Man Sentenced To Year in Jail After Chase Here

A R. 3, Campbellsport man, residing at Lake Bernice, was sentenced Monday to one year in jail as the result of a high speed chase through the village of Kewaskum Saturday night.

Victor Fellers, 25, was sentenced to serve six months each on charges of driving after revocation of his driver's license and failing to heed an officer's signal, according to Chief of Police Roland Pledl. The jail terms are to run consecutively. He was sentenced at West Bend before Judge Robert Stoltz Monday morning in Branch 2, Washington county court.

According to the report, Patrolman Ken Neldner clocked the Fellers vehicle at 58 miles per hour in the village. He followed the car, which turned west on Hwy. 28 at the north limits and when Neldner attempted to overtake the auto, Fellers increased his speed to 90 miles per hour. The chase continued to Hwy. 41 where the Fellers auto developed engine trouble and the man escaped Officer Neldner by running into the woods near a wayside.

After Fellers abandoned his car, Neldner called Chief Pledl in Kewaskum, who instructed the officer to confiscate the vehicle and search the area. After further investigation with Fond du Lac and Washington county authorities on Fellers' identity and record, the local officers had a state probation officer apprehend and arrest him at his home the next day for violation of probation. Chief Pledl and Officer Neldner then served two warrants on Fellers for driving after revocation of his license and failing to heed an officer.

College Prank Ends in Scare

At four o'clock in the morning Monday the doorbell rang at the Harold Boettcher home at 1640 Riverview drive.

Harold, in a sound sleep after attending the firemen's banquet at Cedarburg the night before, got out of bed, went to the door, and opened it.

Yeow! There at the door, in the darkest part of the night, like a nightmare he had never had before, was a modern version of Sitting Bull standing up. There stood a big man, husky and about 6-2, with his face painted, clothes painted, shoes painted, and brown goo oozing out of his shoes.

When the door opened the "character" walked in, said very little, but was given permission to use the bathroom to clean up. While he was doing so Harold, thinking this could be an escapee from the boys' school north of here or some booby hatch, was on the kitchen phone calling police in whispered but excited tones.

Chief Pledl, also aroused from cloud nine, and not knowing what to expect, rattled out fellow officer Marriner Frank. The two stealthily approached the house in plain clothes, as per Boettcher's request, carefully walked in one at a time and confronted the intruder, who offered no resistance but willingness to cooperate.

After preliminary questioning the man was given a ride "on the house" to the county jail at West Bend, where he was a "guest" for the little of the night remaining and was further questioned later in the morning.

Here is the story he told police: He gave his name as Henry F. Bachman, his age 20 years, and

his address as 7027 Olcott, Hammond, Ind. He reported that he was "kidnapped" by a group of freshman students at the university (possibly in retaliation for an earlier initiation prank). The freshmen painted his face and clothing, filled his shoes with peanut butter, loaded him in a car, blindfolded him and drove off.

Evidently they drove and drove and drove, all the way from Indiana to a spot near Beechwood (Wis.) where they dumped him out. Having been blindfolded, he had no idea where he was, not even knowing he was in the state of Wisconsin. He began walking aimlessly in his peanut butter shoes (hope it was not the crunchy kind), not knowing in what direction he was headed or where he was going. He said he walked through the night, hitting one dead end road and back-tracking. He had a slight idea he might be in Wisconsin when he saw the name of the state on a highway sign. Finally he ended up in Kewaskum at 4 a. m. and the Boettcher home at the village limits was the one where he happened to stop.

To prove his identity, Bachman requested that the officers telephone the president of his fraternity at Valparaiso U. He identified the student and promised to send bail money for his release via Western Union. Charged with disorderly conduct, Bachman was released after his bond of \$20 arrived and left to find his way back to Valparaiso.

