## Reuben Schaefer Dies at Age 54 Of Heart Attack

Reuben W. Schaefer, 54, well known resident of R. 2, Kewaskum, who lived just north of the village limits, passed away unexpectedly of a heart attack on Monday morning, Feb. 15, at about 7:45 a. m. while at work at the West Bend Company.

Mr. Schaefer had been an employee in the engineering department of the West Bend Company for 36 years and was a member of the 31-year-club of that firm. For two years he also taught welding at the West Bend Vocational school. He was also a member of the Kettle Moraine Sportsmen's association of Kewaskum.

A lifelong resident of the town of Kewaskum, he was born there on Feb. 17, 1911, a son of the late August and Mary Kocher Schaefer. He married the former Gertrude Reggel on July 5, 1938. Mr. Schaefer would have observed his 54th birthday on Wednesday of this week.

Survivors include the widow, three daughters, Gloria (Mrs. Mark Rodenkirch) of Kewaskum, Dianne (Mrs. Dave Weber) of Waupun and her twin Donna (Mrs. Frank Stoffel) of R. 2, Campbellsport; four grandchildren, three sons-in-law, three sisters, Mrs. Henry Petermann and Mrs. Lorena Petermann, both of R. 2, Campbellsport, and Mrs. Jack Tessar of Kewaskum; one brother, Marvin Schaefer of Kewaskum; his mother-in-law, Mrs. Catherine Reggel, and many other relatives and friends.

Friends paid their respects at Miller's Funeral home in Kewaskum from 2 p. m. Wednesday. Funeral services were conducted at 10 a. m. Thursday, Feb. 18, at the funeral home with the Rev. John T. Budde officiating. Burial took place in the new Holy Trinity parish cemetery.

### JACK TESSAR, WILMER PROST ARE CHAIRMEN

Business and rural division of the 1965 Heart Fund campaign will conduct their solicitation on Feb. 12-24 it was announced today by Dr. R. G. Edwards, community chairman of the drive here.

Jack Tessar will head the division whose workers will canvass business firms and Wilmer Prost will lead the volunteers who will solicit in a two-mile radius outside the community limits.

## Bar Association of County Meets, Has Panel Discussion

### ROGER McKENNA ELECTED ASSOCIATION SECRETARY

The legal uncertainties over the present status of jointly held property was commented upon extensively by Judge Joseph W. Wilkus of Sheboygan county, candidate for the Wisconsin Supreme court, in a panel discussion on probate practices and procedure Thursday evening at the Washington County Bar association meeting. The meeting and dinner was held at the Linden Inn near Big Cedar lake.

Also on the panel were Judges Milton Meister, Lester Buckley and Robert J. Stoltz of Washington county, and Judge Jerold Murphy of Fond du Lac county.

Judge Wilkus, 52, recently elected chairman of the Wisconsin Board of County Judges, also emphasized in a brief news interview that "the judiciary, as one of the three check-and-balance branches of our government, is sometimes called the most powerful because least checked. Yet by the nature of its purpose and function it carries the least popular appeal. Even though it is the voter who has the ultimate control on all three departments, the contrast between the percentage voting in the spring and fall elections is reason for concern."

## Girl Injured in Toboggan Mishap

Sue Scannell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Scannell, Kewaskum, suffered painful injuries in a tobogganing mishap on Monday evening. She was a member of a CYO group of Holy Trinity parish enjoying a tobogganing party on a hill at Hon-E-Kor Country club when the accident occurred.

Sue was at the foot of the hill with other companions when she was accidentally struck by another toboggan descending the hill. She was tossed some distance and landed skidding on her face in the ice coated snow. The young lady, a freshman at Kewaskum Community High school, suffered a fractured nose, severe lacerations inside her lower lip and underneath her jaw which required the taking of a number of stitches, a couple of "shiners," and other bruises.

Miss Scannell was taken to a local physician's office for treatment of her injuries and then was removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, where she spent the night.

Another member of the CYO party, David Bingen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Bingen, R. 2, Campbellsport also was struck by the toboggan and received a bruised cheek and scratches.

