The hearing is open to all the electors of the district and is held for the purpose of discussing the advantages and disadvantages of district reorganization. The Agency School committee may, as a result of the hearing, order reorgenization, or order a referendum election on the question.

All electors are urged to attend this very important meeting.

WHEREAS, the Coordinating Committee for Higher Education has assigned the operational responsibility to the Regents of the University of Wisconsin, and,

WHEREAS, the Regents of the University of Wisconsin view the University Center System as an integral and important part of the instructional program of the University and welcomes the addition of the West Bend-Washington County Center to that

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

The Regents of the University of Wisconsin express appreciation to the Washington County Board of Supervisors and the Common Council of West Bend for their concern over the educational welfare of the young people and adults of Washington County and for the resolutions indicating their intention to provide funds for the cost of acquiring land for a site and for the construction of a wilding to be construction of a building to be used as a University Center in their region as provided in Wisconsin Statutes 59.07 (61) and 67.04 (1)(a).

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Regents of the University of Wisconsin express their intent to provide the capital equipment directly related to instruction, to maintain an adequate teaching and administrative staff, and to assume responsibility for one-half the janitorial costs of the West Bend-Washington County

RESOLUTION No. 2

A Resolution Concerning the Washington County Guidance Center

WHEREAS, Washington County and Ozaukee County have been jointly operating a Guidance Center since 1955; and

WHEREAS, Ozaukee County has now served notice of its intent to withdraw from said joint operation on January 1, 1966; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of Washington County to continue to operate a Guidance Center;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Washington County Board of Supervisors, that

SECTION I. ESTABLISHMENT. Pursuant to Section 51.36, Wisconsin Statutes 1963, there is established a community mental health agency. Any and all former resolutions concerning the Washington-Ozaukee Guidance Center are hereby repealed, said repeal to be effective January 1, 1966, said Washington-Ozaukee Guidance Center to operate until that date.

SECTION II: NAME. The name of such community mental health agency shall be the Washington County Guidance Center.

SECTION III. PURPOSE. The community mental health agency shall provide the following services:

- Collaborative and co-operative services with public health and other groups for programs for the prevention and treatment of mental illness, mental retardation and other psychiatric disabilities.
- (2) Rehabilitative services for patients suffering from mental or emotional disorders, mental retardation and other psychiatric conditions and particularly for those who have received prior treatment in an in-patient facility.
- (3) Out-patient diagnostic and treatment services.
- (4) Consultative services to schools, courts and health and welfare agencies, both public and private.
- (5) Informational and educational services to the general public and lay and professional groups.
- (6) Such other services as may be within the purview of Sec. 51.36, Wis. Stats, 1963, or amendments thereto, and the rules and regulations of the State Department of Public Welfare.

SECTION IV. BOARD OF DIRECTORS. There shall be a representative governing and policy-making Board of Directors which shall have charge of the operation and administration of the program.

- (1) The Board of Directors shall be composed of nine members, five of whom shall be the members of the County Welfare Board, one of whom shall be the Judge of the County Court, Branch I, and three of whom shall be private citizens.
- (2) Appointments to the Board of Directors shall be made by the County Board of Supervisors, and all actions of the Board of Directors shall be subject to review and approval of the Board of Supervisors.
- (3) The term of office of the citizen members of the Board of Directors shall be 3 years except for those first appointed, one shall be for a term of one year, one for a term of two years, and the remainder for a term of three years. The County Judge of Branch I shall serve during his term of office and the members of the Welfare Board shall serve during their terms of office. Vacancies for unexpired terms shall be filled in the same manner as original appointments. Directors may be removed by the County Board of Supervisors.
- (4) Subject to section 51.36. Wis. Stats, 1963, and any amendments thereof, and rules of the State Department of Public Welfare, the Board of Directors shall have the following powers and duties:
 - (a) Appoint the Administrator, who shall be responsible to the board in the operation of the program.
 - (b) With the co-operation of the Adiministrator, define the program and formulate the necessary policies to implement the program.
 - (c) Estabilsh salaries and personnel policies
 - (d) Review and evaluate the agency services to assure conformance with the basic plan and budget, including periodic reporting to the Director of the State

Department of Public Welfare, the County Board of Supervisors (and appropriate county officials), and when indicated to make recommendations for changes in program or services.

- (e) Assist in arranging and promoting local financial support of the program from private and public sources.
- (f) Assist in arranging co-operating working agreements with other health and welfare services, public and private, and with other educational and judicial agencies.
- (g) Establish patient fee schedules based on ability to pay. If a person who can afford private care applies for clinic services, consultation and diagnostic services may be offered, but any needed treatment services must be obtained from other sources, providing private service is reasonably available.
- (h) Review the fiscal practices, the annual plan and budget and make recommendations thereon.
- Provide that no one be denied services on the basis of race, color or creed, or inability to pay.

SECTION V. FINANCES. The agency and its services shall be financed by such funds as may be available from public and private sources, and the agency is authorized to accept private donations and to request state grants-in-aid in addition to county funds.

- The Board of Directors shall plan its financial operations on a calendar year basis.
- (2) The Board of Directors shall request the necessary appropriations of county funds through the Budget and Finance Committee
- (3) The Board of Directors shall be responsible for the establishment and collection of fees from patients which shall be deposited with the County Treasurer and subject to audit.
- (4) The Board of Directors is authorized to request and negotiate for necessary and available state grants-in-aid.
- (5) The Board of Directors may solicit and accept funds from private sources.

