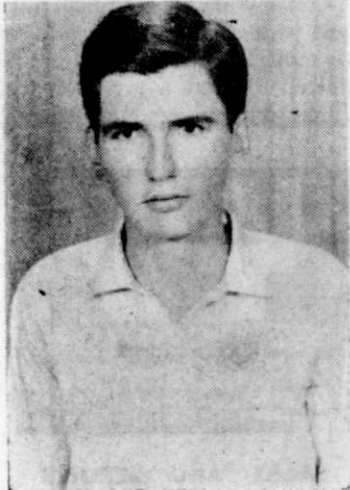

Gloria Benicke Is Year's Homemaker of Tomorrow at School

Gloria J. Benicke is this year's Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for Kewaskum High school. She scored highest here in a written knowledge and attitude examination taken Dec. 7. She is now eligible for state and national scholarship awards ranging from \$500 to \$5,000.

More than 570,000 senior girls in 14,714 of the nation's high schools were enrolled for the examination.

Test papers of all school winners in the state are being judged competitively. From them, the State Homemaker of Tomorrow will be named. She will receive a \$1,500 scholarship from General Mills, Inc., sponsor of the annual Betty Crocker search. In addition, her school will be awarded a set of the Encyclopaedia Britannica by Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc. The second-ranking girl will receive a \$500 educational grant.

Following her selection, the State Homemaker of Tomorrow together with a school advisor, will join winners and advisors from each of the 49 other states and the District of Columbia in an expense-paid educational tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington D. C. Climax of the trip will be the naming of the 1966 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Chosen from the state winners on the basis of her original test score, plus personal observation and interviews during the tour, she will receive a scholarship increased to \$5,000. Grants of second-, third- and fourth-ranking girls in the nation will be raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

All judging is conducted by Science Research Associates, Chicago. This educational testing and publishing firm also constructs and grades the written test.

Begun in the 1954-55 school year, the Betty Crocker search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow is designed to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career. This year's record enrollment pushes the 12-year total of participating girls near the 5 million mark. With the 1966 grants, total scholarship awards will exceed \$1.25 million.

Church Women Hold Missionary Tea Here Friday

COUNTY-WIDE EVENT IS HELD AT PEACE CHURCH

Braving one of the coldest days of winter, members of the United Church Women arrived from a county-wide area to attend the Winter Missionary Tea held Friday at Peace United Church of Christ in Kewaskum. The event, held annually for the benefit of migrant workers, had as its keynote speaker Rev. Wallace B. Smith of Hartford's Methodist church who substituted for Rev. William Benallack of Rhinelander who had previously been scheduled to address the UCW meeting.

Rev. Smith, picturing the plight of the migrant workers, called them "hidden and unknown" to the average privileged American. Legal citizens themselves, they do not have the advantages of accident, health or disability insurance. Usually they cannot qualify for welfare aid because they cannot meet residency requirements. The speaker emphasized that a migrant worker fits the official government description of poverty, "a daily struggle to secure the necessities for a meager existence." Praising the efforts of the United Church Women to help the migrants, Rev. Smith outlined a 5 point program for all citizens who wished to show their Christian concern. 1. See that migrants are guaranteed a fair wage. 2. Protect them from exploitation. 3. Grant them a good education. 4. Treat and cure their physical ailments. 5. Grant these people who have no lobby except that of public opinion, a decent place to live.

Mrs. Arvin Murre of Kewaskum presented the call to worship and scripture reading. Mrs. Jack Tessar, Kewaskum, new state UCW chairman of Migrant Work, and Mrs. Harold Ziegler, West Bend, county president, also spoke at the tea. Rev. Daniel Schowalter of Peace church offered the prayer and benediction. Loofboro's appointment was announced by Richard A. Klumb, 6th District Brotherhood Week chairman.

Dates set for 1966 observance of Brotherhood Week have been set by the National Conference of Christians and Jews for the week of Feb. 20 to 27. The 32nd annual observance of this week is aimed at: Giving people an opportunity to rededicate themselves as individuals to the basic ideals of respect for people and human rights which are essential to our way of life; dramatizing the practical things which people can do to promote an understanding and realization of these ideals; enlisting the support of a large number of people in year-round activities to build brotherhood.

