### J. O. Reigle Retires As Regal Ware, Inc. President

#### James D. Reigle Is New President

Just before going to press on Thursday afternoon announcement was made in a special news release by Regal Ware, Inc. that J. O. Reigle has retired as president of Regal Ware, Inc., Kewaskum manufacturers of cookware and electrical appliances.

Mr. Reigle will continue to serve as chairman of the board of directors of the company he founded 20 years ago, and guided to front rank leadership in the housewares industry.

The new president is James D. Reigle, formerly vice-president-sales and management. Well known in the housewares field, 39-year-old James Reigle has been active in the firm since his graduation from Ohio university in 1949. A member of the board and officer of the firm since 1954, he served as assistant general manager and secretary prior to his appointment as a vice-president in 1962.

### Annual Kiwanis Club Live Turkey Shoot on Sunday

#### 13TH SHOOT AND OTHER EVENTS AT BAR-N RANCH

The Kewaskum Kiwanis club will sponsor its 13th annual Live Turkey Shoot on Sunday, Sept. 19, at the Bar-N Dude Ranch, six miles northeast of Kewaskum on County Trunk GGG, the beautiful Kettle Moraine drive.

Patterned after the historic turkey shoots which were so popular in frontier days, this fascinatingly interesting annual event has become an outstanding attraction. Thousands of men, women and children from all over the state attend as participants and spectators.

The Turkey Shoot is handled as follows: large live turkeys are protected behind an earthen bunker at the end of the rifle range with only their heads exposed to the marksman. For a fee of \$1.00 for three shots (four shots for a dollar on advance sale tickets) the marksman attempts to hit the turkey's head from the firing line, using a .22 rifle. The turkey he hits is the turkey he gets for the family larder. Rifles and ammunition are furnished.

A live trout fishing contest is another public attraction. It offers fine sport for the pro and amateur alike. The angler keeps all the fish he catches.

Other prizes are offered for those catching the most fish.

Other events include trap and deer target shooting. Sportsmen desiring to enter these events may bring their own shotguns, rifles and ammunition. An archery target range and marksmanship contests have been added. Here's an opportunity for Robinhood admirers to test their skill. In addition, there are games for every member of the family to enjoy. Shelter, hot and cold food and beverages will be available.

The shoot is sponsored by the Kewaskum Kiwanis club with all profits going to their Youth and Community Benefit funds.

### Kenneth Pierce, Wife Critically Injured in Crash

#### ONE KILLED, SIX OTHERS HURT IN HEAD-ON MISHAP NEAR WISCONSIN RAPIDS

Kenneth L. Pierce, 34, Milwaukee, a son of Mrs. Margaret Pierce of Kewaskum, and a former resident of this village, and his wife Carol, 26, were critically injured, one man was killed and six other persons were injured in a head-on collision Saturday night, Sept. 4, on Hwys. 13-73 two miles west of Wisconsin Rapids, according to word received by the Statesman from Preston Pierce and wife (the former Jeanette Staehler of here), of that city, brother and sister-in-law of Kenneth.

Mrs. Preston Pierce first notified this office of the accident by long distance phone call and later sent a clipping of the account of the mishap taken from the Wisconsin Rapids Tribune of Sept. 7. Kenneth and wife and family had gone to Wisconsin Rapids to spend the Labor Day weekend with the Preston Pierces and also his wife's folks who reside in that area. They were on their way to Preston's home when the crash occurred.

Apparently killed instantly in the crash was Levi Pidgeon, 32, an Indian, of R. 3, Wisconsin Rapids. He was a passenger in a car driven by his brother, Ernest Pidgeon, 43, Wisconsin Rapids, which crashed into the auto operated by Pierce.

Wood county officers said the Pidgeon car and the Pierce auto collided in Pierce's lane of traffic. The accident is still being investigated by the sheriff's department. Officers reported that Ernest Pidgeon had been arrested earlier about 2:30 p. m. the day of the accident and charged with operating on the wrong side of the road after his car ran into a ditch along County Trunk D in the town of Cranmoor.

Among those injured in the collision were Pierce and three passengers in his car. He suffered severe head injuries and was reported in very critical condition. (Continued on page 3)

### High School Has Enrollment Of 527 Students

#### TOTAL DOWN SLIGHTLY FROM LAST YEAR'S 531; 137 FRESHMEN ENROLL

The enrollment of 527 at Kewaskum Community High school is down slightly from last year's record enrollment of 531 students. This is due mainly to a smaller freshman class. This year's freshman class numbers 137 students while last year a record 155 students enrolled.