SECTION VI. REPORTS. The Board of Directors shall make an annual report to the County Board of Supervisors as to its program and activities, and shall make such reports as may be required by the Director of the State Department of Public Welfare.

SECTION VII. EFFECTIVE DATE. All provisions of this resolution shall be effective January 1, 1966, except for the provisions of Section IV hereof relating to the appointment of the Board of Directors. Said provision shall be immediately effective and said Board of Directors shall be appointed as soon as possible with instructions to prepare for the establishment of the said center on January 1, 1968.



Mr. James Brown, a member of the university committee, also was called upon and he reminded the Board that the county had authorized a university extension center, jointly with the City of West Bend, and the university committee had made a study of available sites in the vicinity of West Bend and the Pick farm was given a priority over and above all other sites investigated. He stated that the university could use about eighty acres of the eastern portion of this farm, and the western portion of about one hundred acres would be well suited as a park site for the county. He stated that the schedule to be followed in the construction of a university center would require that a site be selected within the next thirty days. In conclusion clusion Mr. Brown stated that a university center and a county park are compatible and have so proven in a number of cases. He also informed the Board that if the county would purchase the entire site and allow the university extension center to be located on a portion of the site, and use the balance of the farm as a park, The West Bend Company would donate \$25,000.00 toward the purchase price. At this point, the chair informed Mr. Ahlers that he could have recourse to the courts if he was not satisfied with the plans of the Highway Commission as they pertain to improve-ments on County Trunk Highway G. Mr. Ahlers asked that his appeal be included in the County Board records, and he was told that his comments as written out would be included in detail.

Discussion then continued regarding the Pick Farm Park site. Supervisor Joe Schmitz suggested that the State Conservation Com-mission be requested to survey the Pick farm and Paradise Valley areas in the hopes that they might acquire land with conservation commission funds. He also stated that flood plains should be investigate as possible park areas, in order that future home sites would not be located in such areas.

Supervisor Fred Sager said that enthusiasm is high in Washington County for the development of parks. He stated that he had visited the Pick farm site and found it very suitable as a park area. He stated, however, that he was not entirely satisfied with the idea that it should be included as a university center site. He thought it should be purchased entirely as a county park, but he stated that he had an open mind, and could be convinced if the merits are explained, that this should be an area to include the university center as well as a county park. Mr. Brown concluded with a comment that both the university and the county would have much to gain by the multiple use in this case. He also stated that it was entirely possible that the park could be expanded to the west and north of the Pick farm.

Representatives of the Amity Leather Co. were present and Mr. Romaine called upon Mr. Tom Rolfs to explain the needs of the Amity Company, as far as land area was concerned. Mr. Rolfs stated that his company was interested in the purchase of about 32 acres, located east of the present West Bend Highway Shop, and lying north of S. T. H. "33." Harold F. Ryan, Work Unit Conservationist U. S. Soil Conservation Service

During the past fiscal year, we were slightly under our goals in new cooperators and conservation plans due to the fact that the work unit conservationist was ill for three months during the year. In regard to application of conservation practices, we were under in some of our goals and exceeded in others. The establishment of contour strips was the lowest in several years due primarily to the heavy winter kill in old alfalfa stands. Many farmers hesitated to lay out strips this spring because they needed the land for hay.

The demand for advisory services by county and local planning boards, developers, architects, real estate dealers, schools and town boards nearly doubled over the previous year and we expect that it will more than double in the 1965-66 fiscal year.

There has also been in increase in the demand for technical assistance in the development of land for private recreation.

In October, 1965, the Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District was fortunate in that the Soil Conservation Service transferred Soil Conservationist Harold Clark to the district from Jefferson County. Harold is a veteran of nearly twenty years of experience with the Soil Conservation Service and is considered as one of the best in Wisconsin.

PERSPECTIVE

State Division of Mental Hygiene

While the Washington-Ozaukec Mental Health Clinic is a local facility to meet local needs, it is part of a coordinated mental health effort, part of a network of state-wide services. The Division of Mental Hygiene of the State Department of Public Welfare is the governing body in the sense that it provides basic philosophical and policy structure. For example: the State Division defines the minimum clinic staff necessary and on these requirements is based its 40 per cent re-imbursement to the county.

A clinic such as ours works in close cooperation with the other State facilities such as Winnebago State Hospital for acute psychiatric treatment, and University Hospitals and Diagnostic Treatment Center for diagnostic and evaluative services.

Other Facilities

When it becomes clear that the clinic cannot provide the treatment needed, we can request help or recommend placement in such facilities as the Boys' and Girls' Schools, the Central and Southern Colonies for the mentally retarded and the Residential Treatment

The Clinic is the consultive and the referring agency and cannot undertake the actual placement of persons. This is the responsibility of the individual, his family, the court, or the local department of public welfare.

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Just as the county facilities are coordinated on a State level, so also are the local facilities within the county. We maintain communication and encourage coordination of efforts between the clinic and the juvenile authority, probation officer, judge, police, sheriff, welfare department, city and county nurses, county hos-

The purpose of these efforts is to provide to the patient as much helpful and efficient service as possible.

Patient Staffings with all staff present Patient interviews are "face to face" interviews with the patients or other members of his family.

Not recorded in the statistics are the many phone contacts with the patient, or family, or conferences with professional personnel. These represent a significant amount of staff time but cannot be computed because they occur on an unplanned basis. While they are not recorded as "INTERVIEWS" they are often an essential part of the patient's total treatment.

