TO COST \$70,000 - \$100,000, BEGIN WORK THIS SUMMER; VOTE NEW CHURCH PEWS

At the annual parish meeting of Holy Trinity congregation, held in the church hall following May devotions on Sunday afternoon, members of the congregation voted to build a four-classroom, second story addition to the present school building. The estimated cost of the project is \$70,000 to \$100,000.

The present school is still comparatively new. It was built in 1948 or 1949, which makes it only about 17 years old. But the school is overcrowded and some classes are still being taught in the old school building, which also houses the sisters' home.

The new second story addition will be the same size as the first floor. With this addition there will be ample space for each of the eight grades in the school to have a separate room. The addition will also provide additional toilet facilities.

Detailed plans will be drawn up by an architect and construction of the addition is expected to begin this summer. It is anticipated that the project will be completed in time for the 1967 fall term of school. Members of the parish have been contributing voluntarily to a building fund for a number of years now and this fund is substantial at the present time to cover the major portion of the cost of this new project.

School plans for the distant future have also been made and were discussed at the meeting. These plans would provide for an eight-room addition and 60x120 foot gymnasium to the north of the present school where the sisters' home and old school building now stand. A new sisters' convent would be located at the rear of the present church parsonage facing Prospect st.

At Sunday's meeting it was also decided to install all new pews and padded kneelers in the church. Some of the pews and kneelers presently in use will be moved upstairs and installed in the choir loft to provide more room and relieve the overcrowding downstairs. The cost of this project is estimated at \$6,500. It was also voted to have the interior of the church cleaned.

Parish officers re-elected for two year terms at the meeting were John Battaglia, secretary, and William Martin, treasurer.

Young Man Dies Of Injuries in Accident Here

WILLIAM PLISCHOUNIG OF WEST BEND VICTIM

William F. Plischounig, 23, of West Bend, victim of an early Sunday morning crash at Kewaskum, died late Monday night at West Allis Memorial hospital of injuries suffered in the mishap. His death advanced the Washington county traffic toll to 10 for 1966.

Plischounig was seriously injured about 12:50 a. m. Sunday when his southbound car apparently veered over the center line on the railroad overhead bridge on Hwy. 45 just north of Kewaskum and collided with an auto traveling north operated by John A. Mayer, 18, of West Bend. Both cars were demolished.

Mayer was also seriously injured and is reported in fair condition at West Allis Memorial hospital. Plischounig, who was alone in his car, suffered a fractured skull, cuts, bruises and internal injuries. Mayer reportedly

Growth and accomplishments through activities is attained by holding responsible positions in connection with school and chapter activities, by participating effectively in community activities and by participating in an outstanding way in activities provided for in the state and national FHA program of work. To attain her degree the candidate must think through her goals in the light of needs, interests and abilities and

must follow a plan for the wise use of her resources to achieve her goals. In working toward happier families and homes the candidate must participate effectively in activities which contribute to better family life and assume responsibility for some worthwhile homemaking activity for a period long enough to show definite improvements.

The State degrees are evaluated by a State Degree committee. This committee consists of girls who have already received their Wisconsin Homemaker degree.

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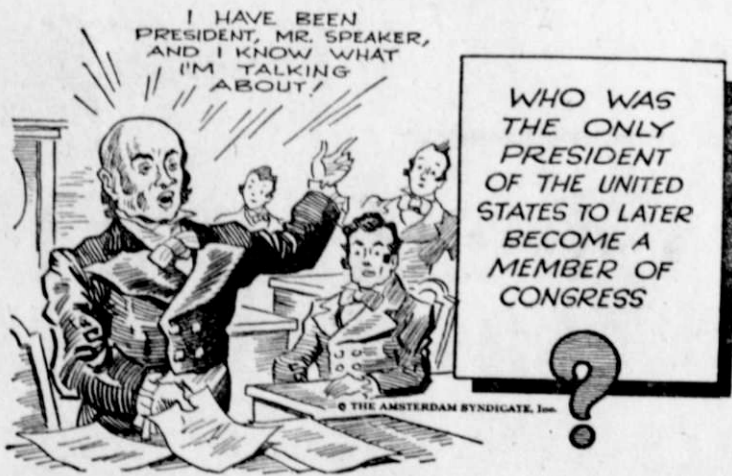
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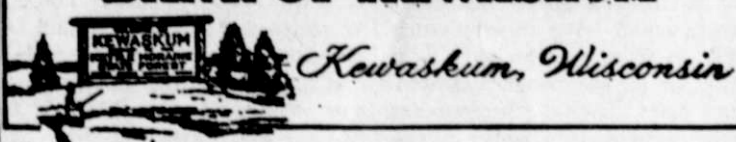

