High School Addition Approved By Electors at Special Meeting

Favor \$646,500
Bond Issue by
Vote of 198-163

WILL PROVIDE FACILITIES FOR 800 STUDENTS, MEET TEN YEAR SCHOOL NEEDS

At a special district meeting Monday evening electors of the Kewaskum Community High School District Joint No. 2 approved the board of education's recommendation that \$646,500.00 be borrowed for the purpose of erecting and equipping an addition to the high school and improving the present building.

Three plans were presented to the electors by the board of education. Approved was the board's preferred plan, expected to be adequate to take care of the school needs for the next 10 years. The vote was 198 "yes" and 163 "no," a margin of 35 votes, by the good turnout of 361 electors present. Two previous referendums on the same issue were defeated last February and last July.

The building project will increase the number of teaching stations (classrooms of all types) from 22 to 36. Several areas such as art, foreign language and reading will be provided with proper facilities for modern instructional techniques. It will almost double present library facilities and relocate and improve many other school facilities. The addition is expected to provide for increased enrollment up to 800 students. The present enrollment is 527.

Two other proposals were also presented to the electorate. One provided for a \$350,000 building program to take care of immediate school needs and another for \$466,000 which would offer facilities for the school needs for approximately five years.

The present program would not require a referendum unless specifically requested through petition. Such a petition must be presented within 15 days of publication of the notice of intent to build, which publication is scheduled in the Statesman next Friday, Dec. 17. It was stated that 500 signatures would be required on a petition for a referendum. Requests for bids on the loan will be requested and advertised immediately.

It was pointed out at the meeting that the present method of undertaking the building program under state statutes permits a more favorable interest rate. Delaying the construction has cost the district tax dollars in rising building costs.

The high school district consists of the village of Kewaskum, towns of Kewaskum, Barton, Farmington and Wayne in Washington county; Ashford and Auburn townships in Fond du Lac county and Mitchell and Scott townships in Sheboygan county.

Indians Win Easily Over Bells, 79-62

IMPRESSIVE IN SCENIC OPENER; N. FONDY NEXT

Scenic Moraine conference play opened with a bang for host Kewaskum Friday night with the Indians piling up an impressive 79-62 victory over neighboring Campbellsport.

In smashing the Bells the Indians, under their new coach Lindley DeNamur, established themselves as a contender. Kewaskum took command from the start and the score was never close. The Indians swamped rebuilding Campbellsport, which has good size, with a 45-point first half and then coasted in behind the scoring of Ed Czaja, who also played a fine floor game and Dick Wietor, along with the rebounding of Bob Coulter.

Czaja, showing much improvement, scored 22 points to pace both teams. Coulter dominated the boards and hit 17 points, closely followed by Wietor with 16. Dave Weiland, Bell ace who scored 32 points against Rosendale the week before, was held to 18 by the Indian defense, although he still tied for top honors on his team with Johnson, who also netted 18. Weiland, a senior was an all conference second team choice last year.

Kewaskum iced the win in the opening quarter by building up a big 24-15 lead. The Indians also outpointed the Bells in every other period but by smaller margins. By the intermission the Indians were ahead by 12 points, 45-33. They outscored their opponents by two points, 16-14, in the third stanza and by three points in the final quarter, 18-15, to increase their final margin of victory to 17 points. Both coaches substituted freely in the final period after the outcome was decided. The Bells lost both Weiland and Miller on personals.

In other openers Friday, North Fondy snowed under Slinger, 88-65, defending champion Grafton won a low scoring game from host Pewaukee, 56-38, and Germantown turned back invading Random Lake by a one-sided 83-60 count.

Tonight (Friday) the Indians entertain North Fondy, which looked very impressive in clobbering Slinger by 25 points last week.
