Carl Wertz Wins Fourth Crown at South Hills Club

CRUSHES OPPONENTS IN FINALS OVER WEEKEND

Carl Wertz of Kewaskum set down the final two pretenders to his throne with crushing finality Saturday and Sunday, so now he reigns as club champion for an unprecedented fourth time of South Hill Country club at Fond du Lac.

Wertz, who won earlier championships in 1959, 1963 and 1964, defended his crown with victories over Don Castle and Mike O'Neill. Castle was beaten in the semi-finals, 3-2, then O'Neill was no match for the Kewaskum golfer, falling by a 7-6 count in the championship match.

O'Neill had gained the final round with a one up verdict over Tom Rause Saturday.

In Sunday's championship battle, Wertz went three up after 18 holes before closing out the match on the 30th green. He broke a tie with Tom Puls to become the first four-time winner in the tournament's 15-year history. Puls won titles in 1953, 1956 and 1957.

In winning, Wertz became the first man to capture the championship three years in a row. Puls and Robbie Edgerton are other golfers who took back-to-back championships, Edgerton winning in 1961 and 1962.

Wertz has now begun defense of his title as champion of Hon-E-Kor Country club, Kewaskum, which he also holds. In his first match played Tuesday, Wertz defeated Leroy Chapman of West Bend, 5-4.

FIREMEN TO DEMONSTRATE FIRE FIGHTING WITH FOAM

The Kewaskum fire department has arranged to have Jim Fenton of Madison give a demonstration on high expansion foam for fighting oil fires or any other class A and class B fires. This is the latest development in the field of fire fighting.

The demonstration will be held at 7:30 p. m. Monday, Aug. 30, at the sewage disposal plant grounds just south of the village and the public is invited to come and witness this demonstration. About 300 gallons of crude oils and gasoline will be lighted, creating a brilliant fire, and then will be extinguished with this new type of foam.

The fire department is considering purchasing one of these new nozzles.

Mrs. Walter Dei Is County Dollars for Democrats Chairman

Kewaskum Native, Ben Rimmel Dies

Ben J. Rimmel, 75, of 803 W. Brown st., Waupun, a native of Kewaskum and uncle of Ralph Rimmel of this village, passed away unexpectedly of a heart attack at his home on Monday night, Aug. 23, at his home.

He was born May 25, 1890, in Kewaskum, the son of Mathias and Augusta Laverenz Rimmel. He married Ella Kressin in Milwaukee on Aug. 19, 1914, and they resided in Milwaukee until 1930. Moving to Waupun, they operated Rimmel's Market in that city until his retirement in 1955.

Survivors include two sons, Robert and Donald, and one daughter, Mrs. August Staehling, all of Waupun; four grandchildren; a sister, Mrs. Adeline Rodenkirch of Milwaukee, and two brothers, Edward Rimmel of Milwaukee and John Rimmel of Wausau. He was preceded in death by his wife in January of this year.

Schedule County Apportionment Hearing Sept. 1

The Washington County Board Apportionment committee has set Wednesday, Sept. 1, at 8 p. m. in the auditorium of the new courthouse at West Bend as the time and place for holding the public hearing on the apportionment of supervisory districts of Washington county. The county board has approved the 29 supervisors quota.

The following changes are proposed:

1. Towns of Wayne and Kewaskum are combined to form one single district.
2. Village and town of Jackson combined to form one single district.
3. Town of Trenton and Rich-

field each will be increased from one to two districts.

4. Town and village of Germantown are combined and given three districts.

The districts that will be represented by more than one supervisor such as the cities of Hartford and West Bend, the village of Germantown and the towns of Richfield and Trenton will have an additional problem, which is the division of their area into districts with equal representation.

The population average per district is 1,590. Average percentage deviation per supervisor is 12.3 per cent—ranging from town of Polk's 2,090 population for its supervisor down to town of Erin's 1,133 for its supervisor (last census).
