Local Elementary Principals Meet, Items Considered

The Nov. 10 meeting of the Kewaskum Elementary Principals' association was called to order at 1:00 p. m. at the Beechwood Elementary school with all members present, reports Chairman Richard E. Zarling, supervising principal of Kewaskum Elementary school.

The Oct. 13 minutes were approved as printed.

Items considered were as follows:

1. Reactions to the dental health materials provided in October. They were well received where used.

2. No great problems have developed as a result of report card changes.

3. A brief discussion regarding K-12 legislation and a reminder of the special meeting being called by the high school board on Dec. 6, at 8:00 p. m. for the purpose of building an addition.

4. Considerable discussion of the Elementary and Secondary School Act and possible ways of making use of it was held. More investigation is necessary before planning a program and Mr. Bloomingdale and Mr. Zarling will report further on this at the December meeting.

5. Copies of the recommended scope and sequence in social studies were distributed. Principals are to be prepared to make a recommendation of their desires at the December meeting. Following the adoption of a sequence, sample materials of instruction will be secured for review and possible adoption for the 1966-67 school year.

6. Clarification of the proposed testing schedule for both achievement and IQ tests was made by Mr. Zarling. Materials will be sent to principals to aid in their ordering, etc.

7. A common school calendar, uniform length of the school day and salary schedules were discussed. Districts should strive for this for the 1966-67 school year.

8. More information regarding the mid-year in-service meeting was presented. Mr. Robert Wheeler of the Department of Public Instruction will make an audio visual presentation to teachers as part of the program.

The Dec. 8 meeting will be held at the Wayne Elementary school with Mr. Leader as host.

10. The meeting was adjourned and the principals toured the classrooms and other areas of the school.

Firemen Answer 2 Calls Within Hour

Members of the Kewaskum fire department were called out twice Tuesday night to separate blazes which occurred less than an hour apart. Tuesday night was cold and very windy with gusts up to 45 miles per hour and this probably had something to do with the cause of the fires as residents had to turn up their stoves and heaters to keep warm.

The first call at 9:40 p. m. was to a chimney fire at the Mrs. Loretta Kempf Stange home in New Fane. Firemen extinguished the blaze and cleaned the chimney without any damage resulting.

After returning to the fire station, firemen had just left when the siren sounded a second time at 10:30 p. m. This time they were summoned to the R. Ellefson trailer house at R. 2, Kewaskum, about three miles southwest of the village. Wood paneling and electric wires around a gas heater in the trailer caught fire and firemen had to remove the panels to get at the source and put out the blaze. There was only minor damage.

What Can We Do to Help?

Mental retardation is an affliction which strikes without regard for social, ethnic or religious background. Vividly illustrating this fact are the late President Kennedy's sister, the grandchild of Vice President Humphrey, the daughter of authoress Pearl Buck, the children of baseball stars Pete Reiser and Del Crandell.

It is estimated that there are over 5½ million mentally retarded children and adults in the USA today. And in three out of every four cases of mental retardation, there is no known cause.

National Retarded Children's Week (Nov. 14 to 25) is a good time to examine this massive problem and see what we can do about it.

We believe that enlightened public opinion can be a major factor in banishing the age-old, thoroughly false myths surrounding mental retardation and facing it squarely as what it is—a complex of child-crippling afflictions which can and will eventually be conquered.

We urge citizens of Kewaskum and Washington county to contact the Washington County Association for Retarded Children, by calling their president, Mrs. Greg Matenaer, or the Sheltered Workshop, FE 4-5931. There you will find the answer to the key question, "What can we do to help?"

How to Douse Fire on Stove

If you are frying food in a pan on the kitchen stove and the grease catches fire, turn off the heat immediately as a first step, the American Insurance association said. Then, quickly cover the burning pan with a large, flat cover, using a long-handled fork or pair of kitchen tongs to set it in place, or smother the flames with baking soda or salt. Douse it with plenty of soda or salt. Never use water on a grease fire. Water could cause the burning grease to spatter which could spread the fire.

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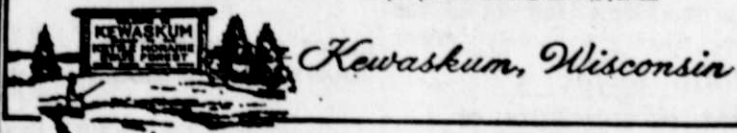

Cedar Lake Home Addition Dedicated

On Tuesday evening, Nov. 2, the fourth major expansion of the Cedar Lake Home for the Aged was dedicated. The special service attended by lay people and clergy from the area was conducted in the home's new therapy wing.

