Schultz, 1528 Fond du Lac ave., Kewaskum. The car was parked in Schultz' back yard. Langston also admitted taking an electric drill from the warehouse at Campbell's restaurant. The thefts were committed between 6:20 p. m. Thursday and 7:45 a. m. Friday and the total value of the items was estimated at \$125.00.

At 8:30 a. m. Saturday Chief of Police Roland Pledl arrested Langston as a suspect in the theft. He was picked up behind the Kewaskum Frozen Foods plant. After questioning he admitted the theft. At 10:30 a. m. he was taken into custody for larceny and removed to the county jail, where he appeared Monday in Branch 2 of county court on the charge. His case is being continued. All of the stolen property was recovered and returned to the owners.

Shed, 25 Chickens, Award Nurses Scholarship to Wendy Weiss

An early morning fire of undetermined origin last Friday destroyed a large shed, about 20 by 40 feet in size, an automobile, 25 chickens and other small farm implements and tools stored in the building on the farm occupied by Murray McEwen about two miles west of Kewaskum on Hwy. 28.

Another larger shed or barn, about 25 feet away from the one leveled by the blaze, also started to burn on the northeast corner but firemen quickly extinguished it. This shed was next to the large barn on the farm which also would have caught fire in a short time if firemen had not arrived when they did. There was no chance of saving the leveled shed, which was entirely engulfed in flames when firemen arrived. Efforts were confined to soaking the house and other buildings to prevent them from catching fire. After this was accomplished firemen doused the remaining flames and embers of the destroyed shed before returning to the fire station.

The alarm was received at 1:15 a. m. and was turned in by a passing motorist. The farm buildings and property are owned by Lloyd Backhaus of R. 2, Kewaskum. Water was hauled to the scene in the firemen's tank truck and 2,200 gallons were used. Firemen remained at the scene almost two hours.

Trailer Crashes Into New Wigwam Addition Monday

The nearly completed new addition to the Wigwam Supper club and restaurant, formerly a drive-in, on South Fond du Lac ave., was damaged at 8:50 a. m. Monday when a four wheel trailer towed by a tractor driven by Walter Krueger, 48, of the town of Auburn, R. 2, Campbellsport, unhitched and crashed into the front of the building. The tractor and trailer are owned by Farnco, Inc. of Kewaskum.

The tractor, which was towing a trailer loaded with fertilizer, was southbound on Fond du Lac ave. when the pin on the spreader unhitched and it broke away from the tractor. The trailer mounted the curb and veered into the front of the Wigwam building, ripping two holes in the outer wall of the structure and causing other damage. There was no personal injury.

An estimated \$1,000 damage to the new building resulted. According to William A. Edwards, operator of the business, the entire wall will have to be replaced.

Mrs. Clara Herman, 76, of Kewaskum suffered bruises to her head and body when she was struck by a car driven by Lynn L. Honeck, 17, of R. 2, Kewaskum, at 5:10 p. m. Friday at the intersection of Main st. and Fond du Lac ave. as she was crossing the street. She was taken to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, for treatment.

According to Chief of Police Roland Pledl, Miss Honeck was southbound on Fond du Lac ave. and made a left turn onto Main st. when she struck Mrs. Herman with the front of her auto. The pedestrian was on the crosswalk about eight feet south of the safety island at the intersection.

Harlan Pergande, 19, Milwaukee, suffered cut lips and a possible skull injury at 4:50 p. m. Saturday when a car driven by Robert J. Haidlinger, 18, West Allis, traveling west on STH 28 left the highway after crossing all four lanes of Hwy. 41 and came to rest on the south side of Hwy. 28. 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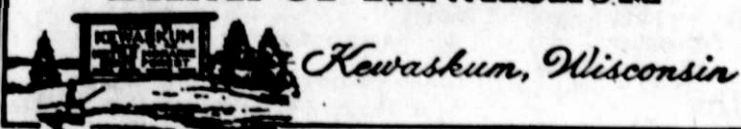

He was born July 10, 1922, at Jericho, Wis. and married the former Janet M. Hughes at St. Matthew's church, Campbellsport, on Aug. 25, 1948. Following their marriage the couple lived in Campbellsport for several years, and then moved to Kewaskum. They resided in this village for six years, during which time the Buchels operated the Sportsmen's Bar at the intersection of Main st. and Fond du Lac ave., before moving to Fillmore 12 years ago. Mr. Buchel was chief inspector at Bilson Bros. in Plymouth for the past six years.

