Recipients of Two \$500 Regal Ware Scholarships Announced

The Regal Ware Company of Kewaskum has announced the recipients of their annual scholarship grants. The students were chosen from a field of 18 applicants who were selected on the basis of outstanding achievements in scholarship and citizenship while in high school.

Michael McCarty, son of William McCarty, 1140 Roseland drive, Kewaskum, plans to attend the University of Wisconsin Madison, and will study engineering.

Kewaskum Teacher To Participate in Purdue U Institute

Participants for the sixth annual Foreign Language Institute at Purdue university, Lafayette, Ind., have been selected.

The institute will be June 21-Aug. 13 to provide high school teachers with intensive experience speaking and living the French and Spanish languages. Participants will live in unique "language houses," dormitory facilities especially designated for the trainees, where they will speak their foreign language specialties for meals, recreation and all other out-of-class living.

Trainees receive \$75 a week plus special allowances for dependents. The institute is conducted under a National Defense Education Act contract.

Participants come from 17 states throughout the country and are instructed by Purdue staff members, visiting specialists in French and Spanish, and several invited native speakers of the two languages. Class sessions are in the extensive language laboratories of the Purdue department of modern languages.

Trainees selected include: Spanish section, Mrs. Elizabeth A. Stahmer, 246 Fifth ave., West Bend, Kewaskum Community High school, Kewaskum.

Koch Store Break-in Hearing Is Opened

The preliminary hearing of James Kroll, 30, of Milwaukee, opened before County Judge Lester A. Buckley in Branch II of county court on Wednesday morning.

Kroll is being held on burglary charges in conjunction with a break-in at the A. G. Koch grocery store on Main st. in Kewaskum.

Sgt. Paul Hetebrueg of the West Bend police department and Officer Don Mertens, traffic patrolman of the sheriff's department, were called to testify as to incidents which led to the apprehension of Kroll and a companion, Kenneth R. Meyer, 28, of Milwaukee following the break-in at the Koch store. In the afternoon Sgt. Arthur Wellner of the West Bend police department, chief of Police Roland Pledl and Patrolman Ken Neldner of Kewaskum testified. Judge Buckley bound Kroll over to county court to be tried at a later date.

Meyer was removed from the county jail in West Bend last month to face charges of car theft in Denver, Colo.

Roy Esser, vocational agriculture instructor at Kewaskum High school, who is in charge of a part of the day's activities, says that one of the big events of the day will be a parade through the downtown streets of Kewaskum. The parade will consist of local units such as 4-H clubs, scouts, firemen, bands and so forth.

The parade will start at 1 p. m. and the theme of it will be dairying. Anyone who has antique or horse-drawn dairy equipment is asked to participate. Children, organizations and family groups are welcome. The committee indicates

After the parade, until 4 p. m., there will be a milk production guessing contest on the parking lot at the rear of the L. Rosenheimer store. At 4 p. m. there, a milking contest will be held between Wayland Tessar and Dave Twohig, respective village presidents of Kewaskum and Campbellport. A dairy queen will be selected by contributing coins as votes, and each penny contributed is one vote. The money accumulated through this fund will be used to bring an AFS student to the local high school. Voting for the queen will be at the Kewaskum Floral Shop.

A fine evening program will also be held in the village park starting at 7:30 o'clock. It will feature a band concert by the high school band, Rusty Hagen and his troupe of entertainers, the awarding of Kiwanis conservation awards, crowning of the Dairy Day queen, and awarding of prizes. The PTA will operate a lunch stand, featuring dairy products, and the firemen will operate the refreshment stand from 7 to 10 p. m.

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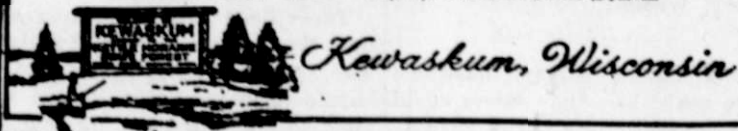
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Board Buys Truck, Radar Speed Timer

Regular Meeting
May 3, 1965

The Village Board of Kewaskum met in regular monthly session with President Tessar presiding and all Board Members present.

The Minutes of the April 19th meeting were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Merwin, seconded by Trustee Geidel and duly carried.

