Rev. F. Seefeldt to Be Installed As Assistant Pastor of Neenah Church

The Reverend Fredric A. Seefeldt will be installed Sunday, Sept. 12, as assistant pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran church, Neenah. The Reverend Doctor Theodore E. Matson, president of the Wisconsin-Upper Michigan Synod of The Lutheran Church in America, will preach the sermon and conduct the installation at the 10:30 a. m. worship service.

The Reverend Mr. Seefeldt was ordained into the ministry on June 13, 1965 at Trinity Lutheran church, West Bend. He has been serving St. Paul's congregation since July 1. The recently ordained pastor's responsibilities include preaching, visitation of the sick, the members and prospective members with special emphasis on youth work and parish education.

At present, Pastor Seefeldt is also serving on the steering committee for a Teacher Training Institute sponsored by four Lutheran congregations in Neenah and Menasha. He will also be on the teaching staff of this institute for Sunday Church School teachers. This six-week institute represents a milestone in inter-parish cooperation for the community.

In addition, Pastor Seefeldt is also serving on the planning committee for a joint four-parish Senior High Youth Retreat to be held the last weekend of September. The retreat will bring youth together from four Lutheran Church in America parishes in the Twin City area. Pastor Seefeldt will be the chaplain for the retreat.

Interested in community activities, Pastor Seefeldt recently appeared in the Riverside Players' production of the musical, "Showboat." The Riverside Players is sponsored by the Neenah Recreation Department and it brings together people from all walks of life throughout the Fox Cities area. Pastor Seefeldt will also be attending the Clergyman's Institute on Mental Health sponsored by the Winnebago State hospital.

A native of Kewaskum, Pastor Seefeldt is a graduate of its public schools. In 1960, Lakeland college awarded him the degree of Bachelor of Arts, cum laude. In May of this year, he graduated from the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago with a Bachelor of Divinity degree. The Reverend Mr. Seefeldt is a nominee to the 1959-60 edition of Who's Who in American Universities and Colleges. He served his seminary internship at First Lutheran church, Freeport, Ill., under the guidance of the Reverend Charles F. Landwere and the Reverend Doctor K. E. Irvin.

St. Paul's Lutheran church of Neenah was organized in 1912. It presently has a membership of 1,800 baptized members and 1,300 confirmed members. During its 53 year history it has been responsible for the organization of two more congregations: St. Timothy's of Menasha in 1945 and St. Mark's of Neenah in 1958. St. Paul's was also the site of the constituting convention of the Wisconsin-Upper Michigan Synod in 1962. This synod, of which St. Paul's is a member, is one of the 31 constituent synods of The Lutheran Church in America. The largest of the Luth-

Mrs. William C. Schmidt, 70, nee Olga Eichstedt, of Kewaskum, passed away on Monday, Sept. 6, at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend. She had been seriously ill for one week before her demise.

She was born Jan. 22, 1895, in the town of Auburn, a daughter of the late William and Louisa Quandt Eichstedt. Her marriage to William C. Schmidt took place in Kewaskum on May 4, 1915. They lived in the town of Auburn until 20 years ago when they moved to Kewaskum, residing here since that time. Her husband preceded her in death just a year and a day before her, on Sept. 5, 1964.

Four children were born to the couple, two of whom predeceased them. Surviving are one son, Sylvester Schmidt, of R. 2, Kewaskum, and one daughter, Evangelina (Mrs. Lloyd Teeselink, of Kewaskum; six grandchildren; one daughter-in-law; one son-in-law, and one brother. E. A. Eichstedt of Milwaukee.

Mrs. Schmidt was a member of the Ladies' Guild of Peace United Church of Christ, Kewaskum.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 p. m. Wednesday at Peace United Church of Christ, with the Rev. Daniel Schowalter officiating. Burial was in the parish cemetery. Friends called at Miller's Funeral home from 2 p. m. Tuesday until 11 a. m. Wednesday and at the church from 12 noon until the hour of services.

Second Burglar Is Given Term in Koch Store Theft

Kenneth Meyer, 28, former Milwaukee resident, was sentenced to a two year term in Waupun state prison last Friday by Lester A. Buckley, judge of County Court No. 1 in Washington county for his participation in a break-in and burglary at the A. G. Koch, Inc. grocery store in Kewaskum on April 2, 1965.

The Waupun sentence will begin when Meyer completes a term in the federal penitentiary at Sandstone, Minn., which was imposed in Colorado on an interstate car theft charge. He was brought to this county for sentencing by a federal marshal.

