Another Referendum Vote on High School Building Project Jan. 18

ELECTORS TO VOTE THIRD TIME ON ADDITION; POLLS OPEN FROM 7 A. M. TO 8 P. M.

Another special referendum on the borrowing of \$646,500 for construction of an addition and improvement of the Kewaskum Community High school serving Joint District No. 2 has been called for Tuesday, Jan. 18, in the high school gym. Voting hours will be from 7 a. m. to 8 p. m.

The referendum was called following circulation of a petition requesting same. The petition, bearing 570 signatures, some of which were reported to be invalid, was submitted, calling for the vote. The referendum will be the third one held on the building project.

The building project was defeated at two previous referendums held in February and July of last year but at a special meeting of the electors held in December the district went on record as favoring the project.

The January issue of the high school Newsletter points out that delay of the construction project has already cost the electorate of the district from \$50,000 to \$60,000 in rising costs of material, interest and labor plus additional rising costs of steel. Initially, when first placed before the electorate, the project would have cost \$633,000, the Newsletter points out.

The proposed additions, remodeling, improvements and equipment would provide facilities for 800 students and should take care of the needs of the district for 10 years under normal growth. The present school, with 530 students, is over-crowded with vocal and Spanish classes held in other buildings.

Fillmore GI, Local Graduate, Killed on Okinawa

Sp4 David W. Degnitz, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Degnitz of Fillmore, R. 1, Fredonia, was killed on New Year's Day, Jan. 1, in an auto accident on Okinawa, where he was stationed with the U. S. Army, when he was apparently struck by a civilian car.

A telegram to the parents on New Year's Day from the department of defense said that Degnitz died when he was struck by a civilian vehicle. Details of the mishap were not immediately available here.

Born in West Bend, Degnitz graduated from Kewaskum High school and attended Wisconsin State university at Whitewater for a year prior to enlisting in the U. S. Army on Nov. 7, 1963. He was also a graduate of the Army Information school in Fort Slocum, New York and was an "information specialist" in the education branch. He had been stationed on Okinawa since March, 1965.

In addition to his parents, he is survived by a brother, Arthur Degnitz, of West Bend and a sister Diane (Mrs. Robert Donath) of R. 6, West Bend; two nieces and five nephews, a sister-in-law and brother-in-law.

Funeral services and arrangements will be in charge of the Techtman-Myrhum Funeral home, West Bend. The arrangements are incomplete pending arrival of the body from Okinawa.

State Student Aid Grants Available, Schroeder Reveals

State Assemblyman Frederick C. Schroeder, (R-West Bend) this week sent to all high schools in the Washington county district a memorandum outlining the provisions of the new \$2-million grant-in-aid program for Wisconsin college students.

The grants, Schroeder said, will provide as much as \$500 a year for full-time students attending post high school educational institutions within Wisconsin.

The basis for the grants is the effective income of the eligible student or of his parents if they are providing a major share of the student's support, Schroeder told the high schools. Effective income is defined in the law as the net taxable income reported in the Wisconsin state income tax return for the previous year, minus \$600 for each dependent. The student grants range from \$50 per semester up to \$250 per semester for low income students and families.

Each full-time resident student registered as a freshman after Sept. 1, 1965 (sic) at an accredited, non-profit post high school educational institution in Wisconsin will be eligible for a grant Schroeder reported. Sophomores, juniors, seniors and graduate students will in turn become eligible each Sept. through 1969 as the program is implemented to cover the full span of education, Schroeder said.

Students must maintain a "C" average to become and remain eligible for the grants.

LADY YELLS FOR HELP, HURT WHEN AUTO LANDS IN DITCH

Virginia B. Gundrum, 47, of 638 Wolcott st., West Bend, suffered a back injury, bruises and shock in a freak auto accident in the village at 9:30 a. m. Wednesday.

The northbound driver reported to Chief of Police Roland Pledl that in passing a truck on Hwy. 45 about a half mile south of Kewaskum near the Len & Rog service station, she stepped on the gas and the accelerator stuck increasing her speed and she was unable to slow down the vehicle. The car raced on over the Kewaskum hill and into the village at a high rate of speed. The woman said she panicked, causing her to open the car window and yell for help while speeding through town on Fond du Lac ave. The auto sped on until it reached the north village limits where she lost control in front of the Mrs. Selma Backhaus home. The vehicle went into a ditch, traveled along an embankment a long distance, reentered the ditch and finally came to a halt against a steep embankment while clipping off a stop sign at an intersecting road on the right side, about 200 feet south of the junction with Hwy. 28.

John F. Stallman, 23, of R. 6, West Bend, suffered possible rib injuries at 1:30 p. m. New Year's Day when a truck he was about to pass turned left and his car skidded off the road and struck a pole and culvert on Hwy. 28 about 8½ miles west of Kewaskum.