Dr. Fred H. Harrington, president of the University of Wisconsin, Madison, is state Brotherhood Week chairman for 1966. Serving with him as state vice-chairman are: District Attorney John H. Chisholm of Superior, Attorney

Fred W. Genrich, Jr. of Wausau, Supreme Court Associate Justice Nathan Heffernan of Madison, Attorney V. J. Lucarelli of Kenosha, Attorney Maurice B. Patch of Madison, State Supt. of Schools Angus B. Rothwell, Madison, and prominent businessman Ben Safford of Fond du Lac.

Commenting on his appointment, Loofboro said:

"All weeks are equally in need of the practice of brotherhood. However, the week of Washington's birthday has been set aside as a time of resolution to sustain brotherhood throughout the year. This can and should be done without seeking a union of religious bodies, without modifying the distinctive beliefs of Protestants, Catholics and Jews, and without weakening the loyalties of those of any faith. It is our hope that the people of Washington county will make every effort to participate in this observance."

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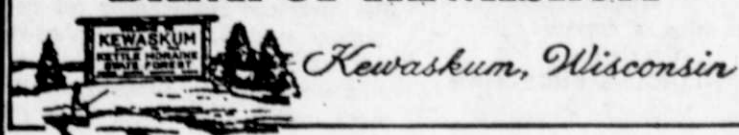

STURGEON SPEARING SEASON TO OPEN SATURDAY, FEB. 5

Sturgeon spearing season opens on Lake Winnebago and Little Lake Butte des Morts Saturday, Feb. 5, and runs to March 1, both dates inclusive.

The season on Lakes Butte des Morts, Poygan, Winneconne and connecting waters is closed this year.

The size limit remains at 40 inches and the bag limit is one per season.

The sturgeon spearing license is \$2.50 and is issued to persons 14 years of age or over. The tag with the corresponding number on the license must be immediately attached and locked to the tail of the sturgeon.

Fishing Regulations on Fox Lake

Liberalized; Lake to Be Treated

Something of interest to local fishermen. Fox lake will receive the type of treatment that Wal-lace lake experienced a few years ago. The lake will be lowered three feet over a period of time. The gates are now open.

Rough fish removal crews of the Wisconsin Conservation Department are operating fyke nets at the present time. Rough fish will be destroyed or sold and the game fish transferred to nearby waters.

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Liberalized fishing regulations are now in effect and will remain until the lake is chemically treated. The rules are listed below.

No bag limit.

No closed season.

No size limit.

No possession limit.

Ice fishing allowed from 6:00 a. m. to 9 p. m.

No limit on number of lines (maximum number of hooks per line 2).

Three foot dip nets, spears and minnow seines may be operated during daylight hours.

No set lines or other unspecified gear will be permitted.

All fish harvested must be removed from the ice on the day taken.

BOEGEL ON CARRIER OFF VIETNAMESE COAST

Mail Delayed by Severe Weather

Postmaster Harry E. Koch received the following message today from the regional director:

Unusually severe weather in the midwest and other parts of the country has slowed the movement of railroads and airlines into and out of the four states served by the Minneapolis postal region. It is comprised of the states of Minnesota, Wisconsin, North Dakota and South Dakota.

Adrian P. Winkel, regional director, explained the current 12-day cold wave in the midwest has been a major problem to the airlines and railroads which transport mail. It was brought to a head this past weekend when frigid temperatures virtually halted trains from Chicago, and the unprecedented blizzards in the eastern United States stopped virtually all movement of trains and airplanes.

"A major portion of mail for these midwestern states from eastern and southeastern states is carried on trains from Chicago. Since yesterday, when the severe cold hit Chicago, trains have been delayed from four to twelve hours. The cold was so extreme that it caused power failures in the stations and heat failures on trains," he explained.

This weekend also brought record snowfalls to the east coast tying up rail and air transportation. "Eastern airports such as Dulles and National in Washington, D C, and Friendship in Baltimore were closed down yesterday. Consequently, millions of pieces of mail were delayed," Winkel said.

