## High School Building Project Approved at 3rd Referendum

### \$646,500 Addition Wins by 173 Votes; 911 Ballots Cast

A resolution authorizing the borrowing of \$646,500 for construction of an addition and improving and equipping the present high school was approved by electors of the Kewaskum Community high school district in a referendum vote held Tuesday.

The addition will provide facilities for 800 students and care for the needs of the school district for an estimated 10 year period. The present school facilities, which are overcrowded, serve 530 students.

Tuesday's referendum marked the third time the building project has been submitted to a referendum vote in the district. A total of 911 votes were cast in Tuesday's referendum, a much larger figure than those recorded in the two previous referendums, in which the electors rejected the building program. Tuesday's third referendum was called after the building project was approved at a district meeting held in December, but opponents of the plan circulated a petition requesting that the project be submitted to another referendum.

The vote at Tuesday's referendum, held in the high school gym-

nasium from 7 a. m. to 8 p. m., was 542 "yes" to 369 "no," a margin of 173 votes.

Kewaskum Community Union High School District Joint No. 2 serves students from portions of three counties including Kewaskum village, and the towns of Kewaskum, Barton, Farmington and Wayne in Washington county as well as Ashford and Auburn townships in Fond du Lac county and Mitchell and Scott townships in Sheboygan county.

The school building plans will raise the number of teaching stations in the school from the present 22 to 36, will almost double present library facilities and will relocate and improve many other school facilities. It will also provide new facilities including an art program and language and reading laboratories, which are not now available at the school.

Proponents of the building program pointed out in this latest referendum that delay in constructing the school addition has already cost district taxpayers approximately \$50,000 to \$60,000 in additional funds through rising building and material costs as well as higher interest rates on borrowing money.

Initially, when first placed before the electorate, the project cost was estimated at \$633,000. Increasing costs of building mater-

E. M. Romaine of Kewaskum, chairman of the board of supervisors of Washington county, is circulating a petition in Kewaskum and vicinity for the improvement of Hwy. 28, running east and west between Hwy. 41 and Kewaskum and Hwy. 144 east, through Kewaskum.

This is a connecting link between Hwy 41 on the west and Hwys. 57 and 141 on the east. Travel on this road has increased over the past years. It is a narrow road right-of-way with limited shoulders. Several serious accidents have occurred on this road in the past three years, resulting in at least three deaths.

The petition will be sent to the Highway Commission of the State of Wisconsin, Madison, Wis.

## Firemen Pay Village for New Truck

The village did the advertising for bids and paid the initial cost on the truck but was reimbursed in full by the fire department out of funds from their treasury obtained through profits made on picnics, fireworks and voluntary fire calls.

The new chassis is a 1966 International load star model 1600 purchased from Cooley & Sons, West Bend, to replace the old 1937 model International formerly used by the department as a chassis for its equipment truck. After its many years of service, the old truck could no longer be operated by the firemen to give efficient service. Its "get up and go had got up and went." The new chassis was delivered in October and driven to Hortonville where the comparatively new body from the former truck was installed on the new chassis by the Melray Co. The new chassis was put into service about the middle of November.

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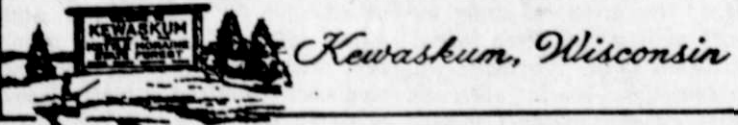
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## Local Members At Conference of Kiwanis District

A well-known Wisconsin jurist, Judge Milton L. Meister, West Bend, was elected Wednesday night (Jan. 12) to the position of Illustrious Potentate of Tripoli Temple of the Shrine in Milwaukee. He will head more than 9,000 members throughout Wisconsin during the ensuing year. Judge Meister is a director of the Bank of Kewaskum.

The new potentate is circuit judge of the 24th Judicial Circuit comprising Washington and Ozaukee counties. The group he will lead is the 17th largest Shrine Temple of the 168 in North America.

Judge Meister was formerly district attorney and then county judge of Washington county and is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin Law school. He has served as president of the State District Attorneys association, the State Board of County Judges, and the State Board of Criminal Court Judges.

