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

Judge Meister To Head Tripoli

ELECTED POTENTATE OF MILWAUKEE SHRINE WITH MORE THAN 9,000 MEMBERS

A well-known Wisconsin jurist Judge Milton L. Meister, West Bend, was elected Wednesday 1937 and began his climb up the night (Jan. 12) to the position of officers' ladder in 1959, after Illustrious Potentate of Tripoli serving the Washington-Ozaukee Temple of the Shrine in Milwaukee. He will head more than 9,000 members throughout Wisconsin during the ensuing year. Judge Meister is a director of the Bank ington Chapter No. 98, R-A.M. of Kewaskum.

The new potentate is circuit judge of the 24th Judicial Circuit comprising Washington and Ozaukee counties. The group he will lead is the 17th largest Shrine Temple of the 168 in North Amer-

Judge Meister was formerly district attorney and then county judge of Washington county and is a graduate of the Uniersity of Wisconsin Law school. He has served as president of the State District Attorneys association, the State Board of County Judges, and the State Board of Criminal Court Judges.

Active in civic affairs, he is a member of the executive board of the Badger Council, Boy Scouts of America, serves on the Washington County Retarded Children's committee, was chairman of the Washington County Red Cross for two years, and has been both president and lieutenant goernor of Ki-