Chem-Theraphy

It is widely recognized that drugs have a legitimate use in the treatment of emotional disturbances. A great majority of distressed patients do receive relief from their symtoms through the use of these medications. They are often the primary treatment mode or may be part of the total treatment approach.

During the past year our psychiatrist prescribed and supervised the medication for 118 patients.

Aftercare might best be defined as the follow-up treatment on a regular basis of patients released from mental hospitals.

The clinic is but one of several community agencies which can assist the released patient in staying out of the hospital and re-integrating into family and community life.

Our clinic is helping patients from private and public mental hospitals. Direct supervision on these cases is provided by the psychiatrist and almost always these persons are on medication.

During the past year 31 persons were seen for Aftercare at this clinic. In addition to the all important human benefit, it is economically sound to provide this care.

The cost of hospitalization at Winnebago State Hospital is \$16.50 per day. With one staff interview of perhaps one-half hour's length each month, the person can be maintained outside the hospital. The cost difference is obvious

If we could keep 6 people out of the hospital for one year the saving would be a little over \$36,000.

Dr. Vodegel provided psychiatric consultation to welfare de-partment caseworkers who met weekly with a group of Aftercare patients in group therapy sessions.

We are constantly striving to be more effective and responsive to community needs and to improve individual staff member per-formance. During the past year new developments took place toward this end

We established regular evening hours to be available to those who absolutely cannot come during the day.

We are trying to see people sooner for the initial interview. even though treatment cannot begin immediately. This allows us to come to know the family, spot and deal immediately with emer-gencies, and to work with other agencies, such as the school, on the patient's behalf while he is awaiting regular treatment. This "immediate intake" policy began in March of 1965. We still have not caught up with the waiting list, but people are being seen much sooner than before.

Our secretary attended the first state-wide conference of clinic secretaries in June of 1965. Our Mrs. Risse not only attended this meeting, but was in fact instrumental in creating it and bringing it to realization. It was a success, ideas were shared, knowledge gained and given. It will undoubtedly become an annual affair. This will surely improve the secretarial staff morale and functioning efficiency, and speaks highly for their interest in improving neir professional stature. They are actually the first contact with the patient in the waiting room

A part-time psychiatric social worker was hired to work in Port Washington, in an office graciously made available by the county nurse, Mrs. Daane. He was there to do intake interviews and brief term treatment with Ozaukee County families who could not come to West Bend, or who would have had to wait much longer if this person were not available. This position was ably filled by Mr. Bernard McBride, Casework Supervisor of Washington County Department of Public Welfare. He began work in February of 1965 and worked 10 hours a week

The Chairman introduced Rev. Maschmeier, Chairman of the Guidance Board for 1966, and he made several comments regarding the importance of this center.

Resolution No. 21 was given second reading. Mr. Sager, Chairman of the Park Committee, gave a brief resume of the history on the interest in parks in Washington County, Mr. Sager pointed out the need for a county park and the method of meeting the costs by application for state and federal aids. He said the Pick Farm Site was a prime site, so designated by the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission, and did lend itself well for the purpose of developing a campus for the university, as well as a park possibility. Mr. Dettmann inquired whether other contributions toward a park had been received, but he was told no other offer had been received in addition to the \$25,000.00 contribution made by The West Bend Co. Mr. Cornelius Gundrum inquired whether this area would be annexed to the city. He was informed whether this area would be annexed to the city. He was informed that the portion designated as a university site would have to be annexed, since water and sewer services would be required. Mr. Baltus Rolfs, a seasonal resident on Cedar Lake, was present and he stressed the need for parks. He called upon Leo Thiefenthaler, another seasonal resident of Cedar Lake, and one who has done much for the development of parks in Milwaukee County. He spoke briefly to the Board on the urgency to preserve some of the natural beauty in our county. WHEREAS, the said Ridge Run Farm is for sale at a price of \$950 per acre for those areas which are adaptable for park purposes;

WHEREAS, The West Bend Company has offered a donation of \$25,000 to Washington County to assist in the purchase of said property and federal funds are available upon application by the

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the people of Washington County to take necessary steps to purchase the said property.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of Washington County, that the Chairman of the County Board and the County Clerk be, and hereby are, authorized to take appropriate steps to purchase 100 acres, more or less, of the area known as the Ridge Run Farm, said area to be the westerly and southerly part thereof, at a price of \$950 per acre.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the sum of \$95,000.00 be and is hereby appropriated from the General Fund of Washington County to pay for the said purchase; and

Summarized Report of County Judge, Branch I and Judge of the Juvenile Court — Register in Probate and Clerk of the Juvenile Court

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors Washington County, Wisconsi Centlemen

The following is a resume of all new proceedings filed and acted upon by the County Judge of Branch I (which is by Statutes designated as the Probate Court) and also of matters had before the Judge of the Juvenile Court for the period commencing October 1, 1964 and ending October 1, 1965 wherein the County of Washington has become liable for costs and fees with the nature and results of the same as follows:

I. MENTAL CASES:

A total of 57 mental cases requiring court involvement with either commitment to or admission of 47 adults to the Winnebago State Hospital or Washington County Hospital and of 3 minors to the Winnebago State Hospital and Central Wisconsin Colony and Training School

II. HOSPITAL CASES:

In this area, there were 16 certifications to hospitals with 1 being admitted at Rocky Knoll Sanatorium and 15 to University Hospitals. It is significant to note at this point that for the previous year covering the same period of time, there were 39 such certifica-tions and that undoubtedly more people are covered by sickness and hospitalization insurance benefits than heretofore.

