At a special district meeting Monday evening electors of the Kewaskum Community High School District Joint No. 2 approved the board of education's recommendation that \$646,500.00 be borrowed for the purpose of structed this fall is just being crete floor below. erecting and equipping an addition to the high school and improving the present building.

Three plans were presented to the electors by the board of education. Approved was the board's preferred plan, expected to be adequqate to take care of the school needs for the next 10 years. The vote was 198 "yes" and 163 "no," a margin of 35 votes, by the good turnout of 361 electors present. Two previous referen dums on the same issue were defeated last February and last July. It was stated that 500 signatures would be require on a petition for a referendum. Requests for bids on the loan will be requested and advertised immediately.

Our building committee, our school board and our capable Superintendent, Mr. Marshall Boyd, have worked many long hours, scught the advice of many other schools, architects and builders and have produced the best workable solution for our growing school population in our ever growing community.

Let us thank our God we have such unselfish, wise men to lead us forward in education to Kewaskum.




Safety Tips for Ice Fishermen
