Heavy Deer Kill In Area During 3-Day Slaughter

1,200 SHOT IN FOND DU LAC COUNTY, 235 IN WASHINGTON; MAUTHE LAKE REGISTERS 305

In the neighborhood of close to 2,000 deer were killed in the surrounding area during the three-day deer shot season Saturday, Sunday and Monday as the population of bucks, does and fawns was tremendously reduced in a hunting slaughter.

Fond du Lac county had registered just under 1,200 deer killed in that county up to Tuesday afternoon with more expected to come in. Washington county had registered 235 up to Wednesday afternoon with a few more expected. Registration at the Mauthe lake checking point reached 305 by Tuesday morning with more coming in. Dodge county registered 300 deer already on the opening day with two more to go. These totals do not include Sheboygan county, which borders this area on the east and north, where a 9-day buck season will continue through this coming Sunday. No report was immediately available from Sheboygan county but many deer were shot on this end of the county in the town of Scott and Beechwood area.

The deer kill in this territory exceeded all expectations. Many checking stations had to turn hunters away because they had run out of tags by Monday, others had only a few left. This delayed registrations and many late ones were still expected to boost the totals. No one expected the hunting pressure or the kill to be as heavy as it was. Although most of the deer killed were does, yearlings and fawns, a few hunters brought trophy animals home. The deer ranged from the size of medium size dogs up to a 200 pound, 17 point buck. The deer should be well fed, fat and tasty with all of the standing corn this wet year. Many more deer would have been killed except for the warm weather, lack of snow for tracking and much water in the swamps that kept hunters from getting to the deer, especially the big bucks.

Wisconsin Conservation Department headquarters representatives at Mauthe lake summed up the kill aptly: "More deer, more hunters." They compared the current kill with that of two years ago when Fond du Lac county had a three-day, either sex season. Registration then was about 180 at their station compared to 305 to about 9 a. m. Tuesday. "Hunting pressure was very heavy," they said, "especially on opening day."

Very few hunters and hunting groups were unsuccessful. One group of 10 local hunters your reporter ran into said they had killed eight deer the first two days. A spokesman for another local party said their group of 18 hunters had bagged 12 deer the first two days. That was the trend among the many successful hunters.

Percentage-wise, according to the number of hunters, those who hunted in this area were much more successful than those who

Adult Recreation Program to Begin From Boys' Home, At School Dec. 1 Youth Escapes Picked Up Here

The Kewaskum Elementary school will again sponsor an adult recreation program beginning Dec. 1 and extending through March.

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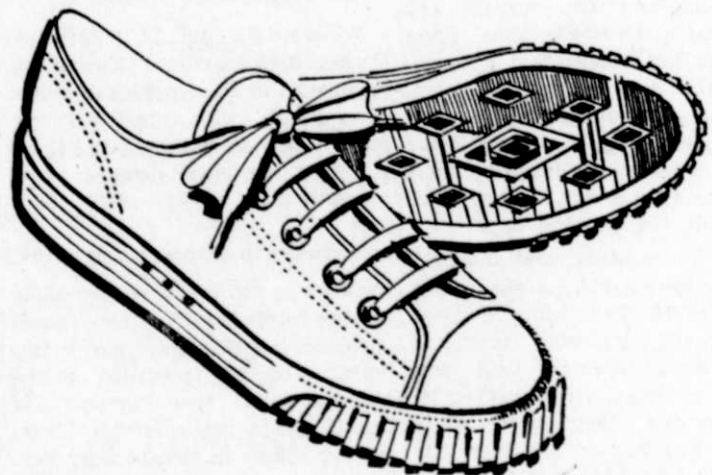
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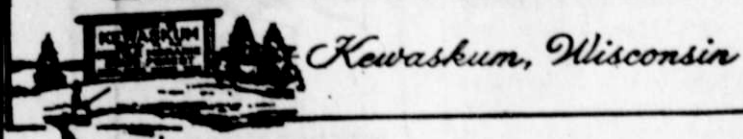

October 25, 1965

All members of the Board of Education of the Kewaskum Community High School, Jt. District No. 2, were present at the monthly meeting held Monday, October 25, 1965, in the high school library.

Minutes of the September 28, 1965, meeting were read. Leo Bingen moved to accept the minutes as read. Mrs. Zona Miske seconded. Carried.