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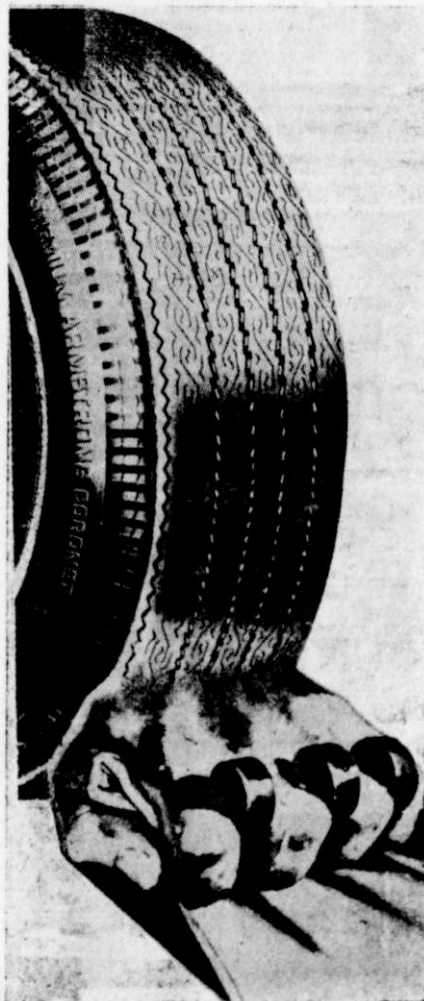

Five Hurt in Four-Car Crash Here
Five other youths were injured in a four vehicle crash on the Kewaskum hill at the south village limits, STH 45 at CTH H, about 1:25 a. m. Saturday.

The accident occurred when a car driven by Gaylord S. DeWitt, 20, of Kewaskum and traveling north, reportedly veered into the southbound lane of traffic when DeWitt apparently fell asleep and his car collided with one driven by Timothy J. Vrana, 20, of R. 2, West Bend, in a head-on manner in the southbound lane just south

of CTH H.

Officers who investigated reported that the lights on the vehicles apparently were knocked out by the impact and a third southbound vehicle, driven by Hiram G. Justman, 19, of Kewaskum, came over the crest of the hill and struck the DeWitt auto which was crossways on the highway. A fourth car, operated by Frank A. Poos, Jr., 18, of R. 1, Kewaskum, also came over the hillcrest and he attempted to veer his car to the right into the west ditch but struck the DeWitt auto, hit for the third time, and then struck the Justman car, pushing it into the ditch.

Injured in the accident were Ralph E. Bier, 18, R. 2, Kewaskum, multiple face and arm lacerations and broken teeth; Vrana, head bump and arm injuries; De-

Witt, forehead lacerations and other cuts and possible concussion; Justman, arm and knee injuries, and Poos, forehead lacerations and knee injuries.

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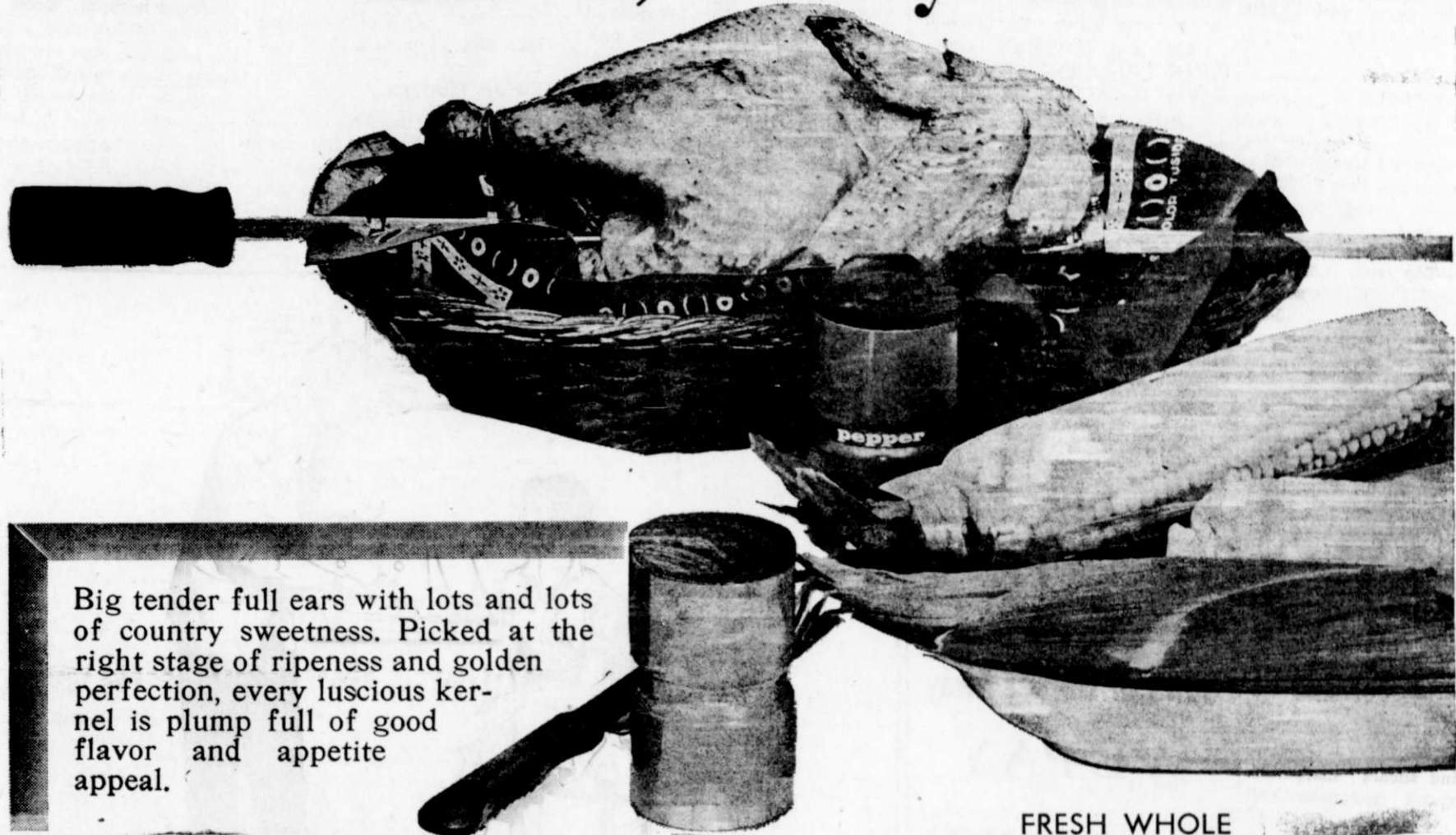

