## Youth Killed in Fillmore Crash; Other Accidents

A rural West Bend area youth of Fillmore at 9:06 p. m. Saturday was the 28th traffic fatality of the year in Washington county. Victim of the mishap was Ronald W. Struck, 17, of R. 2, West Bend.

A companion, Daniel Nagrocki. 18, of 540 Powers st., Port Wash ington, was said to be in good condition at St. Joseph's hospital in West Bend. He suffered cuts, abrasions and possible chest injuries. Both victims were removed to the hospital in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance where Struck was pronounced dead upon arrival.

Struck apparently lost control of his northbound vehicle on CTH M and the car left the highway and rolled over several times. It was stated that Struck was apparently thrown from the car and was found approximately 37 feet from where the vehicle came to a halt in a field.

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





The organization is participating in a nationwide program to reduce accidents due to carelessness during the corn harvest. The Safe Corn Harvest program is sponsored by the Farm Equipment Institute and the National Safety Council

ture Farmers of America.

A safe corn picker operator has only about one chance in a million of being hurt on a picker in the next five years, while the average tack. operator stands one in 25, according to the University of Illinois College of Agriculture. A careless operator has a 50-50 chance of being seriously injured in the next five years.

The U. of I. study showed the average corn picker loses about 10 per cent of the yield. But one operator in five loses only half this much, while another almost doubles the average loss.

As part of the program, members of the chapter will take home safety reminders and rules for safe use of a picker.

The corn picker is the most dangerous farm machine to operate, and on most farms it is leaving too much corn in the field. But the danger is to the careless operator. Proper and safe operation puts money in the family's
