## Manawa Firm Awarded Contract For New Post Office Building

PROJECT EXPECTED TO BE COMPLETED MARCH 1, 1967

Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien announced yesterday that a contract has been awarded to Sturm Building Corp. of Manawa, Wis. to build the new post office in Kewaskum and lease it to the post office department.

The announcement of the award to the successful bidder advances the new building closer to the construction stage. When fully operational, the Postmaster General said, the additional space and more modern equipment will, in the long run, more than offset the extra cost involved in producing more efficient handling of the mail, in accord with President Johnson's directive to provide the best possible postal service at the least possible cost.

"This project is in accordance with our policy of building new post offices only where they are urgently needed," Mr. O'Brien said. "We are constantly reassessing our construction program to determine whether present buildings can be altered or remodeled to take care of our expanding mail volume.

"We now have about 45,000 postal locations throughout the country handling an anticipated volume of nearly 75 billion pieces of mail for the 1965-1966 fiscal year. By 1970 it is expected to rise to 90 billion.

"Our employees are doing a great job of processing the mail. But it is clear that if we are to meet the demands of our growing population we must make use of the best mechanized equipment available in areas where it is economically justified.

"We are also constantly seeking to develop new ideas and new postal techniques, such as ZIP Code, to help process the mail more efficiently and economically."

The new building located at 341-347 Main st. will be leased to the department for 10 years with renewal options running up to 20 years. It will have an interior space of 3,433 square feet and an area of 6,024 square feet for parking and movement of vehicles.

The post office is expected to be completed by March 1, 1967.

Mr. O'Brien explained that the department's capital investment is limited substantially to postal equipment. The building will remain under private ownership, with the owner paying local real estate taxes.

## Steve Lecher And Wife Die 8 Hours Apart

A R. 2, Kewaskum couple, Mr. and Mrs. Steven Lecher, died within eight hours of each other on Tuesday, April 26, and Wednesday, April 27. Mr. Lecher, 80, died at the Hope Nursing Home at Lomira, where he had been a resident for the past eight months, at 6:15 p. m. Tuesday. His wife, 82, also a resident of the nursing home, who was stricken upon hearing of his death, was rushed to St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, where she passed away about eight hours later, early Wednesday morning.

Mr. Lecher, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Lecher, was a retired farmer. He was born Aug. 20, 1885, in Hungary and came to this country as a young man, settling in Milwaukee, where he married the former Katie Melack in St. Steven's church on Feb. 13, 1909. In 1918 the couple moved to their farm home in the town of Kewaskum where they farmed for 48 years before retiring.

Mrs. Lecher was also born in Hungary on Dec. 6, 1883, and came to this country as a young lady, settling in Milwaukee.

Mr. and Mrs. Lecher are survived by three children, Anna (Mrs. Joe Mayer) of Milwaukee, John S. Lecher of R. 2, Kewaskum, and Rose (Mrs. Carl Bauer) of R. 4, West Bend; 10 grandchildren, one great-granddaughter, a daughter-in-law, two sons-in-law, and other relatives. Mrs. Lecher is also survived by a sister, Mrs. Anna Sommers, of Milwaukee.

## Reconstruction Of Hwy. 28 Here On State Program

E. M. Romaine of Kewaskum, chairman of the Washington County Board of Supervisors, who earlier petitioned the State Highway Commission of Wisconsin for the improvement and reconstruction of State Trunk Hwy. 28 from USH 41 easterly to STH 144 through Kewaskum, received the following letter from S. T. Banaszak, district engineer, informing him that this project has been included in a future construction program:

We wish to refer to our letter to you of February 15, 1966, which commented on the petition that was submitted to this office, signed by interested citizens in the vicinity of Kewaskum, urging that the State Highway Commission take into consideration the improvement of S.T.H. 28 from U.S.H. 41 easterly to S.T.H. 144. The petition request was reviewed with our Central Office in Madison, and we were informed that this section of S.T.H. 28 should be included in a future construction program.

In compliance with this recommendation, we will evaluate the urgency for reconstruction of this highway and will place it in a program accordingly.

It must be understood, however, that any improvement on this particular state trunk highway will have to be based on overall needs with improvements of other state trunk highways in this area.

## GOP Rally-Dinner Draws Large Crowd

An enthusiastic crowd of about 300 people attended the GOP Rally Dinner held in West Bend at St. Frances Cabrini gym Saturday night. One of the honored guests, Mrs. Dena Smith, Wisconsin state treasurer, described the atmosphere which prevailed as one of "hospitality and friendship." She praised Gov. Warren Knowles and urged that a completely Republican legislature be elected to support his programs. She also urged the election of William Steiger of Oshkosh to the U. S. Congress. Her request was echoed by the other speakers at the event.

Co-chairmen of the dinner, Robert Barber and Allan Kieckhafer of West Bend opened the meeting with a moment of silent prayer in memory of the late D. J. Kenny, civic leader and longtime worker in the Republican party. Many office-holders, candidates and distinguished guests were introduced, among them were Mrs. Anita Becker, vice-chairwoman of the 6th District who shared in the program with chairman Bernard Ziegler; State Senator Frank Panzer, LeRoy (Butch) Walterlin, Germantown, and Mrs. John Disher, Hartford, chairmen of the Washington county Republicans, and Assemblyman Fred Schroeder.

