Mary Kroncke spent seven weeks in Spain last summer. Her Spanish family has a winter home in Barcelona, Spain. She spent two days there. After that they moved to their summer home 200 miles away to the Island of Mallorca. Her Spanish father was a chemist for a Swiss chemical firm. Mary told about the national sport

in Spain, bull fighting. Many American people think this is very cruel but this is a real art in Spain. The fighters have to make certain passes to merit points and it feally is very beautiful, explained Mary. Some people may consider the food spicy but Mary thought it was rather mild when she saw the people eat plain garlic. The clothing fashions are very similar to ours. There is no compulsory education in Spain. The schools are mostly private and are run by the churches.

This was a very rewarding experience for Mary and Kewaskum is proud of her.

Eighteen year old Marion Evans, a vivacious, brown-haired young lady comes from a city of 25,000 people, Gisborne, New Zealand. Her father is a funeral director in Gisborne. Marion finished the Gisborne Girls High school and upon her return to her native country plans to attend the university.

In New Zealand, education is compulsory to the age of 15. The

school year starts in late February and continues through December. The climate is the exact opposite of ours. In December the temperatures often are in the nineties and it is very humid.

New Zealand is often called "Fisherman's Paradise" and offers a wide variety of fish. Deep sea fishing also attracts many tourists. Yachting is very popular and one of the largest regattas in the world takes place there.

The economy is based mainly on dairy products, sheep and forestry. New Zealand is one of the largest producers of dairy products in the world. Some of the wealthiest people in New Zealand are sheep farmers. There are two major political parties there, Conservative and Liberal.

Miss Evans attended the club meeting with her American mother, Mrs. Marvin Martin. There is a son Dean in the Martin family, who is a sophomore, and another son George, who is a freshman. A daughter Dawn is a senior.

Rodenkirch to Be Honored at UW Commencement

Norman Edward Rodenkirch, R. 1 Kewaskum, is among 87 students of the University of Wisconsin at Madison who will be honored for their outstanding work in their studies at the university's first full-fledged midyear commencement being held in the Wisconsin Field House on the Madison campus at 3:45 p. m. Saturday, Jan. 23.

The names of the honor students will be contained in the program for the UW's midyear commencement being held this year complete with cap and gown for the first time in university history. In past years convocations have been held by the university honoring midyear graduates, with formal commencements being held only at the end of the school year late in the spring, usually in early June.

A total of about 1,400 will be

receiving their bachelor's or higher degrees at the Madison campus commencement. Of the total, about 800 will be receiving their bachelor's degrees, about 375 their master's and about 200 their Ph. D. degrees.

The honor students who will be given special recognition in the program for the Madison campus commencement have gained a grade-point average of 3.25 in their studies for at least three semesters' work at the university beyond the sophomore year. A grade-point average of 4.00 would mean perfect grades in studies.

Baby Climbs Into Tub of Hot Water, Severely Burned

Michael Grupe, 18-months-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Karl E. Grupe of R. 1, Allenton, suffered burns over 25 per cent of his body, mainly to his legs, when he climbed into a bathtub of hot water at his parents' home Saturday evening.

Mrs. Grupe had finished giving the baby a bath and had dressed him in pajamas for the night. She was letting the hot water run into the tub to take a bath herself when she stepped out of the room for a moment. Seconds later Mr. and Mrs. Grupe heard Michael's screams and rushed into the bathroom to find that he had climbed into the tub.

The Kewaskum firemen's ambulance was called at 7:20 p. m. and the attendants rushed the baby to St. Mary's Burn Center in Milwaukee. The infant is still confined at the Burn Center, where his condition was reported as good Friday morning, although he may have to remain there for some time.

The ambulance got the baby to the Burn Center in the shortest possible time. The trained attendants radioed ahead on their ambulance radio to the county sheriff's department, which in turn radioed Milwaukee police, informing them when and where the ambulance would reach the city limits. When the ambulance reached that city on Hwy. 41, a Milwaukee police squad car was waiting for it. When the officers saw the ambulance approaching from a distance they immediately turned on their siren and led it at high speed through the city to the Burn Center, informing the ambulance attendants to stay right behind them to avoid traffic interference. While speeding through the city the police car radioed the ambulance following them, for details on the age of the infant, nature of the burns, etc. Then the police radioed ahead to the Burn Center giving them all available information so that when they arrived the attendants there were waiting for them with the necessary equipment and medication for immediate treatment of the baby. All who participated in the race to the hospital did so with the usual efficiency and greatest saving of time.

