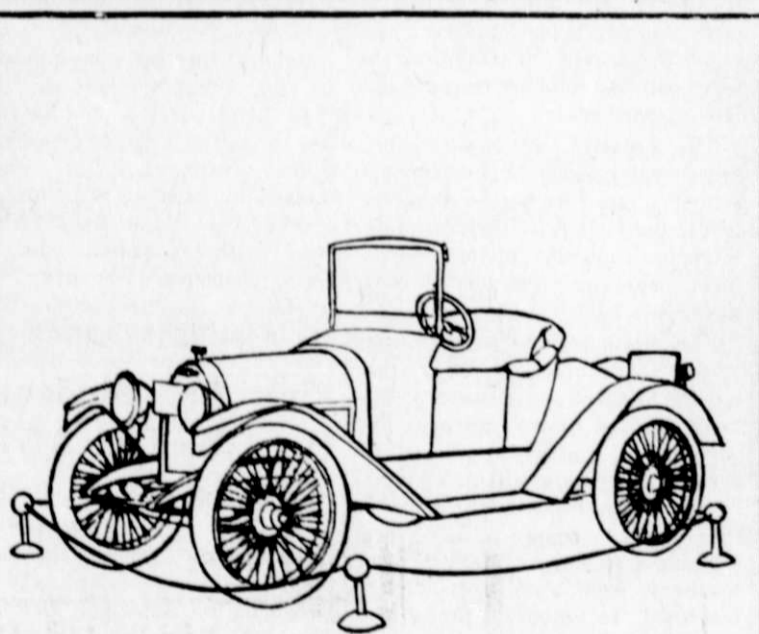

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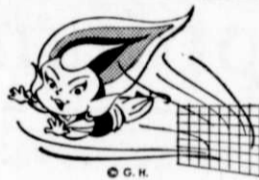
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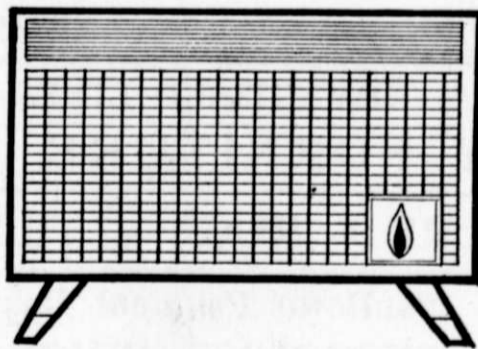

19 HUNTERS ARRESTED DURING DEER SEASON

Dodge county, with a land area more than twice the size of Washington county, registered approximately 250 deer during their nine day season. In addition over 225 of either sex were taken in the two day shoot on the federal part of the Horizon marsh.

Nineteen individuals appeared in Branch 2, Washington County Court, on Dec. 2, charged with game law violations during the

November deer season. Thirteen were charged with hunting deer after the season closed, three for transporting uncased guns, two for failure to wear red clothing while hunting rabbits in deer season, and one man paid a fine of \$50.00 plus costs for killing a doe deer in Dodge county, and making an attempt to register it in Washington county.

The duck and pheasant seasons are closed, the goose season will end on Dec. 13, and ruffed grouse on the 15. Ice fishing hours are 6:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m. Each fish shanty or shelter used for fishing

purposes on the ice of any waters, shall have the name and address of the person owning or using it painted on the outside so as to be readily seen and read at all times.