III. JUVENILE COURT MATTERS

A total of 312 petitions to determine status were authorized for filing or complaints filed involving alleged delinquent, neglected or dependent children or traffic law violators of which total 283 constitute new proceedings and an additional 29 matters were before the Court involving youth repeaters in the Juvenile Court requiring new and additional consideration. Matters were disposed of by placement in foster homes or by supervision in of by placement in foster homes or by supervision in their own homes by the Washington County Department of Public Welfare

or legal custody given to the State Department of Public Welfare or legal custody given to the State Department of Public Welfare with confinement at the State School for Boys at Wales or for Girls at Oregon; a restriction, suspension or revocation of operator's driving privileges. In 15 of these instances, termination of the rights of either one or both parents took place with the State Department of Public Welfare being named as guardian. With but a few exceptions, all violations and offenses involving out-ofcounty juveniles were referred to the County of residences except-ing those matters which were contested and disposed of by this Court. An impressive number of juvenile offenses were alerted to the Court's attention in an informal manner without requiring the filing of petitions or complaints. In most instances, the child and parents were counselled with the finding that no further action was warranted or deemed necessary and with the express admoni-tion that if there were a repetition of further misconduct of any kind, more drastic action on the part of the Court would result.

IV. MISCELLANEOUS MATTERS:

(A) Marriage license dispensations were issued to 17 couples and the statutory fee therefore was in most cases not required due to the military service status of one of the parties and in all other respects was paid by the applicant directly to the County Treasurer and receipts were obtained for the

- For administration, including salaries, per diem, office and travel expense of the County Highway Committee, the County Highway Commissioner, his clerks and assistants not paid from construction or maintenance funds, the sum of Thirty Thousand and no/100 Dollars (\$30,000.00)
- For Snow Removal and Snow, Drift and Ice Prevention on the

SECTION IV. WHEREAS appropriations are made herein, in addition to the amounts to be received from the State and available for work in the County under Section 20.420 of the Statutes.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT the County Board does hereby levy a tax on all of the property in the County to meet such appropria tions as follows:

(1) For the various purposes as set forth in Section III hereof the sum of Four Hundred Sixty Thousand and no/100 Dollars (\$460,000.00)

SECTION VII. WHEREAS the County Highway Committee and the County Highway Commissioner are charged with the duty and responsibility of carrying out the construction and maintenance of highways for which provision is made, and other related supervisory and administrative duties,

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Highway Commissioner shall have authority to employ, discharge, suspend, or reinstate any such personnel as he deems necessary for such purposes, provided, however, that the County Highway Committee may by action recorded in its minutes determine the number of persons to be hired and may at any time by action so recorded order the County Highway Commissioner to employ, discharge, suspend or reinstate any such person. The term "personnel" or "person" shall include all national persons the county of the co all patrolmen, laborers, foremen, clerks, stenographers or other employees necessary to carry on such activities.

SECTION VIII. WHEREAS for the construction and main tenance of highways, including the removal and control of snow and ice, it becomes necessary from time to time to purchase equipment, the nature of and necessity for which can not be accurately antici-

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the County Highway Committee is hereby authorized pursuant to Section 83.015 (2) of the Statutes, to purchase without further authority, and to the extent that revolving funds accumulated for such purpose or appropriations made for such purpose are available, such highway equipment as they deem necessary to properly carry on the work, and to trade or sell such old equipment as may be considered to be for the best interests of the county.

Washington County Underwriters' Association

The Insurance Committee Washington County Board West Bend, Wisconsin

Gentlemen:

We, the undersigned committee, members of the Washington County Underwriters Association, are pleased to present for your consideration our annual report of insurance coverage for the County. We wish to do this efficiently and economically to assist County officials.

As in prior years, we have used as a basis for our report the 1958 appraisal as made for the County by the Rau Appraisal Company covering the County buildings. The buildings included in their appraisal report are the Courthouse Annex, Historical Society and Civil Defense Building, County Hospital and Auxiliary Buildings, County Home, West Bend Highway Shop and Slinger Highway Shop, and 4-H Club Barns. The value of the new Courthouse and Jail was taken from figures supplied by the Office of the County Clerk.

With reference to the 1958 appraisal, we feel it was pudgment on the part of the members of the County Board to have had this appraisal made as it helps to determine the replacement and net sound values of the respective County buildings. As a suggestion, it would be a good policy to bring these appraisal values up to date.

Comparative Costs charts as furnished by the Engineering Departments of Insurance Companies show that building costs have increased approximately 1.03% since our last report. There is no apparent indication of a reversal of this advance in the coming months. We feel that the insurance presently carried complies with the insurance requirements as revealed in our analysis of building costs

inal referred to above did not include valuations of The appraisal referred to above did not include valuations of contents located in any of the above buildings listed. We again suggest that the various department heads report to your Committee as to the value of contents of the various departments located in the respective buildings so that the proper insurance

The insurance applying to the County buildings and contents was rewritten as of December 1, 1962, under the Public and Institutional Property Plan. The coverages provided insure against the hazards of fire, lightning, extended coverage, vandalism and ma-licious mischief, subject to a \$100.00 deductible applying to all losses except fire and lightning

The total insurance amount is blanket on all real and personal property of every description owned by the County; on personal property of others for which the Insured assumed liability prior to loss; on the Insured's liability imposed by law for loss to personal property of others, and on the Insured's interest in personal property belonging in whole or in part to others.