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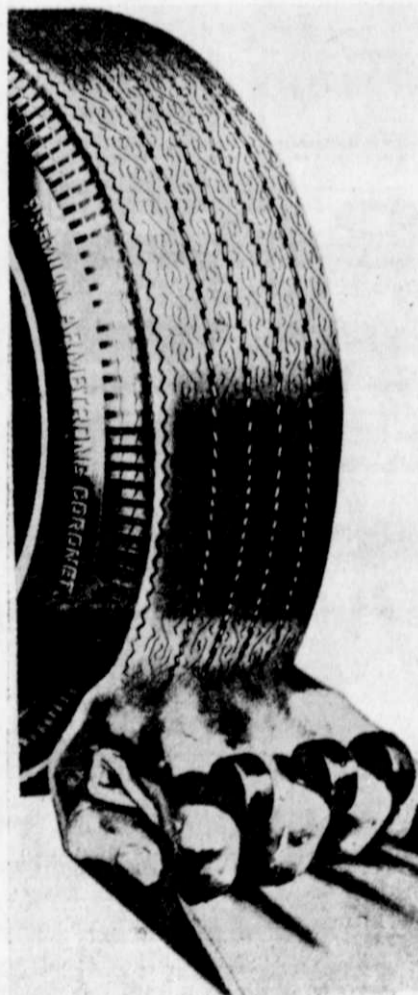

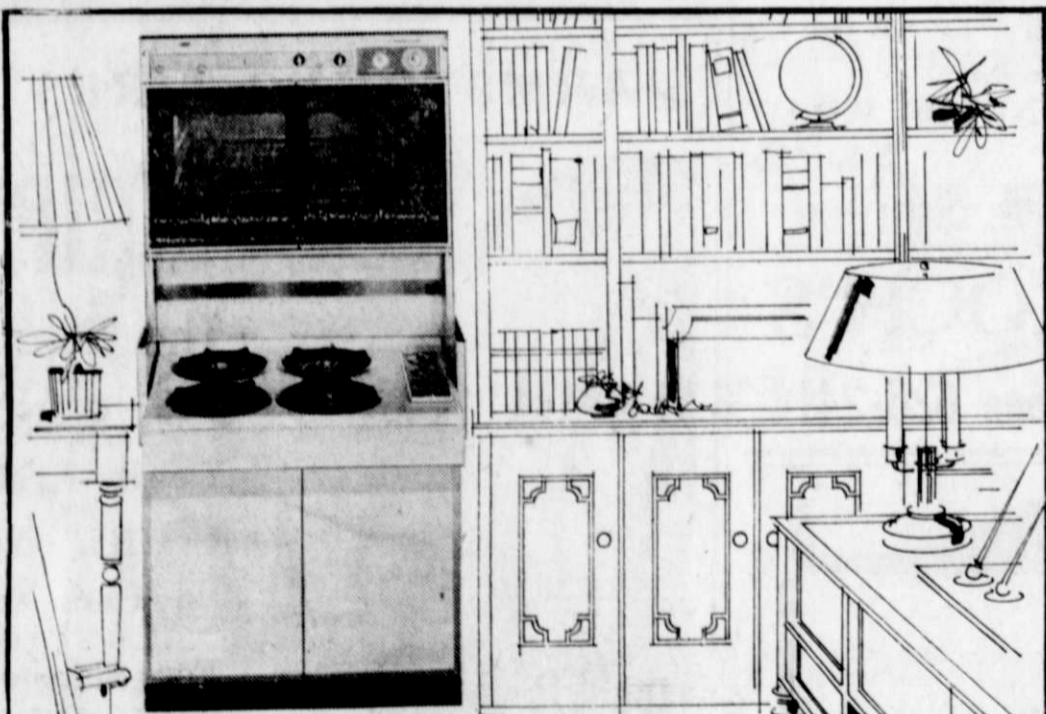
