Tickets for WIAA Tournament Here Go on Sale Feb. 21

SUB-REGIONAL, REGIONAL BASKETBALL FINALS IN KEWASKUM MAR. 1, 4 & 5

Tickets for the sub-regional and regional finals basketball tournament will be on sale at the high school and at Jack's Appliance beginning Monday, Feb. 21. The tournament at Kewaskum will be held on Tuesday, March 1, Friday, March 4, and Saturday, March 5. Two games will be played on Tuesday and Friday and a single game will be played on Saturday.

Adult season tickets for Tuesday and Friday are \$1.75. Single admissions will be available only at the door if there is room.

Adult tickets for the Saturday night regional finals must be purchased separately and are \$1.00 for adults and 75 cents for students.

Teams paired for the tournament on March 1 and 4 are in the first game Grafton and Kewaskum and in the second game Campbellsport and Slinger. Sub-regional finals will be played Friday night. Saturday's game will pair the Kewaskum sub-regional champion against the Cedar Grove sub-regional champion. Playing at Cedar Grove are Cedar Grove, Oostburg, Ozaukee and Random Lake.

The accident occurred at the Dorzak residence in the town of Farmington when the youth attempted to fire the cannon from a flat roof over a first floor bedroom. The weapon exploded with fragments striking Jerry in the calf and heel of his left leg and also the sole of his right foot.

The blast blew a hole in the ceiling and floor of the bedroom.

Kewaskum AFS Chapter Seeks Home for Student

Mrs. L. N. Peterson, president of the local American Field Service chapter, has announced that families wishing to be host parents for a foreign exchange student should make application before Feb. 25.

Ernest Mitchell, committee member from the high school, reports that the experience with the present student, Sergio Andrade de Carvalho, of Brazil has been entirely favorable. He has been well accepted by teachers and classmates, is impressive in his speaking engagements and social activities. Mitchell said, "It would be unfortunate if after the fine experience with exchange students during the last six years, Kewaskum was unable to have another student for the lack of a host family."

General qualifications for a host family are listed as follows:

Both parents should be 37 years old, or older, and native born. They must have reared one or more children of the age level of the AFS student. All members of the family must want to have a student in the home. The AFS student must have a bed of his or her own and may share a room with another teenager but not with a child under 15. The host family is not paid for accepting the student, but may deduct up to \$50.00 monthly for U. S. income tax purposes and the home should be convenient to school, town and centers of teenage activities.

Other qualifications may be determined by contacting local AFS members. The final choice of a family is made in New York.

Any Kewaskum area family interested in applying or in getting more information is urged to call either Mrs. Ray Schaefer or Mrs. Gregor A. Nigh, Home and Student-Family Adjustment committee, local AFS chapter members.

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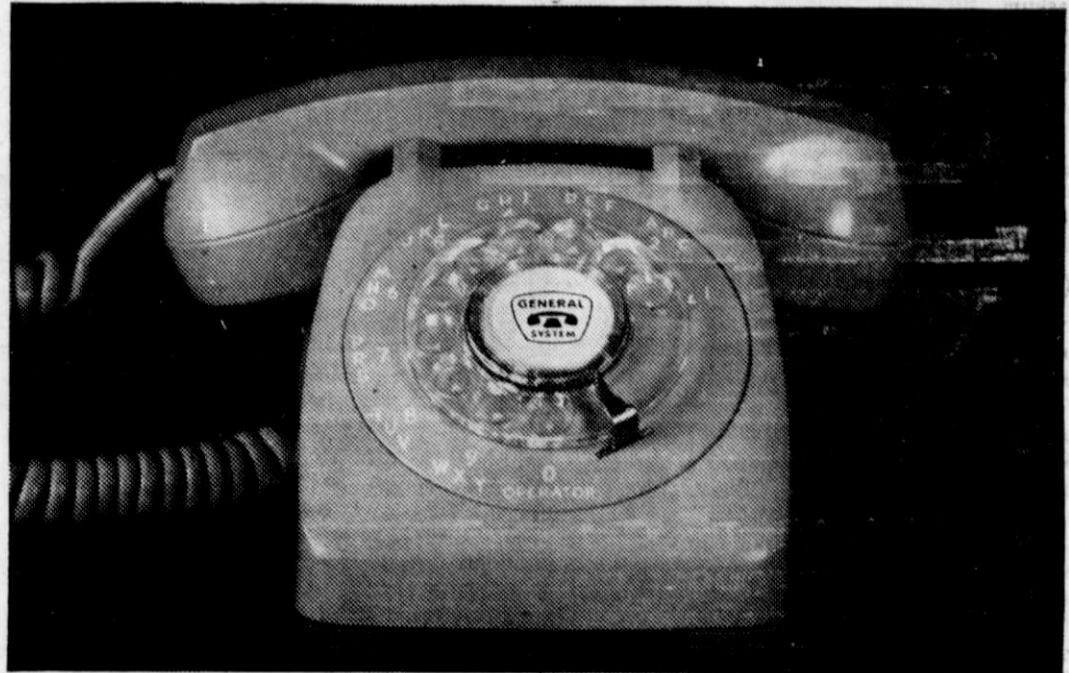
MAIL CURTAILMENT ON WASHINGTON'S BIRTHDAY

There will be no window service or rural delivery service.

