Opposition for Two Offices on Village Ballot

CONTESTS FOR TRUSTEE. SUPERVISOR OFFICES IN SPRING ELECTION

Friday, Mar. 19, was the last day for filing nomination papers for village offices to be elected in the spring election on Tuesday, Apr. 6, when polls in the municipal building will be open from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m.

A village president, three trustees and a supervisor will be elected in this spring's election for two year terms. The three remaining trustees hold over in office until next year. Assessor and justice of the peace offices are no longer elective in the village.

Village President Wayland D. Tessar will be a candidate for reelection without opposition. Two of the incumbent trustees, Alfred Kral and Cyril Wietor, will be candidates for re-election while the third, Richard Reigle, did not file nomination papers for re-election and will not be a candidate. Two new candidates seeking the Blumer and Carl Freehauf. Three of the four candidates will be elected. Supervisor Elwyn M. Romaine, who has held this position many years, and is chairman of the Washington county board, will be opposed by Francis N. Bohn on the ticket.



Mobile Chest X-Ray Unit to Be Here Next Week

WILL ALSO VISIT WAYNE, BOLTONVILLE; EXAMINE FOR TB, CANCER, HEART TROUBLE

An invitation has been issued to residents of Washington county to take part in the public health program of the mobile chest x-ray unit. Miss Helen M. Degner, R. N., supervisory health nurse of Washington county, has urged that all adults take part in the survey which is sponsored and approved by the State Board of Health, the Washington County Medical society, and the Washington County Public Health Nursing Service.

According to Miss Degner, the survey, which is free, will demonstrate that x-ray can find tuberculosis, cancer and some forms of heart trouble. No disrobing is necessary, the entire procedure takes only five minutes. A report will be sent to you and your physician in about four weeks. As usual, the program will have the support of volunter workers who met recently to aid the program. 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

The committee submits that ence the designated boundaries eminent domain come into play, in that it will penalize anyone for owning a home where the government wants to build a park.

Wisconsin state statutes do not compensate or take into consideration property losses stemming from the mere announcement that the government intends to condemn property. In other words, owners will be paid not the value at the time of official announcement of the project, but rather the rundown value at the time the government finally decides to take physical possession of the property. In one case in the state of New York, 23 years elapsed between publication of intention to condemn and actual time of possession. In Michigan, over a six year period dating back to 1959, property values of affected areas have depreciated one-third the original market value.

The committee also submits that this constitutes a misuse of the right of eminent domain. Setting aside private property for recreational purposes is one thing, but official publication designed to bring financial disaster to unsuspecting property owners is anoth-

DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME IS EXTENDED

Gov. Warren Knowles last week signed legislation extending daylight saving time from the last Sunday in April until the last Sunday in October. Previously daylight time was in effect from the last Sunday in April until the last Sunday in September only in Wisconsin. The extension was approved by the legislature so that daylight time in Wisconsin would conform with neighboring states and thus coincide with railroad schedules and other time tables and avoid the confusion which ex isted under the old set-up.

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

At 1:30 p. m. Tuesday, March 30, consumers are being invited to meet at the Kewaskum Labor Temple, where a specialist from the Meat and Animal Science Department of the University of Wisconsin will conduct a demonstration and discussion on selecting meat cuts. This specialist is Quin Kolb (years ago his sister was home agent in Washington county). He will cut the loins and the other parts of the carcass, and present a discussion on selecting cuts, what to look for, etc. All consumers of pork products are invited to attend.



SPEARING PROHIBITED; FISHING RESTRICTIONS

Fishing thru the ice is limited from 6:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m. daily. There is no restrictions for open water fishing. Hook and line fishing is permitted twenty-four hours a day after the ice is gone.

Spearing for rough fish during daylight hours in Washington and Ozaukee counties is prohibited until April 21. Night spearing is prohibited at all times (state-wide).

The season is closed for bass, walleyed pike, trout, northern pike and sturgeon. The panfish season is open all year. However, there is a 50 in the aggregate daily bag limit on perch, bluegill, sunfish and crappie. There is no daily bag limit on white bass, rock bass and bullhead.




