J. O. Reigle Retires as President of Regal Ware; James, Ronald Reigle New Firm Heads

J. O. Reigle has retired as President of Regal Ware, Inc., Kewaskum manufacturers of cookware and electrical appliances. He will continue to serve as chairman of the board of directors of the company he founded 20 years ago, and guided to front rank leadership in the housewares industry.

The new president is James D. Reigle, formerly vice-president-sales and management. Well known in the housewares field, 39-year-old James Reigle has been active in the firm since his graduation from Ohio university in

1949. A member of the board and officer of the firm since 1954, he served as assistant general manager and secretary prior to his appointment as a vice-president in 1962.

Active in community affairs, he served as president of Kewaskum's Village Board of Trustees for more than three terms from 1955 to 1962. He is a member of the Robert G. Romaine Post No. 384 of the American Legion and the Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum. A native of Massillon, Ohio, he has

lived in Kewaskum since Regal Ware was founded in 1945. During World War II he served with the U. S. Air Force.

Ronald O. Reigle, 38, has been elected to the Regal Ware board of directors and designated as the new vice-president-sales and management. Active with the company since 1952, he had served as field sales director since 1962. Previously he had been sales manager of the firm's direct sales division since its establishment in 1953. He is a graduate of the University

of Arizona and resides in Kewaskum.

In announcing his retirement, J. O. Reigle expressed his gratitude to all the members, friends and customers of the Regal organization for the assistance and cooperation they have given over the years. "It created," he said, "the Regal spirit and teamwork that made the growth and accomplishments of the past possible. I am confident our new officers will carry on to even greater achievements in the future."

Two Well Known County Officials Killed in Crash

JUDGE BUCKLEY, CLERK OF COURTS BEREND VICTIMS

Two prominent Washington county residents and public officials, Judge Lester A. Buckley, 57, of Hartford, and Lawrence P. Berend, 56, of West Bend, Washington county clerk of courts, were apparently instantly killed about 8 p. m. Tuesday in a two car collision on Hwy. 41 at CTH K about two miles north of Slinger.

The deaths occurred when the Buckley car and the auto of a honeymooning Michigan couple collided in the southbound lane of Hwy. 41 at the intersection. Both vehicles were badly damaged. The fatalities raised the county toll to 22 for the year.

Occupants of the Michigan car were Thomas Rowe, 25, the driver, of Utica, Mich., who incurred minor lacerations of the scalp, and his bride, Vera, 23, who suffered severe lacerations of the scalp and possible internal injuries. Her condition was termed fair at the Hartford hospital while her husband was reported in very good condition.

Both Judge Buckley and Berend were thrown from their auto in the crash. County Coroner Robert Boltz reported that both suffered skull fractures and other multiple injuries and died at the scene. He said it was not known who was driving the Buckley auto.

It was believed that the Buckley car was traveling west on Hwy. K and the Rowe auto was proceeding south on Hwy. 41. Authorities said that the car carrying the victims crossed in front of Rowe's vehicle. It was reported that Judge Buckley and Clerk Berend had attended the meeting of the Washington County Bar association at the Linden Inn prior to the crash.

Judge Buckley, an honor graduate of the Marquette University Law School in 1930, practiced law in Hartford for 28 years before being appointed county judge by Gov. Gaylord Nelson beginning his term on the bench Jan. 4, 1960. (Continued on page 5)

Turkey Shoot Is Great Success; Sets Records

The 13th annual Live Turkey Shoot sponsored by the Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum at the Bar-N Dude Ranch Sunday was a grand success and set new records in attendance, number of turkeys taken and gross receipts.

A total of 559 turkeys were taken with 341 of them being live ones shot on the firing line. The attendance was estimated at between 10,000 and 12,000 persons throughout the day. The event grossed close to \$13,000.

Grafton's Champs Tip Indians, 27-6, In Scenic Opener

KEWASKUM HOSTS BELLS IN HOME OPENER FRIDAY

Opening Scenic Moraine conference play at Grafton Friday, the Kewaskum Indians were bounced by the defending champion Blackhawks, 27-6, as the winners displayed a strong passing attack.

Phil Klemme followed his blocks for an 80-yard punt return to score in the first quarter for Grafton and the Blackhawks went on from that point to post a convincing victory over the Indians. Rocky Maxson, who hit on 10 of 20 pass attempts for 215 yards, fired 55 and 20 yard scoring passes to Jim Wegner and Dean Tonn in the second quarter to give Grafton a comfortable 20-0 lead at halftime.

Maxson, who is filling the shoes of graduated all-conference star Gary Rogahn, got the Blackhawks on the scoreboard again in the third period with a 13-yard touch-down pass to Chuck Woods and Bliese added three extra points from placement for the winners. Kewaskum's consolation score came in the last quarter after the issue had been decided and the contest ended, 27-6.

In other opening games North Fondy and Campbellsport battled to a 13-13 tie as the Orioles came from behind with two touchdowns in the final quarter. Germantown extended its streak of scoreless quarters over opponents to eight by blanking Random Lake, 18-0. Germantown had blasted Hartland Arrowhead, 25-0 in their opener the week before. Slinger, which surprised Columbus, 6-0 the week before in a non-conference game, was ambushed by Pewaukee, 28-14. Judging from their pre-conference season wins over Little Ten loop teams and other good teams, Pewaukee, Germantown and Grafton loom as powerhouses.

