All Set for Big Dairy Day Program Here on Saturday

Parade at 1 p. m. to Be One of Features; Over \$300 in Prizes

DAY-LONG PROGRAM OF FREE ENTERTAINMENT, CONTESTS, AWARDS, BARGAINS OFFERED

The businessmen are ready to entertain residents of Kewaskum and its rural areas at this year's all new and different seventh annual Kewaskum Dairy Day observance this Saturday, June 5, with an all afternoon and evening program of free entertainment including a parade, contests, band concert, magic act, awards, crowning of the Dairy Queen, prizes, food, refreshments and special bargains in merchandise. Formerly held at the high school, this year's entire event will be held on the streets and in the village park and business places. The date has also been changed from early spring to June Dairy Month.

Highlight of the day's program will be the gala parade at 1 p. m. featuring a dairy theme. Preparations this week indicate that the parade will have many entries and will be an interesting one. The parade will be led by the Kewaskum High school band and all children, organizations and family groups are welcome to participate. Prizes will be awarded junior entries. A change in the line of march was made this week and the parade will be reversed from the original one planned. The parade will form at the high school, proceed south on Bilgo lane to First st., east on First st. to Parkview dr., south on Parkview to Main st., west on Main to Fond du Lac ave., north on Fond du Lac to North ave., south on North to Midland ave., south on Midland to Forest ave., east on Forest to the L. Rosenheimer parking lot.

After the parade, until 4 p. m., there will be a milk production guessing contest on the Rosenheimer parking lot at the rear of the store. At 4 p. m. the big milking contest will be held between Wayland "Three Fingers" Tessar, Kewaskum village president, and Dave "Sure-Grip" Twohig, Campbellsport village president. In this "no holds barred" contest each contestant, drop by drop, will decide which has the most "pull" and no "udder" contest will thrill you more.

Throughout the afternoon the Kewaskum FFA chapter will offer all the milk you can drink for 10 cents at a special booth at the Kewaskum Floral Shop. A dairy queen will be selected by contributing pennies for votes and the proceeds will go towards the AFS fund. Voting will be in an outdoor garden setting at the floral shop. Candidates for Dairy Queen are Sandra Jackson, Jane Hiller, Sandra Schrauth, Elaine Heinecke, Cheryl Timmerman, Carol Schmitt, Betty Spartz and Joyce Brussels.

Over \$300.00 in valuable merchandise prizes (listed in this newspaper last week) will be given away by the various business places. Persons must register for these prizes in the business places which donated them and the prizes will be awarded at the close of

the evening program in the village park. Cooperating merchants will offer special bargains and sales on merchandise throughout the day Saturday. Many merchants will feature dairy products and some will have Dairy Day snacks available.

The evening program in the village park will begin at 7 p. m. and a dairy lunch stand will be operated by the PTA and the refreshment stand by the fire department. The program includes a concert by the Kewaskum High school band at 7:30 p. m., a magician, Mystifying Rusty Hagen at 8:00, awarding of the Kiwanis conservation awards at 8:45, crowning of the Dairy Queen at 8:50, and the selection of prize winners at 9:00. In the event of rain the evening program will be held in the high school gym.

Kewaskum businessmen extend a cordial invitation to all area residents to visit the village and participate in the fun, take advantage of the many bargains, and enjoy the free entertainment and other events.

In all three sports the local teams were undefeated champions in the conference and monopolized the titles to make history for the school.

After the tour is completed refreshments will be waiting for you at the Art Gallery, where you will then have the opportunity of looking at the art exhibit for the month of June.

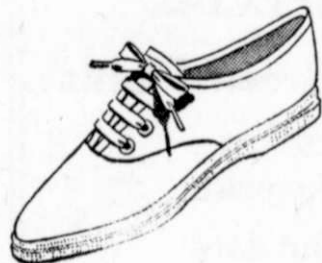

Looking Thru the Field Glasses...

NICE SIZE FISH TAKEN; MEETING ON POLLUTION

Except for Memorial Day fishing pressure was very light. Best spots were Pike lake, 14 inch wall-eyes were taken on spinning tackle and yellow jigs. nice size crappies caught on small minnows, trolling on the bays at Big Cedar.

Far too many people living in the vicinity of Big and Little Cedar lakes are found fishing or boating without life preservers aboard, and operating a motor or sail boat without a certificate of registration, or the registration numbers on the bow of the motorboat and the stern of the sail boat as required by law.

The Cedar Creek Restoration Council, Washington county branch, will hold a meeting at the Cedar Creek tavern, Wednesday, June 9, 8:00 p. m. Any and all individuals are invited to attend and express their views regarding pollution problems at Big and Little Cedar lakes and Cedar Creek flowing thru Washington county.

Floyd Stautz, basin engineer for the committee on water pollution, took samples of the stream on June 2.

Boat Safety Patrol Aids

The figures below are self-explanatory. The city of Milwaukee receives \$34,000 for patrol of the inner harbor and the river up to the North Ave. dam. I wonder how much it costs the U. S. Government for the coast guard to patrol the same area.

The city of Milwaukee and the city of Madison receive \$47,907.91 or nearly one-half of the amount allotted to the entire state.

