Carl Wertz Wins Graduates From Fourth Crown at Nursing School South Hills Club

CRUSHES OPPONENTS IN FINALS OVER WEEKEND

Carl Wertz of Kewaskum set down the final two pretenders to his throne with crushing finality Saturday and Sunday, so now he reigns as club champion for an unprecedented fourth time of South Hill Country club at Fond du Lac.

Wertz, who won earlier championships in 1959, 1963 and 1964, defended his crown with victories over Don Castle and Mike O'Neill. Castle was beaten in the semifinals, 3-2, then O'Neill was no match for the Kewaskum golfer. falling by a 7-6 count in the championship match.
