Cancer Crusade Envelopes Are Circulated Here

MAIL PHASE OF CAMPAIGN GOT UNDERWAY IN COUNTY RURAL AREAS THURSDAY

American Cancer society "neighbor-to-neighbor" envelopes are now circulating in all residential areas of the village of Kewaskum, reported village unit chairman Mrs. Norman Held.

Envelopes contain educational and instructional leaflets urging recognition of cancer danger signals and prompt medical treatment—the best known remedy to curable cancers. Voluntary contribution envelopes to continue the "fight against cancer" are also enclosed.

Residents are requested to promptly move the red and white packets along the route specified. Last year's crusade produced record high contributions of over \$400.00 in the village under the co-leadership of Mrs. Held and Mrs. Jack Tessar. Mrs. Tessar is vice-chairman of the 1965 crusade.

The Washington county unit of the American Cancer society is headed by Guido Schroeder. Lehman Rosenheimer of Kewaskum serves as county unit vice-president and director.

Schroeder said "neighbor" programs also began this week in West Bend, Jackson, Slinger and Germantown. He said the rural and special gift phase of the crusade, conducted by direct mail, got underway Thursday, April 28.

"Last year, 550,000 more Americans fell victim to cancer — 290,000 died of cancer. Why should these people not have a chance to live?"

These words begin an important message which will reach every rural household in Washington county, announced Schroeder, in the direct mail phase of the 1965 "Crusade Against Cancer" which began Thursday.

Schroeder urged every family contacted in the mail campaign to carefully read the educational and instructional material. "Have a medical checkup annually. Learn the seven danger signals of cancer," his message states. "Early diagnosis and prompt treatment can save one out of two."

Contributions for continued research against incurable cancer are also solicited. Handy reply envelopes are enclosed for that purpose. Contributions can also be sent directly to the village and township chairmen for the crusade. These include:

ASK PARENTS TO ENROLL PUPILS AT ELEMENTARY SCHOOL MAY 10 AND 11

This year's annual "round-up" for the parents of prospective kindergarten pupils or beginning 1st graders will be held during the day, on Monday, May 10, and Tuesday, May 11, from 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon, and 1:00 to 3:00 p. m. in the elementary school office.

To be eligible for enrollment in kindergarten, children must have attained their fifth birthday prior to Sept. 1, 1965, and for 1st grade they must have attained their sixth birthday prior to Sept. 1, 1965. Evidence of date of birth, either a birth certificate or a baptismal certificate, must be brought to the office at the time of enrolling.

Parents will be asked to register their children for next year's term and to fill out the child's health record. If you know of any new families in this district that have children eligible for kindergarten, please pass this information on to them.

Supervising Principal Richard E. Zarling should like to impress upon parents the importance of registering their child on either of these two days to insure them the best chance of having the child in the section you prefer (a. m. or p. m.) or first grade so that the school may plan for them.

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

KEWASKUM

Warns Home Owners Against 'Peddlers'

Word received at the Washington county extension office from the State Department of Agriculture warns home owners to be careful when solicited by persons selling door to door. This word of warning is especially important to homeowners solicited by persons claiming to be selling a product which is represented as being industrial or commercial grade.

An example is someone selling industrial or commercial grade carpeting. They talk in terms of their product selling from \$18.00 to \$25.00 per yard, that it is industrial or commercial, and that it is left from some big job they had just completed. Actually when compared to carpeting available locally, it would be in the \$7 to \$10 per yard bracket. Equally important, the guy who estimated the needs of your house probably overestimated it at about 30 per cent. These people represent themselves many times as being interior decorators, but in their trade they are known as closing artists, and about the only thing they can decorate the interior of is their own billfolds.

Take these precautions, says the department: Take your time when these people approach you door-to-door. Find out as much about them and their product as you can, then compare quality, especially when they say their product is superior and not available in local establishments. Also, don't be rushed into buying, and this is important at any time. Don't fall for the old line of "a very limited supply" or "this is your last chance" or "get in on a good bargain." Your local deals don't work that way because they want you to be a satisfied customer.

Further, don't be misled by offers of something for nothing. Nothing is free these days. Keep the sample when ordering an installation. Then there will be no dispute about what you have bought. And make sure you check the tag for fiber content. Also, read and look before signing any contract. Make sure all terms, agreements and promises are in writing, and all financing costs and arrangements are disclosed, and that blank spaced in the contract are filled in or a line drawn through.

It is also important that you

know the difference between a contract and a note or negotiable instrument before signing. You may be obligated to pay a bank or a lending institution regardless of any claims you may have against the seller.

Also, read the guarantee and look it over thoroughly. Remember that a lifetime guarantee is worthless if you can't find the person who made the guarantee. If you don't know carpeting, know your dealer. Deal only with reputable people whom you can trust. Finally, complain immediately if you have been defrauded. Make sure you have all the papers and facts available, and don't delay.

