To provide information concerning recent developments and trends in the elementary school ties curriculum. 3. To prepare participants to help conduct inservice programs in modern mathematics in their own school system.

The seminar will provide participants the opportunity: 1. To examine the relevance of the content of the institute courses to cur. rent elementary school mathematics programs. 2. To develop and accumulate materials to be used in the arithmetic classroom. 3. 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