Other Republicans presented at the rally dinner were Anton Staral, county clerk; Robert Klein, county treasurer; Mrs. Helen Berend, clerk of court; Mrs. Olga Perrin, register of deeds, Ray Jeffords, sheriff; Richard Becker, retiring district attorney, and Robert Kaufmann, candidate for the D. A. position. The newly-elected mayor

of West Bend, Ralph Schoenhaar, also greeted the group.

Candidate for Congress, William Steiger, spoke briefly on the coming campaign. Interrupted by frequent applause, he urged that every Republican worker redouble his efforts. Criticizing his opponent, Democrat John Race, Steiger pointed out that the congressman should have been aware of the facts and figures before his recent remarks on the "flight from the farms." Member of the legislature, now serving his third term, Steiger asked "where has the congressman been?" He indicated that it was, indeed, "time for a change."

Following two songs by Jim Barber, teacher at West Bend's Silverbrook school, The Liberty Song and God Bless America, Congressman Glenn Davis of Brookfield was introduced. Keynoting the rally dinner, Davis charged that beneath the seeming assurance of the American people was a declining trust in the nation's leadership. "Everything seems to have a price—paid out of the U. S. treasury. He questioned the votes which passed quickly without alteration, and suggested that the taxpayers' dollars are being used, in some cases to win elections.

Davis asked that citizens be alert to any betrayal of the trust which would put one man in complete charge of government funds. He warned that so-called anti-poverty and foreign aid funds might fail to really reach and help the poor or "buy friends." He urged the GOP to return to the philosophy of self-reliance and protest the by-passing of local and state governments by the administration's political machine. The challenge drew applause.

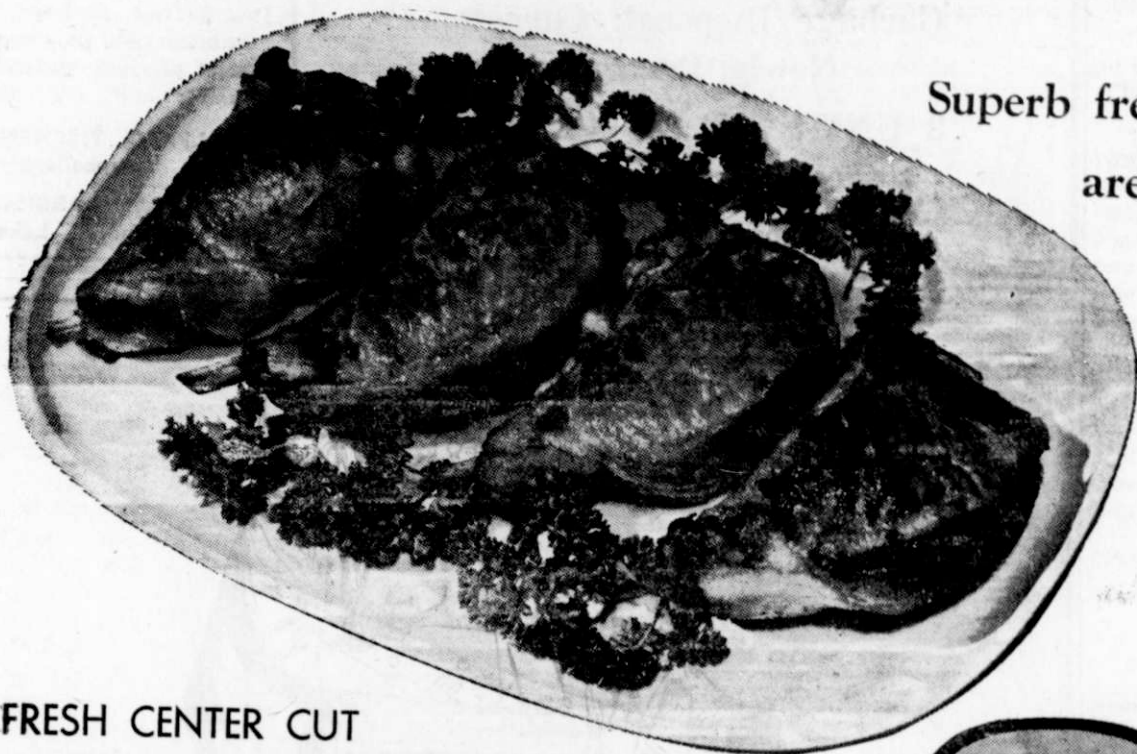

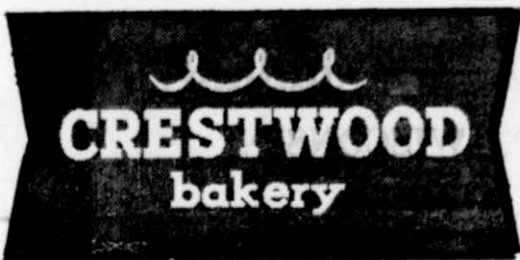
