## Youth Killed in Fillmore Crash; Other Accidents

A rural West Bend area youth fatally injured in a crash south of Fillmore at 9:06 p. m. Saturday was the 28th traffic fatality of the year in Washington county. Victim of the mishap was Ronald W. Struck, 17, of R. 2, West Bend.

A companion, Daniel Nagrocki, 18, of 540 Powers st., Port Washington, was said to be in good condition at St. Joseph's hospital in West Bend. He suffered facial cuts, abrasions and possible chest injuries. Both victims were removed to the hospital in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance where Struck was pronounced dead upon arrival.

Struck apparently lost control of his northbound vehicle on CTM M and the car left the highway and rolled over several times. It was stated that Struck was apparently thrown from the car and was found approximately 37 feet from where the vehicle came to a halt in a field.

The youth was born Dec. 28, 1947, at Dayton, Ohio, and moved to Elm Grove with his parents at an early age. The family moved to their present home in 1951. He attended St. John's Lutheran school in Newburg and graduated from Port Washington High school in 1965. He was employed by the Grauge Construction Co.

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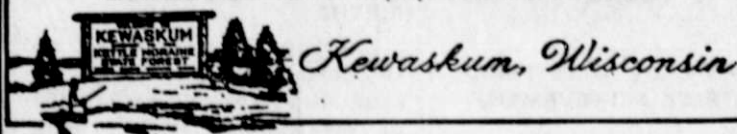

## County to Receive Regional Planning Com. Federal Grant

WILL SHARE IN \$255,459 FUNDS, RACE ANNOUNCES

WASHINGTON — Congressman John A. Race announced Friday that the Southeastern Wisconsin Planning Commission will receive a federal grant for \$255,459 under the Urban Planning Assistance Program to aid its program of comprehensive planning for growth and development in southeastern Wisconsin, including Ozaukee and Washington counties.

The federal grant will cover two-thirds of the total cost of the planning work, according to Race. Grants may be used in counties and small communities to help pay for planning work such as preparation of base maps; analysis of land use, population and economic conditions; preparation of a comprehensive development plan, and measures to implement this planning, such as zoning and subdivision regulations.

In making the announcement, Race said, "The Southeastern Wisconsin Planning Commission is to be congratulated on its aggressive spirit in attempting to build a better state."

Other areas that will benefit under this program include Milwaukee, Racine and Kenosha, as well as Washington and Ozaukee counties.

Race said that Secretary Udall will inspect the proposed Ice Age National Reserve, the Neenah slough, and that part of the Wolf river which Race has proposed to be a part of a national system of Wild Rivers.

The Fond du Lac lawmaker said that "other areas of interest to this part of Wisconsin might be included in Mr. Udall's schedule, if time permits."

Race said that Congressman Henry Reuss of Milwaukee, author of legislation to create the Ice Age Reserve, and Congressman Lynn Stalbaum of Racine will accompany the group on that section of the tour.

The Sixth Congressional District Democrat said that he would also invite Congressman Melvin Laird (R-Marshfield) to join the group to inspect a section of the Wolf river in Menominee county. Laird recently joined Race in introducing legislation which would set aside a section of the Wolf to be designated as a Wild River.

Race is a member of the House Interior committee and National Parks and Recreation sub-committee which will consider the Wild Rivers legislation.

"I have asked Secretary Udall to tour these areas," said Race, "because I believe that we must begin now to plan the use of our resources for the future. Unless we take positive steps soon, our choice wetlands, our fresh water assets, and our valuable forest land shall be lost forever."

Race said that the tour would be climaxed with a "Sixth District Conservation Dinner" in Fond du Lac that evening.

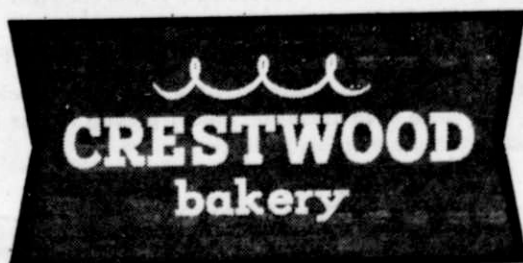

FFA Safe Corn Harvest Program

The proper operation of a mechanical corn picker increases the farmer's yield per acre. And proper operation is safe operation says the Kewaskum chapter of the Future Farmers of America.

The organization is participating in a nationwide program to reduce accidents due to carelessness during the corn harvest. The Safe Corn Harvest program is sponsored by the Farm Equipment Institute and the National Safety Council.

A safe corn picker operator has only about one chance in a million of being hurt on a picker in the next five years, while the average operator stands one in 25, according to the University of Illinois College of Agriculture. A careless operator has a 50-50 chance of being seriously injured in the next five years.

The U. of I. study showed the average corn picker loses about 10 per cent of the yield. But one operator in five loses only half this much, while another almost doubles the average loss.

As part of the program, members of the chapter will take home safety reminders and rules for safe use of a picker.

The corn picker is the most dangerous farm machine to operate, and on most farms it is leaving too much corn in the field. But the danger is to the careless operator. Proper and safe operation puts money in the family's

bank account and continued happiness in their future of farming.

