## Tom Larsen Selected For Award to Attend Summer Institute

Thomas Larsen, who teaches mathematics in the junior high program of the Kewaskum Elementary school, has been selected as a recipient of an award to attend a summer institute in mathematics at Wisconsin State University-Eau Claire.

This institute, supported by the National Science Foundation, is for key elementary school personnel.

The purposes of the institute are: 1. To provide an understanding of the mathematical concepts necessary to teach a good modern mathematics program. 2. To provide information concerning recent developments and trends in the elementary school mathematics curriculum. 3. To prepare participants to help conduct in-service programs in modern mathematics in their own school system.

The seminar will provide participants the opportunity: 1. To examine the relevance of the content of the institute courses to current elementary school mathematics programs. 2. To develop and accumulate materials to be used in the arithmetic classroom. 3. To help secure and develop materials and procedures that will enable participants to help conduct in-service mathematics programs in their school systems.

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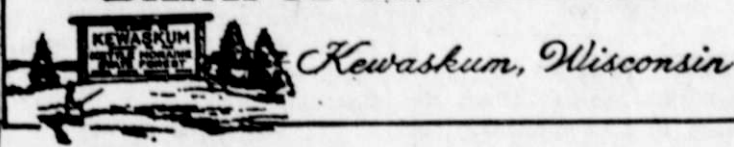
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### Hubert P. Klein, Retired Farmer, Official Dies

Hubert P. Klein, 82, of R. 2, Kewaskum, passed away at 7:05 p. m. Thursday, Apr. 15, at St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, where he was confined for nine weeks.

He was born Nov. 14, 1882, in the town of Auburn, a son of the late Peter and Margaret Fellenz Klein, and was married to Susan Mertes on Apr. 11, 1907, at Holy Trinity church, Kewaskum.

Mr. Klein farmed in the town of Wayne for 40 years before his retirement. During this time he served as trustee of St. Bridget's congregation for 20 years, town assessor for eight years, and also as school clerk of the Campbell school district for 10 years.

### Must Cut State Spending, Speaker Tells Kiwanians

(Special)—Wisconsin's tax problem is a spending problem created by government growing at a faster rate than the economy, John Hennick, Milwaukee, a representative of the Public Expenditure Survey of Wisconsin, told the Kewaskum Kiwanis club here Monday at the Hon-E-Kor Country club.

The Public Expenditure Survey of Wisconsin is a private nonprofit nonpolitical government research and service agency for state-wide and community taxpayer organizations.

"Are we going to take another income tax increase when our income tax places us at a disadvantage in competition with other states? Are we going to sacrifice the property tax relief we bargained for at the price of a selective sales tax, higher income taxes and income tax withholding? Or are we going to lower the boom on state spending?" Hennick asked.

Hennick said taxpayer organizations have demonstrated how state spending can be reduced to prevent tax increases. He said they are asking for a ceiling on the amount of aid the state will pay per school pupil, a streamlining of state government agencies, and a single board to control all tax-supported post-high school education.

"Taxpayer groups feel state spending can be cut. They are certain that every state administrator knows where he could cut in his department if he had to. He knows which phases of his operations are most expendable and least essential," Hennick said.

Hennick said the public generally is not aware that Wisconsin taxpayers pay more per person than government would cost in the states which are our principal competitors for job-producing business and industry.

"Our economic climate is such that to management and financial men it makes Wisconsin unattractive," Hennick said.

"When a new industry is thinking of coming into the state there

is the added hazard that the potential manager may say to his boss 'I don't want to work in Wisconsin because the state income taxes are too high,'" Hennick said.

Hennick said that Wisconsin is not going backward economically but that if the rest of the United States were standing still, Wisconsin would be losing ground.

"We cannot permit our government costs to continue to expand at a faster rate than the economy that is supplying the taxes," Hennick said.

