The deer kill in this territory exceeded all expectations. Many checking stations had to turn hunters away because they had run out of tags by Monday. others had only a few left. This delayed registrations and many late ones were still expected to boost the totals. No one expected the hunting pressure or the kill to be as heavy as it was. > It was reported that a number of other boys had escaped from the school since Sunday, some of whom were picked up in Campbellsoprt Sunday night.