The building and contents "Statement of Values" are filed with the Fire Insurance Rating Bureau and is used as a basis for the insurance. (A copy of the latest filing is attached).

The writing of the insurance under this plan has not only provided better coverage but has also resulted in a considerable premium saving to the County.

A separate policy provides coverage on the Slinger Oil Tank Station. This policy as written in the amount of \$15,000.00 uses the Oil Distribution Station form which provides coverage to "real and personal property both above and below ground including underground tanks, contents of tanks, piping and connections, petro-leum products, awnings, signs and metal smokestacks."

Public Liability Insurance

This coverage is written on a comprehensive policy form. It cludes Contractors' Liability covering highway operations; Owners' and Tenants' Liability on all County real estate, buildings, elevators; and Automobile Liability with the following limits:

Personal Injury

\$200,000 per person \$500,000 per accident

Property Damage

\$100,000 per accident \$100,000 per project

The present liability limits appear to be adequate for most claims. We do know that claims are becoming more numerous since the waiver of immunity from tort liability on the part of municipal the waiver of immunity from tort liability on the part of municipal corporations with the emphasis being placed on increased liability limits for insurance coverages written on governmental units. We recommend an umbrella liability policy which would provide liability coverage up to \$1,000,000.00 in addition to the above listed limits. This latter policy would also pick up many other liability hazards in cases where the primary coverage is inadequate or contains exclusions for a specific claim or incident. This coverage is usually written with a \$25,000.00 deductible. We would be very happy to have insurance company engineers make a survey of the County exposures and submit a quotation for your consideration. We recommend that the Board avail themselves of this additional protection.

Workmen's Compensation

The County, to date, has again elected to provide their own workmen's compensation and employers' liability coverage.

The increased number of employees of the County over the years, may result in an increase in the number of claims. It is suggested that consideration again be given to having such coverage provided by a private carrier.

All boilers and compressed air tanks are insured in the amount of \$100,000.00 for damage to County property and the property of others, and for personal injury to the public, excluding em-ployees who are covered under Workmen's Compensation. Credit has been allowed for seasonal use of some equipment.

Automobiles and Trucks

The County's investment in passenger cars is covered for full value under the comprehensive form. Trucks are fully covered against loss by fire only. Windstorm and Hail damage may be added, if desired, at a rate of 10 cents per \$100,00. This coverage applies regardless of where the loss occurs. County owned cars have Comprehensive coverage. There is no collision insurance on any of the County's cars or trucks. The total insurance on the automobiles and trucks is in the amount of \$405,250.00.

Other Highway Equipment

This equipment is fully covered under a floater policy against loss by fire, lightning, windstorm, flood, collapse of bridges, collision, etc., regardless of location. This equipment is insured for \$663,390.00. Theft is covered subject to a \$25.00 deductible clause.

Radio Equipment on Cars - Guns - Cameras

There is a floater policy covering radio equipment in the amount of \$25,915.00 on sherif's and police cars as well as eight mobile radios of the Highway Department for full value, substantially as above. The radio tower and equipment in the concrete block control house are included in the floater policy. There is also a floater policy covering guns of the sheriff's department in the amount of \$795.00. Camera equipment of the sheriff's department is insured for \$535.00 under the floater policy.

Bonds for all County officials and employees are properly filed. It is suggested that the bonds for the Clerk of Courts and other qualified officials, whose offices are now handling additional funds, be increased to statutory requirements.

Money and Securities

Money and securities of the County are now covered in the amount of \$3,000.00 with a limit on money of \$2,000.00 while in the premises or being carried by a messenger and a limit of \$4,466.00 and \$3,466.00 on money outside of the premises. During the month of March these limits are increased to \$8,000.00 with a limit on money of \$7,000.00 to meet the additional needs during tax collection time.

It is a pleasure to work with your Committee. It is always our desire to give the County Board the best insurance service possible.

ORDINANCE No. 17

An Ordinance Controlling Removal of U. S. Public Land Survey Corners

The County Board of Supervisors of the County of Washington do ordain as follows: SECTION 1: Preamble

Many roads are still being constructed or improved within Washington County, and especially some Town Roads, without proper regard for the preservation and protection of the U. S. Public Land Survey Section Corners, Quarter Section Corners, and Interior Corners, as the case may be, and all remaining physical evidence of the correct position of the corners is thereby being rapidly obliterated and destroyed. The location of all real property boundaries depends ultimately upon the location of these corners, and the accurate retracement of property boundaries will become more and more difficult and expensive as the corners are lost as will the accurate mapping of property boundaries by public agencies and the conduct of engineering surveys for the planning, design, and construction of public works.

SECTION 2: Perpetuation of Land Marks

No roads, either Town, County, State, or Federal shall be constructed, improved or resurfaced, or new roads constructed or surfaced within Washington County without first having the U. S. Public Land Survey Sections Corners, Quarter Section Corners, or Interior Corners for the sections pertaining to such roads recovered or established by the County Surveyor or any registered surveyor, and these corners are to be referenced by points set outside the limits of construction in such manner that the corners can be accurately re-established after construction, and a copy of the references shall be presented to the Washington County Surveyor for recording in the County Court House.