Active in civic affairs, he is a member of the executive board of the Badger Council, Boy Scouts of America, serves on the Washington County Retarded Children's committee, was chairman of the Washington County Red Cross for two years, and has been both president and lieutenant goernor of Kiwanis.

He joined Tripoli Temple in 1937 and began his climb up the officers' ladder in 1959, after serving the Washington-Ozaukee Shrine club as president in 1955.

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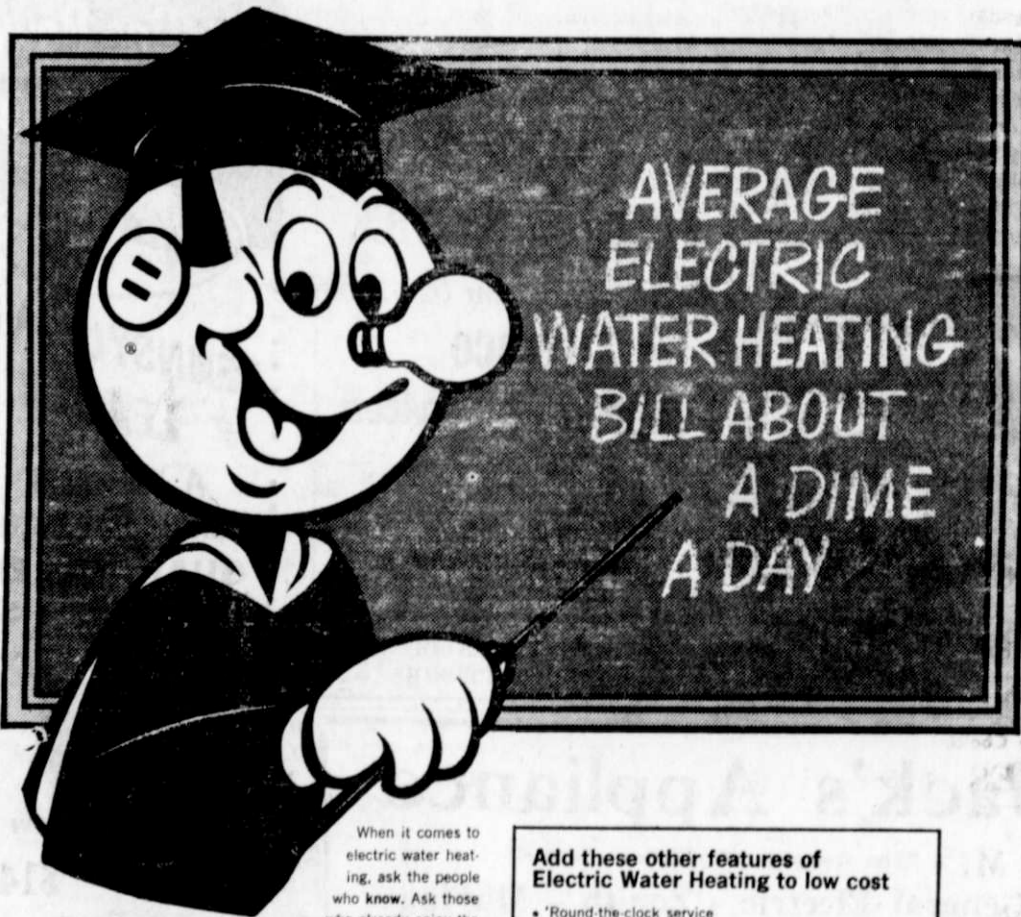

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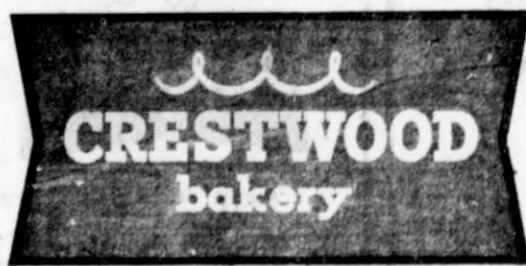

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# AFS Student From Brazil Woman's Club Speaker

AFS student Sergio is making Kewaskum his home for the 1965-66 school year. He is living with the Eugene La Marche family and attending the Kewaskum Community high school as a senior. A handsome, dark-haired young man with a winning smile, Sergio was more than happy to see snow arrive in Kewaskum. This was the

first time he has had the opportunity to see snow.