After two games away at Horicon and Grafton, the Indians will play their home opener this Friday night, hosting the rival Campbellsport Bells. The Bells, who de-

molished Brandon, defending Tri-County conference champion, 20-0, in their opener and tied North Fondy last Friday, have shown a bruising ground attack led by Dave Weiland. It should be a hard battle.

Looking Thru the Field Glasses...

BOW AND ARROW SEASON FOR DEER, BEAR OPENS SATURDAY

The bow and arrow season for deer and bear in all counties of the state will open Sept. 25 at 6:17 a. m. Bag limit one deer of either sex. The state-wide bag limit for bear is one adult bear per license holder per year. (For the purpose of that section of the law, an adult bear is defined as any bear except a cub of the year).

The archer must wear a back tag and carry the deer tag that is issued with the special license. It is unlawful to hunt deer or bear except during the open season and before the time listed in the a. m. column and after the time listed in the p. m. column for any day as listed in the big game regulations. It is also unlawful to possess a bow between 30 minutes after the time listed in the p. m. column and the time listed in the a. m. column of the following day unless it is unstrung or enclosed in

a carrying case.

The archer who kills a deer or bear must register it before it is removed from the county or adjoining county in which it was killed. The deadline is 5:00 p. m. of the day after it was killed.

Pick up a copy of the big game regulations and read them before you take off with your bow and arrow.

Archer License Information

When Bill 263.S was passed by the legislature recently, it not only established the archer hunting license, it also effected other facets of hunting. Some were effected directly and others indirectly.

We will try and present it to you in a brief and concise manner.

1. Established an archer license at a fee of \$5 for residents over 18 and \$1 for residents 18 years of age or under. (Before his 19th birthday anniversary a person is 18 years of age or under).

2. Authorizes the hunting of all game with bow and arrow during open seasons for hunting with bow and arrow.

3. Restricts resident deer hunting license to hunting deer with firearms only.

4. Deer may be hunted by residents with bow and arrow only by holders of resident archer hunting licenses.

5. Holders of resident deer hunting licenses may hunt bear with firearms only during concurrent open seasons for hunting deer and bear with firearms. (Resident deer hunting license does NOT authorize bear hunting during early bear seasons).

6. Bear may be hunted on a small game license or sportsmen's license or settler small game license with gun or bow and arrow during early seasons AND during concurrent deer and bear season.

Information on Duck Blinds

We are getting numerous requests for information on when

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duck blinds can be built.

There are no restrictions on when you can build a blind. It should be remembered, however, that if the blind is built on navigable water, it must be removed soon after the season closes, so that no part of the blind interferes with navigation or becomes debris on the shore or in the water.

Also, a blind can NOT be used for hunting if it is located in open water.

County Retarded Group Officers at Training Session

Washington County Association for Retarded Children officers and committee chairmen attended a day of leadership training sessions Sunday, Sept. 12, at the Racine Labor Center in Racine. The Southeast Regional conference is one of four leadership conferences being sponsored this fall by the Wisconsin Association for Retarded Children for key personnel of its local member units throughout the state.

Four morning sessions, running concurrently, dealt with "Leadership in the ARC," "How to be an Effective Governmental Affairs Chairman," "Developing Public

Education and Awareness through the ARC," and "How to be an Effective Residential Care Chairman." Wisconsin ARC staff people and volunteer leaders coordinated the sessions.

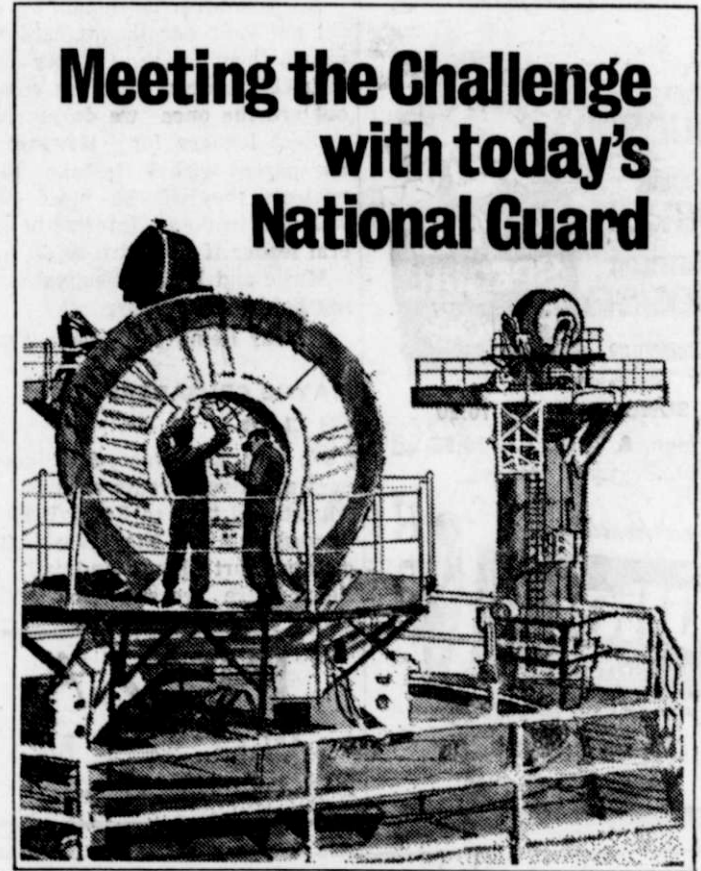