Following the tobogganing party the CYO group returned to Holy Trinity parish hall for hot chocolate and snacks.

The Kewaskum fire department will serve as host to the Badger Firemen's association at its 47th annual tournament the last Sunday in June, 1940, it was decided at the association's meeting held at Plymouth. This will be one of the biggest events ever held here as the association is composed of 20 departments. Fire Chief Harry Schaefer, William Schaub and Walter Bruessel attended the meeting as delegates and A. P. Schaeffer and Philip McLaughlin accompanied them. The local delegation used enough influence to bring the tournament here over West Bend, which also put in a strong bid. The tournament in Kewaskum will be the first one in 34 years, since 1905. It will be the third time in the association's history that the event will be held in our little city, the other one being held in 1898, the second year of the association's organiza-

tion. At that time it was called the Washington-Ozaukee and North Milwaukee Firemen's association and the name was changed to Badger Firemen's association in 1913. After holding the 1905 tourney here, Kewaskum dropped out until 1933 when it rejoined. Speaking before the assemblage at Plymouth, Chief Schaefer stated that Kewaskum has the facilities to make the tournament an outstanding success and can show visiting firemen a real enjoyable time with a new park and plenty of room for contests, parking and festivities.

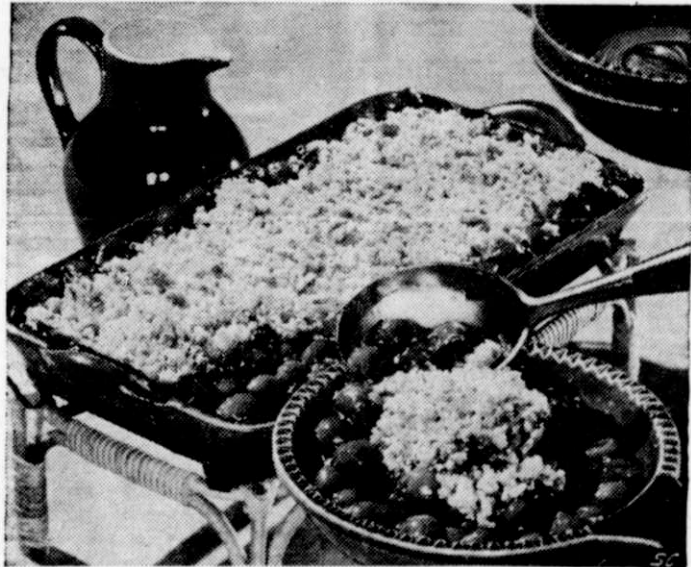

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### George Washington Cherry Cobbler

| 2 No. 303 cans red cherries               | 1-1/2 cups prepared |
| 1-1/2 cups sugar                          | biscuit mix         |
| 3 tablespoons cornstarch                  | 2 tablespoons sugar |
| 6 to 8 drops red food coloring if desired | 1 egg               |
| 2 teaspoons lemon juice                   | Light cream—Sugar   |

Combine sugar and cornstarch; add cherries and cook until thick. Add food coloring and lemon juice. Pour into a 8-1/2 x 2-inch baking dish. Combine biscuit mix and sugar. Break egg into measuring cup and beat slightly with a fork. Add light cream to make 2/3 cup. Add to biscuit mix and stir to moisten flour. Spoon over hot fruit. Sprinkle with sugar. Bake in moderately hot (400°) oven for 25 to 30 minutes. Makes 8 servings. Serve with cream.

(Note: If sweetened cherries are used decrease sugar to 1 cup and cornstarch to 2 tablespoons.)

**Local, Area Pastors Attend Sessions at Winnebago Hospital**

A special program, to acquaint clergymen more intimately with the work of Winnebago State hospital and with current trends in mental health, was attended in Winnebago on Monday of this week by the Revs. Herbert Feierabend of Salem United Church of Christ, Wayne, Herbert Stemler of St. Martin's United Church of Christ, Fillmore, and St. John's, Boltonville, and Dan Schowalter of Peace United Church of Christ, Kewaskum. Nearly two hundred pastors attended the sessions, from within a radius of one hundred miles from the hospital.

