The Kewaskum Education association recently elected officers for the next school year, 1965-66. Harold Mosher was elected president, Kenneth Erickson will be vice-president, Chester Czoschke is secretary-elect, and Mrs. Jean Backhaus was elected treasurer.

The association is proud to announce that three of its members have been elected as participants in summer institutes sponsored by the National Science Foundation. FIREMEN CALLED TO PUT OUT GRASS, DUMP FIRES

The Kewaskum fire department answered a call at approximately 1:30 p. m. Saturday to extinguish a grass fire on the Volm farm about two miles west of the village. The blaze occurred in a field at the rear of the Robert Gruber home and is believed to have resulted from burning rubbish. A large section of grass burned before the fire was put out.

On Monday evening shortly after dark the firemen were summoned to douse a fire at the former village dump on the Anton Wiesner farm east of New Fane, which reportedly had been lighted. The fire siren was not sounded but several firemen were called by phone to soak the flames.

Bernard J. Seil, "Murphy" Miller Called in Death

A well known Kewaskum resident, Bernard J. Seil, 70, of 318 Forest ave., passed away unexpectedly at 2:15 p. m. on Saturday May 1. He was working on the lawn at his home when he suffered a fatal heart attack.

Mr. Seil was born June 27, 1894, in the town of Scott, Sheboygan county, a son of the late Peter and Margaret Kellner Seil. His marriage to the former Ruth Piper took place at St. Mary's Catholic church, Cascade, on June 10, 1919. Following their marriage they lived on a farm in the town of Auburn, Fond du Lac county, for six years and then moved to Kewaskum. Mr. Seil was a farm salesman for the L. Rosenheimer firm for the past 40 years.

Mrs. Seil survives her husband, together with a daughter, Doris (Mrs. Alois Berg) of Kewaskum; two sons, Donald of Kewaskum and Gilbert of West Bend; one daughter-in-law, one son-in-law, four grandchildren, one sister, Mrs. Chester Harrison of Waldo; three sisters-in-law, three brothers-in-law, and other relatives. His parents and two brothers, John and Nick Seil, preceded him in death.

Mr. Seil formerly held office as a trustee of the village of Kewaskum and was a former member of the Kewaskum fire department.

Funeral services were held at 9 a. m. Tuesday, May 4, at Miller's Funeral home and at 9:30 o'clock at Holy Trinity church, with the Rev. John T. Budde officiating. Burial took place in St. Mary's parish cemetery at Cascade. Friends called at the funeral home from 2 p. m. Monday.

A well known West Bend and former Kewaskum resident, Edwin G. "Murphy" Miller, 638 North st., died at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, on Saturday, May 1, after a day's illness. Mr. Miller, who was 81, was the father of the late Roman "Jimmy" Miller of Kewaskum.

Born in the town of West Bend on Nov. 15, 1883, he grew up in that township and after his marriage to the former Josephine Jansen at St. Mary's church, West Bend, on June 3, 1908, became a city of West Bend resident. He was employed at the West Bend Lithia Co. for several years and for many years after that served as field manager for the White House Milk Co. He also owned and operated a bakery and tavern in Kewaskum for a time. The tavern is now owned by his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Rose Miller.

Mr. Miller leaver his wife, two daughters, Marcella (Mrs. Robert "Corky" Michels) of West Bend and Lucille (Mrs. Charles Palt) of rural West Bend; three sons, LeRoy, Edwin J. ASK PARENTS TO ENROLL PUPILS AT ELEMENTARY SCHOOL MAY 10 AND 11

This year's annual "round-up" for the parents of prospective kindergarten pupils or beginning 1st graders will be held during the day, on Monday, May 10, and Tuesday, May 11, from 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon, and 1:00 to 3:00 p. m. in the elementary school office.

To be eligible for enrollment in kindergarten, children must have attained their fifth birthday prior to Sept. 1, 1965, and for 1st grade they must have attained their sixth birthday prior to Sept. 1, 1965. Evidence of date of birth, either a birth certificate or a baptismal certificate, must be brought to the office at the time of enrolling.

