Village Board Holds Tax Rate At \$33 Per Thousand for Year

RATE SAME AS LAST YEAR; FIRST OF SPLIT PAYMENTS DUE NO LATER THAN FEB. 28

Regular Meeting
December 6, 1965

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Tessar presiding and all Board members present except Trustees Hirsig and Freehauf.

The Board convened at 7:30 p. m. to conduct the public hearing upon the proposed 1966 budget. There were no public appearances at the meeting and no questions to the budget were presented. Thereupon the budget hearing was declared closed.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Kral, seconded by Trustee Merwin and duly carried.

The 1966 budget, as previously published, was approved without any changes and the following resolutions were passed.

RESOLUTION NO. 65-4

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, that there be and hereby are levied the following taxes for the year ending December 31, 1965, upon all real and personal property according to the assessment roll of the current year:

STATE TAXES — \$2,887.40, at the rate of \$0.30768 per thousand.
COUNTY TAXES — \$52,848.64, at the rate of \$5.63148 per thousand.

SCHOOL TAXES — \$210,726.94, at the rate of \$22.45477 per thousand.

STATE LOAN TO SCHOOL DIST. NO. 2 — \$5,479.14, at the rate of \$0.58385 per thousand.

VOCATIONAL SCHOOL TAX — \$574.17, at the rate of \$0.06118 per thousand.

VILLAGE TAXES, INCLUDING DEBT RETIREMENT AND INTEREST — \$37,172.38, at the rate of \$3.96104 per thousand.

TOTAL TAX LEVY — \$309,688.67, at the rate of \$33.00 per thousand.

New Post Office Here Confirmed By Postal Chief

Plans to acquire a new post office in Kewaskum were confirmed this week by Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien.

"The new building," Mr. O'Brien said, "is designed to carry out the Post Office Department's objective of a more efficient postal service combined with improved working conditions for our employees."

"President Johnson has asked us to exercise frugality in conducting our governmental operations, and we are doing so. New construction, therefore, is being authorized only when it is demonstrated that the need is urgent and no other alternative is available."

The alternatives, Mr. O'Brien explained, would involve remodeling of the existing building or moving into other suitable quarters in the same community.

The building in Kewaskum will be located at 341-347 Main st. Preliminary plans call for 3,081 square feet of floor space, with an area of 4,500 square feet for parking and movement of postal vehicles.

The Postmaster General said the building will be constructed under the department's lease construction program, with the government's capital investment limited to postal equipment. While leased to the government, the building will remain under private ownership and the owner will pay local real estate taxes.

Plans and specifications for the new building, as well as bidding forms and other pertinent data, will be made available to prospective bidders at an early date, at which time the department will advertise for bids.

The site option will be assigned to the successful bidder, who will purchase the land, construct the building and lease it to the department.

Elementary School
Principals Meet

MATTERS DISCUSSED AT
WAYNE SCHOOL SESSION

The Dec. 8 meeting of the Kewaskum Elementary Principals' association was called to order at 1:00 p. m. at the Wayne Elementary school with all members present, reports Chairman Richard E. Zarling, Kewaskum Elementary school supervising principal.

The Nov. 10 minutes were approved as printed.

Discussion concerning the following took place:

1. The special meeting of the high school district and approval of its building program, as well as the possibility of operating either a junior high or middle school five years or so from now and the effect this would have on present elementary building use and space requirements.

2. Allen Tassar was nominated as the area's elementary representative to the joint Waukesha-Washington County School committee being formed by the Co-operative Service Agency.

3. More discussion of the Elementary & Secondary School Act, the kinds of projects possible, whether separate or joint projects would be better and related problems were considered. It would seem a joint project might be the best use of available funds if permissible. More literature was distributed to aid in future decisions.

4. The Social Studies Scope and Sequence tentatively adopted by the Kewaskum Elementary school board was distributed and discussed. Principals will contact publishers and get samples for review and possible adoption.

5. The Kewaskum Elementary school's required reading list was distributed and discussed. This is coordinated with the recommended literature portion of the language arts curriculum from the Department of Public Instruction.

6. Special education pupils will

continue to be accepted from the outlying districts as long as the boards involved are willing to pay the necessary costs involved.

7. The cooperative math in-service course will end this month, costs will be prorated and bills sent to the boards on the basis of participation. This program should be repeated next year for those unable to attend this class.

8. Budgeting for additional services from the CESA No. 16 such as psychological help, etc. was discussed. Individual boards should try to make greater use of possible services for next year. Determine how much you will spend and contact agency to find

out what can be purchased prior to budget time.