The nature and purposes of the hospital were described by the superintendent, Dr. Darold A. Treffert. He indicated that the hospital is much less static and isolated than formerly, with a more vital program and outreach to the community, including the clergy. The growing investment in budget of recent years is now paying dividends with increased and earlier discharge of patients, and with fewer patients returning to the hospital after release. The hospital's approach is that of considering the whole person and all the spheres in which he moves, including the spiritual, rather than looking only at the injured psyche or emotions.

Indications of mental illness

were presented and discussed by Dr. Gordon Filmer-Bennett, chief psychologist. This included case presentation of the more common emotional disorders requiring hospitalization. Factors that might aid in or militate against the patient's recovery were spelled out, together with implications for the pastor's relationship with the patient and his family.

Slides were used to illustrate the types of experience which a patient typically meets in his progress through the hospital. The slides were presented and explained by Mrs. Julaine Farrow, acting director of nursing services. Then one type of experience, that which takes place in the relationship of a patient and a social worker, was presented in further detail by Mrs. Merle Schwei, a social worker on one of the psychiatric services. The social worker explores and summarizes the patient's basic life situation upon admission. She interviews him while in the hospital, and also members of his family when possible. She communicates with key figures in the patient's home community, and formulates a discharge plan which seeks to ensure the environment and resources that he will need upon release.

Four chaplains serve the patients at the hospital with a religious ministry: Father Andrew L. Nelson, Rev. Dayton G. Van Deusen, Rev. J. B. Windle, and Rev. Louis A. Winter. In a joint presentation, they pictured the activities of the chaplains, their gen-

eral visitation and worship program; their counseling work with the mentally ill; their teaching and interpreting function, within and outside of the hospital; and the adaptation of the Catholic liturgy for the benefit of mental patients, and for involving them as participants in the community of worship.

## County Agent News Notes

### FRUIT GROWERS TO MEET

The Washington-Dodge County Fruit Growers association will hold its annual meeting Wednesday, Feb. 24, in the Electric Company meeting room, West Bend.

Paul Cypher, chairman, will conduct a part of the meeting, and your county agent will conduct the remainder. The subject this year is primarily good orchard management.

All people interested in growing apples are invited to attend. If you wish, you may join the association at that time.

### BULLETINS AVAILABLE

We did a little reorganization in the extension office last week. Spring is nearly here, and many of our Washington county citizens will want the bulletins that are available on lawns, landscaping, gardens, spraying, etc. We have therefore tried to create a "horticulture center."

This is your invitation to come to the office and look over these bulletins to see if there is information that will interest you for the coming season. The office is open from 8:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. (except the noon hour), Monday through Friday. It is located on the second floor of the old court house, West Bend.

### BUILDING PROBLEMS

Once or twice a year, or oftener if necessary, we try to have an engineer visit Washington county from the University of Wisconsin College of Agriculture. It is our intent to have him visit farms that are having a building problem, you can expect help from this man.

Ted Brevik of the agricultural engineering department is coming to the county Friday, March 5, about 10:00 a. m. We invite you to call the office, stop in, or write, if you have a building problem and would like to see the engineer. If you will do this, we will plan to visit you some time during the day.

### HOLSTEIN BOARD ELECTS

The Washington County Hol-

stein association board of directors met last week to organize itself. During the course of the last few years there had been some confusion in some of the elections, but it is now definitely stated as to who are the directors and for what term. These are: three-year term—Christ Mayer, John Horlamus, Howard Proeber; two-year term—Bob Held, Ed Melius, Cyril Rohde; one-year term—Philip Frey, Fred Schroeder, Tom Wiedmeyer.

Officers for the coming year are John Horlamus, West Bend, succeeding himself as chairman; Cyril Rohde, Hartford, vice-chairman; and Christ Mayer, Slinger, continuing as secretary-treasurer.

You have to give Holstein men credit for being dedicated and proud dairymen. This is good. It means they are interested in the breed, in dairying, and they are interested in their young people who are active Holstein breeders. This is as it should be. We think the promotion the breed has had throughout the state indicates real interest.