Eighteen year old Sergio, who has three brothers and one sister, graduated from the Goiania, Goias-Brazil high school and upon his return to his native country plans to enter medicine and become a doctor.

In Brazil, five years of elementary school are followed by seven years of high school. There are 3 000 students in Sergio's high school. Because of crowded conditions, there are three shifts. One thousand go in the morning, one thousand in the afternoon and the third thousand in the evening. In his school, the students do not move from classroom to classroom, the teachers change classrooms. If the students do not have average grades they must remain in the same grade for the next year.

Processing food and dairy products are Brazil's major industries.

Economic sources are agriculture, rice fields, corn, beans and bananas.

Having come from a much warmer climate, where the lowest temperature is 50 degrees, Sergio admits he did not particularly like the cold temperatures but doesn't mind the snow.

Sergio read about the AFS program in a Brazilian newspaper. He became interested in a scholarship to the United States. As one of 100 high school students who applied, Sergio completed the test with the highest score. We are glad to have Sergio spending the year in Kewaskum.

Sergio attended the club meeting with his American mother, Mrs. Eugene La Marche. There are four children in the La Marche family. John is a junior at Kewaskum High school and Connie a freshman. Jim is in the 8th grade at Holy Trinity grade school and Jeanne is in the third grade.

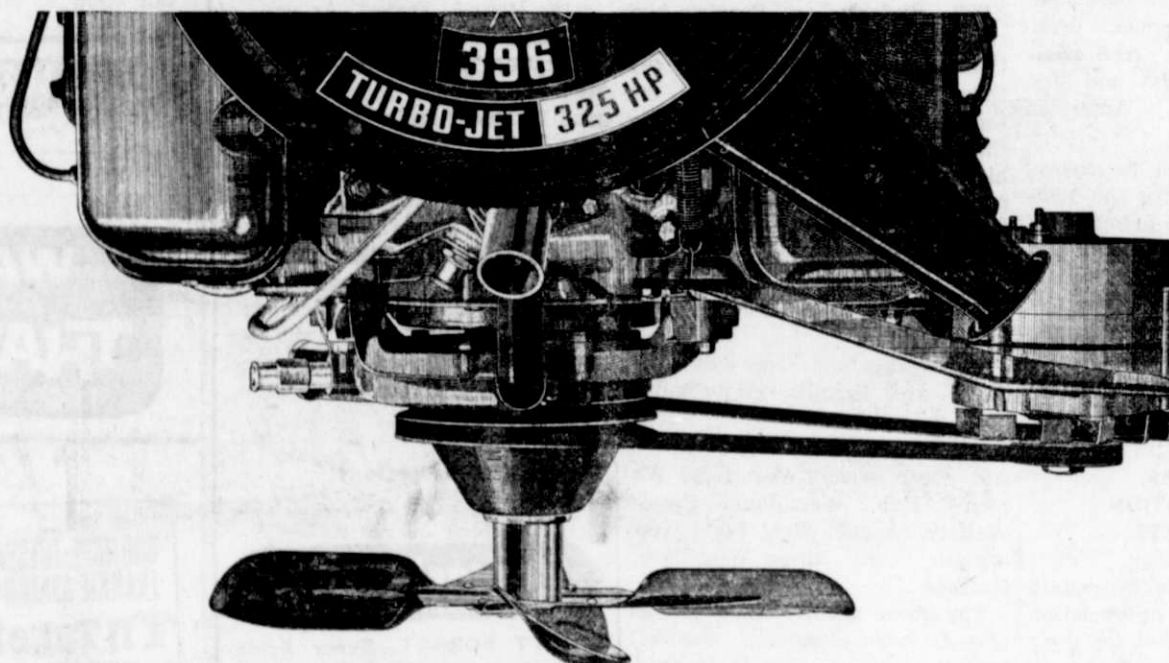