SECTION 3. Penalty

Any person or persons, including any corporation or municipal corporation, who shall violate the provisions of this ordinance, shall be subject to a forfeiture not to exceed \$250.00, and in default of payment thereof, to imprisonment in the cunnty jail for a period of not more than one year.

This ordinance shall be effective upon passage and publication.

REPORT No. 25

To The Honorable Board of Supervisors of Washington County Ladies and Gentlemen:

It is our pleasure to submit the financial report for the year 1965 to you. The year 1965 has been a fairy typical year in that previous trends in our program are again quite noticeable. These trends concern medical care, which continues to be the largest

single item in our budget and also continues to rise each year. Also, the money payments, those amounts spent to meet the needs of daily living, are decreasing.

Although there seems to be some constant factors that are operational in our work, we are presently experiencing a period of change. The Medicare program and other influences all have had an effect on our operations. It is possible that we will see vast changes in our medical programs as the Governor has appointed a task force whose assignment is to study and make recommendations to the legislature regarding implementation of Title XIX of the Social Security Amendment of 1965.

Among other things, Title XIX provides for a new plan for providing medical care for all medically indigent persons. This plan will be financed by State and Federal funds and is presently available to the States on a voluntary basis until 1970. If such a program is not adopted by 1970, there will be no further medical reimbursement from the Federal Government under the Kerr-Mills plan. In other words a combined plan for meeting the medical needs of medically indigent persons must be established by 1970 or clse there will be no Federal reimbursement toward medical costs.

Title XIX requires legislative enactment at the state level and thus we must await these decisions before we know how we will be affected.

Section 4. Section 17.06 (A) (1) be amended by striking paragraphs (b), (d), (e), (f), (g), (i), subsection (b); and paragraph 17.06 (h) by striking the words any of the above uses when situated in the same dweling including." Section 5. Section 17.06 (D) (2) (a) be amended by striking

the number '30,000' and substituing the number '40,000;' and in Section 17.06 (b) striking the number '150' and substituting the Section 6. Section 17.07 (A) (1) be amended by striking paragraphs (c), (d), (e), (f) and (g).

Section 17.08 (D) (1) (a) (1) be amended by striking the number '850' and substituting the number '1050;' and Section 17.08 (D) (1) (a) (2) be amended by striking the number (2) (a) by striking the number '20,000' and substituting the number '20,000' and substituting '40,000' and in Section 17.08 (D) (2) (b) by striking the number '110' and substituting the number '175,' and in Section 17.08 (D) (1) (a) (2) by striking the number '900' and substituting the number '1400.

Section 9. Section 17.03 (D) (8) be amended by striking the words 'at least 15 inches in diameter and 20 feet in length and' and substituting the words 'of corregated metal or reinofreed concrete culvert pipe of a size approved by the Town Board.

Section 10. Section 17.03 (H) (1) (a) (1) be amended by striking the number '40' and substituting the number '33;' and Section 17.03 (H) (1) (a) (2) by striking the entire subsection and substituting therefore the words 'there shall be no base set-back line in platted subdivisions and the set-back shall be 50 feet from the edge of the street as platted.'

Section 11. There is created a Section 17.03 (H) (1) (a) (5) which shall read as follows 'on al cu de sacs there shall be no base set-back line and the set-back shall be 50 feet from the line creating the exterior boundaries of the cul de sac."

(a) No camp, boat, house, or other trailer, bus, boat, truck, nor more than 2 passenger motor vehicles may be stored on a lot in Class "A" and Class "B" residence district except within a garage or other enclosed storage structure; provided. however, that open storage may be permitted with the approval of the Town Planning Commission if it is completely shield and the town riaming commission in it is completely sheld-ed by landscaping, walls or fencing so as to screen such objects at all seasons of the year from the street or from adjoining properties; and provided such storage is not between any portion of the building and an abutting street.

(b) No enclosed storage of materials, equipment, or supplies shall be permitted where such storage is unsightly to the surrounding view.

Section 15. Subsection 17.03 (L) (2) is amended by striking the entire subsection and substituting therefore the following:

Parking of Trucks, Trailers, and Equipment. No truck, commercial trailer, house or camp trailer, or other vehicular equipment of a commercial or industrial nature shall be parked regularly on a lot in any district except Local Business, General Business, Limited Industrial and General Industrial Districts except as hereinafter specifically provided or as follows

(a) Agricultural equipment shall be permitted without limitation where accessory to a permitted agricultural use. (b) One panel or pick-up truck shall be permitted in any District.

(c) Unenclosed parking of house or camp trailers, without habitation, shall not be permitted for more than 3 consecutive or 10 cumulative days in any 12 month period.

Section 16. There is created Section 17.03 (J) (2) (d) which shall read as follows: 'In determining the minimum average width of a lot, such measurement may be made by a line perpendicular to the line establishing the average depth of the lot, at any point where '2 the required minimum lot area would fall on each side of such line establishing the minimum average width. On a cul de sac the minimum average width shall be measured at the set-back line.'

The rate for 1965 for the municipality (Washington County) was 4.59 for Wisconsin Retirement plus 3.625 for Federal Social Security, or a total of 8.215%. The employee's and official's contribution was 3% for the Wisconsin Retirement Fund and 3.625% for the Federal Social Security, or a total of 6.625%

During 1966, the rate for the municipality will be 7.14 for the Wisconsin Retirement plus 4.20% for the Federal Social Security or a total of 11.34%. The employee's and official's contribution will 4.5% for the Wisconsin Retirement and 4.2% for the Federal Social Security, or a total of 8.7%.