### DHIA PRODUCTION RECORDS

The DHIA quarterly herd average report came to my office last week. I was amazed and proud to read some of the production records that are coming through on some of our standard herds.

The 49 standard herds averaged 13,091 lbs. of milk, with a 3.7 test and 487 lbs. butterfat. The 156 owner-sampler herds averaged 12,136 lbs. of milk, with a 3.7 test, and 443 lbs butterfat.

Let's take a look at some of the high herds, and I will quote only the butterfat per cow: Tom Wiedmeyer, 589; Jim Esselmann, 583; Howard Proeber, 561; James Wiedmeyer, 552; Sylvan Becker, 549; Herbert Clausing and Sons, 544; Guido Schroeder and Egbert Muth, 533; Paul Pamperin, 530; Joe Schmitt, 528; Hilbert Scheunemann, 526; F. C. and W. C. Schroeder, 516; Dietrich Schluter, 514; Leo Becker, 513; Jacob Serman, 510; Roland and Gerald Rate, 508; Harvey Schmidt, 504;

Philip Frey, 502; and Felix and Lawrence Doerfert, 500.

These are very good production figures, and we think these men are laying the basis for some good efficient milk production in their herds.

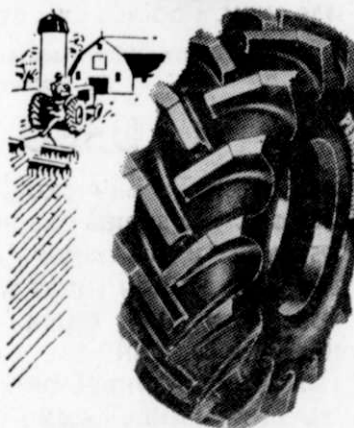

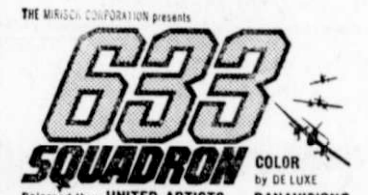

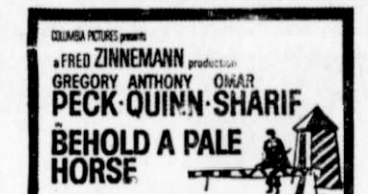

### Looking Thru the Field Glasses...

#### DOGS SEEN CHASING DEER; PIKE, BASS FISHING ENDS

On Monday morning, Feb. 8, a local citizen saw a deer (tongue hanging out) running slowly towards Big Cedar lake. This was on the south side of the West Bend Country club. A short time later three dogs came thru on the trail, one a large brown animal, the second a medium size black and white, and the third a small black animal. The larger of the three was dusted with fine shot and left blood tracks on the snow. When last seen they were in the vicinity

of the kettle of Little Cedar lake. The owners of these dogs should keep them tied up.

Monday, Feb. 15, was the last day for fishing northern pike, bass and walleyed pike in Washington county. The season on these species will remain closed until May 8, 1965.

#### Critical Days for Wildlife

The days from now until the spring breakup are critical days for all wildlife. Favorable weather will assist in pulling them through, bad weather will be rough on them and may take many unless man lends a helping hand.

If you have been feeding, be sure you continue to make food available. The birds have by now learned to depend on you and if you don't continue to make it available to them, they will starve.

If you haven't been feeding, and know where there is a flock of birds, you can assist them greatly through these critical days by making food available to them.

Your local warden can advise you where you can get the necessary feed if you don't have any available.

These are critical days, not on-

ly for small birds and animals, but also for deer. Their needs however are somewhat different. Dogs will harm deer in these coming weeks more than anything else. Even without deep snow, dogs raise havoc with deer and especially at this time of the year.

Most of the dogs that cause the damage are not wild, as used to be common belief. They are hunting dogs, farm dogs and pet dogs.

We are sure that no one wants

their dog to be running or harming deer; but if you don't keep your dog confined, he might be doing just that.

Any dog that isn't confined, is a potential deer killer.

Let's all pitch in and help our wild friends through these critical days. This extra effort could pay great dividends come next hunting season.
