THANKS EXPRESSED BY

Honor Norm Held For 25 Years With West Bend Firm

Norman W. Held, 361 First st., Kewaskum, was awarded a gold engraved watch by J. R. Brown, president of The West Bend Company, on Thursday, Feb. 17, in recognition of his 25 years of service with the West Bend firm.

Held joined the company in 1941 as a timekeeper. Following three years in the United States Army during World War II, he rejoined West Bend in the customer service department. During January 1947, he transferred to credit. He is now the credit department's adjustment manager.

Two of Norman's three years in military service were spent overseas. Assigned to a Special Services Company, he was stationed in Great Britain for a period of about five months. From there he was transferred to the continent of Europe where he followed the war's path from Normandy through France and into Germany.

Born in Batavia, Wis., Held graduated from Random Lake High school. He is a member of Peace United Church of Christ, Kewaskum. He and his wife, Ruth, a native of Kewaskum, have two daughters—Nancy, who is married to Marine Lieutenant John Harwood and lives in Jacksonville, N. Car., and Colleen, a sophomore at Lawrence University. Nancy is a graduate of Lawrence.

Board OK's \$2.5 Million County Hospital, Home

The Washington county board last week approved plans and specifications for a new \$2,500,000 county hospital and home for the aged.

Board members also authorized Anton P. Staral, county clerk, to advertise for bids on the project.

The new facility is to be erected on county land on Hwy. 33 near the east limits of West Bend. Construction is scheduled to start this spring. Architects for the project are Wenzel-Zoller-Gunn, Inc. of Elm Grove.

To be constructed in the form of a "Y," the base of the Y would face north and the wings extending to the east and west. The structure will have a three story elevation to the north and to the west, on the higher ground, while the rear and east, conforming with the terrain, will have a five story elevation. Accommodations for 323 to 327 patients will be provided.

The new building will replace the old county buildings which have been termed inadequate by state inspectors. Arnold Korth, superintendent of the county hospital and home, stated that the new facility will provide for "better care of the aged and mentally ill."

The new facility will contain a chapel, therapy area, sitting rooms, all medical offices, dining area, three elevators, as well as other modern facilities and equipment.

Korth also indicated that the building committee approved "The Samaritan" as an appropriate name for the facility.

NAMES COULTAS TO HEAD
SOCIETY'S 1966 CRUSADE

Lehman Rosenheimer, Kewaskum, president of the Washington County Unit of the American Cancer Society, has appointed Warren Coultas, West Bend, to head the society's 1966 Crusade in Washington county.

The American Cancer Society is scheduled to launch its annual educational and fund-raising Crusade on April 1. The group plans a stepped-up program that could save thousands of lives each year from cancer.

Coultas said that plans for the 1966 Crusade are well underway and additional volunteers "will be needed if we are to get a good start in reaching our objectives." He indicated that training sessions will be held for volunteers for they are "the lifeblood of the American Cancer Society."

Society figures show that about 49 million Americans now living will eventually have cancer, in one form or another, if present rates continue.

Grafton Tips Kewaskum, Slinger Wins in WIAA Tournament Here

WINNERS SQUARE OFF FOR TITLE FRIDAY; REGIONAL FINALS HERE SATURDAY

The form chart swayed slightly in the WIAA sub-regional basketball tournament at Kewaskum Tuesday night played before an overflow crowd of screaming supporters of the four participating teams. Slinger pulled an upset decision over Campbellsport, 80-73, in the opening game of the meet, while Grafton's unbeaten Scenic Moraine conference champions lived up to their role as the favorite by outlasting host Kewaskum, 61-49, after a battle.

As a result, the 8:30 p. m. title game tonight (Friday) in the sub-regional will be a pairing between Grafton's (14-0) first place team and Slinger's (1-13) last place squad. Naturally Grafton will be a heavy favorite to win and earn the right to meet the winner of the Cedar Grove sub-regional tourney in the regional finals playoff here Saturday night. Campbellsport and Kewaskum square off in a 7 p. m. consolation game Friday to open the evening's events.

Slinger wasn't expected to beat Campbellsport but in sizzling tournament play season records mean nothing. Coach Doug Potter of West Bend, in his first year of coaching at Slinger, had his improving Owls up for this one. They held the Bells' high-scoring Dave Weiland to a mere 12 points and enjoyed a decisive edge from the floor, 31-24. The Owls, enjoying only their second win of the season, opened and closed explosively with 22 and 24-point first and final quarters with Frank Gundrum pacing the winners with 23 points. John Lidington added 13 points and Larry Krenn 12. Don Miller was the main noise for the Bells with 20 points. Slinger led at the half, 36-32, and was only 2 points ahead at the end of the third period, 55-53.

The Grafton-Kewaskum tilt ended up about as expected with the champion Blackhawks winning by 12 points. The victory was Grafton's third of the season over the Indians, who gave them a battle in every one of them. The Blackhawks, with their star, Jeff Sewell, who erased all existing Scenic Moraine season scoring marks with 453 points in 14 games and is an all-state candidate, were too much for the Indians, who put up an all-out effort. The two teams fought tooth and nail in the opening quarter, which ended in a 2-point lead for Grafton, 12-10. But the Indians stumbled in the second stanza, 16-6, and fell behind at halftime, 28-16, which advantage they could not overcome. The Blackhawks increased their lead to 48-32 in the third period. Paced by Sewell, who sank 10 free throws, the winners outpointed the Indians from the free throw line, 17-11. Sewell was high scorer with 26 points, below his average 32.5 per game. He scored 18 in the first half. Grafton's other ace, playmaker Greg Kirst, tallied 14 points. Four players did nearly all of Kewaskum's scoring. Bob Coulter made 14, Larry Coulter 11, Dick Wictor 10 and Bill Backhaus 9.

Indians Thump Owls in Finale, Wind Up Fourth

Bringing the 1965-66 Scenic Moraine season to an end at Slinger Friday night, the Kewaskum Indians gained an easy victory over the last place Owls, 81-64. The Indians wound up in fourth place in the standings with an 8-6 record.

Slinger, with only one to show in 14 games, was no match for Kewaskum, which outscored them in each quarter but the last when substitutes finished the contest. Coach Lindy De Namur used his entire squad of 12 players in the game and kept the score down. The Indians owned a big 19-7 lead at the quarter and it was 44-27 at the intermission. By the end of the third period Kewaskum was ahead by 20 points, 64-44.

Adding to his normal rebounding chores, Bob Coulter also took time to score 20 points for the winners, tops in the game. Ed Czaja also returned to form with 17 points. Lidington and Rick Held paced the Owls with only 10 points apiece.

Grafton's undefeated champions ran their string to 14 straight this season and to 55 out of the last 56 in drubbing Germantown, 99-61. Jeff Sewell, who has surpassed the 50-point mark on several occasions this season and in the process erased all existing Scenic season scoring marks with 453 points, added 25 more. He is an all-state candidate. In other finales North Fondy tipped Random Lake, 71-61, and Pewaukee nailed Campbellsport, 69-58.

This week Kewaskum is participating in the WIAA sub-regional tournament, which it is hosting this year.