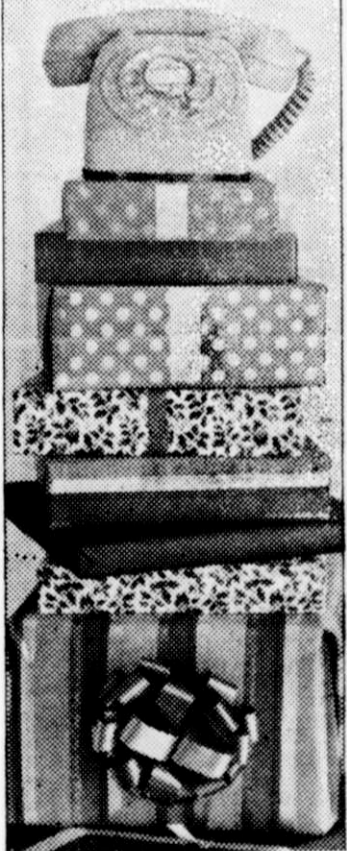
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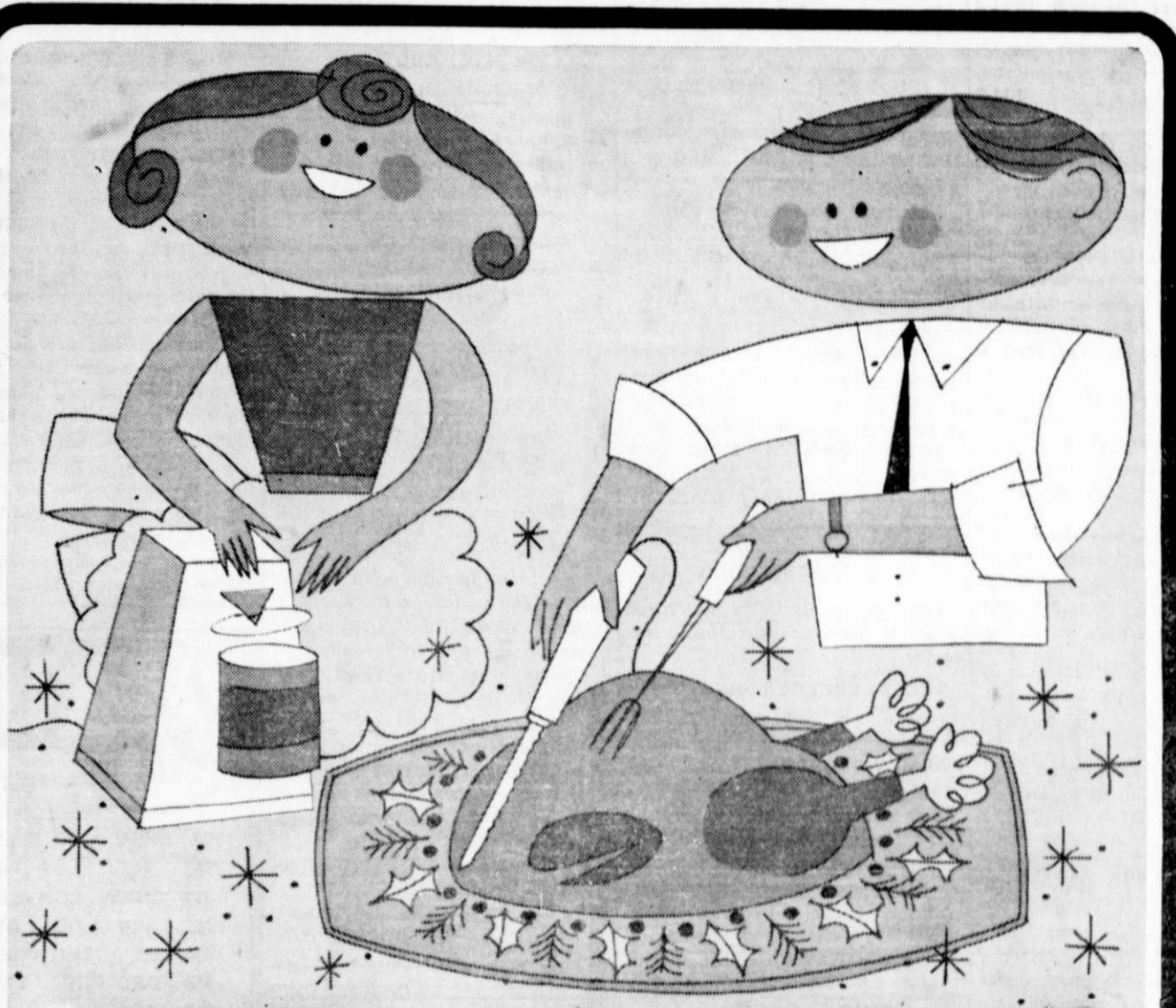

A letter from the State Department regarding the visit by state personnel was presented to the members of the Board.

Mr. Boyd reported that the Kewaskum Community High School would stay with the Scenic Mo-

rairie Conference through the 1965-1966 school year.

Mr. Boyd reported that the lathes for the Industrial Arts Department had arrived. Also, that shade screens had been installed on Mr. Mitchell's office windows.

The visitation day at other schools was mentioned.

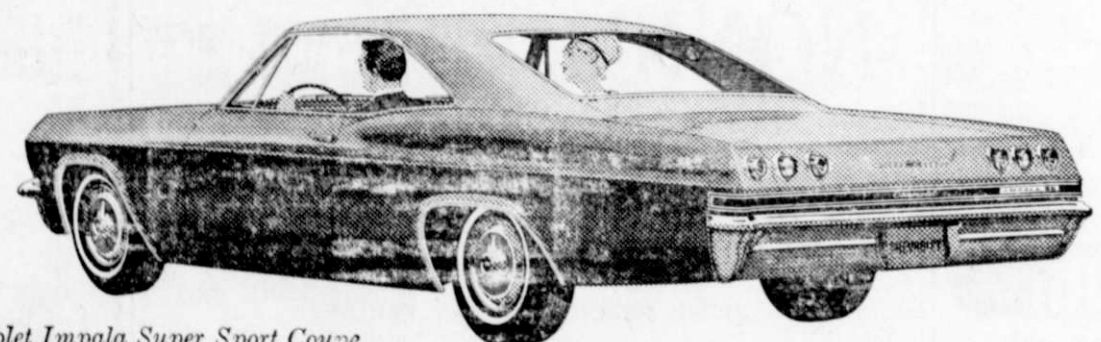