## Tough N. Fondy Defense Beats Indians, 26-6

After an even first half, North Fondy rallied Friday night at Kewaskum for a resounding 26-6 Scenic Moraine conference victory as the Oriole defense put a ferocious pass rush on the Indians. The loss was No. 4 for Kewaskum, which has won one and tied one game.

The Indians bolted into a temporary lead in the first quarter when Bill Backhaus swung out a 10-yard scoring pass to Mike Miller but North Fondy closed the gap in the second period with Curt Urban firing a 34-yard touchdown toss to end Buddy Lefebvre. The teams left the field at the intermission with the score knotted at 6-6.

The Orioles' blitzing front four put on the big rush in the third quarter and directly set up two touchdowns. Defensive guard Don Touching blocked a Kewaskum punt and linebacker Alex Semenas scooped up the pigskin and raced 50 yards to score. A repeat order of mayhem by this pair was supplied later in the same quarter when Belongia jarred the ball loose from Backhaus, who had retreated to pass but was not retreating far enough, and Semenas intercepted the ball in mid-air and raced 75 yards to score again.

Steve Groeschel scored in a more conventional manner for the Orioles in the last period as he ran over from eight yards out for his team's final TD. Mike Rock counted both Oriole extra points on pass receptions.

North Fondy's big plus gain in the yardage department came via pass interceptions as the Orioles returned three passes for a total of 141 yards. Kewaskum attempted 26 passes and completed 10 for a meager 67 yards. The Indians, who outgained North Fondy on the ground, 126-62, picked up most of their yardage in the first half before they were shook by the blitz. The outcome was expected to be closer.

In other Scenic action Friday, Pewaukee, tied with Germantown for first place, showed a lot of power in blasting defending champion Grafton by a surprising margin, 31-7, and Campbellsport shaded Random Lake in their homecoming game, 14-13. In a contest played on a cold, windy day Saturday, Germantown blanked Slinger, 27-0, to maintain their first place tie with Pewaukee.

The Indians bring the 1965 grid season to a close this (Friday) afternoon, playing at Germantown against the undefeated but once tied conference leaders. Game time is 4 p. m. Germantown has shut out their opponents in four of their five victories and a win by

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the Indians in this one would have to be a major upset.

On Saturday, Oct. 9, the Indian harriers participated in the Grafton invitational, along with eight other schools, and placed high in winning fourth. Homestead took first place with 31 points, followed by Nicolet with 51, Cedarburg 89, Kewaskum 131, Grafton 143, Port Washington 152, Granville 163, Slinger 204, New Holstein, no score. Hiltgen of Homestead had the winning time of 11:13. Next in line were Belcher of Homestead, Auferheide of Cedarburg, Handley of Nicolet and Ed Czaja of Kewaskum. In the JV

meet, Kewaskum placed fifth behind Nicolet, Homestead, Granville and Port Washington, with a score of 133. Jim Czaja was the only Indian runner to place among the first 10. He was 9th.

Czaja, both of Kewaskum, placed first and second. Klug's winning time was 12:30.

The Indians copped their third Scenic Moraine meet on Thursday, Oct. 14, on a 1.9 mile course behind the local high school, beating Germantown easily, 20-41. E. Czaja once won, had the winning time of 11:13, followed by Weddig of Germantown. Among other local runners Bier was 3rd, J. Backhaus 4th, Schuenemann 5th, Teeselink 7th, Wilson 8th, Weddig 9th, Klug 11th, La Marche 12th. The Kewaskum JV's won over Germantown, 24-31, as the Indians swept the first three places. J. Czaja was first in 12:13. R. Backhaus 2nd and Gruber 3rd.

## Looking Thru the Field Glasses...

### RECORD NUMBER OF HUNTERS; MISTAKE DEER FOR SQUIRREL

The largest number of hunters ever to attend the opening of a pheasant season showed up last Saturday in Washington county. Over 200 vehicles were counted in the vicinity of the Allenton public hunting grounds. Each vehicle had two passengers and many transported four and five. That is a lot of hunters in a small area. The kill of birds was small due to high water in the marshes, strong northwest wind and snow showers. A large buck deer was killed with a 22-rifle, evidently mistaken for a squirrel. A Milwaukee hunter was wounded with fine shot and numerous signs, both state and private, were used as targets.

### Be a Good Sportsman

Most hunters will agree that using good judgment is one of the most important attributes of a good sportsman.

Asking the farmer for permission to hunt on his land is simply exercising good judgment and sportsmanship. Most farmers are

glad to grant such permission as long as you identify yourself and respect his instructions concerning restrictions from certain fields, etc.

With the tremendous increase in our hunting population the trespass problem increased greatly the past few years. Abuses such as careless use of firearms, complete disregard for standing crops, cutting fences, leaving gates open and the deliberate or accidental shooting of livestock, and even theft of crops and farm property are now common.

These acts are committed by a few hunters, but all sportsmen suffer because of them.

When you see acts being committed, it is to your advantage to report them to the warden or sheriff and help in the prosecution.

The least we can do is ask permission to hunt from the landowner. If we obtain it, be sure and conduct ourselves as sportsmen because we might want to return another day. Without the farmer and landowner providing the place to hunt and the game, we would not be able to enjoy it as we know it today.