Parents will be asked to register their children for next year's term and to fill out the child's health record. If you know of any new families in this district that have children eligible for kindergarten, please pass this information to them.

Supervising Principal Richard E. Zarling should like to impress upon parents the importance of registering their child on either of these two days to insure them the best chance of having the child in the section you prefer (a. m. or p. m.) or first grade so that the school may plan for them.

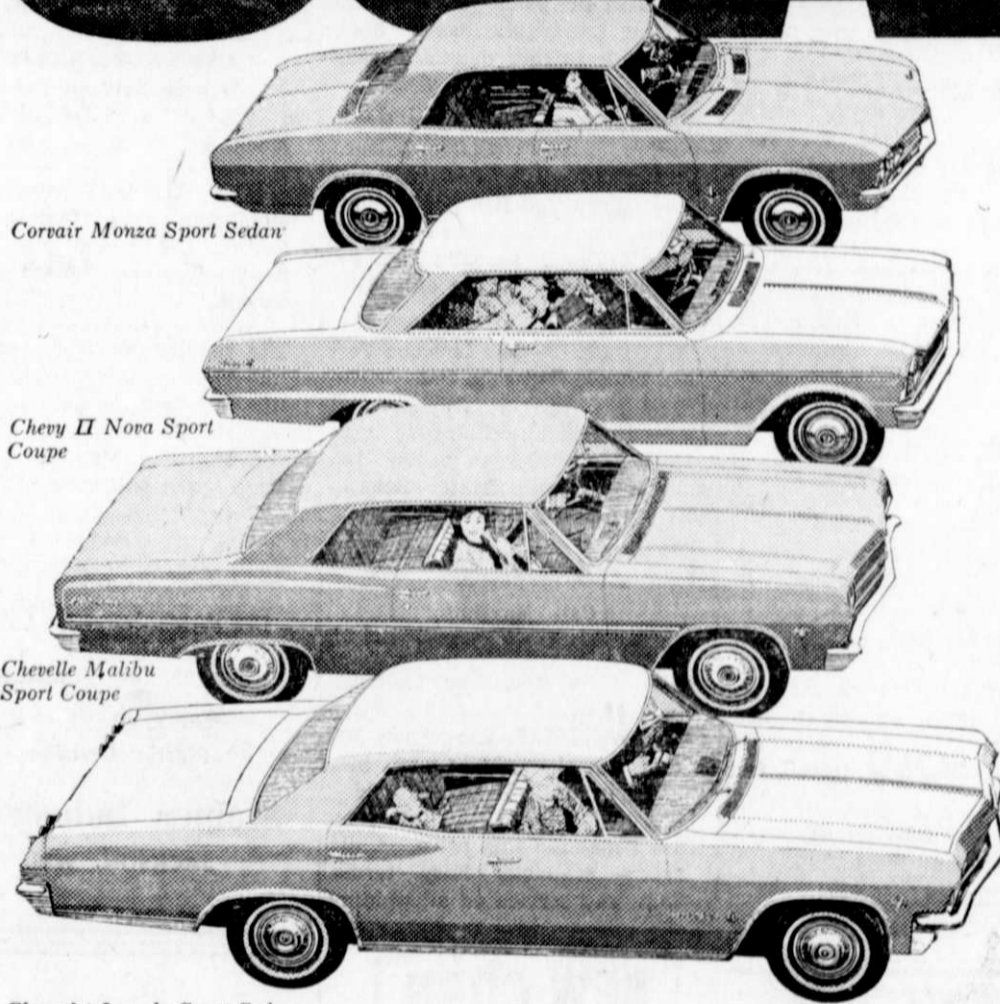

April 22, 1965

The regular monthly meeting of the Kewaskum Community High School Joint District No. 2 Board of Education was held Thursday, April 22, 1965, and all members were in attendance.

Minutes of the March 29, 1965, meeting were read. Leo Bingen moved to accept the minutes as read. Anne Panzer seconded. Carried.