Upon the recommendation of the Equipment Committee and by a 5 to 1 roll call vote, the Board accepted the proposal of Geiger Ford Corporation, West Bend, for one (1) new pick-up truck on their low bid of \$1713.66.

By unanimous roll call vote, the Board authorized the Police Dept. to purchase a Radar Speed Timer from the Muni Quip Corporation, Appleton, Wisconsin, at the quoted price of \$1140.00.

Upon the recommendation of the Village Attorney, the Board approved the Mutual Fire Protective Assistance Contract for the Washington County Mutual Aid Plan as presented by Fire Chief Armin Oppermann.

The application of Harvey Wiedmeyer for an operator's license was tabled pending completion of the reference check by the Police Department.

The Kewaskum Baseball Team was granted permission to use the Elementary School baseball field and lights on the evening of July 10th. Fee for use of lights to be \$5.00.

RESOLUTION NO. 65-1 RESOLUTION OF VILLAGE BOARD ACCEPTING PETITION FOR ANNEXATION

WHEREAS, a petition for direct annexation of the following territory of the town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, to the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, was filed with the Village Clerk on April 5, 1965.

That part of the South Half of the Southeast Quarter (S $\frac{1}{2}$ SE $\frac{1}{4}$) of Section Nine, Township Twelve North, Range Nineteen East, Town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin described as follows:

Commencing at the South Quarter corner of said Section Nine, thence South 88° 55' East on the Section line 505 feet to the point of beginning of the parcel herein described; thence continuing South 88° 55' East 1498 feet, more or less, to the reference line of USH 45; thence North 30° 05' West 53.4 feet; thence North 28° 01' West 1001.1 feet; thence North 28° 52' West 351.18 feet; thence South 61° 08' West, 165 feet; thence North 11° 37' West, 117.23 feet; thence North 28° 52' West, 76.84 feet to the North line of said South Half of said Southeast Quarter (S $\frac{1}{2}$ SE $\frac{1}{4}$); thence North 88° 54' West 1137.16 feet to the North West corner of said South Half of said Southeast Quarter (S $\frac{1}{2}$ SE $\frac{1}{4}$); thence South 0° 16' East on the West line of said South Half (S $\frac{1}{2}$), 1168.03 feet;

thence South 88° 55' East, 505 feet; thence South 0° 16' East, 156.75 feet to the point of beginning.

Excepting therefrom those portions heretofore conveyed for highway and street purposes.

WHEREAS, the Village Clerk has investigated said petition and certified to the Village Board that it was signed by all of the owners of land in the territory proposed for annexation as of the date of filing of the petition and that the territory to be annexed is properly described in the petition and shown on the scale map attached thereto, is contiguous to the Village of Kewaskum, and is unincorporated;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, determines that the petition for annexation of the above described territory is a sufficient and legal petition conforming with the requirements of s. 66.021 of the Wisconsin statutes; and

That the village clerk is hereby directed to notify the clerk of the town of Kewaskum, of this resolution of acceptance in accordance with s. 66.021 (5) (a) Wisconsin Statutes.

