Severe Electric Storm Hits Area, Firemen Called

POWER KNOCKED OUT, BASEMENTS FLOODED. LIGHTNING STRIKES

A severe electric storm accompanied by crackling lightning all ever the sky, ear-splitting thunder, heavy rain, high winds and very threatening skies, struck this area last Thursday evening. Severe storm warnings were out and tornado warnings were broadcast for the area south of Kewaskum.

As a result of the warnings and very threatening appearance of the approaching storm, many residents took cover and headed for basements when the lightning, thunder and wind became severe.
