WIAA Sub-Regional Basketball Tournament, Regional Finals to Be Played Here Next Week

Kewaskum Community High school is one of the schools throughout the state selected to host the WIAA (Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association) sub-regional and regional finals basketball tournament on Tuesday, Mar. 1, Friday, Mar. 4, and Saturday, Mar. 5. Two games will be played on Tuesday and Friday and a single championship game on Saturday.

Tickets are on sale since Monday at the high school and Jack's Appliance. Adult season tickets for Tuesday and Friday are \$1.75. Single admissions will be available only at the door if there is room left. Adult tickets for the Saturday night regional finals

must be purchased separately and are \$1.00 for adults and 75 cents for students. Visiting schools participating are allotted a certain number of tickets and they are greatly in demand by Grafton's conference champions. Grafton followers have sent word that they will take all that are left.

Teams paired for the first night of the tournament on Tuesday, Mar. 1, are: Game 1 at 7 p. m., Campbellsport vs. Slinger; game 2 at 8:30 p. m., Grafton vs. Kewaskum.

Pvt. Butzke Awarded Honor Medal



ONLY ONE OF 1260 MEN TO GET AWARD; SCORE ONE OF HIGHEST EVER RECORDED

Private Robert L. Butzke, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elroy O. Butzke of 1245 Roseland drive, Kewaskum, was awarded the American Spirit Honor Medal at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo. Jan. 28, upon graduation from eight weeks of basic combat training. He was the only one to receive the American Spirit Honor Medal out of 1,260 soldiers.

The young soldier earned a proficiency score of 98.5 out of a possible 100 points at the end of seven weeks of basic training with Company E, Third Battalion, Third Basic Combat Training Brigade. His point total stands as one of the highest ever recorded in post history.

Butzke's score was perfect in the final "proof test" which includes such training as dismounted drill, first aid, individual protective measures, military courtesy and justice, guard duty and reporting, hand-to-hand combat, bayonet and individual tactical training. He fired expert on the rifle range losing only one point, and lost the other half point in his Physical Combat Proficiency Test.

The American Spirit Honor Medal is provided by the Citizens' Committee for the Army, Navy and Air Force, Incorporated. It is authorized to basic combat trainees in recognition of their quali-

ties of leadership, American spirit, honor, initiative, loyalty and high example to their comrades-in-arms, as a means of promoting closer relationships between the Armed Forces and civilian communities.

To be selected for this award, each company in the basic combat training brigade that is graduating nominates one man who can best represent military bearing and has the highest leadership ability. After the names have been selected, a board of three commissioned officers is appointed to carefully screen the qualifications of each man to determine the winner.

Private Butzke, who was a squad leader in basic, received the award from Major Denny D. Dresch, commanding officer of the Third Battalion, Third Basic Combat Training Brigade.

Butzke joined the National Guard on June 17, 1965 and will attend the Aircraft Electrical Maintenance School at Fort Belvoir, Va., for advanced individual training.

A 1962 graduate of Kewaskum Community High school, he attended the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee extension for one year and worked as an insurance underwriter.

Cindy Lou Plautz, 14-months old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Plautz, Jr., R. 6, West Bend, accidentally drowned at the rural home of her paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Plautz, Sr., of R. 1, Kewaskum, when she apparently turned on the water in the bathtub of the farm residence this week.

The grandmother summoned the Newburg rescue squad who gave the child oxygen in a futile attempt to revive her. She was rushed to St. Joseph's Community hospital where she was pronounced dead. Death was attributed to drowning, with scalding from the hot water she apparently turned on as a contributing factor.

Three Hurt in Local Crashes

Two young people were injured early Saturday, Feb. 12, when a car driven by Robert L. Richert, 22, of West Bend, collided with a semi-trailer operated by James Hanned. 24 of Kewaskum, and owned by Henry Timblin, Kewaskum. The mishap occurred at 12:44 a. m. as the flatbed semi-trailer which was loaded with steel and had been stopped partially on the shoulder of the highway, attempted to back northerly and across Hwy. 45 into a driveway at the Timblin truck garage about one-half mile south of the village. The Richert vehicle went under the trailer just forward of the rear dual wheels. The top of the Richert car was almost completely sheared off but the trailer was undamaged.

Injured in the crash were Richert, severe facial injuries to the nose and mouth, and a passenger, Linda Gnacinski, 17, of Kewaskum, three fractured ribs, leg and face cuts. The injured were taken to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance. Richert was transferred Wednesday evening in the ambulance to the Milwaukee hospital, where he underwent major surgery Thursday morning and is now off the critical list but is expected to be a patient there for another two weeks. Miss Gnacinski was released from the hospital on Monday evening.

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A Kewaskum boy, Donald T. Felenz, 4, was reported recovering from a possible skull fracture at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, following a crash on the overhead bridge at the junction of Hwy. 45 and CTH V just north of Kewaskum recently. The mishap occurred when a car driven by Mrs. Marlene T. Felenz, 27, Kewaskum, apparently slid sideways on the frosted pavement of the overhead early Feb. 11 and struck the guard rail posts.