### Severe Electric Storm Hits Area, Firemen Called

#### POWER KNOCKED OUT, BASEMENTS FLOODED, LIGHTNING STRIKES

A severe electric storm accompanied by crackling lightning all over the sky, ear-splitting thunder, heavy rain, high winds and very threatening skies, struck this area last Thursday evening. Severe storm warnings were out and tornado warnings were broadcast for the area south of Kewaskum.

As a result of the warnings and very threatening appearance of the approaching storm, many residents took cover and headed for basements when the lightning, thunder and wind became severe. One tornado did touch down in northwestern Waukesha county, uprooting trees, knocking down wires, tearing off a barn roof and flooding roadways, and funnel clouds were sighted over Milwaukee. One local resident reported seeing a small funnel cloud as the storm hit this area. Radio and TV warnings stated that funnel clouds were sighted at Beaver Dam and in Waukesha county and were headed from west to east toward this area. Hail pelted some areas.

The entire Kewaskum area was "blacked out" for about a half hour by a power failure when lightning struck a feeder line leading into the main sub-station at West Bend. That city was without light or power for an hour. Many basements, streets, fields and highways were flooded. Main st. in the village on the west side of the railroad tracks was under water for a time and water rose up to the doors in front of Heisler's tavern and the Fair Variety store. East Main st. was also under water in front of Kohn Bros. Farm Service. Village crews and firemen spent Thursday night pumping out flooded basements, there being many in town. Numerous tree branches were blown down.

Kewaskum firemen received a call at about 9:30 p. m., after power had been restored, to the Mrs. Reuben Schaefer home just north of the village. Lightning had struck either the home or wires leading into the house, burning out a switch box and wires in the home and blackening walls in spots, causing smoke and a burning smell. Firemen entered the water filled basement and pulled the switch, shutting off the power. One fireman, Bob Staehler, tore off a fingernail pulling the switch and was treated at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend. There was no further damage.

cut on his left elbow when he accidentally caught it in an electric fan. One stitch was taken to close the wound, which caused stiffness in the arm.

A fire caused by a bolt of lightning striking the steeple of Peace Ev. church during a storm about 5 a. m. Saturday caused extensive damage to the interior of the edifice. Rev. Richard Gadow, pastor, and Fire Chief Harry Schaefer estimated the damage at between \$2,000 and \$3,000. A number of bricks were knocked out of the steeple by the bolt. When firemen arrived smoke was pouring from the steeple and roof but because they were soaked from the night's rain the flames were confined mostly to the interior. The interior of the steeple was an inferno and flames spread along the church rafters. Firemen fought the blaze with one hose from the inside and two from outside and soon checked the fire. Firemen had a narrow escape from injury when a trap door burned loose and fell from the tower to the floor below while they were ascending a ladder, narrowly missing them. One fireman, Albert Hron Jr., was injured when struck on the head by the nozzle of a hose, sustaining a bad cut above the eye, when firemen ducked to avoid the falling trap door. Another fireman, Otto Weddig, one of the first in the steeple, was almost overcome by smoke and had to go out for fresh air.

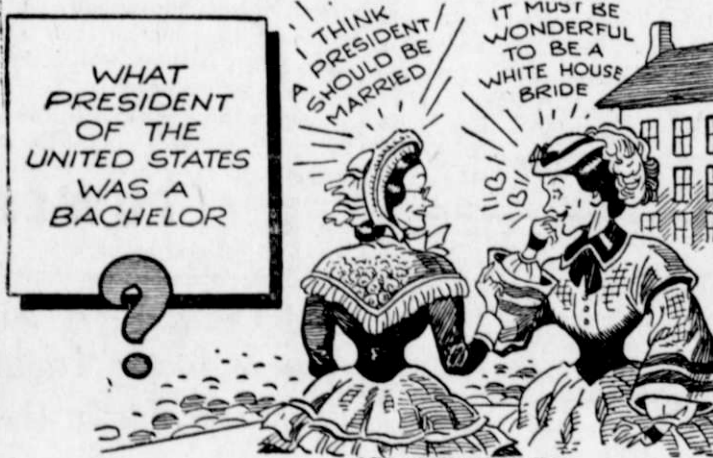
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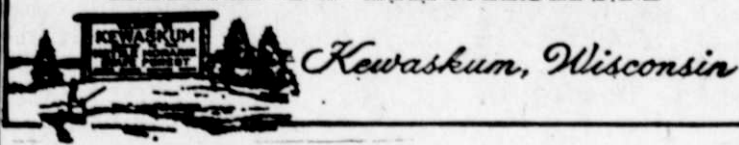

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**Elementary School Principals Meet, Items Discussed**

The monthly meeting of the Kewaskum Elementary Principal's association was called to order at 1:00 p. m. on Sept. 8 with all members present. Mr. John Messerli, coordinator of Cooperative Service Agency 16, was a guest, according to Richard E. Zarling, supervising principal of the elementary school, who is chairman of the association.

