Ralph J. Marx will join the staff of Regal Ware, Inc., Kewaskum, as assistant controller and office manager according to an announcement by Mr. J. O. Reigle, president of the company.

Mr. Marx, who is a partner in the firm of Kannenberg & Marx, certified Public Accountants, West Bend, will assume the responsibilities of his new position on June 15, 1965. He will be located in the Regal home office in Kewaskum from which operations for the company's plants in Kewaskum and Wooster, Ohio are conducted.

Mr. Marx is a native of Kewaskum and has lived here most of his life. He is a graduate of Marquette university; served in the European Theatre in the U. S. Army Glider Troops during World War II; was recalled into the service during the Korean War where he served as a first lieutenant in the U. S. Army Infantry in Korea and was awarded the Silver

Star and Purple Heart.

Shortly after his return from Korea he and Eldor W. Kannenberg formed the partnership of Kannenberg and Marx, Certified Public Accountants. It was the first certified public accounting firm established in Washington county.

He will retain all personnel now employed by the partnership and all clients will be assured of the same professional service that has been accorded to them in the past.

Plans are nearly all completed for Kewaskum's 7th annual Dairy Day to be held Saturday, June 5. The entire program will be completely new this year, including the date. The event formerly was held early in spring in the high school gym. Now it has been changed to June Dairy Month and will be held outdoors on the streets and in the village park. Merchants will offer special sale prices on merchandise on this day.

The formal part of the program will start with a parade at 1 p. m. The theme of the parade will be dairying. There will be prizes for junior entries. The Kewaskum Business association is asking anyone who has antique or horse-drawn dairy equipment to participate (they would prefer NOT to have any steam powered units). Children, families, groups and organizations are welcome. The Kewaskum High school band, and possibly others, will march. Persons

interested in entering a unit are asked to contact Postmaster Harry Koch, the parade marshal.

From the end of the parade until 4 p. m. there will be a milk production guessing contest in the parking lot at the rear of Rosenheimer's department store. About six cows will be on display for judging.

At 4 p. m. a milking contest will be held at the same place, the Rosenheimer lot. The participants will be Wayland Tessar, village president of Kewaskum and Dave Twohig, village president of Campbellsport. "Three fingers" Tessar issued the challenge. "Sure-grip" Twohig courageously accepted and the "no holds barred" contest is on. Drop by drop each contestant will use all his cunning to decide which one has the most pull. No udder contest will thrill you more. Come and cheer for your leader at the 7th annual Dairy Day. In an all-out effort to win, Tessar has

engaged the services of "Fast grab" Esser, vo-ag instructor, as a coach and second.

Throughout the day many business places will feature dairy products and will display merchandise at sale prices on the streets. There will be refreshments, costumes, music, prizes and entertainment.

The program in the evening will start at 7:30 o'clock in the village park but in the event of rain the evening program will be held in the high school gym. It will feature a band concert by the Kewaskum High school band directed by Clyde Brehm, Rusty Hagen and his troupe of entertainers, the awarding of Kiwanis conservation awards, crowning of the Dairy Day queen, and awarding of prizes.

The candidates for queen are Sandra Schrauth, Elaine Heinecke, Sandra Jackson, Jane Hiller, Betty Spartz, Joyce Bruessel, Carol Schmidt and Cheryl Timmerman. The voting for the dairy queens will be held in a garden setting at the Kewaskum Floral Shop on Main st.

The PTA will operate a lunch stand, featuring dairy products, in the park from 7 until 10 p. m. The firemen will operate the beer stand at the same time.