James Kroll, 30, also of Milwaukee, who was a partner in the Koch break-in with Meyer, was previously sentenced to two years at Waupun on the Kewaskum burglary and received three and two year terms for prior burglaries in Milwaukee for a total of seven years.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in adjourned session with President Tessar presiding and all board members present.

Trustee Hirsig was appointed as a member of the Finance Committee to replace John Geidel.

The sealed bids for a new truck chassis and cab for the use of the Fire Dept. were opened by President Tessar and publicly read aloud. The bids were tabulated as follows and were referred to Fire Dept. Equipment Committee for examination and recommendation:

Honeck Chevrolet, Kewaskum, requested postponing of bidding until October 11th because they had not yet received their prices for the 1966 models from Chevrolet Motor Co.

Mr. Al Zehren and Mr. Ted Meilahn conferred with the board and Village Engineer Bob McMahon regarding the anticipated approval of the street plan by the State Highway Dept. for the Meilahn area recently annexed to the village.

Engineer Bob McMahon also conferred with the board regarding the possible installation of another storm sewer on Brooklane Drive and also the possible installation of a gravity sanitary sewer line from the Main Street lift station to the main sewage lift station.

Mr. Ross Bradt of Rosco, West Bend, explained to the board his proposal for replacing the windows and doors on the Water Dept. pump station No. 1. The proposal was referred to committee. Cost of the proposal was \$900.00.

Superintendent Armin Oppermann reported that the estimated cost of installing a gravity flow sanitary sewer line from the Main Street lift station to the main sewage lift station would be between \$7,500.00 to \$10,000.00.

Assessor Carl F. Schaefer made a report to the board on the pre-

Schoolbells will ring again for County Agent Maurice Hovland, starting Sept. 13. Hovland, who has been county agent in Washington county for ten years, is about to enter the University of Wisconsin again to work on his master's degree, which he hopes to complete in January, 1966.

According to Hovland, the pressures upon all extension personnel become increasingly greater each year, in terms of trying to keep up with new knowledge and ways of doing things for all people. As there are more people there are more problems, and since, according to Hovland, knowledge in general doubles every ten years, it becomes increasingly important that all people do what they can to keep up to date with new research and new findings. Hovland will be studying those subjects which are most urgently

needed to help him in his work as county agent when he returns in 1966.

During his absence, Dale Smith, from Marysville, Ohio, will be working for him. Smith is a graduate of Ohio State university, where he was an agronomy major. He has been a teacher of high school science classes, went back to school to obtain his master's degree, and now is interested in a career in agricultural extension. 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Agronomy Field Day At Jackson Monday For Area Farmers

Monday, Sept. 20, should be a red-letter day for many farmers of this area. This is the day that Oliver Vogel has scheduled an agronomy field day on his farm near Jackson. Since both corn and alfalfa are major crops in this area, most farmers will be interested in some of the ideas Vogel is trying with these crops.

Corn has been grown continuously in one field for five years. During that time the land has never been plowed, but has only been disked prior to planting. In another field weed control in corn resulting from cultivation can be compared to the control resulting from the use of various chemicals. Corn has also been planted in 30-inch rows. In addition to observing the narrow-row corn, men on the tour will have a chance to see some of the corn chopped by one of Gehl Company's new two-row choppers for 30-inch rows.

Is it possible to establish alfalfa without a nurse or companion crop? Vogel has tried this by using a chemical for weed control in one case, and by flame burning for weed control in another. The results make a person think about all sorts of new possibilities for the future.

Another idea that will be de-

monstrated at the field day is that of growing two crops on one field in one year. Peas were grown and harvested, the chemical eptam was applied, and alfalfa was seeded. The problems a practice like this present will be considered at the field day.

To get to the Oliver Vogel farm, go south from Jackson on Hwy. 45 two miles, turn left for two miles, go right 1/2 mile, and turn left for 1/2 mile. The program will start in the early afternoon.

SEPT. 10 IS DEADLINE FOR GOOSE HUNT APPLICATIONS

Applications for the Horicon managed goose hunt have been available for some time at the various outlets in the state, and must be postmarked on or before Sept. 10, 1965. The fee is \$4.00 per blind, two persons per blind, and a total of 106 public blinds are available. Kindly stop at the office of the county clerk or any license depot for further details. The migratory waterfowl regulations will be distributed not later than Sept. 20.

ence to the new resident archer licenses in my letter of Aug. 18, 1965."

Small game and bear may be hunted with both gun and bow and arrow on the resident small game hunting license fee of \$4.00 and the voluntary sportsmen's license covers all privileges of the resident small game hunting license. The hunting of deer with bow and arrow must be done on the new resident archer license at the fee of \$5.00 and this privilege is not covered under the sportsmen's license.