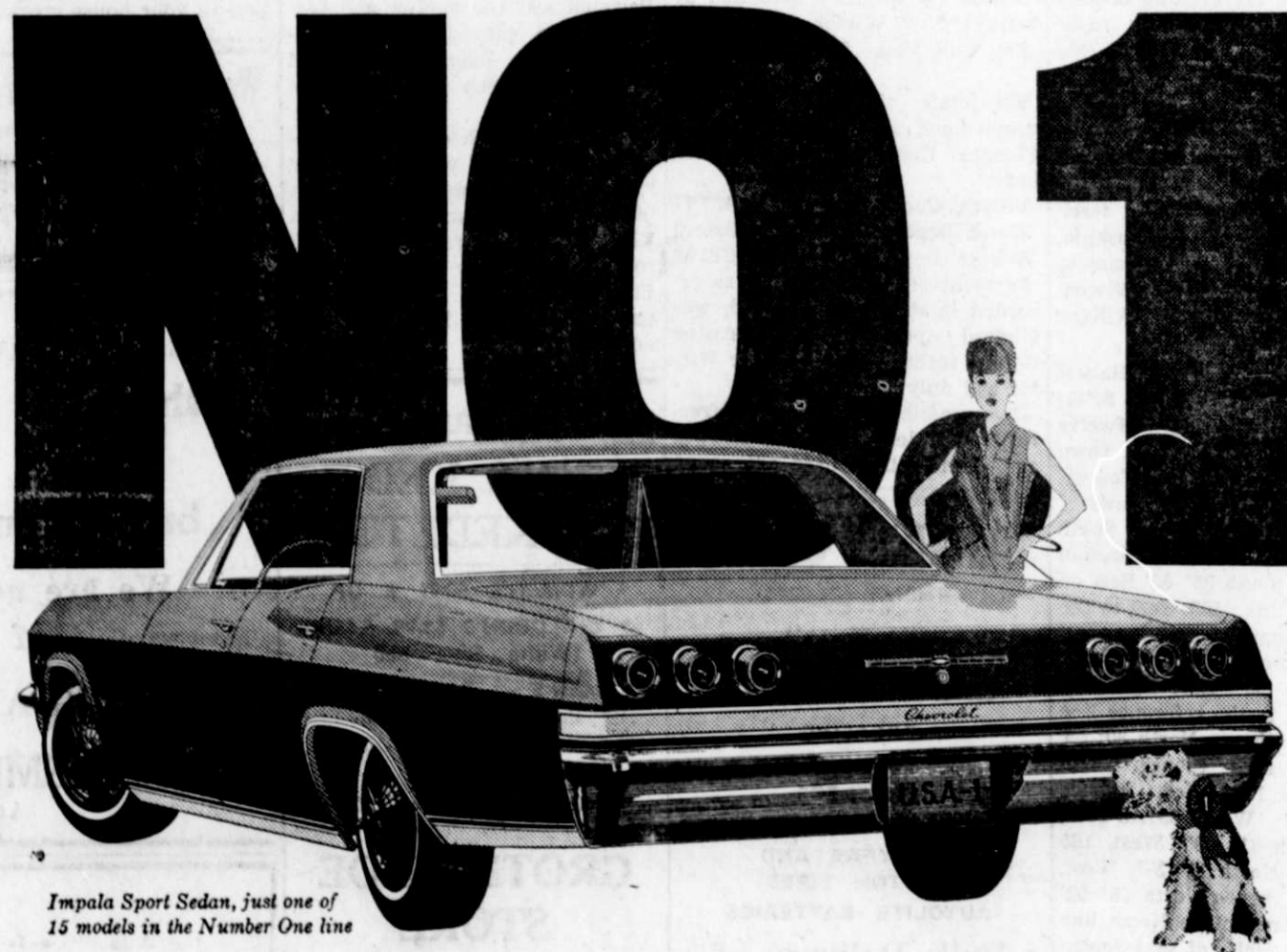

County Agent News Notes

FIELDS FROZEN OUT

We sure have a lot of fields that were frozen out over the past winter. We may wonder just what caused this, and sometimes we can't be real sure. A letter from Dwayne Rohweder, extension agronomist at the University of Wisconsin gives us the following information:

(1) Where Vernal and some of the other closely related selections were used, injury is less prevalent. It is more extensive on Ranger, and very severe on Fle-

mish types as well as non-hardy varieties.

(2) New seedings show less injury than old stands. In fact, some came through the winter in good condition.

(3) Severe damage or complete killing occurred where fall cutting was practiced. Where cutting was done late in the fall, damage was less severe, although most fields which were cut last fall show injury. (He is referring here to cutting in September.)

(4) Injury was less severe on northern exposures compared with southern exposures.