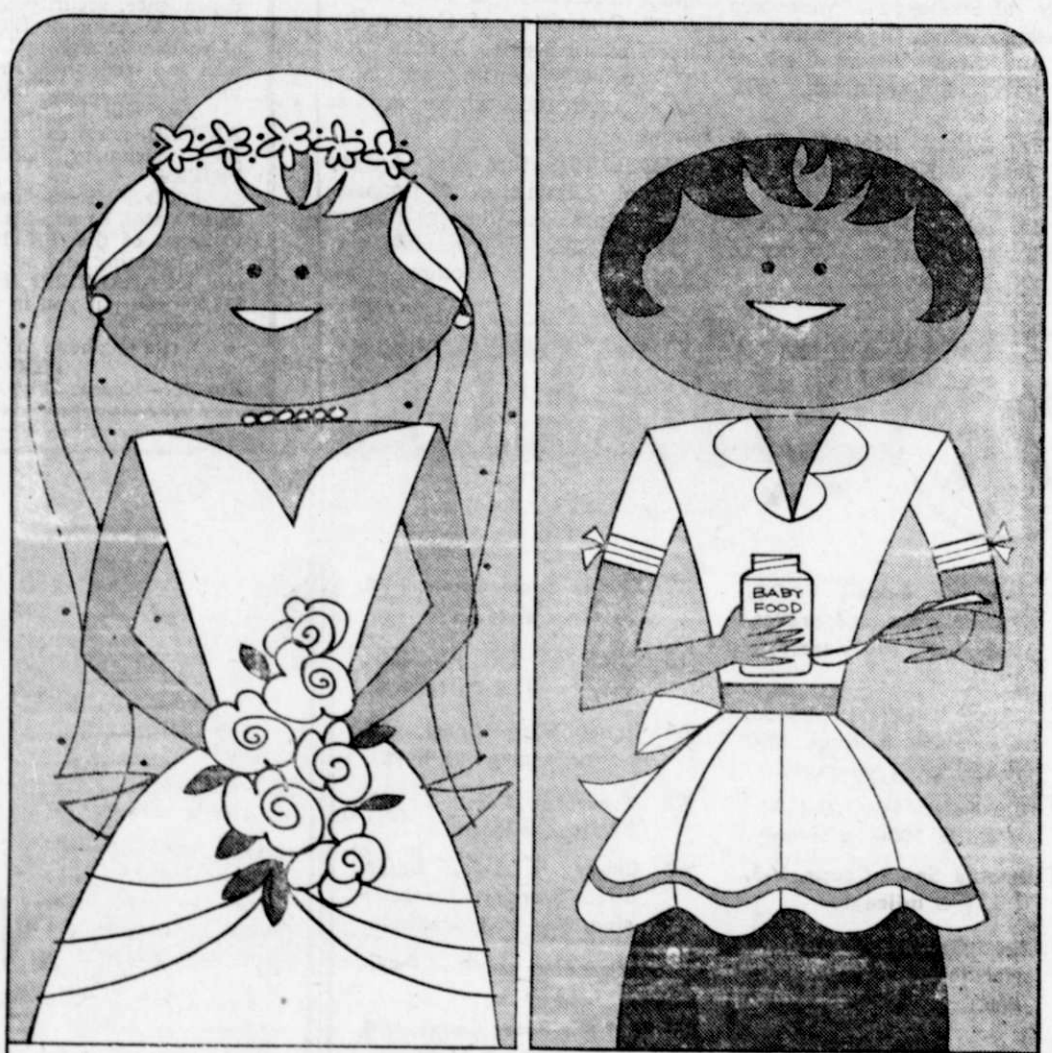
