## AFS Student Entertains Woman's Club

**FERBER AWARDED \$100 SCHOLARSHIP 4TH TIME**

Patricia Mitchell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Mitchell, Kewaskum, delightfully entertained the members of the Kewaskum Woman's club at their meeting Oct. 9.

Pat spent the past summer months with the Andrea Novelli family in Ancona, Italy, a port city on the Adriatic Sea. Ancona has a population of 100,000. Mr. Novelli is a forwarding agent and works in the port area of the city. The mother of the family is a housewife and there are two children, Silvia, age 16, and Stefano, age 10.

The shops in the downtown area are very similar to ours in the United States, Pat said. There are many sidewalk shops which close business by 2 o'clock in the afternoon for siesta.

The typical farms of Italy are very poor and poverty stricken. Students attend school from 8 a. m. until 12 noon. High school students are required to go five years, taking 12 subjects every year. If a student should fail a subject he has the opportunity to take that course over again during the summer but if he fails then he must repeat the entire year.

Pat had an opportunity to taste "Octopus and Squid" for the first time and said "it was very good." Italians drink mineral water or wine with every meal. Upon arrival Pat was asked by her Italian family what her favorite drink was, to which she replied "coke" and subsequently was served coke for breakfast every morning.

Pat was overjoyed when she was told she had been selected to represent Kewaskum in Italy and thought that it would be a "glorified vacation." However, she admits this was the "hardest thing she's ever done." There were many preparations and much hard work was required. She completed a 40-lesson Italian language course in two weeks. The Woman's club is sure she gave the people of Italy a better understanding of Americans, their thoughts and their behavior.

Another highlight of the meeting was the announcement of the annual \$100 scholarship grant. Edward Ferber, a senior at Platteville State university, was the recipient for the fourth consecutive year. Edward is a 1962 graduate of Kewaskum High school.

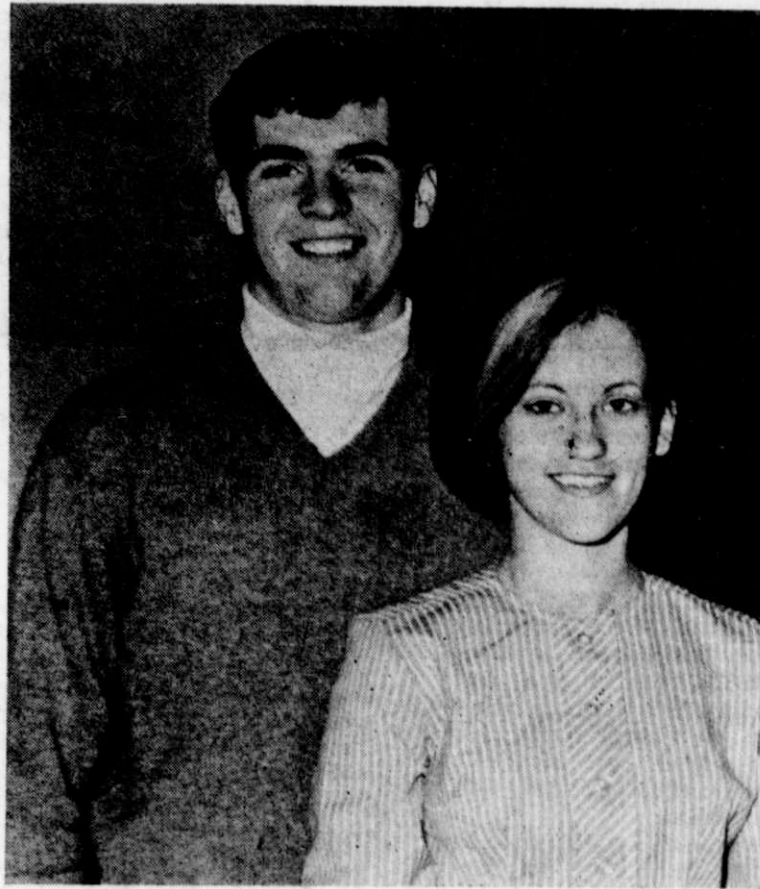
## District Meeting of MACCW Held Here
