Sister-in-Law of Local Man Slain In California

MURDERED WOMAN'S THREE CHILDREN FLOWN HERE TO LIVE WITH KEN NELDNERS

Several suspects underwent lie tests at Huntington Park, Calif. on Christmas Day, police said, in the brutal slaying of Mrs. Clara Neldner, 31, formerly of Milwaukee. The slain woman was the sister-in-law of Kenneth Neldner of Kewaskum.

However, Lt. C. H. McCasland of the Huntington Park detective bureau, said that no charges have been made in the case.

Mrs. Neldner, a bar manager in nearby South Gate, Calif., was found unconscious on the lawn in front of her home at Huntington Park last Tuesday morning by her eldest son, Donald Mitchell, 14, police said.

McCasland said the victim's head had been crushed by a blunt instrument and that she "possibly had been raped." Her lower clothing had been torn away. She died some 14 hours later in Los Angeles county hospital without regaining consciousness.

The victim had two other children, Cindy Mitchell, 12, and Robert Neldner, Jr., 5, police said. Cindy and Donald were her children by her first marriage, said McCasland.

Mrs. Neldner was estranged from her second husband, Robert, 33, an inmate of the Wisconsin state prison at Waupun, according to the victim's brother-in-law, Kenneth Neldner, 29, of Kewaskum.

Kenneth Neldner said his sister-in-law and her three children moved to California from Milwaukee last April.

Waukesha county (Wis.) sheriff's authorities said Robert Neldner was placed on three years' probation in county court there on a larceny charge in June, 1964. He was subsequently arrested for violating that probation and sentenced to three years at Waupun last April, sheriff's officials said.

Kenneth Neldner informed the Statesman that the slain woman's three children were to be flown from California to Milwaukee on Thursday night of this week, where he was to call for them at Billy Mitchell field and bring them to Kewaskum. The children will make their home with Mr. and Mrs. Neldner here for the present time.

Ernie Mitchell Wins Award for Coaching Record

MADE HONORARY MEMBER OF CENTURY CLUB FOR 100 OR MORE WINS IN TWO SPORTS

Coach Ernie Mitchell of Kewaskum Community High school was named an award winner recently by the Sports Trail Century Club, an organization sponsored by the Bike division of the Kendall Company, to foster community recognition of the contributions made by dedicated athletic coaches throughout the United States.

Coach Mitchell was made an honorary member of the Century Club for his record of 120 victories in football and 253 in basketball.

The club is an honorary group open to all college and high school coaches whose teams have won 100 or more contests in any sport. It was originated some 20 years ago by high school coach William Matthei of Milwaukee, who asked that Sports Trail honor outstanding coaches "because their efforts result in good citizens."

"Successful coaching of athletic teams develops in young men a strong competitive spirit, an abiding appreciation of fair play and a sense of responsibility," said R. H. Neilson, director of the club and a Bike executive. "The characteristics that make a winning team are the same ones that build better citizenship."

Neilson pointed out that, although a few coaches receive widespread recognition and praise, many others, like the current award winner, deserve to be honored by their communities for their dedication and achievements.

Dan Reindl on UW Weekly Broadcasts

Dan Reindl, R. 2, Kewaskum, is among the 113 University of Wisconsin students who go "on the air" every week on the university's Madison campus.

Broadcasting from dormitory basement studios, the broadcasters reach 4,100 fellow students in the Lakeshore Halls area of UW Residence Halls. The station, WLHA, sends its signal through telephone wires, and dormitory power lines act as broadcast antennas. The station's broadcasts can be heard over an ordinary radio, but only while inside or very close to one of the dormitories. The station is financed by the student Lakeshore Halls association.

Each of the more than 60 WLHA announcers averages one two-hour show weekly. With some 25 studio engineers and a score of technical engineers and executives, the entirely student-run station fills a broadcast week that averages 110 hours. The students volunteer their time and, with the exception of a few who are planning careers in broadcasting, their work is largely a campus hobby.