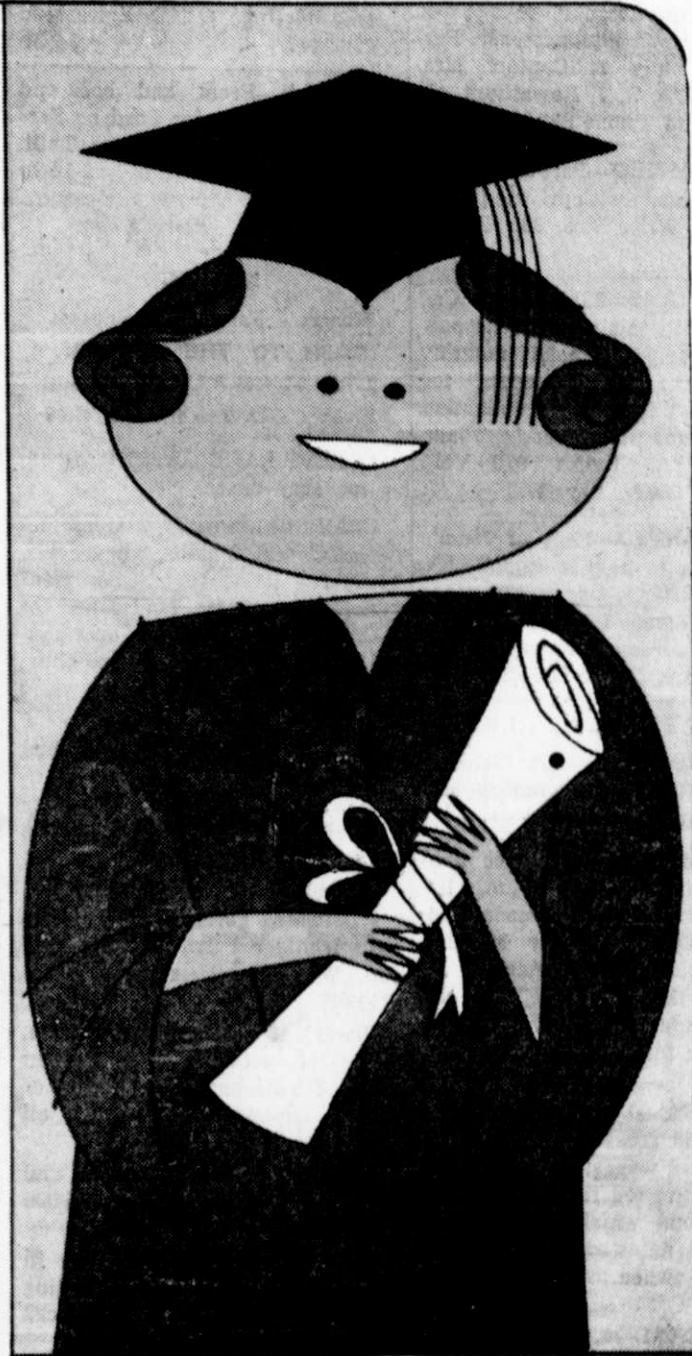
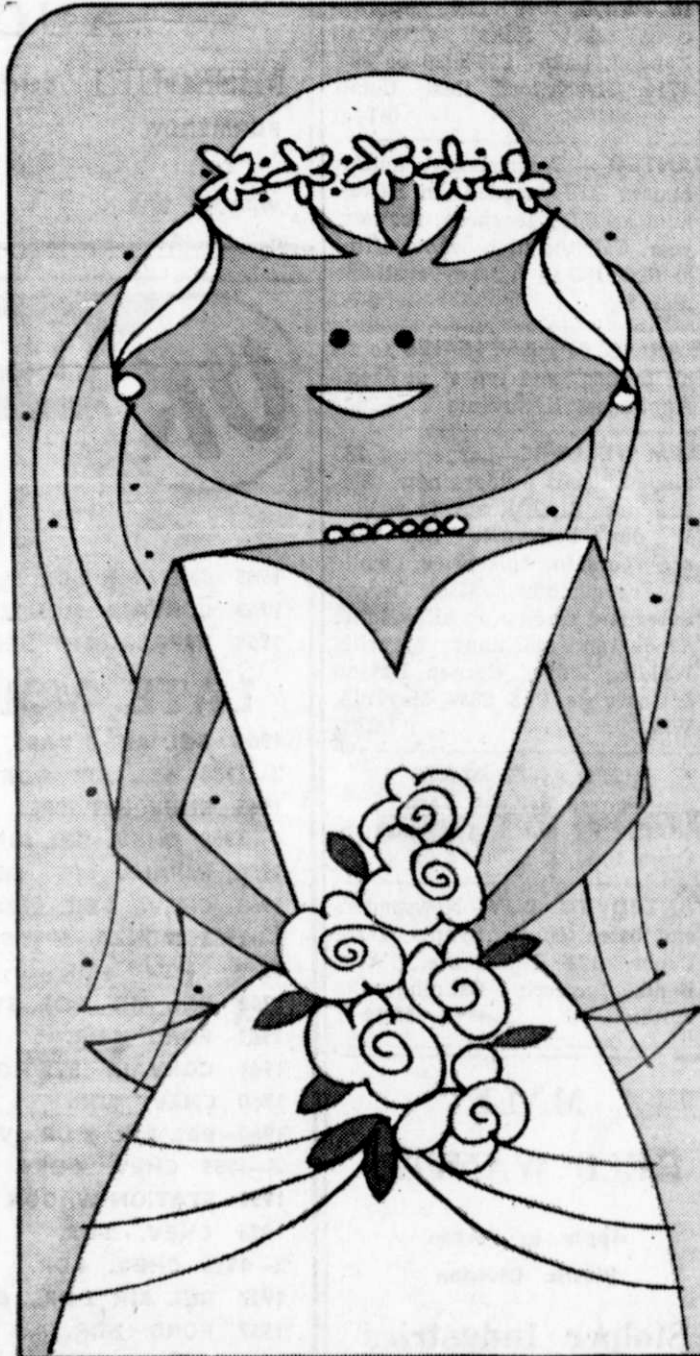
(5) Injury was less severe where brome grass was included in the mixture.