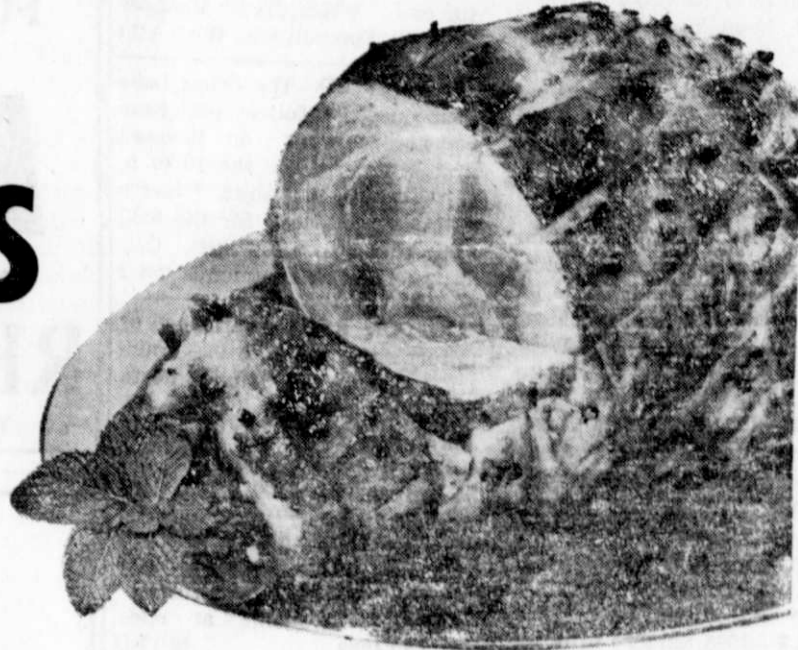

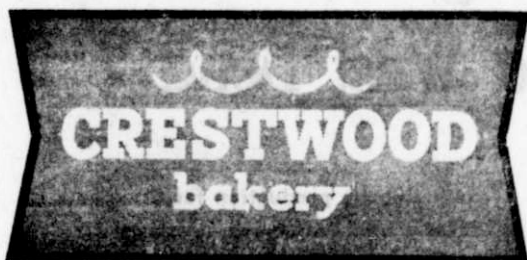

Indians Lose Another at N. Fondy, 74-68

The Kewaskum Indians dropped another game at North Fondy Friday night by a close score of 74-68 and also dropped into a tie with the Orioles for second place. It was the third straight setback for the Indians, including one non-conference tilt.

The rampaging young Orioles soared past slumping Kewaskum, which only two weeks ago was challenging undefeated Grafton for the lead. Now the Indians must defend their first division position. The Orioles rebounded over Kewaskum all night with Steve Groeschel grabbing 18 deflections, Kurt Urban adding 13 and Ron Nelson pulling in a personal high of 12 recoveries.

Groeschel, who has been burning the nets this season for upwards of 50 per cent from the field, turned on his scoring powers again and dropped in 27 points to take honors. Urban scored 14 and Dumbaskas 13. Bill Backhaus of the Indians sniped away for 21 points before fouling out. Mike Miller added 14 and Dick Wietor 12.

North Fondy outpointed the losers in every period but the last, leading 18-17 at the quarter, 32-25 at halftime, and 52-42 at the end of the third period. The Indians outscored them in the final stanza, 26-22, to dwindle the margin but it was too late.

Grafton's Jeff Sewell put on another record-smashing scoring performance to lead his team to a lopsided 92-51 win over Campbellsport. Sewell's scoring binge almost defies imagination as at one stretch he potted 9 of 10 shots with five of them fired in from beyond 25 feet out on the court. The 6-3 guard set another new record with 51 points against the Bells on 22 baskets in 34 shots and 7 straight free throws. Sewell scored 158 points in his last 3 games. He was named "player of the week" by the Associated Press this week and a picture of him appeared in Thursday's Milwaukee Sentinel, which also carried a feature item on him earlier in the week. In other games Friday Germantown beat Slinger, 92-72, and Pewaukee trimmed Random Lake, 54-36.

Tonight (Friday) Kewaskum hosts fifth place Germantown in the second last home game and Tuesday the team plays at Pewaukee, which holds fourth place.