Big Herd of 25-30 Deer Seen Near Village Limits

Donald Seil stopped in at the Statesman office this week to report that he spotted a large herd of between 25 and 30 deer at the edge of the L. Rosenheimer woods at the west village limits at noon on Christmas Day while he was backing his car out of the driveway. The Seil home is located on the west side of the village in view of the woods. Seil said he stopped and counted the deer, counting 25 or 26 and then seeing a couple more white tails moving about farther into the woods.

This is the largest number of deer ever reported seen in one group in this area. What makes it all the more unbelievable is the fact that they approached so close to the village and the woods is only a small one. Several other residents of the vicinity also reported seeing smaller herds of deer in the same area, apparently split up from the main herd. Evidently there are plenty of deer left in the area following the recent hunting season.

Telephone Bills Will Be Reduced Beginning Jan. 1

Telephone bills will be reduced beginning Jan. 1, 1966, M. J. Hoeksema Madison, commercial director for General Telephone Company of Wisconsin, reminded telephone customers this week.

The federal excise tax on telephone service will be lowered from 10 per cent to 3 per cent as a result of legislation signed into law last June by President Johnson.

After the initial 7 per cent reduction, an additional 1 per cent will be trimmed from the tax each Jan. 1, so by 1969, the entire tax will have been eliminated.

"We are pleased that this saving will be passed on to our customers," said Hoeksema, pointing out that no excise tax revenues have ever gone to the telephone company.

"The tax was put into effect as a 'temporary' measure during World War II," Hoeksema said, "and since then the telephone company has merely collected the money for the government."

It is estimated that the tax reduction will save General Telephone Company customers in Wisconsin in excess of \$1.5 million in 1966.

Hoeksema reminded customers that the reduction applies to both local and long distance service.

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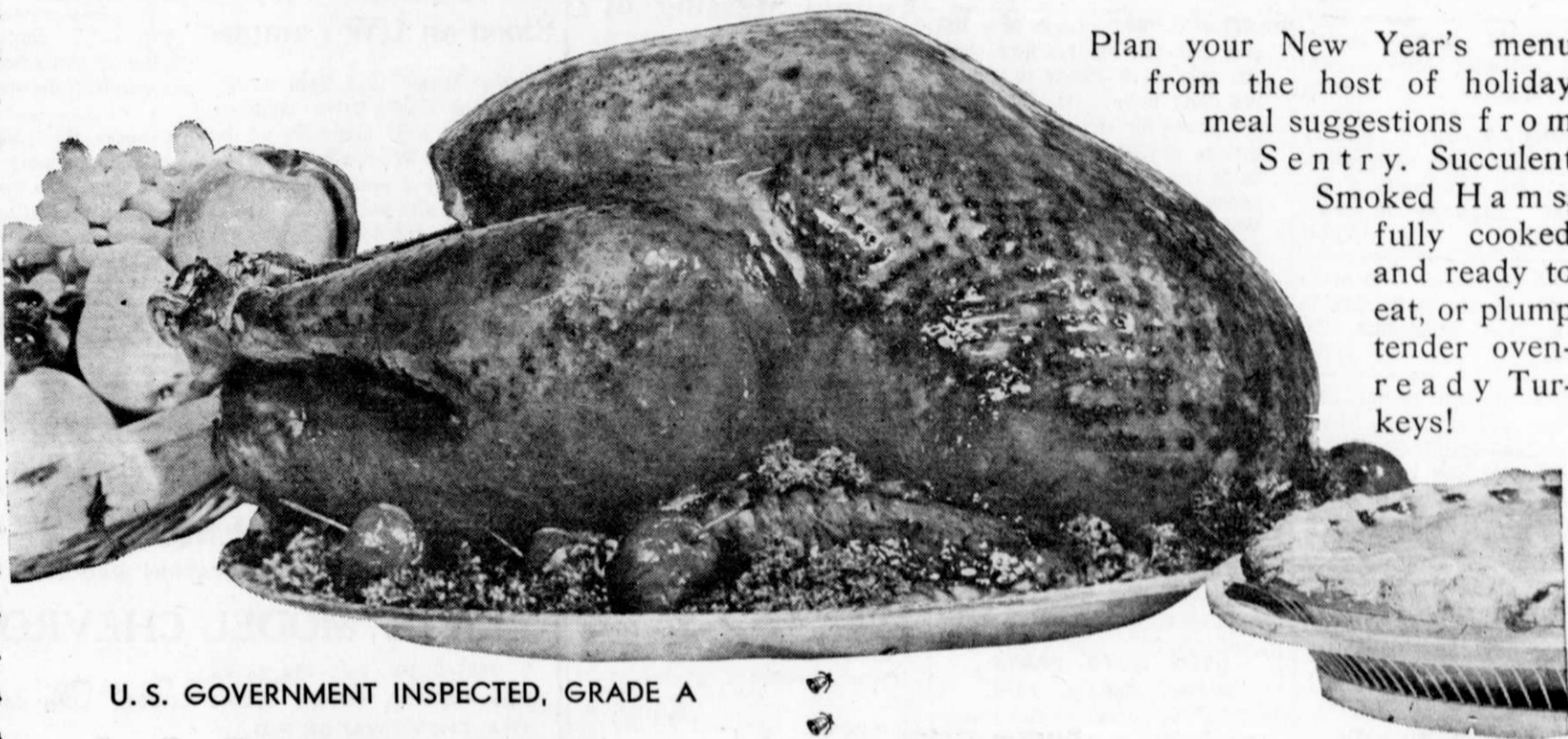

