## High School Will Hold Special District Meeting Dec. 6 to Vote Again on Addition

### ELECTORS HAVE CHANCE TO DISCUSS PROPOSALS AND OFFER SUGGESTIONS

There will be a special district meeting on Monday, Dec. 6, at 8 p. m. of the Kewaskum Community High School District No. 2 in the gymnasium room of the school for the purpose of obtaining authorization from the electors of the district to borrow \$646,500.00 to build an addition to the high school, to improve certain areas of the existing building and to equip the addition.

The school district has already held two referendum elections on the addition and both times the proposal was voted down. The board of education is now calling for a special meeting rather than a referendum for several reasons:

The special meeting for an addition to the high school coming up Monday has created much interest in the village the past week. Cars have been seen with large signs on the tops expressing the owners' opinions on how to vote. A petition has reportedly been circulated in the village. News items and an editorial have been printed in the high school Newsletter expressing their point of view. Much discussion has been going on in public gathering places. This should result in a large attendance at the meeting.

handle three or four times the number of people who have voted on previous referendums; 2. The meeting will give the electors a chance to discuss the question previous to voting; 3. The type of borrowing involved could be refinanced should the district become an integrated unit; 4. A meeting is far less expensive than a bond issue referendum.

The main proposal of the high school board of education is to increase the teaching stations (classrooms of all types) from 22 to 36. It is felt by the board that this solution to the problems of the high school is the most economical to the community and will fit in with long range plans for the district.

At the meeting the electors of the district will have the opportunity to discuss school board proposals and to offer suggestions. All electors are urged to attend so that some progress toward solving the educational problems of the community can be attained.

The December issue of the monthly high school Newsletter mailed out to all electors in the school district circulated on Thursday morning of this week, included a sketch of the present building and proposed addition with layout of rooms as well as as building data and budget figures on the new structure.

## J. O. Reigle to Head Carley Fund Raising Dinner

\$50 A PLATE EVENT AT PFISTER HOTEL JAN. 30

A fund-raising dinner committee for David Carley, announced Democratic candidate for governor, was filed with the Wisconsin Secretary of State's office Tuesday.

J. O. Reigle, founder and chairman of the board of Regal Ware, Inc., the Kewaskum based manufacturer of cookware and electrical appliances, will be chairman of a \$50 a plate campaign dinner for Carley. The fund-raising dinner will be held in the grand ballroom of the Pfister hotel, Milwaukee, on Sunday, Jan. 30.

Reigle served as president of Regal Ware, Inc. from August, 1945, when he founded the company, to Sept. 15, 1965, when he retired, but continues to serve as chairman of the board of directors of the company. James D. Reigle is the new president.

The treasurer of the Carley dinner is Robert Levine of Madison, chairman of the Governor's Committee on Human Rights and widely known owner and consultant of college dormitory planning and construction. Levine is also vice-chairman of the Wisconsin Civil Liberties Union.

Mrs. Esther Kaplan of Madison is secretary of the committee. Mrs. Kaplan was personal secretary to Gov. Gaylord Nelson during his two terms in office. She also served as secretary-treasurer of all of Nelson's political campaigns.

The dinner committee said that state-wide district and county dinner chairmen and committee members will be announced shortly.

Carley, Democratic national committeeman, announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for governor three weeks ago. He served for four years as director of the Wisconsin Department of Resource Development under Governor Nelson.

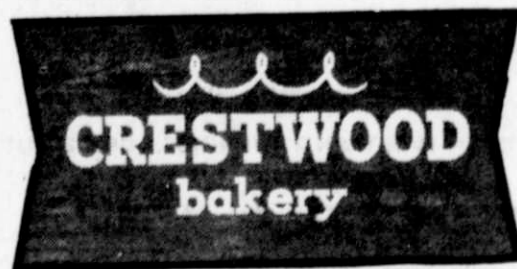

### FINAL COUNTY DEER TALLY SHOWS 238 ANIMALS KILLED

The final tally for the 1965 deer season shows the following figures: 238 animals registered at the four check stations in the county. 201 were killed in Washington county, 20 in Dodge, 15 in Fond du Lac and 2 in Waukesha. There were 99 doe deer, 87 bucks, 27 buck fawn and 25 doe fawn.

The car kill on Washington county highways to date is 63 and there will be more before New Year's Eve. This is the number picked up, we do not count those injured that run into the marsh to die at a later date, or those picked up illegally by passing motorists. Three were killed by squirrel hunters and left in the woods to rot, one by a dog and another by a hay mower.

The late bow and arrow season for deer state-wide is Dec. 4 to Dec. 31 inclusive.