The County Judge, as per state statutes, is included in a separate classification. If a county pays a supplementary salary to the County Judge, as Washington County does as per Resolution No. the County Judge, as Washington County does as per Resolution No. 39, effective December 31, 1963, then the County must include the supplementary salary upon the County report to the Wisconsin Retirement Fund. The County must make the employer contribution for the supplementary salary at the county rate of 7.14%. The judges contribute 5% until their combined state and county salary reaches \$6,600.00. After the salary reaches that point, the county judge's contribution is increased to 7% to the Wisconsin Retirement Fund. The judges will contribute the maximum of Retirement Fund. The judges will contribute the maximum of the rate of \$6,600.00 for Federal \$277.20 in 1966 based on the rate of 4.2% of \$6,600.00 for Federal Social Security. Washington County will contribute 4.2% toward the first \$6,600.00 of the judges' combined state and supplementary salary.

The Court Reporter, as per state statutes, is included in a separate classification. If a county pays a supplementary salary to the court reporters, as Washington County does as per Resolution No. 40, effective January 1, 1964, then the county must include the supplementary salary upon the county report to the Wisconsin Retirement Fund. The county must make the employer contribution for the supplementary salary at the county rate of 7.14%. The court reporters contribute 4.5%. The court reporters will contribute the maximum of \$277.20 in 1966 based on the rate of 4.2% of \$6,600.00. Washington County will contribute 4.2% toward the first \$6,600.00 of the court reporters' combined state and supplementary salary for Federal Social Security.

The traffic police contribute 5.5% to the Wisconsin Retirement Fund. They also make a contribution of 4.2% to Social Security.

Rules of Order of the Board of Supervisors of Washington County

Section 1. The Board shall choose by ballot one of their members to occupy the chair. He shall be styled "Chairman of the Board" and shall hold this office during one year, or during the time that said Board was elected to serve. He shall take the chair at the hour to which the Board is adjourned and call members to order, and if a quorum be present he shall direct the minutes of the preceding meeting to be read and mistakes, if any, corrected. He shall preserve order and decorum, and shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board. He shall, unless otherwise directed by the Board, appoint all committees; he shall vote on the calls of yeas and nays. The Board shall elect one of their members as vice-chairman. In the absence of the chairman and vice-chairman, the Board will appoint a chairman pro tem.

Section 2. Any two members may make a call of the Board and require absent members to be sent for; but a call of the Board can not be made after the voting has commenced, and the call of the Board being ordered and the absentees noted, the doors shall be closed and no member permitted to leave the room until the report of the sheriff be received and acted upon, or further proceedings under the call be dispensed with a vote of the majority of the members elect

Section 3. All questions shall be put in this form. Those who are of the opion (as the case may be) say "aye," those of the contrary opinion say "no," and in doubtful cases any members may call for a division.

Section 4. When a motion is made and seconded it shall be stated by the chairman or clerk previous to debate. If any member requires it, all motions, except to adjourn, postponed or commit, shall be in writing. Any motion may be withdrawn by consent of the Board before the decision for amendment.

Section 5. Every member present, when a question is put or when his name is called, shall vote unless the Board shall, for special cause, excuse him; but it shall not be in order for a member to be excused after the Board has commenced voting.

Section 6. A motion to adjourn shall always be considered in order and be not debatable, and a call for the previous question and a motion to lay on the table, shall be decided without debate: but a motion to adjourn shall not be received when the Board is voting on another question.

Section 7. When any member is about to speak in debate; or deliver any matter to the Board, he shall arise from his chair and respectfully address himself to the chairman and shall confine himself to the question under the debate and avoid personality.

Section 8. When two or more members shall arise at once, the chairman shall name the member who is to speak first.

Section 9. No committee shall absent themselves by reason of their appointment during the sitting of the Board without special leave.

Section 10. Every resolution or other matter shall be introduced on leave and referred to the appropriate committee if considered necessary. All resolutions shall be laid over for a second reading before voted upon. All resolutions carrying an appropriation shall, after the first reading, be referred to the budget committee for their recommendation as to its effect, upon the same day that it is introduced except by suspension of the rules.

Section 11. When a motion or question has once been made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall, at any time on the same or succeeding day, be in order for any member of the majority, or when the Board is equally divided, for a member who voted in the negative, to make a reconsideration thereof.

A motion to reconsider being put and lost shall not be renewed.

Section 12. No member or officer of the Board shall be permitted to read newspapers or magazines within the bar of the Board while the Board is in session.

Section 13. All resolutions brought in by any member or committee shall be endorsed by the member of the committee bringing the same.

Section 14. When a member is called to order, he shall sit down and shall not speak except in explanation, until the chairman shall have determined whether he is in order or not and every question or order shall be decided by the chairman, subject to an appeal to the Board by any member, and if a member be called to order for words spoken, the exceptional words shall be taken down in writing, that the chairman and the Board may be better enable to indee

Section 15. A majority of all members elected to the Board must be present to constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and three of their number, however, can adjourn from time to time and have a power to compel the attendance of absent members.

Section 16. Any committees required to or entitled to report upon a subject referred to them may make a majority and minority report.

Section 17. All appropriations of money shall require the affirmative vote of not less than a majority of the members present and shall be voted for by the roll call vote, and entered among the proceedings of the Board. In all resolutions where a roll call vote has been requested, or is required, the names of all members voting thereon be published in the annual report and that said report show which members voted for or against said resolution.