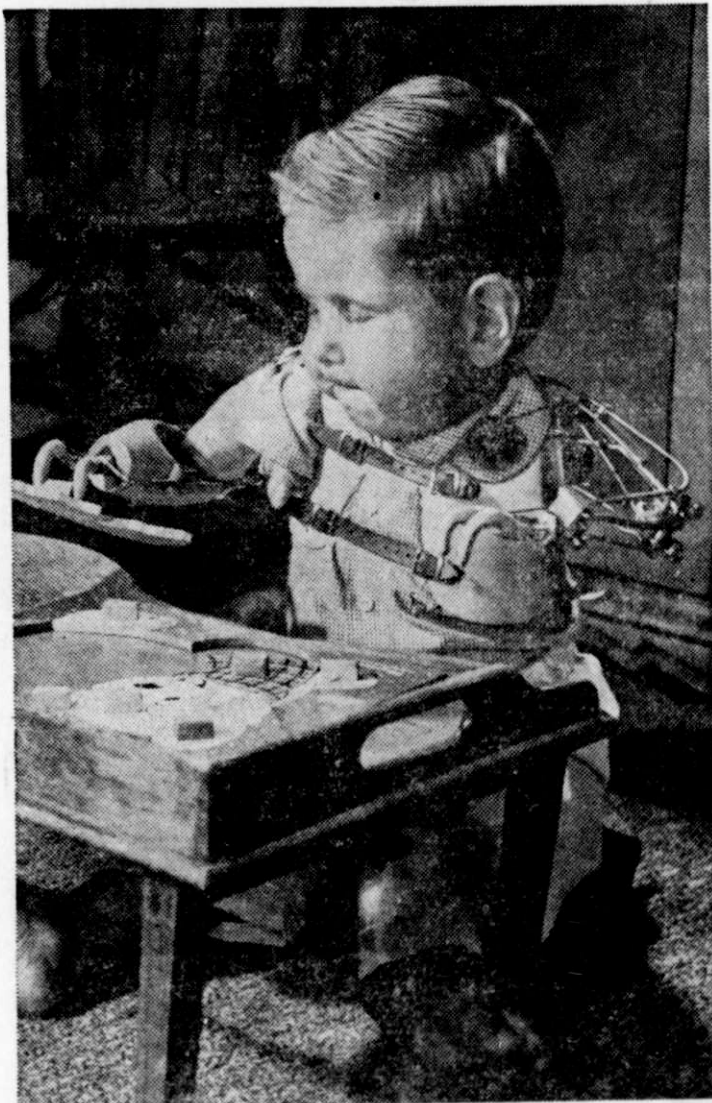

Lomira Jolts Indians, 76-59

GAME AT GRAFTON FRIDAY TO DECIDE FIRST PLACE

Returning to basketball action after the holiday layoff, Kewaskum, co-leader in the Scenic Moraine conference with Grafton, was jolted by Lomira there Tuesday night in a non-loop affair, 76-59. Lomira, second place holder in the Fox Valley Tri-County conference, has lost but one game, to Rosendale. The Indians have a perfect 4-0 record in their conference and an overall record of 5-2, suffering the other defeat at the hands of Plymouth.

The Indians fell apart in the last quarter and this, together with their ice cold free throw shooting, cost them the setback. Kewaskum led the Lions, 54-52, in the opening minutes of the final period but Lomira streaked to eight points and salted away the decision. The Indians trailed at the quarter, 18-15, and 38-29 at the intermission. But they bounced back to outscore the Lions, 19-14, in the third stanza. Then came the complete collapse as they were far outdistanced in the fatal last quarter, 24-11.

One of the strong points of the Indians all season has been their accurate free throw shooting but they were woefully weak at Lomira. They made good on only three free tosses for a new low, while the Lions sank 14. Lomira thus gained 11 points from the charity line.

Steve Sterr, the Lions' all-around athlete, led all scorers by hitting his season's peak with a 30-point performance. It was surprising that he was able to run wild against a strong defensive team like Kewaskum after being checked with less points by some of the weaker teams they played. No player was hot for Kewaskum and as a result the team's top scorers were held to their lowest totals of the season. Leading scorers were Bob Coulter, Larry Coulter and Ed Czaja with only 11 points apiece, while Bill Backhaus chipped in 10.

The Indians will have to play much better basketball if they hope to stand a chance in the big game at Grafton tonight (Friday). Kewaskum and Grafton are tied for first place with 4-0 records

ACTUAL COUNTY DEER KILL IS 238; 71 KILLED BY CARS

The actual count of deer killed in the three day 1965 season for Washington county was 238. This is about 90 animals less than the 1964 count. This year's kill in Waukesha county was down 63 animals over last year. There were four deer killed in the long bow and arrow season of 1965.

There were 71 deer killed by cars in the county this year. This compares with 100 a year ago.

Ice fishing is slow in the county as of Jan. 1. Many lakes are not safe to walk on let alone trying to drive on with a car.

Hazards of Ice Activity

Recently I discussed briefly the hazards of activity on ice, especially during the early winter when its condition is easily adversely effected by many factors.

I am sad to say several drownings in the state have been brought to my attention, most involving children. So again I would like to say, it would be well for you who have children who are asking to go skating or fishing on nearby frozen ditches and ponds to have them stay off until you yourself are certain of its condition. Ice to a child is an invitation to explore and most do not realize the hazards involved.

As most fishermen know, now

is the most productive time as far as ice fishing is concerned. Many of the bays and bayous are frozen over enough to permit walking out and it will be well worth your time if you are an ice fishing enthusiast to get out now.

In the event you are not aware of it, the Wolf, Fox and Embarrass rivers, as well as the other larger rivers of the state, have many such areas which are especially good at this time of the year for panfish and northern pike fishing. Good Luck!!

BRUCELLOSIS TEST RESULTS IN COUNTY

The 31st round of the brucellosis ring test report has been completed, and the results show a very marked improvement over the first round of tests which were conducted in 1961. The 1965 report covers tests conducted in July and October of last year, and shows that in Washington county, out of 1,035 herds tested, only two showed a positive test.

Remember that calves should be vaccinated for resistance to brucellosis at the age of from 4 to 6 months.

Parents or guardians submit reports for alien children under 14 years of age.

Klein urges all aliens to report before the end of January, as willful failure to do so may lead to serious penalties.