The front end of an auto driven by Charles W. Stehlik, 24, of 1923 Salisbury, West Bend, was damaged when it struck a light pole on Main st. at 3:15 p. m. Sunday. Stehlik was driving south on Riverview dr. making an east turn onto Main st. he attempted to stop but his vehicle skidded and struck the light pole on the opposite side of Main st. 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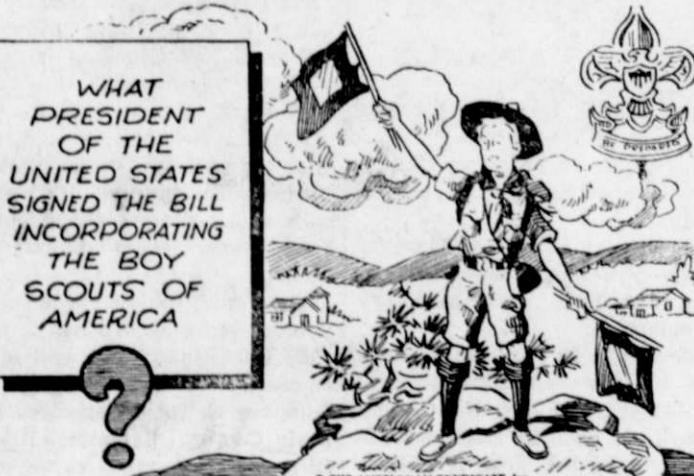
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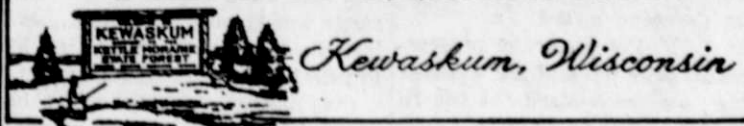

After the business meeting lunch was served and a movie entitled "The Cause of Labor" was shown.

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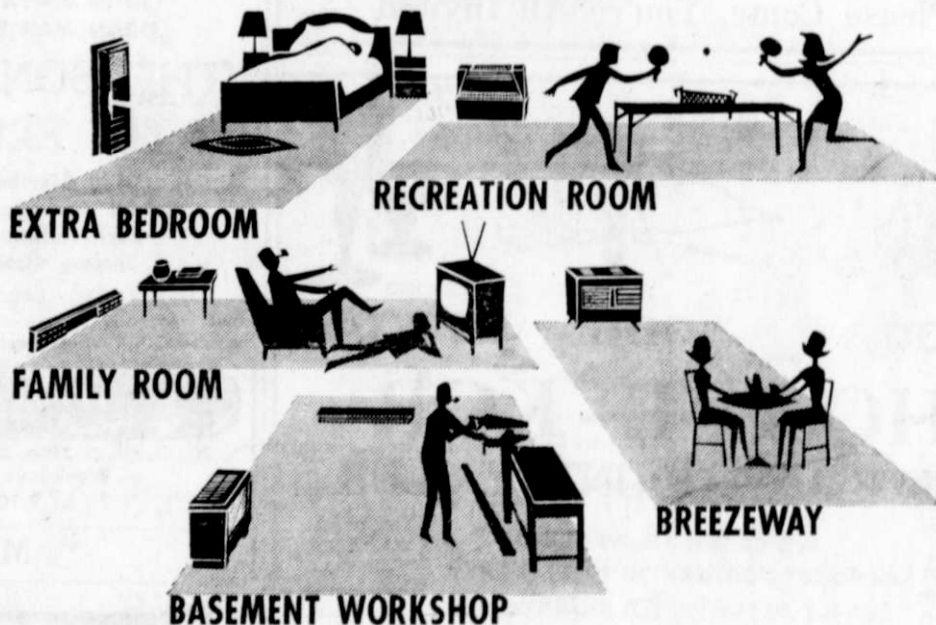

Indians Take Three on Chin, Drop to Fourth

GIVE GRAFTON CLOSEST BATTLE IN NEAR UPSET

Kewaskum's unpredictable, again sputtering Indians were defeated in all of their last three outings. They were up and gave Grafton's unbeaten champs their closest battle of the season and almost pulled the upset of the year before losing, 66-61, on Feb. 11, then in a turn-about were surprised by 6th place Random Lake, 79-67, last Friday, and on Tuesday night in a make-up game at Pewaukee lost again, 57-43. The three setbacks dropped the Indians, who had been nesting in second place all season, to fourth in the standings.

Grafton's win here clinched their fourth straight conference title and was their 12th straight without a defeat, but they did not attain it without a real struggle from the stubborn Indians. The Blackhawks survived a lackluster second half in which Kewaskum crept to within two points of the champions in the final stanza, 56-54. Ed Czaja, who picked up three fouls in the first quarter, returned in the second half to restrict high-scoring Grafton ace Jeff Sewell to a mere six points. Sewell who made 14 of 17 free throws, led Grafton with 26 points, less than his usual total. Bill Backhaus, with 19 points, and Dick Wietor, with 17, paced the Indians. Kewaskum trailed Grafton, 44-32, at halftime but outscored them, 18-9, in the third quarter to almost overtake them.

At Random Lake Friday Kewaskum's second place hopes were dealt a crippling blow as they went down, unexpectedly, 79-67. Guards Ike Steuerwald and John Dunphy put on a show of strength and combined for 34 points in pacing the Rams' victory. Mike Gruenwald clicked for 24 points for the Rams and Rod Scholz pulled down 14 rebounds and added 16 points. It was mostly famine for the Indians in the offensive department as Larry Coulter topped their scorers

with only 14 points. Random Lake led at the half, 40-37, and outscored the Indians in every period but the second, in which each team scored 25.

It was more of the same at Pewaukee Tuesday when the Pirates ripped a listless Indian team, 57-43, to knock them out of the second place running. Pewaukee clinched at least a share of the runner-up spot by using their tight defense to shut out Kewaskum with only 18 baskets and 20 points in the first half. The Indians contributed to their own downfall by sinking only seven of 18 free throws. Bob Coulter was top scorer with 16 points, while his usual scoring mates were help-

less. Backhaus and Czaja were completely checked with one basket each, while Wietor and Larry Coulter were held to four points apiece. Kewaskum trailed at halftime, 28-20, and was outpointed in every period.

The Indians bring the season to a close at Slinger tonight (Friday) against the last place Owls.