Section 18. The following standing committees shall be appointed by the chairman of the County Board and each committee shall consist of the number of members and its duties shall be as follows:

BOARD OF PUBLIC WELFARE — Shall supervise the working of the Public Welfare Department and shall be the policy making body determining the broad outlines and principles governing the administration of the functions, duties, and powers assigned to the Department by Wisconsin Statutes and County Board delegation. The Board of Public Welfare shall also supervise the Washington County Guidance Center. The Board of Public Welfare shall consist of five members elected by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to Resolution No. 62, enacted February 21, 1955.

COURT CLAIMS — To audit all justice of the peace accounts and dockets; to consist of five members.

GENERAL CLAIMS — To audit all other accounts which are not enumerated above; to consist of five members.

FINANCE AND BUDGET COMMITTEE — To take care of all matters which come under the heading of finance. The preliminary budget of Washington County is to be presented to the County Board on or before November 1, and the final budget is to be presented to the Board before the end of November session. The committee is to consist of five members.

EQUALIZATION COMMITTEE — To take care of the equalization of taxes of Washington County. All County Board members, as a committee of the whole, shall act on this committee.

COUNTY INSTITUTIONS — To supervise the welfare of the Washington County Hospital and the Washington County Home; to consist of five members.

SALARY COMMITTEE — To supervise all salaries paid to Washington County officials and employees and traffic patrolmen, except Welfare Department personnel, Extension Department heads and Professional Employees of the Guidance Center, to consist of professional Employees of the Guidance Center, to consist of the Committee, the Chairman of the Finance and Budget Committee, the Chairman of the Institutions Committee and the Chairman of the County Board and three other members.

EDUCATION — To provide aid for public schools, supervising teachers, and anything else pertaining to education; to consist of five members.

COUNTY FAIRS — To supervise the county's fairs and take care of the supervision and maintenance of the fair buildings of Washington County; to consist of three members.

AGRICULTURE — To take care of the agricultural activities and 4-H Club activities of Washington County; to consist of five members.

PUBLIC PROPERTY — To have the supervision of the court house, jail and annex of Washington County and the equipment therein, and the printing of Washington County; to consist of five members.

INSURANCE COMMITTEE — To handle all the insurance of Washington County; to consist of the following five members: chairman of the County Board, chairman of the Finance and Budget Committee, chairman of the Highway Committee, chairman of the County Institutions Committee, and chairman of the County Fairs Committee.

SHERIFF'S COMMITTEE — To set hours of work, duties and general rules of employment of traffic patrolment, radio operators and jailers; to consist of five members.

HIGHWAY COMMITTEE shall be elected as provided by the Wisconsin Statutes, shall consist of three members and have charge of the supervision and maintenance of all county highway buildings and shall have such further duties and powers as provided by law.

No person shall be appointed to standing committees of the County Board except members of the County Board unless where the law provides that certain other persons shall be appointed.

Section 19. No rule shall be suspended or amended without concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Section 20. Any member of the County Board elected to the Highway Committee shall, as soon as he becomes a member of such Highway Committee, be ineligible to act on any other committee; his position on such other committee shall be automatically vacated and the chairman of the County Board shall immediately appoint successors to such vacated positions on the various committees; except for members of the Insurance Committee, when the Board meets as a committee of the whole, or as otherwise designated by the rules of order.

Section 21. No petition shall be considered by the County Board of Washington County unless such petition be sponsored by and signed by a member of such board. No petition for the construction or repair of roads or bridges in Washington County shall be considered by the County Board of Washington County unless such petition shall be signed by a majority of the members of the town, village or city board or boards where such construction or repairs is to be done.

Section 22. After the minutes of the preceding day have been read and opportunity has been given to correct, the following order of business shall be followed:

- 1. Resolutions may be offered and considered.
- 2. Reports of committees.
- 3. Memorials and other documents
- After one hour has passed, then the unfinished business on the chairman's table may be taken up and considered.

Section 23. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Robert's Rules of Order shall govern this Board in all cases in which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the rules and orders made by this Board.

Section 24. The date for the elections by the members of the County Board of Supervisors shall be fixed on the opening day of the November session of said Board, except as otherwise provided by law, and except the election of the Highway Committee, who shall be elected at the April session.

The following procedure shall be followed for the election of all members of the Highway Committee and other elections by the County Board of Supervisors. Under this procedure only one office will be filled on one series of ballots.

Nominations shall be made by written ballot. The three men receiving the highest number of votes on such nominating ballot shall be declared nominated and no other names shall be considered or recognized in such election as a candidate.

In the event of a tie, nominees tied shall be declared nominated. If one member receives a majority of all votes cast in the nominating ballot, provided such ballot was a written ballot, he shall be declared elected; if no member receives a majority, a ballot shall next be taken for the election of first committee member, and if one of the three nominees receives more than one-half of all votes. he shall be declared elected. In the event that no nominee receives more than one-half of all votes cast, a third ballot shall be taken on the two candidates receiving the highest total number of votes cast and the person then receiving the plurality of votes shall be declared elected.

In case of a tie on final ballot, lots shall be drawn by the two persons tied.

Section 25. Instead of adjourning at noon, the Board shall recess to a definite hour in the afternoon and any member, not answering to roll call, may ask unanimous consent of the Board to be marked present and the Board may grant such request if