## County Agent News Notes

### FARMERS IMPATIENT

Farmers normally are a very patient group of men. They till the soil, plant the crop, and harvest it. There is a long period of waiting between each phase. But I think that farmers right now are showing more impatience as a group than I have ever seen in 18 years as a county agent. Rightly so, because there are years when we see all the grain planted and a good share of the plowing done by the middle of April. And here we are, just about to get started. Have a little more patience, Friend Farmer — you will still get your oats planted in plenty of time. But I'll bet we burn a lot of midnight oil this year, and we'll cut the planting time required to plant all the oats in Washington county to an all-time minimum.

### SIGNS ON SLOW VEHICLES

Kenneth Kohlwey, who is one of the tractor leaders in the Washington county 4-H club program, has asked that we give you a report on the slow-moving vehicle sign now being popularized in Wisconsin. Kenneth says that a slow-moving vehicle is one traveling under 25 mph. If this sign is properly placed on the vehicle, it is an immediate means of recog-

nition for motorists coming from behind that it is moving slowly. This is very important at night.

These signs are available from your dealers. They are also available from 4-H tractor members. It would be a good idea to have one for each slow-moving vehicle you have that might be on the road at night.

The 4-H leaders in this tractor project deserve a pat on the back for the fine work they are doing with the young boys in their clubs.

Last week a farmer asked about the procedure for naming his farm. It was his sons who wanted to do this, and he was equally enthusiastic, but didn't know how to go about it.

We checked with the register of deeds, and this is the procedure. First of all, choose the name that you would like to have for your farm. Report to the register of deeds in the Washington county court house, and give them this information. They will then check the names of farms registered and see if it is already taken. If not, it will then be recorded, it will cost you \$1.00, and this will be the name of your farm. You might use your imagination a little in choos-

ing a name — if there is a single pine tree standing by itself somewhere, it could be the Lonesome Pine farm; or Gnarled Oak farm, or Sleepy Creek farm. This is a good idea, and remember that if you ever want to register cattle, this name can be the prefix on your cattle that were bred in your herd.

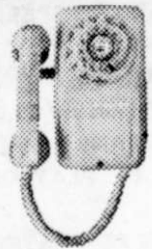

West Bend. The meeting will start with Benediction and Rosary at 7:30 p. m., followed by a program on Judaism. Election of new officers for the district will also be held.

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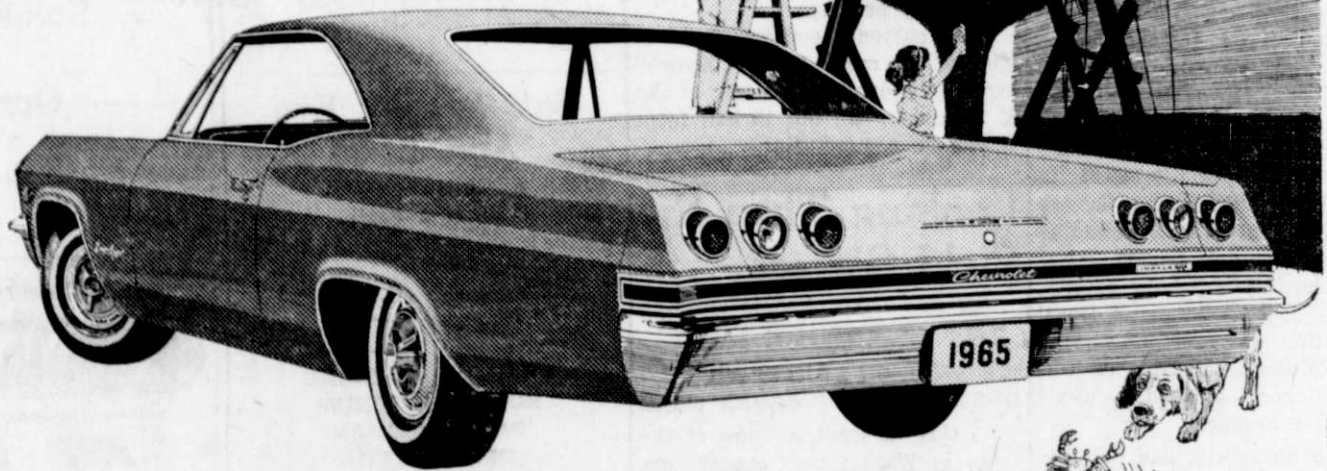
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