Mr. Boyd read the letter received from John-Mansville Company regarding the condition of the high school roof. He also reported on information received from Carroll Haug regarding repairs. The Board agreed that Carroll Haug be instructed to make necessary repairs per the agreement given Mr. Boyd at a cost of approximately \$125.00.

Discussion was held regarding having another referendum the day of the annual meeting so electors could vote on the building addition, as well as for a board member. Nothing definite was decided.

Mr. Boyd informed the Board of the resignation of Mr. Bade and Mrs. O'Connor. The Board asked that a letter of appreciation be written to Mr. Bade.

A letter from Iron-Firemen was read wherein they requested payment on the balance of their account. The request was denied.

Mr. Boyd stated that there would be a meeting of the Washington County School Committee with the Boards of Education of the elementary schools in the Kewaskum High School District, as well as members of the Sheboygan and Fond du Lac County School Committees and the members of the Kewaskum Community High school, Board of Education on Thursday, April 29, 1965 at 8:00 p. m. in the high school library to discuss re-organization. This will be an informational type of meeting.

The proposed budget for the 1965-1966 school year was reviewed. Discussion was held. Tentative approval was given, however final 1964-1965 school year figures will perhaps cause changes in the final figures to be presented to the electors.

The Board asked Mr. Boyd to inform the grade school Board of Education that under the new book-keeping system the prorated share of costs involved for the cafeteria program would be broken down for the clerical wages, janitor wages and vehicle and their school would be responsible for their share. Also the prorated part of the transportation supervisor's salary would be their responsibility.

Mr. Fred J. Spoerl was selected as the Board Member to speak at graduation exercises.

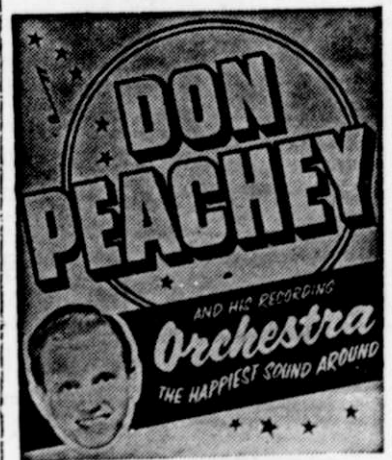

Jan. 1. Eight were adult doe and two were doe fawns.

In the early part of April a young man living near St. Lawrence found two dead rabbits in a marshy area. The animals were sent to the UW College of Agriculture, Department of Veterinary Science for examination.

The following report came back: One rabbit was killed by fine shot. The second rabbit, an adult female, was heavily infected with rabbit coccidioidosis. The rabbit itself was in poor physical condition and this chronic parasitic infection undoubtedly contributed to its death. Rabbit coccidioidosis is a protozoan disease that is very serious and commonly recognized by commercial rabbit raisers.

Saturday, May 8, is the opening day of the general fishing season in most waters of the state. The bass season remains closed north of Highway 64 until June 5. Fishing license and regulations are available at all license depots in the county.

batting average, most first base hits, most third base hits and runs batted in.

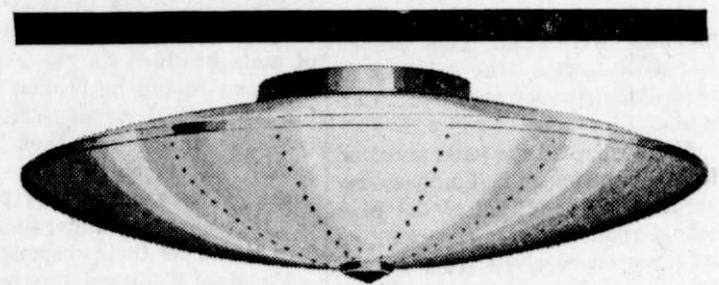
This was the 25th anniversary of the organization of the league. Kewaskum was one of the six teams which originally formed the loop. Today the league has 28 teams with about 300 participants.