The ambulance call was received just as firemen began arriving for their annual stag party at the fire station that night.

In another ambulance call the past week, Mrs. Edna Glass of R. 2, Campbellsport, was removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, at 1:45 p. m. Sunday, Jan. 10.

Advice to Rural Mail Delivery Patrons Given

POSTMASTER APPEALS TO PATRONS TO CLEAR SNOW, REMOVE OBSTRUCTIONS

Postmaster Harry E. Koch today appealed to postal customers on rural routes to help their rural carriers make deliveries during bad winter weather.

The Kewaskum post office has

two rural routes, covering the area of New Fane, Beechwood, St. Michaels, Wayne and Kewaskum.

Koch said that at the same time he hopes all authorities concerned with rural routes where snow and other bad weather hampers the carriers will continue to cooperate.

The postmaster listed these points of particular concern:

1. Approaches to rural mail boxes must be kept open by customers.

2. Obstructions to delivery of mail on rural routes should be removed or minimized to the fullest extent possible.

Where rural boxes pose a problem, the carrier may leave form 4056, "Your Mailbox Needs Attention," a notice to keep box approaches clear by promptly removing all obstructions, including snow, which may make mail delivery difficult or impossible.

Unless approaches are cleared, it may be necessary to temporarily withhold delivery of mail, the postmaster pointed out.

Rural carriers are not required to perform service on foot when roads cannot be traveled with the vehicles normally used, but they are expected to make every reasonable effort to serve as many of

their patrons as possible without physical exertion or added financial cost, he explained.

If excessive detours are necessary to effect delivery of mail, customers should temporarily relocate their boxes on the new line of travel, arrange to receive their mail through other patrons' boxes, or make other arrangements for their mail until travel on the roads affected can be resumed.

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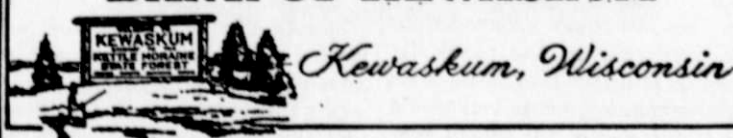
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Kiwanis Golden Anniversary Proclamation

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Kewaskum Has 60 Businesses, County 783, Count Shows

Figures have just been released by Albert Nicolet, Milwaukee district manager of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., giving the latest figures on the business population of Washington county.

According to a recent physical count of the current edition of the Dun & Bradstreet reference book, Washington county has a total of 783 manufactureres, wholesalers and retailers. This does not include some of the service and professional businesses, such as beauty and barber shops, security dealers and real estate brokers.

The number of businesses listed in the principal communities in Washington county are as follows:

Allenton, 35; Colgate 11; Germantown, 61; Hartford, 164; Hubertus, 11; Jackson, 35; Kewaskum, 60; Newburg, 15; Richfield, 24; Slinger, 60; West Bend, 304.