Local communities operating boat safety patrols were subsidized to the tune of \$103,000 last year by the Wisconsin Conservation Department.

Milwaukee county took the lion's share with \$34,000 followed by Dane county with \$18,800 and Waukesha with \$7,800.

Under current state law \$100,000 annually is appropriated from \$1.00 per year boat registration fees for aid to local communities

having water safety patrols. Statutes allow state aids covering up to 75 percent of the cost but provide for prorating when claims exceed \$100,000.

Legislation is currently in the hopper that would limit any single claim to 10 percent of the \$100,000. Another bill would double registration fees.

Currently more than 100 different local ordinances are in effect regulating boating traffic on Wisconsin lakes and streams. To simplify enforcement the conservation department is sponsoring legislation that would make these rules uniform.

\$2,539.74; town of West Bend, \$1,191.44.

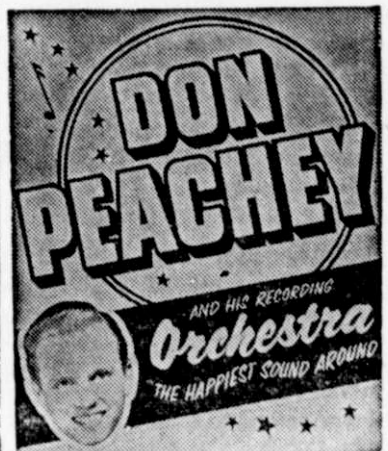

Indians Win WIAA District Tournament; Lose to Powerful Oconomowoc in Subsectional

DEFEAT HOWARDS GROVE AND CEDAR GROVE TO COP DISTRICT CROWN

The surprising Kewaskum Indians, who wound up fifth in the Scenic Moraine conference with a 1-5 record, continued to befuddle the experts by winning the WIAA district tournament at Howard's Grove last Thursday as they took the measure of Cedar Grove in the title game, 4-2. They reached the finals by downing Howards Grove in the opener Tuesday, 7-3.

By copping the district crown, Kewaskum advanced to the subsectional tourney on Saturday at Hartford, where they were finally eliminated by powerful Oconomowoc of the Little Ten loop, 4-0. Oconomowoc, which reached the finals of the sectionals a year ago, is now 16-0 for the season and is clearly a threat for the state title. In losing the Indians were eliminated by one of the best teams in the state, but gave them a strong battle.

Oconomowoc advanced to the sectional meet at Beloit by beating Kewaskum. This is being held this Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Other sectionals are at Eau Claire, Dodgeville, Oshkosh, Rice Lake, Stevens Point, Tomah and Watertown. The eight winners in the sectionals will advance to the state meet. Oconomowoc faced Wilmot in the sectional opener. Other schools in this tourney are Beloit Memorial and winner of the Kenosha-Bay View playoff.

Sophomore Mark Heise of Kewaskum had a one-hitter going until the last inning when he allowed a run on a yield of two hits as his mates downed Cedar Grove in the district title contest at Howards Grove 4-2. Jerry Marx supplied most of the batting power for the Indians as he stroked 3 for 3 including a run-producing double. Heise checked the Grovers on 3 hits, while Kewaskum collected 6 off of Cedar Grove hurling. The Indians scored two runs in the first inning and the deciding two in the sixth.

Kewaskum's tournament trail came to an end Saturday at Hartford as they were clipped by Oconomowoc, 4-0. Cooney's Dave Rosenow completely shut the door for the Indians as he hurled a no-hit game. The big blow for the winners was struck in the sixth inning when Keller unloaded against a Paul Kohler pitch and slammed a two-run homer. Errors contributed to Kewaskum's downfall in the subsectional game as they were guilty of three miscues. Rosenow was the master of the situation at all times as he fanned nine and walked three. The Indians also received top rate pitching from Kohler, who surrendered only four hits, two of them by Keller, the cleanup batter. The game was scoreless until the fourth inning, Kohler blanking Cooney until that time.

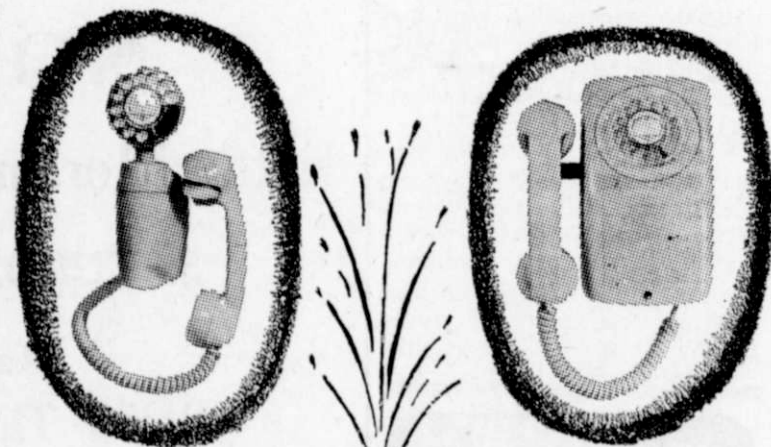