County Agent News Notes

GRASS FIRE DANGER

I read in the West Bend News last week that Fire Chief Carl Peters is very much concerned about spring grass fires.

We take this opportunity to encourage landowners to do everything they can to cut firelanes along their fencerows, and certainly along the woodland, so that this extremely dry grass will not have a chance to burn. If it should catch fire, at least it will come to the firelane and then die out for lack of fuel.

This is an obligation on the part of any landowner. Remember that fire out of hand, fanned by a high wind, can move far more rapidly than any fire department can move to put it out. If someone's house or other buildings or valuable property, along with wild life and wildlife cover, is in the way, it goes too. No landowner wants to be in the position where he feels he has caused undue harm to someone else. The best way to eliminate this—and we certainly agree with Carl Peters in this—is to cut the firelanes immediately, to avoid any possible future damage.

WINTER WHEAT DAMAGE

We understand there are some problems with winter wheat. I have had a couple calls on it, and

in both instances the wheat is not in very good condition. We can't say that all winter wheat is dead, but we will suggest that you keep a close eye on it. If it is not shaping up properly then dig it up and plant something else. You might put in some oats so that you won't lose a crop from that acreage.

BOATING REGULATIONS

When the Wisconsin Legislature enacted Section 30.50 to 30.90 of the Wisconsin Statutes, (REGULATION OF BOATING), they agreed to certain restrictions laid out by the US COAST GUARD.

Section 30.62 (3) reads as follows: LIFE PRESERVERS. Every boat shall carry at least one life preserver, life belt, ring buoy, buoyant cushion or other device of the sort prescribed by the regulations of the commandant of the U. S. coast guard, for each person on board, so placed as to be readily accessible.

At the present time the coast guard insists that each life preserver must have their buoyant material encased in waterproof vinyl. Outer covers might still be cloth or other material.

Life preservers must have the following coast guard approval numbers to meet our requirements. You will note each type of preserver has a different coast guard approval number, other numbers are obsolete.

This is one of the prime reasons the law requires us to have numbers on our boats. Report this incident to the nearest warden or sheriff's department.

We have been having increasing success in our courts in prosecuting these individuals and it is through your cooperation that this success will continue.

Kiwanis Members in Congress Total 103

A total of one hundred and three Kiwanians are serving in the 89th Congress of the United States a recent survey has revealed. The survey, undertaken at the time of Kiwanis' Golden Anniversary Year, showed 22 members of Kiwanis in

the Senate and 81 members in the House of Representatives. This number constitutes about a sixth of the national legislature.

A. Hron, President of the Kiwanis club of Kewaskum, characterized this record as a dramatization of the traditional desire of Kiwanians to assume individual responsibility and to share in the burden of national, state, and local problems. "The number of Kiwanians in the national legislature at the time of our Golden Anniversary marks an all time high," the president said.

Commenting on this record of service, Senator John J. Sparksman of Alabama, former Governor of the Alabama Kiwanis District, said:

"Most of man's problems arise as a result of group action rather than individual action. It seems only appropriate that man's problems should be attacked through group action. I hate to think what the world would be like if each man attempted to set himself off from the world's problems. Frankly, I believe the world would be an immensely more difficult place in which to live.

"The history of our nation is a shining example of individuals taking an interest and doing something about problems which affected large groups of people.

"I wonder what the world would be today if George Washington or Abraham Lincoln or Nathan Hale had thought only of themselves."

To this, Senator, Karl E. Mundt, of South Dakota, a Past Governor of Kiwanis' Minnesota-Dakotas District, added:

"For the past 50 years, Kiwanis has built. It has not only built itself into a great service organization, but it has also built better cities and towns, better education and charitable institutions, better opportunities for the needy; and, last and not least, it has built human beings into finer and better citizens. And it has achieved all of these worthy goals not because it is 'Kiwanis,' but because it is an organization established on the premise that each of us has a responsibility to our fellow man, a responsibility of sharing, to the best of our abilities, the burdens of the problems that confront mankind. Out of this sharing, I am convinced, will be achieved the peace of mind, the strength of spirit, and the international understanding that all of us so fervently seek."

Applications for Job Corps Training Again Being Taken

H. H. Forster, manager of the Waukesha District Employment Service office, announced that applications are again being taken at the employment office from young men 16 through 21 years of age for possible training in the Job Corps

Camps in various parts of the country are being rushed to completion and are expected to be ready to receive ten thousand additional young men by June.

Forster stated that youth accepted by the Job Corps will live in a camp-center with other young people their own age, and will be paid thirty dollars a month while they receive training in useful skills, plus a final payment of fifty dollars for every month spent in the corps upon completion of their term. They will also receive room and board, work clothes, medical and dental care, and an allowance for new clothes.

Actual job training is given by professional teachers. Work projects include construction of roads, erosion control, survey of property lines, construction of camp ground and other recreation areas, reforestation, logging, landscaping and building.

Interested youth are urged to contact their local employment office immediately so that interviews for the Job Corps can be arranged.