The minutes of the Aug. 26 meeting were approved as printed. Items discussed were as follows:

1. Discussion of the mathematics in-service program which began Sept. 7. Principals requested to again urge participation of their respective teachers. The possibility of making it mandatory next year for those who are not now enrolled is being considered.

2. A decision on report cards will be made at the Oct. 13 meeting. Principals are to be prepared to discuss cards in detail.

3. Supervision and school visitations by principals. Principals will visit the various schools beginning with the Kewaskum Elementary school to observe classes, facilities and materials of instruction. Visitation days will be held on regular meeting days.

4. The new scope and sequence in social studies was considered a critical area for study. Principals are to report on what units are now being taught by grade level at the October meeting.

5. New retirement legislation was mentioned and it was recommended that the Washington-Waukesha administrators and the Cooperative Service Agency ex-

plore the effects and inform their respective area people.

6. Field trips and conservation type camps and their value and problems. No decisions were made regarding these areas.

7. Mr. Messerli spoke to the group about the agency he heads as well as giving his reactions to our group and what is being attempted in the way of coordinating the area elementary schools.

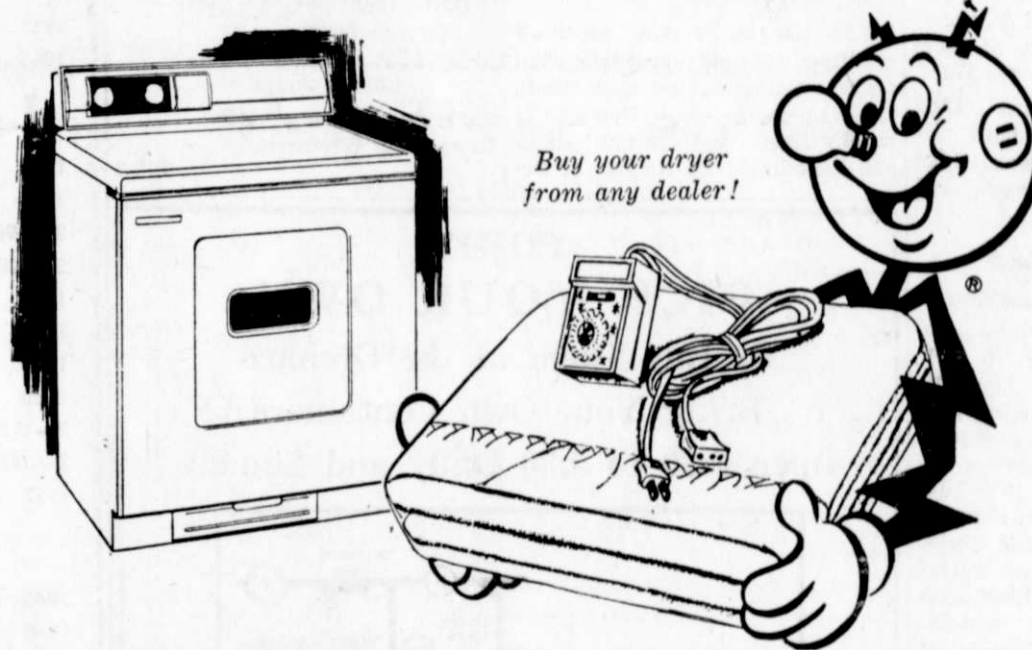

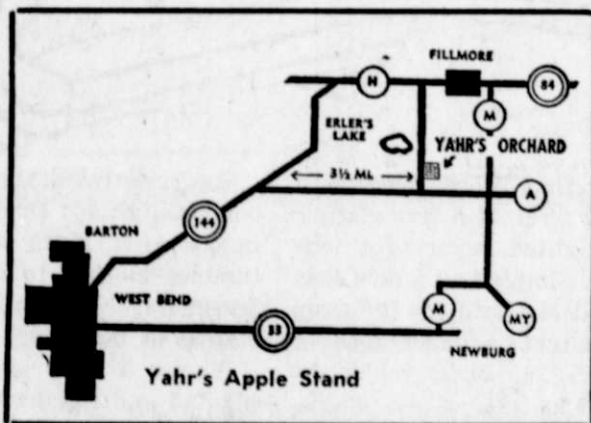

## Horicon Defeats Indians in Hotly Contested Opener, 14-7

**KEWASKUM SCORES THREE TOUCHDOWNS, ONLY ONE COUNTS IN NEAR UPSET**

The Kewaskum Indians almost pulled off an upset over Horicon of the Little Ten conference before dropping a hotly contested decision to the Marshmen there Friday night, 14-7, in the season's non-conference opener.