Dedicated was a new fire-resistive residence wing housing eighteen ambulatory residents on the upper floor and eighteen special care residents on the lower level with a large newly constructed living room adjoining the special care unit. Also dedicated was a fire-resistive wing constructed to house the occupational and physical therapy departments with the lower level providing new laundry facilities. Mrs. H. Baumer of West Bend, building committee chair-

man, made the presentation.

In addition to the buildings, the former Erwin J. Peters farm consisting of ninety-one acres adjoining the present Cedar Lake property was also dedicated. This farm was acquired in two units, with 69 acres having been purchased in 1964 and the remaining 22 acres including the farm buildings more recently acquired. This acquisition was made possible through special gifts from friends of the Benevolent Corporation appreciative of the program as carried on at the Cedar Lake Home. Norman A. 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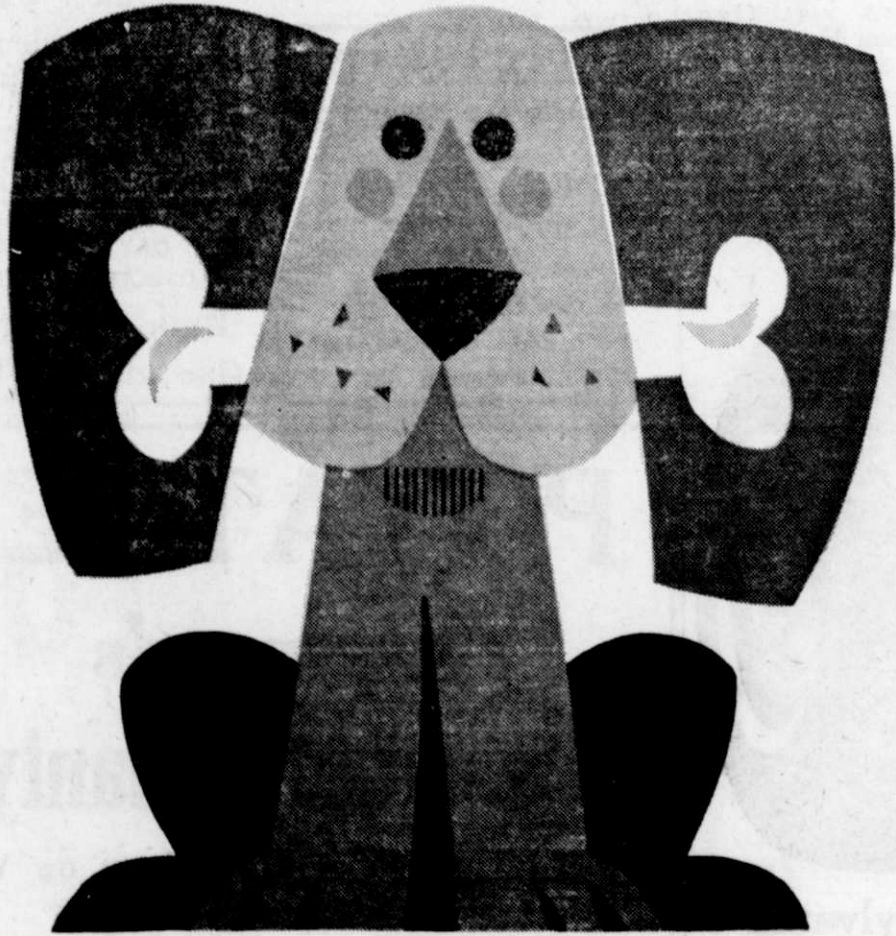
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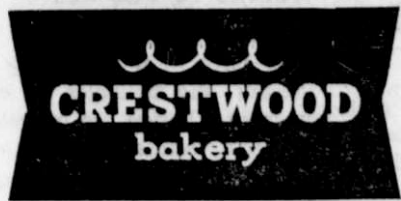
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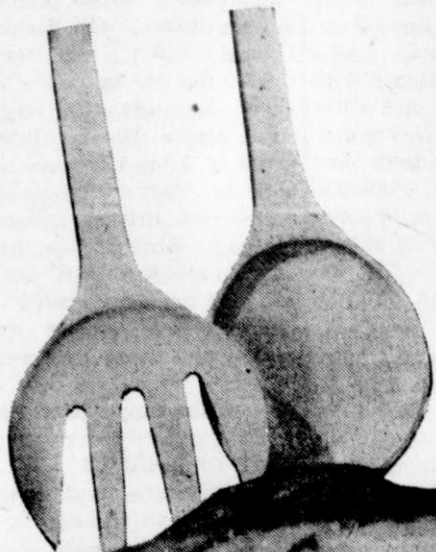

