Herriges, Perschbacher, Yoost Win Trustee Posts; Romaine Reelected

ONLY 270 BALLOTS CAST HERE; ED CAMPBELL LOSES

In the spring election in Kewaskum Tuesday incumbent Trustee Oscar Hirsig was unseated while Myron Perschbacher, appointed to office to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late John Geidel, was reelected. Raynor Herriges and Elmer Yoost are the new trustees elected. The third incumbent, Arvin Merwin, was not a candidate for reelection.

The balloting ran very close among the five candidates in the village with only 43 votes separating the top vote-getter from the candidate with the least number of votes. Receiving the most votes was Perschbacher (inc.) 168, followed by Yoost 164, Herriges 163, Roger Strack 143 and Hirsig (inc.) 125. The three newly elected trustees for two year terms will now serve in office with the three holdover trustees. Richard Reigle, Cyril Wieter and Carl Freehauf.

Only 270 ballots were cast in the village as about one-third of the voters turned out for the election.

Twenty-three supervisors presently serving on the Washington county board were returned to office, four incumbents were defeated, and six new office holders will be seated on the board in the county. In County Supervisory District No. 9, village of Kewaskum, incumbent Elwyn M. Romaine, who is chairman of the county board, defeated his opponent, Francis N. Bohn. 166 to 100. Defeated incumbent supervisory candidates included Ed. J. Campbell of the town of Kewaskum, who lost to John A. Oelhafen of the town of Wayne in District No. 8 (towns of Wayne and Kewaskum), by a vote of 224 to 128.

The vote on the three state referenda issues followed in the village when electors approved all three issues by comfortable margins. The village vote on the referenda issues follows: Military service (regarding legislators)—125 yes, 63 no; Abolish Justice of the Peace—121 yes, 57 no; Debt Limits—106 yes, 58 no.

Incumbent Judge J. Tom Merriam, who was appointed to fill the vacancy created by the death of Judge Lester A. Buckley, polled 236 votes in the village and 7,613 in the county to be elected to a six year term as judge of Branch I of county court.

Thomas E. Fairchild polled 6,479 votes for election to the state supreme court in Washington county balloting and 182 in the village. Both judges were unopposed.

Issues also appeared on town ballots in the county. The town of Wayne vote for a change in meeting places for various town business sessions was 126 to 112 against moving the meeting place.

In Fond du Lac County Supervisory District 30, comprising the village of Campbellsport and towns of Ashford and Auburn, Henry J. Weld and Gil Howard were elected. They defeated William Wunder and Fred Grossen, a write-in candidate.

Harold Eggert, 49, of R. 1, Kewaskum (New Fane), was seriously injured as the result of a fall from the roof while at work in Sheboygan Monday morning.

According to the report, Eggert, who is employed by Carroll W. Haug & Sonsssss, West Bend roofers, was working on the roof of the new St. Dominic's Catholic church in Sheboygan at the time. He fell about 14 feet through an open skylight in the roof and landed on a cement floor and pipes on the floor below. He was found by one of the mason workers on the job a short time later.

Eggert suffered a crushed vertebrae, smashed left foot and fractured bone in his right foot in the fall. He was taken to St. Nicholas hospital, Sheboygan, for treatment, where he is now a patient.

"Neighbor" Phase Of Cancer Crusade To Begin Next Week

TO DISTRIBUTE LEAFLETS TO EVERY COUNTY PERSON

"Hope is in the air concerning cancer. Nearly 1 1/2 million Americans now alive have been cured."

This is the message contained in an American Cancer society leaflet which will soon be distributed to every person in Washington county during the society's Cancer Crusade.

The leaflet, entitled, "Cancer and You: Facts That May Help Save Your Life," gives the latest lifesaving information about cancer.

"If all people responded to these facts as they should, one half of those who develop cancer today would be saved," according to Warren Coultas, West Bend, Crusade chairman, "not just one out of three as we are now saving."

The leaflet lists several means of guarding against cancer. It says "an annual checkup by a physician is the best defense against cancer. It can lead to early detection and treatment . . . and add years to your life." The folder warns against lung cancer, which is increasing at a rapid rate. "If you don't smoke cigarettes, don't start. If you do smoke, stop."

Coultas urged that any person not receiving a copy of the leaflet from a volunteer or from some other source should ask the American Cancer society for one. He urged that the leaflet be studied and the facts it contains kept in mind.

With the "neighbor-to-neighbor" phase of the campaign scheduled to begin next week, Coultas issued a final appeal for volunteers. Persons willing to help should contact the Crusade chairman or an American Cancer society volunteer in their area.

HEBERER WITH SIXTH FLEET

Airman Russell R. Heberer, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. John A. Heberer, Sr., R. 2, Campbellsport, participated in "Fairgame IV," a joint French-US naval training exercise in the western Mediterranean and on Corsica as a crew-member aboard the attack

aircraft carrier USS Forrestal. Fairgame is conducted annually between US Sixth Fleet and French Naval forces to provide tactical training in conducting air, amphibious and naval operations, as well as defense methods, against them.

The three-phase exercise began with US and French carrier task forces training in combined support operations. Participating French and US air and submarine forces provided mock opposition to the carriers.

Phase two consisted of individual ship exercises in which the French and US observers were exchanged for orientation and indoctrination.

The final phase of Fairgame was a two-nation amphibious landing at Santa Manza, Corsica, supported by a fast carrier task force and opposed by French and US submarines, land and air units.