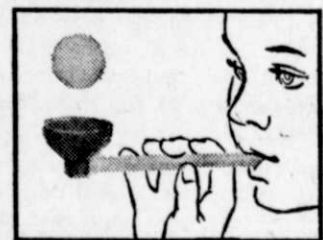

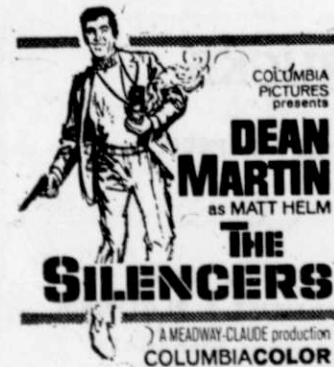

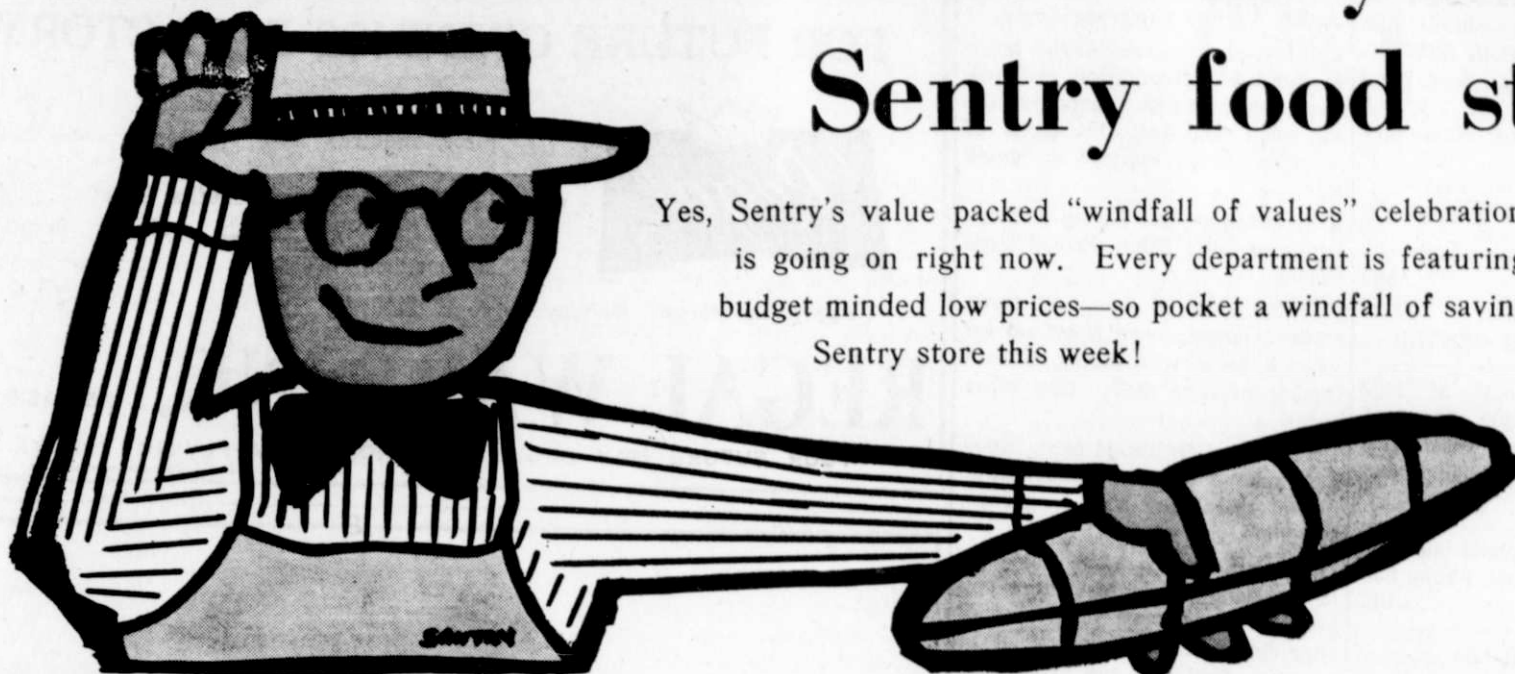

Jeff Sewell Heads Scenic All-Loop Team

KEWASKUM'S BOB COULTER PICKED ON SECOND TEAM

Jeff Sewell of Grafton, who was the leading scorer in the WIAA state tournament at Madison with 63 points in three games despite actually sub-par performances for him in the tourney, headed the list of Scenic Moraine All-Conference selections. The Blackhawks placed fourth in the state meet.

Sewell, 6-3 senior guard, who averaged over 32 points a game in the 14 game season, ended up with 453 points in the conference, or 125 ahead of Steve Groeschel of North Fondy. This was a new conference scoring record by far.

Also named to the all-conference first team were: Don Youse of Germantown, Groeschel, Rod Scholz of Random Lake, and Greg Kirst of Grafton. Kewaskum's Bob Coulter was selected on the all-conference second team. The Indians placed fourth in the standings with an 8-6 record.

Grafton's fine team upset Madison East, ranked No. 1 in the state among the larger schools, in the state tournament opener but then tired and lost to Wisconsin

Rapids (which lost out in the finals to Milwaukee Lincoln) and Alma (in the battle for third place). In a class by itself, Milwaukee Lincoln beat Wisconsin Rapids for the state crown, 75-62.

Sewell, one of the best players ever to represent the Scenic Moraine loop, was also named to both all-tournament teams at Madison by coaches and sportswriters. Also named were John Stohr, Alma; John Rushing, Fred Brown and Clarence Sherrod, Lincoln, and Greg Ebsen, Wisconsin Rapids.

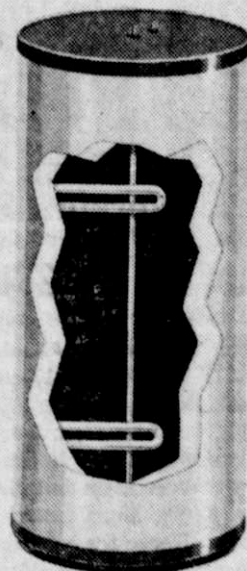