Our next meeting will be on May 12 at Doris Prost's house. Lucille Nigh, Reporter

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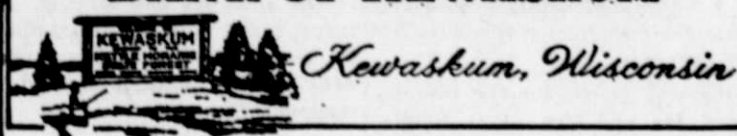

Nephew of Local Couple Killed in West Bend Crash

JAMES KARIUS, 18, LOSES LIFE EARLY ON SUNDAY; 2 COMPANIONS INJURED

James J. Karius, 18, only child of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob A. Karius of West Bend, was fatally injured and two teenage companions suffered minor injuries when the car in which they were riding left Hwy. 144 near Wallace lake shortly after midnight Sunday morning. The youth was a nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Alois Staehler, Sr. of Kewaskum, his father being a brother of Mrs. Staehler.

Karius was riding in the rear seat of a car operated by William Brad Arnold, 17, West Bend, who suffered a cut on the nose. Another youth, Jeffrey J. Corbett, 17, also of West Bend, who was riding in front, incurred scratches and bruises on the left arm. Young Corbett is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Corbett, whose father is a former resident of New Fane. All of the youths were seniors at West Bend High school.

The car was traveling south on Hwy. 144 when it left the highway on the first curve approaching the abrupt curve at Wallace lake. The car struck and knocked down an electric pole and then careened into a tree with the rear of the vehicle. Karius is believed to have died almost immediately of a head injury.

Arnold, the driver of the car, was brought into Branch II of county court before Judge Robert Stoltz Tuesday morning and charged with "homicide by intoxicated user of an automobile" after Juvenile Court Judge Lester A. Buckley waived jurisdiction in the case. Atty. G. E. Otten, counsel for the driver, requested that the court give him additional time to study the case. His request was granted and Arnold was scheduled to come up to enter a plea next Tuesday. Dist. Atty Richard A. Becker stated that the accident and other details in conjunction with it are still undergoing investigation.

Karius was born in West Bend on Feb. 15, 1947, and lived there all his life. Surviving are his parents and other relatives. Funeral

services were held at St. Frances Cabrini church at 9:30 a. m. Wednesday, with burial in Holy Angels cemetery there.

Several Persons Hurt in Series Of Auto Mishaps

In a number of auto accidents which occurred th past week in the Kewaskum area, several persons were injured and others luckily escaped injury.

In a mishap which occurred at 8:55 a. m. Saturday on the Kewaskum hill just south of the village at the intersection of Hwys. 45 and H, a station wagon driven by Mary Shaw, 18, of 918 E. Crocker, Milwaukee, struck a pipe protruding from the rear of one of the village trucks. The truck was southbound on Hwy. 45 and was turning east into a private driveway about 50 feet north of Hwy. H. The northbound Shaw vehicle came over the crest of the hill and struck a 7 inch pipe extending out 9 feet and 3 inches from the truck. The overall length of the pipe was 18 feet. The windshield and hood of the Shaw wagon were damaged.

Three young people were injured early last Thursday morning when a car driven by Kenneth K. Schmidt, 18, of R. 2, Campbellsport, failed to stop for the intersection at Hwy. 45 and CTH H and skidded across the highway and struck the bank south of Kewaskum. Injured were Schmidt, who incurred a cut under the upper lip; Dianne Kaehne, 19, of R. 3, Campbellsport, a fractured right leg and bruised face, and Laura Heller, 22, Campbellsport, cut lips and a bloody nose. The young ladies were removed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the fire-

men's ambulance.

Two persons were hurt in a two vehicle crash at the intersection of Hwy. 28 and CTH W west of Kewaskum at 12:40 p. m. Tuesday. The mishap occurred when a car driven by Martha Scherper, 62, of Mequon, which was traveling north on CTH W collided with a car operated by Frederick Austin, 41, of Milwaukee, which was traveling west of Hwy. 28. Martha Scherper suffered leg and head injuries and Austin suffered bruises to his leg and side. The injured woman was taken to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance.

In a mishap which occurred Sunday it was reported that a car driven by Eugene "Mike" Gnacinski, Kewaskum, left the highway and struck a pole in the St. Michaels area when the driver lost control of his vehicle. The front of the auto was damaged.

Two other minor crashes, another one of them on the Kewaskum hill on Hwy. 45 Saturday afternoon, were reported but details were not available.
