### Levy Tax in Amount Of \$145,388.00 for Operating Expenses

**ORV BEHNKE, IONA SCHMIDT REELECTED TO BOARD; K-12 SCHOOL SYSTEM FAVORED**

Kewaskum Elementary School Jt. Dist. No. 1 Budget Hearing July 26, 1965

The budget hearing of the Kewaskum Elementary School Jt. District No. 1 was called to order by August Koch at 8:00 p. m. on July 26, 1965. Thirty-two electors were present.

Motion by Richard Edwards, seconded by Marie Dei, nominating August Koch as chairman of the meeting. Motion carried.

The proposed budget for the 1965-1966 school year was read and explained to the electors.

Motion by Fred Spoerl, seconded by Mrs. Linda Kroncke, to present the proposed budget of \$174,633.00 at the annual meeting. Carried.

Motion to adjourn the budget hearing was made by Lloyd Teeslink, seconded by Mrs. Ralph Erdmann. Motion carried.

Kewaskum Elementary School Jt. Dist. No. 1 Annual Meeting July 26, 1965

The annual meeting was called to order at 8:25 p. m. by August Koch. Thirty-five electors were present.

A motion by Wayland Tessar, seconded by Marvin Martin, nominating August Koch chairman of the annual meeting. Motion carried.

A motion by Marvin Martin to dispense with the reading of the minutes of the last annual meeting, the auditor's report, the treasurer's report, and the clerk's report, and these reports be accepted as printed. Seconded by Marie Dei. Motion carried.

Discussion of electing school board members similar to the system used in the Kewaskum Community Union High School Jt. Dist. No. 2 ensued, but no action was taken.

The chairman called for nominations for a member to the Board of Education to succeed Orval Behnke whose term expired. L. N. Peterson nominated Orval Behnke. Clifford Stautz moved that nominations be closed and that a unanimous ballot be cast for Orval Behnke. Seconded by Wayland Tessar. Motion carried.

The chairman called for nominations for a member to the Board of Education to succeed Iona Schmidt whose term expired. Fred Spoerl nominated Iona Schmidt. A motion by Roger McKenna, seconded by Lloyd Teeslink, that nominations be closed and a unanimous ballot be cast for Iona Schmidt. Motion carried.

## Brother of Local Man, Fr. Wittman, Ill 37 Years Dies

Rev. Martin A. Wittman, 75, former missionary priest in South Dakota and a patient at St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, for the last 37 years, died at 3:15 a. m. Friday, July 30, following an extended illness. He was a brother of Hubert Wittman of Kewaskum.

Father Wittman was born Feb. 11, 1890, in Lomira, the son of Martin and Mary Bauer Wittman. A Roman Catholic priest for 49 years, he was ordained in June, 1916, in St. Paul and spent seven years as a missionary in South Dakota, serving as chaplain at Sister Hospital, Hot Springs, and pastor of St. Martin's church, Oelrichs.

Stricken with flu after World War I, he also suffered from a paralysis, which continued to increase, and in 1924 he returned to Byron, Wis. to live with his mother. He was moved to St. Agnes hospital in 1928 and as his condition improved through the years, he was able to offer Mass unassisted at a specially built altar in his room in April, 1948, with Bishop William T. McCarty, C.S.S.R., Rapid City, in attendance. His hobbies included raising tropical fish, repairing old clocks and making rosaries. His hospital room was lined with small aquariums and his friends flooded him with clocks to repair. The rosaries were given to his many friends.

Survivors include three brothers, Hubert here, C. Raymond of Sheboygan and S. J. Wittman, a noted flyer of Oshkosh, and one sister, Mrs. Perry Anderson of Milwaukee. He was preceded in death by his parents.

Friends called after 3 p. m. Monday at the Zacherl Funeral home, Fond du Lac. Funeral services were held at 10 a. m. Tuesday at St. Agnes hospital chapel. Bishop McCarty officiating. Burial was in St. Andrew's cemetery, Le Roy. The body was removed to the chapel and lay in state from 8:30 a. m. Tuesday until the time of the service.

## MRS. FRED RAMER

Mrs. Fred Ramer, 59, died at St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, Saturday morning, July 24, after a long illness. Mr. and Mrs. Ramer were the proprietors of Ramer's Resort at Crooked lake, where they resided the past 21 years.

The deceased was born Feb. 16, 1906 in Cooperstown, Wis. to Thomas and Mary Powers Dewana and married Fred Ramer on Sept. 7, 1929 at Cooperstown.

She is survived by her husband, two brothers, Richard of Green Bay and Donald of California, and one sister, Mrs. Gordon Holloway of Milwaukee.

Mrs. Ramer was a member of the Campbellsport Woman's club and of the Christian Mothers' society of St. Michael's church in Parnell.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, July 28, at 10 a. m. at St. Mary's church, Cooperstown, and burial was in the church cemetery. The body had been in state at the Twohig Funeral home, Campbellsport, and at the Dawana Funeral home in Denmark preceding the services.

**To Attend Organ Teaching Seminar**

Mrs. W. H. Walvoord, 1518 Fond du Lac ave., will attend a teaching seminar in Fond du Lac Aug. 9 at the Hammond Organ Studios. Richard K. Sundin will conduct the seminar. Sundin has been teaching full-time for the past 11 years. Two years ago he published an organ teaching course titled Organ Stylings. This book is now in its third printing. It was awarded first prize by the Ohio State Literary association as the most valuable contribution to music education in this state during 1962. A copy of Organ Stylings, with a bronze plaque reposes in the Ohio State Library. It is in use in 36 states, Canada and Australia.

During the seminar, Sundin will go through all phases of the organ course, in as much detail as possible, with discussion on all points. #### TOTAL DEER KILL 33 ON COUNTY HIGHWAYS

Fishing pressure light and fishing pressure slow due to cool weather and rain on weekends. A few walleyes and perch caught at Pike lake. Fair bass fishing at Big and Little Cedar lakes.

Five doe and one buck deer were killed on Washington county highways during the month of July, a total of thirty-three so far this year. In a ten mile drive on

county and town roads this past Sunday morning, the following car kills were counted: five rabbits, one pheasant, a skunk and a farmer's chicken.

The Committee on Water Pollution has received an application for the chemical treatment of Little Cedar lake in Washington county.

The application calls for the chemical control of algae on the shoreline and open water portions of Little Cedar lake. The application has been submitted by the Little Cedar Lake Advancement Association, Inc.