APPLICATIONS FOR TREES FOR PLANTING AVAILABLE

Applications for trees for forest planting on privately owned land in 1966 are available now from the county agent's office, 2nd floor, court house annex, West Bend; or from the conservation offices on the 3rd floor of the court house annex. There trees are made available by the Wisconsin Conservation Department at very low cost.

The following trees are listed on the order blank: black walnut, hard maple, white ash, jack pine, Norway pine, white pine, Norway spruce, white spruce, and white cedar. No order will be accepted for less than 500 trees of one species and age class.

The agents working with this program suggest that those who wish to order trees do so immediately. By ordering now, one can be sure to get the trees he wants.

Looking Thru the Field Glasses...

DEER HUNTING SEASON OPENS THIS SATURDAY

The deer season will open in Washington county on Saturday, the 20th, and close on Monday, the 22nd. This is a shotgun only season. ALL HUNTERS must wear red clothing those three days. Buck, doe or fawn may be killed. Shooting from a federal, state or county highway is prohibited, stay 200 feet away. Wear your back tag. Place and lock your deer tag on the gambrel, not on the horns. Stay out of game refuges and closed areas.

The following registration stations have been set up for the convenience of the deer hunter, and will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m. Saturday, Sunday and Monday, and from 8:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. on Tuesday: Office of the Washington county sheriff, West Bend. Hartford police station, Tally-Ho Inn at Thompson and Frank's Inn, Jackson, and the Wisconsin Conservation Department office at Mauthe lake.

Deer killed in Sheboygan and Ozaukee counties should be registered there. Like northern Wisconsin, they have a nine day buck season, and these animals must be registered there before bringing them into a closed county.

Pick up a copy of the 1965 big game hunting regulations, and read them before you start your hunt.

Deer Season Regulations

As the deer season approaches, your warden's phone becomes increasingly busy. Practically all the questions asked could be answered by the individual if he would consult the big game hunting regulation pamphlet. In fact, it is strongly recommended each hunter have a pamphlet on his person so he may refer to it throughout the season. It contains a map outlining the various deer seasons in addition to all the general deer season regulations which may change from year to year.

The following are a few of the regulations you will come in contact with:

1. Until the time it is registered, each deer that is transported by a motor-driven vehicle must be carried openly exposed to view and in such a manner that any occupants of the vehicle may not handle the deer tag attached to the deer.

2. Each holder of a hunting license may transport by automobile or common carrier his legal

deer during the open season for deer and three days thereafter, but must accompany it to the point of destination.

3. Any person having lawfully killed a deer may have it in possession and consume the meat in his own family at any time.

4. Each person who has killed a deer or bear during the gun season shall not remove such animal beyond the limits of the area included within the open season in which it was killed without exhibiting such deer or such bear to an authorized registration station not later than 5 p. m. of the first day following the close of the season.

Hunters bagging local ducks this fall may find leg bands on birds as one result of an unusual nighttime activity by conservation department biologists.

Researchers invaded nesting

marshes with spotlights and dip nets last spring to capture flightless young ducks. The lights blinded the birds long enough so they could be netted. After banding, the ducks were released.

Numbered aluminum bands have been in use for many years in waterfowl research. Most duck banding has taken place on the Canadian prairie breeding grounds, but Wisconsin game managers need data on local ducks to properly manage the population.

Sportsmen who take banded ducks are asked to return the bands to the address stamped on them, together with the date and place where shot. This data, together with similar facts gathered at the time the bird was banded, gives biologists information on migration patterns, mortality rates, and waterfowl life history.

Hunters may also find leg bands on pheasants or geese, and ear

tags on black bear. These, too, should be returned. Information will be given the hunter on where and when the bird or animal was marked.

Two white deer have been reported in the vicinity of Cedar Creek and the Jackson swamp area. These animals are protected at all times, and bow and arrow hunters should not be hunting them.