After a discussion, Mrs. Zona Miske moved that it be resolved that the public buildings and property belonging to the Kewaskum Community High School, Jt. District No. 2, be insured in the State insurance Fund under Section 210.01 to 210.04, inclusive of the Wisconsin Statutes and amendments thereto. Mrs. Anne Panzer seconded. Carried.

Leo Bingen moved that the Board approve additional janitorial help at a regular hourly rate on a temporary basis. Mrs. Anne Panzer seconded. Carried.

Mention was made of the Washington County School Board Association meeting at the Silverbrook School in West Bend, at 7:00 p. m. on October 27, 1965.

1st Half Jitters Allow Plymouth To Trim Indians

The Kewaskum Indians opened the 1965-66 basketball season at Plymouth Friday night and were blasted, 73-50, as the Panthers of the Eastern Wisconsin conference enjoyed a very successful evening in a non-loop contest.

Kewaskum's rebounding, floor game and shooting fell apart completely in the first half and the Panthers roared to a 39-15 lead at intermission over the Indians, who were making their debut under new head coach Lindy DeNamur. The host school outscored the visitors, 19-8, in the first quarter and 20-7 in the second period.

Coach DeNamur must have injected some other kind of verbal "go-go gas" in his players between halves because the rock and roll was over and the Indians roared back amazingly to outscore Plymouth in the second half, 35-34. But it was too late and this inspired action was meaningless. Kewaskum outpointed the Panthers, 17-15, in the third quarter and held them evenly, 18-19, in the last stanza.

Jack Gebler, an all-conference

player for the Panthers last year, was the premier shot-maker with 25 points, while teammate Don Resimius was not far behind with 17. Junior Bill Backhaus led the Indians' charge with 16 points, followed by Ed Czaja with 12 and Dick Wietor with 10. Plymouth barely shaded Kewaskum from the free throw line, 19-18.

The losers lost both Wietor and Mike Miller on personals and had three other players with four fouls apiece. This weakened them considerably.

Kewaskum hopes to ride on the winning track next Tuesday, Nov. 30, when they host always strong Cedar Grove in their next non-conference game. Three nights later, on Friday, Dec. 3, they open Scenic Moraine conference action when they entertain Campbellsport. The Bells, who might be a contender this season, have six returning lettermen, topped by 6 ft. 1 in. senior Dave Weiland, an all-conference second team choice last year. Other lettermen include Rick Ketter, Don Miller, Marty Osypowski, John Pesch and

Al Zieliekie. Others moving up who have shown promise are Darwin Lohse, Tim Grahl, Dave Emmer, Bert Roate and Bob Twohig. Coach Diekvoss reports that he has the best and most promising group of 10 sophomores and a few freshmen coming up in his 11 years of coaching at Campbellsport and prospects look real good for the future.

HEAVY DEER KILL IN AREA, COUNTY

As of noon Monday, the last day of the deer season in Washington county, 188 animals had been registered at the four checking stations. At the same time the Mauthe lake station of the Wisconsin Conservation Department had registered 262. Dodge county registered in excess of 300 animals on opening day.

Ozaukee and Sheboygan counties have a buck season only and hunting will continue thru Sunday, Nov. 28. In the first two days of the season in Ozaukee county they registered six bucks. All hunters must wear red clothing in those counties until the 28th.

Major Hunting Season Over

With the end of the deer season this weekend, the major hunting season will be over. There are, however, hunting opportunities still available for those of you

who wish to do more hunting. The ruffed grouse season is open through Dec. 19 south of Highway 64.

The squirrel season is open in the entire state through Jan. 31, 1966.

The rabbit season is open in the entire state through Jan. 31, 1966.

The raccoon season in the state is open through Dec. 31, 1965.

For you bow and arrow hunters, all counties are open for bow and arrow deer hunting from Dec. 4 through 31.

One word of caution, if you participate in the late hunting—each year a considerable number of hunters find themselves in difficulty because of shooting illegal game. Pheasants, especially, seem to be a great temptation. When these birds have been smart enough or lucky enough to have made it through the season, they should be saved for the very important breeding season in the spring. The public and the courts frown on the illegal hunting and fines in most instances run very high. Thank you and good luck.
