The 121 members of the 1965 senior class of Kewaskum Community High School will receive their diplomas at commencement exercises to be held in the school auditorium next Wednesday, June 2, at 8 p. m. The class is the largest on record to graduate from the high school and numbers 25 more than last year when there were 96 seniors.

Memorial Day Parade, Service Here on Monday

PARADE BEGINS AT 9:15 A. M.; MARSHALL BOYD TO DELIVER ADDRESS

Residents of Kewaskum and area will again have an opportunity to participate in the annual tribute to the nation's war dead at a Memorial Day observance sponsored by Robert G. Romaine Post No. 384 of the American Legion on Monday, May 31.

The Memorial Day parade will begin promptly at 9:15 a. m. and will form at the high school. Flags will be distributed to all marching children participating. The line of march will proceed south on Bilgo Lane to First st., east to Parkview drive, south to Main st., west to Fond du Lac ave. and north to the Legion Memorial building, where services will be held immediately after the parade.

The tentative order of march for the parade will be as follows: Police escort, colors and color guard, firing squad, Legion members, God Star mothers, disabled veterans, Legion commander and chaplain, main speaker, village officials, Kewaskum Community High school band, Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, Explorer Scouts, Girl Scouts, Brownies, Cadette Scouts, firemen, auxiliary police and other children. 3 Children in Family Die in Car Crash With Kewaskum School Bus

Wilmer Bunkelman Is Driver of Bus; Mother, Son Survive

ACCIDENT NEAR FILLMORE IS WORST OF YEAR IN AREA

Three children of a town of Farmington family were lost in a tragic accident Tuesday afternoon when an auto driven by their mother and a Kewaskum school bus collided on the Washington-Ozaukee county line road and a town road intersection about a mile northeast of Fillmore, just north of Hwy. 84.

In the crash, which occurred at about 4:24 p. m., a car driven by Mrs. David (Jo Ann) Boesl, 28, of R. 6, West Bend, and a school bus driven by Wilmer E. Bunkelman, 39, of Kewaskum, collided at the intersection. Mrs. Boesl was traveling northwest on the blacktop town road while the school bus was going south on the county line gravel road. The school bus is owned by William Bauman of Campbellsport.

The Boesl auto was thrown into

a farm field by the impact, on the southwest corner of the intersection. The bus came to a stop on the road shoulder south of the intersection. None of the four Kewaskum High school students still occupying the bus or the driver were reported injured.

Killed in the Boesl car were Rene, 6, and Jay, 3, who were pronounced dead upon arrival at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, and Jody, 1½, who died of injuries about 7:10 p. m. Mrs. Boesl suffered an injured right knee and was later released. Another son, James, 5, was reported as not critical by the attending physician.

County Traffic Officer David Backhaus of Kewaskum and workers of a Lee Jaeger construction crew who were reported working nearby and heard the crash were reported to have given the children mouth-to-mouth resuscitation in an effort to save their lives. All of the Boesl children were reported thrown from the car and the mother was wandering about dazedly in the field, according to the investigating officers.

New 30,000 Square Foot Factory to Be Constructed

WILL BE COMPLETED IN AUGUST, EMPLOY 10-12 PERSONS AT BEGINNING

Edmund J. Laue and Thurman C. Anderson announce the formation of the Badger Packaging Corp. and will construct a new 30 thousand square foot factory 1½ miles south of Kewaskum on Hwy. 45. The land for the site was purchased from Myron Perschbacher of this village.

They will manufacture corrugated shipping containers and will concentrate marketing in a 50 mile radius around Kewaskum to start, but will be equipped to serve all of the southeastern part of the state.

The owners have a combined experience of 37 years in the packaging field, most of which has been in Wisconsin.

An initial crew of 10 to 12 people will be employed at the plant opening and will be expanded to meet customer demands. The factory will be completed in August of this year and will be in production in September.

The mishap, which raised the county death toll to eight for 1965, was the worst in the county this year. Only a crossroad warning sign marks the crossing on the east—the direction from which the Boesl car came. There are no stop signs or other warning signs at the intersection.

The four students who were still passengers on the bus, Wayne C. Kirst, 15, R. 1, Fredonia; Oscar Knoeck, 16, R. 1 Kewaskum; Judie Geidel, 15, R. 1, Fredonia, and Jacalyn Geidel, 14, R. 1, Fredonia, were not injured although tossed about the bus.

Funeral services were held at St. John of God Catholic church in the town of Farmington at 10 a. m. Friday, May 28, for the three children, with the Rev. I. Staskunas officiating. Burial was in the parish cemetery. Friends called at Miller's Funeral home, Kewaskum, from 7 p. m. Thursday.

The three children were all born at Milwaukee, Rene on Feb. 13, 1958, Jay on Nov. 30, 1961, and Jody on July 21, 1963. They came to their present home, the former Hiller farm, near Boltonville in July of 1964.

Surviving are the parents, David J. and Jo Ann Laakso Boesl, a seven year old sister, Lori Marie, who was not involved in the crash, a brother, David James, 5,

who was injured in the accident; the paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Boesl of Langdon, N. Dak.; the maternal grandfather, Ferdinand Laakso of Chatham, Mich.; their maternal grandmother Mrs. Martha Chapman of Milwaukee, and their maternal great-grandfather, Isaac Laakso of Even Junction, Mich., along with other relatives.

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



BOB HANSON HEADED FOR LEAGUE PITCHING HONORS; HE AND COULTER FAN 21

Kewaskum's unbeaten, league leaders ran their string to four in a row Sunday at Plymouth, where they gained an easy 11-3 victory. With a 4-0 record they are a full game ahead of second place West Bend, which has 2-0.

Bob Hanson, who shaded Grafton, 1-0, the week before, came up with another outstanding pitching job. He worked the first five innings, in which he shut out Plymouth on one hit, struck out 12 of the 20 batters to face him, and walked only two. Then he developed a little soreness in his arm and with a 7-0 lead Mike Coulter was brought in for the first time to see what he could do. Mike also did real well, striking out 9 batters in four innings. He was nicked for three hits and three bases on balls. Between them, Hanson and Coulter struck out 21 batters for all of the outs except 6. Doebert started for Plymouth and the Kewaskum hitters blasted opposing hurling for 12 safeties, including five extra base hits.

Hanson should offer strong competition for league pitching honors this year if he continues his present success. Hanson has given up only two runs in four games to date. He beat Barton, 11-1, Port Washington, 7-1, Grafton, 1-0 and shut out Plymouth in the five innings he worked Sunday. In 3½ games he pitched, Hanson has struck out an amazing 42 batters, an average of about 11 per contest.

Kewaskum started out with four big runs in the first inning at Plymouth and had a 7-0 lead before their opponents scored in the 6th inning. Al Koepke paced the hitting attack with three safeties, all singles. Norb Heise got two hits, one a triple, as did Mike Coulter, whose pair included a double. Plymouth's four bingles were divided.

Kewaskum should be able to extend its streak to five in a row this Sunday when the team hosts

last place Germantown, which has an 0-3 record. Then on Wednesday, June 8, they play a night game at West Bend, the team right behind them, which will have a major bearing on the first half title.