The injury that has been done is probably caused by several

things. It could have been the warm weather we had the early part of January; the real warm weather we had in March might have done it, when the plants began to grow and then it got cold again; some of the ice sheets we had over our fields might have done it.

At any rate, we certainly had a lot of injury, and farmers will have to make the necessary adjustments in their land programs in order to get the proper amount of roughage for the cattle they are feeding.

Always keep pure maple syrup in a cool, dry place. Once the container has been opened, store it in the refrigerator and keep the container capped.

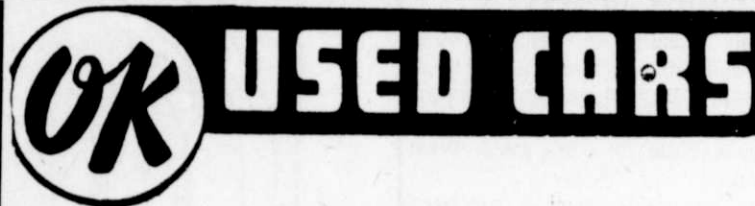

Grafton Romps to Title in Scenic Moraine Track Meet Here Tuesday

Grafton's big appetite for points in all 14 events forced the other seven members of the Scenic Moraine conference into a starvation diet Tuesday at Kewaskum as the Blackhawks were hardly extended in winning the team track title with 88½ points. The meet was held for the first time on Kewaskum's fine new track.

A ding-dong race existed in the battle for the runner-up position as only four points separated second place Campbellsport and fifth place Germantown. The point totals were as follows: Campbellsport 23, Random Lake 22, Pewaukee 20, Germantown 19, North Fondy 13, Slinger 12½ and Kewaskum last with 12.

Three records were set as Random Lake's mile relay team set the pace by turning a time of 3:44.7. Ken Peterson and Gary Rogahn, both of Grafton, accounted for the other new standards in the broad jump and pole vault, respectively. GOVERNMENT TO CHARGE FEE TO ENTER NATIONAL PARKS

High winds and rain this past weekend slowed fishing. However, fishermen who were able to spend time on local lakes week-days were able to catch very nice north-erns, bass and a few walleyed pike.

The state of Wisconsin charges \$2.00 a season or \$.50 per day per vehicle for the use of the facilities at state parks. The U. S. Government has now decided to charge a fee to enter their parks. This permit is called the Seven Dollar Recreation-Conservation sticker.

The nation's new auto-bumper sticker will admit visitors to designated national forest camp and picnic areas where fees were collected last year in Wisconsin.

An alternate single entry fee of \$.50 per person will apply to all persons over 16 years.

Stickers may be purchased from the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, United States Department of Interior, Washington, or a United States forest service office.

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