9. The Jan. 12 meeting will be held at the Kewaskum Elementary school.

10. The meeting adjourned and principals toured the building and grounds.

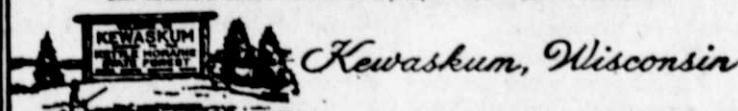

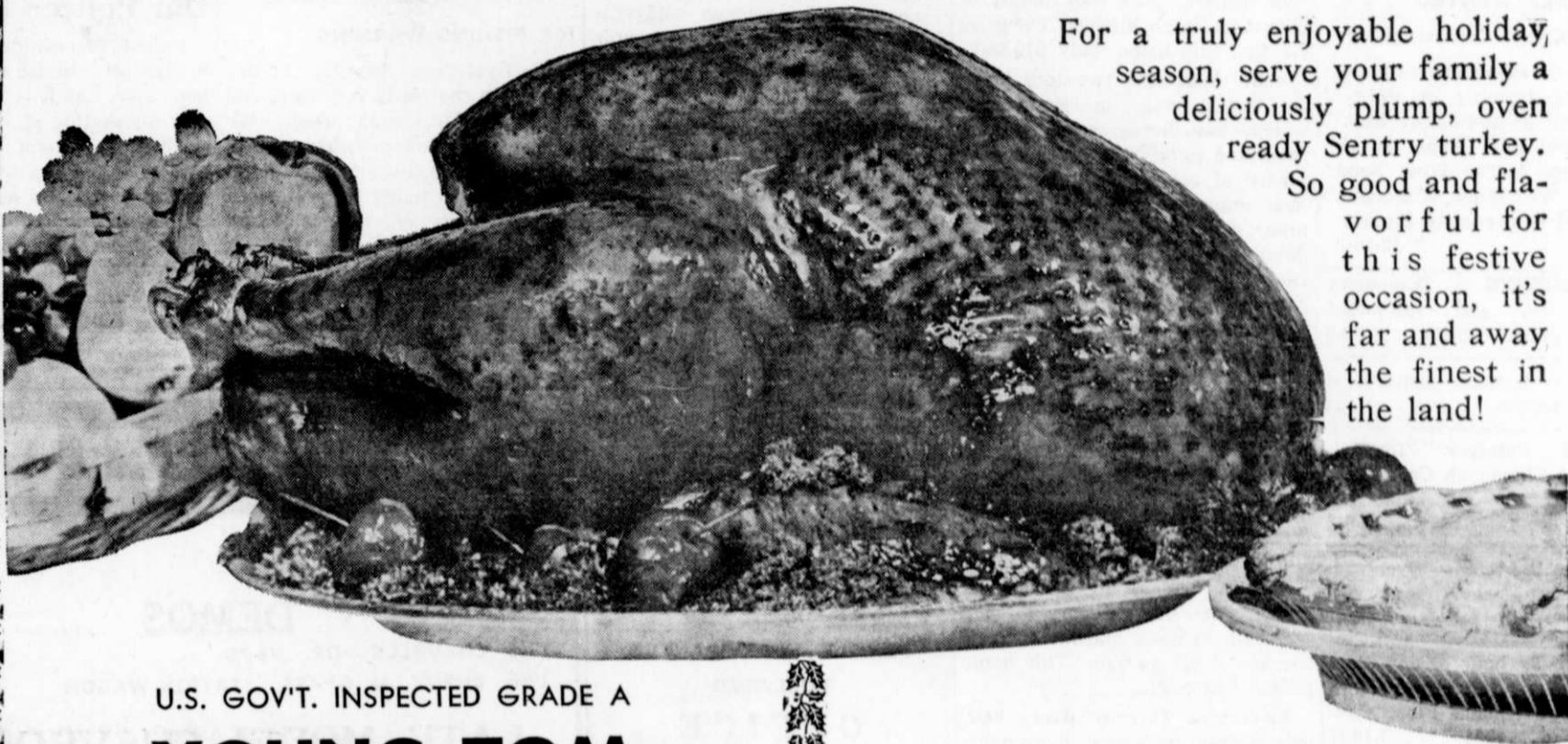

UNBEATEN TEAM RETAINS LEAD TIE WITH GRAFTON

The Kewaskum Indians remained undefeated, extended their winning streak to four in a row, and retained a first place tie with Grafton by romping over Pewaukee here Friday night, 72-56, in the Scenic Moraine conference race.

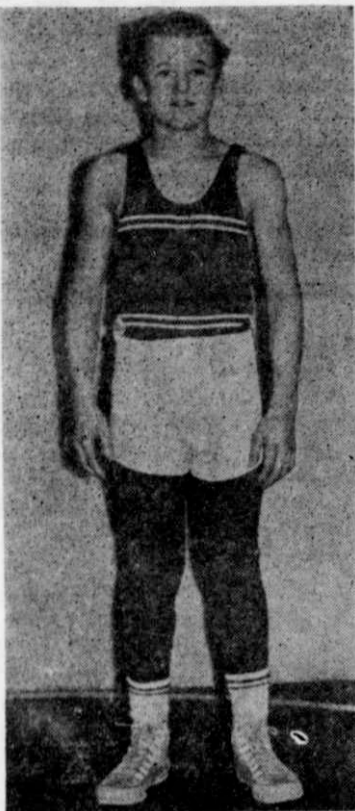