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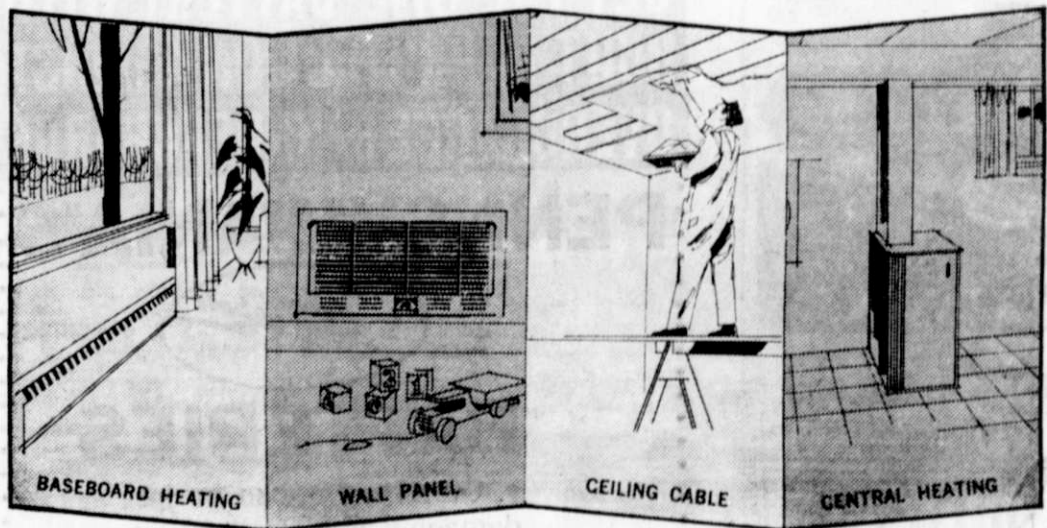
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Eight Local Girl Scouts Presented Marion Awards

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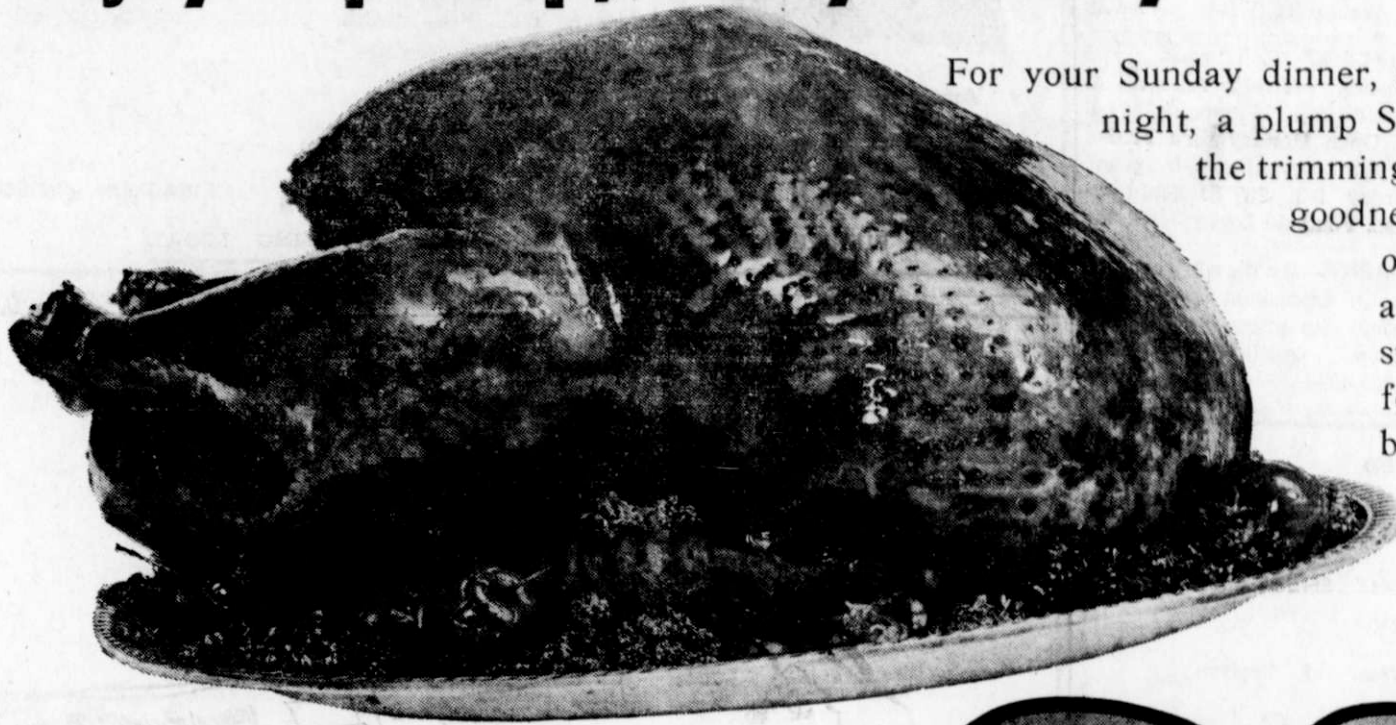

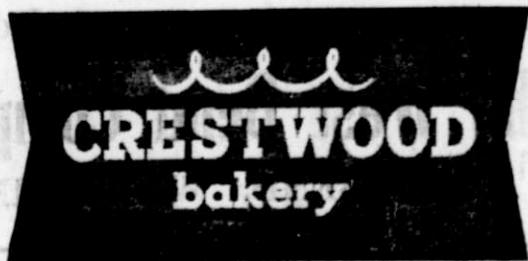