The Indians, who failed to win a game in the Scenic Moraine conference last season, settling for one tie, gave Horicon a surprisingly strong battle under their new head coach, Joe Harlow, and his new staff of assistants. Judging from their performance against the Marshmen, they should win some games this year.

Kewaskum scored three touchdowns at Horicon which would have won the contest but unfortunately only one of them counted. The other two were called back because of penalties. Shortly before the half the Indians completed a pass in the end zone for a touchdown but the score was nullified when the officials claimed the passer was inches over the line of scrimmage when he tossed the pass. On another series of plays Kewaskum started to move, completed passes and went on the ground for 75 yards and a TD. Lucky again for Horicon it didn't count. A long run was nullified and on top of that the Indians were penalized 30 yards on one play (15 yards for clipping and 15 more for talking back (?) to the referee), pushing them way back in their own territory.

The Indians almost scored on one other occasion when Dick Wietor intercepted Quarterback John Marx's pass at midfield. Wietor would have gone all the way if it weren't for a good tackle by Marohl, the lone defender left. Kewaskum moved the ball well but had big gains nullified by infractions. The Horicon defense had trouble all night with Kewaskum's excellent receivers. The Indians completed 10 of 19 passes and several others that were nul-

lified because of penalties. The hardhitting, fighting Indians were very aggressive, a little too much so at times in their determination to win but showed real drive and desire.

The Horicon touchdowns came when in the second period John Sternweis took a handoff and scampered 41 yards after going through the weak side of Horicon's unbalanced line, and in the fourth quarter when Marc Kreger took a short over the middle pass from Quarterback Marx and raced 51 yards through the entire Kewaskum team. The Marshmen led at the half, 7-0. The Indians got their seven points in the closing seconds of the game when Larry Coulter took a six yard pass from Bill Backhaus and scored. Jim Gutjahr ran for the extra point. They had reached scoring territory with passes and good ground gains. Lee Plageman kicked both Horicon extra points.

Kewaskum will open conference action this Friday, playing at Grafton in a 4 p. m. contest. Grafton is the defending champion and right off the bat the Indians will be faced with one of their toughest games of the season. Grafton had a perfect 7-0 record last year.

**HORICON MANAGED GOOSE HUNT TO OPEN SEPT. 25**

The Horicon managed goose

hunt will open at noon on Sept. 25. This includes only the quota zone which is the same as last year. That area known last year as the 2:00 p. m. closing zone will shoot noon to 4:00 p. m. the first day and 9:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. daily after that. That area outside the former 2:00 p. m. closing zone but inside the perimeter of the quota zone will shoot noon to sundown the first day and sunrise to sunset each day after that. The 1965 migratory bird hunting regulations will be available by Sept. 20, pick one up before you hunt.

Fifty percent of the variable quota deer permits (in excess of 25,000) will be available at the office of the county clerks in the various quota areas at 1:00 p. m. on Sept. 29, 1965. An individual from Washington county may if he wishes stand in line at the county clerk's office in Black River Falls and obtain a permit in the event he follows the regulations.

Mailing deadline date for permit applications through the mails to our Madison office is Oct. 11, 1965. Permit applications are now available, and the big game regulations now available indicate the number of permits that will be issued this fall.

### Agronomy Field Day At Jackson Monday For Area Farmers

Monday, Sept. 20, should be a red-letter day for many farmers of this area. This is the day that Oliver Vogel has scheduled an agronomy field day on his farm near Jackson. Since both corn and alfalfa are major crops in this area, most farmers will be interested in some of the ideas Vogel is trying with these crops.

Corn has been grown continuously in one field for five years. During that time the land has never been plowed, but has only been disked prior to planting. In another field weed control in corn resulting from cultivation can be compared to the control resulting from the use of various chemicals. Corn has also been planted in 30-inch rows. In addition to observing the narrow-row corn, men on the tour will have a chance to see some of the corn chopped by

one of Gehl Company's new two-row choppers for 30-inch rows.

Is it possible to establish alfalfa without a nurse or companion crop? Vogel has tried this by using a chemical for weed control in one case, and by flame burning for weed control in another. The results make a person think about all sorts of new possibilities for the future.

Another idea that will be demonstrated at the field day is that of growing two crops on one field in one year. Peas were grown and harvested, the chemical eptam was applied, and alfalfa was seeded. The problems a practice like this present will be considered at the field day.