Bob Miller Donates Blood on UW Campus

Robert Miller, 215 Main st., Kewaskum, is among 2,033 students, faculty and staff members of the University of Wisconsin at Madison who gave a pint of blood during the fall all-campus blood donation on the university's Madison campus.

The gifts of life were collected by the Red Cross Blood Center in Madison for distribution to 87 hospitals in 37 southern Wisconsin counties, including all Madison and university hospitals, and to the nation's armed forces wherever needed.

By the large donation of 2,033 pints the university in Madison set a new blood donation record and continues to hold the blood donation championship of the state of Wisconsin.

Since 1950 when the blood donations were started on the university's Madison campus, two all-campus donations have been held each year—one in the late fall and one in the early spring—and over the past 15 years students, faculty and staff members of the university have donated more than 41,000 pints of blood to the hospitals and armed forces.

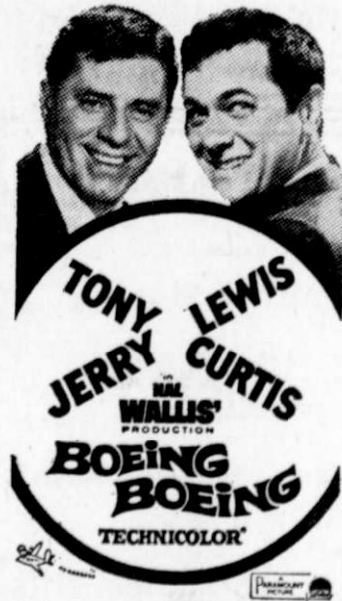

1966 FISHING LICENSES, REGULATIONS AVAILABLE

The 1966 resident and non-resident fishing license and the fishing regulations for the ensuing year are available at license depots in Washington county.

Ice fishermen are allowed to fish from 6:00 a. m. to 9:00 p. m. daily. Fishing is prohibited at the Allenton creek south of Highway 33, it is a trout stream; the same is true of Gilbert's lake, a fish refuge. Enclosed shelters may be used subject to the following restrictions: Door readily opened from the outside when occupied, legible name and address of owner or user on the outside, shanty must be removed from the ice south of Highway 64 on or before March 5. There is an aggregate daily bag limit of 50 fish for crappie, perch, bluegill and sunfish. There is no bag limit on white bass yellow (striped) bass, rock bass or bullhead in inland waters.