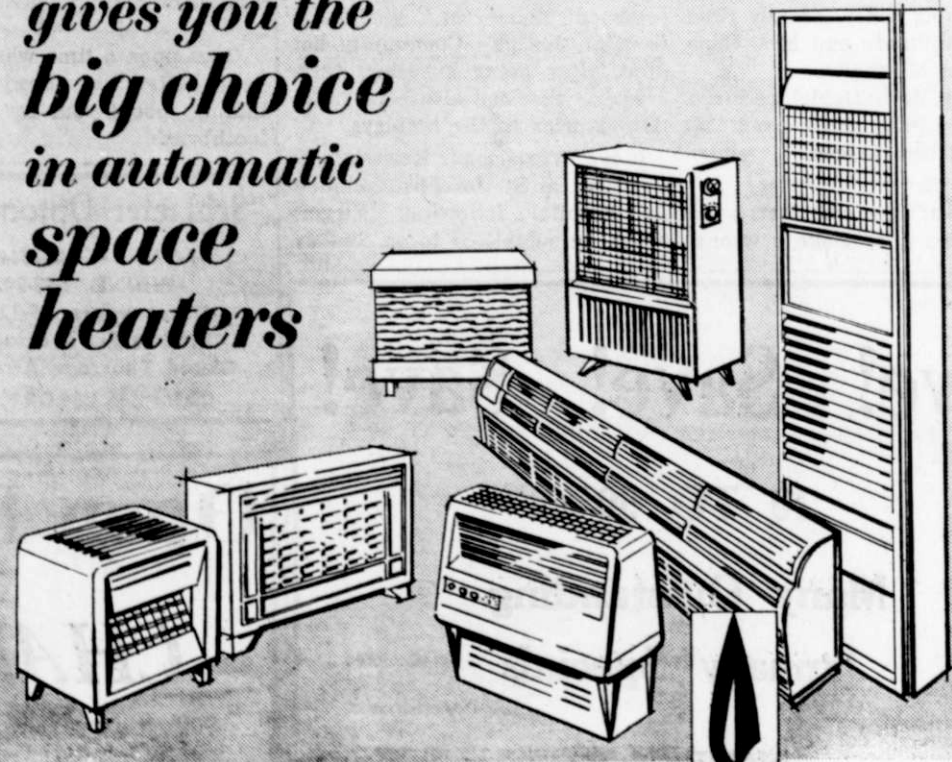

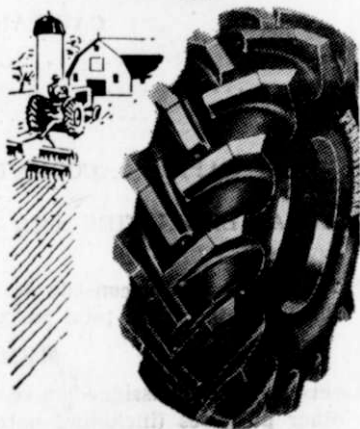

Looking Thru the Field Glasses...

TOTAL DEER KILL FOR YEAR IN COUNTY IS 453

The lack of snow and cold, clear weather this past weekend found hundreds of fishermen, skaters and ice boat enthusiasts operating on local lakes. Fishing was fair to good, and the ice was in excellent shape for the others.

The deer kill in Washington county for the year 1964 is as follows: Gun season 343, bow and arrow season 6, car kill 104, for a total of 453. It seems a shame that about 25% of the deer killed in the county are wasted.

In the month of October, War-

den Edward Hill, Hayward, caught 17 night deer hunting outfits involving 36 hunters. They were fined nearly \$4,000 and sentenced to a total of 200 days in jail. According to Hill's report, one arrest netted a homemade pickup camper with a trap door in the roof and intercom, especially designed for shining operations.

Individuals who purchased sportsmen's licenses last fall should obtain the 1965 fishing regulations before they go out this year. There are some changes. Regulations are available wherever a license is sold.

Snow Time for Fox Hunting

Weather and snow conditions permitting, the fox hunter will have his dogs out running every chance he can or at least as often as time permits. This is a sport which provides a great deal of pleasure for sportsmen during a time of the year when most other hunting seasons have closed. It is enjoyed by women and children as well as the old bearded sportsmen.

Because of the usual fresh snow conditions required for fox hunting, a new book is written after each snowfall and this is one reason you'll do well to take the youngsters along so they may enjoy and learn of the wonders of mother nature.

You will be amazed at the information you can gather during

a hunt, such as the location and type of cover each species of game use, the amount of each type of game present and the lack of it, the condition and available food at this time of year (which is now all important), and the amount of predation and possible illegal hunting activity.

You as a hunter can use this information next hunting season to make it more successful, and also to be a more informed conservationist.

Don't become over-enthused when a fox is being run and neglect to have your gun unloaded and encased while transporting it. Each year a considerable number of hunters have difficulties with the law over this very important safety regulation.
