Loren "Butch" Coulter, 21, Killed When Freight Train Hits Truck

TWO TRAINMEN ALSO HURT IN TOWN ADDISON MISHAP

Loren Reed "Butch" Coulter, 21, of R. 3, Campbellsport, who attended Kewaskum High school, was killed at 6:55 a. m. Tuesday when the large semi-trailer truck he was driving, loaded with 20 ton of washed sand, was struck by a northbound Soo Line freight train about a mile and a half northeast of St. Lawrence.

Coulter, who was leaving the Cedar Lake Sand and Gravel Co. pit next to the Olson Lumber Co., but across the tracks, apparently failed to see the approaching train or for some reason failed to halt his truck before crossing the tracks. The semi-trailer, owned by the Howard Kruepke Trucking Service of R. 1, Jackson, was struck on the right front corner of the trailer.

The impact threw the large trailer to the west side of the tracks and the cab and tractor were tossed to the east of the right-of-way. Coulter was thrown from the cab, which was torn loose from the tractor chassis by the impact.

There are no signals at the crossing where a town road, the railroad tracks and the gravel pit road come together. The train whistle blew for the crossing, according to reports. The north-

Storms, Winds Cause Widespread Damage in Area

Boy Is Trapped In Excavation Cave-In, Injured

Mark Koth, 9, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Koth of 315 Forest ave., Kewaskum, suffered a fractured left thigh bone about 7:00 o'clock Tuesday evening when he was almost buried alive while playing in an open water line excavation trench on Brooklane drive on the village's new west side and a portion of the ground from the wall of one side of the ditch caved in on him.

It was reported that Mark had been playing in the trench dug for a water main which is about seven or eight feet deep and three feet wide when part of the wall apparently collapsed on his legs. He was partially uncovered by playmates who attempted to rescue him. A companion ran to the nearby home of Mrs. Allen Tessar, who in turn called the fire department.

Firemen and rescue squad members rushed to the scene with the fire and equipment trucks and ambulance. The boy was almost uncovered by the time firemen arrived and they finished digging him out. A stretcher was lowered into the excavation and he was transported to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the ambulance. The boy was reported in good condition at the hospital.

After rescuing the youngster and while they had their fire equipment out, firemen extinguished a brush and wood fire that had been smoldering for some time in the new Country View Estate subdivision on the village's northwest side.

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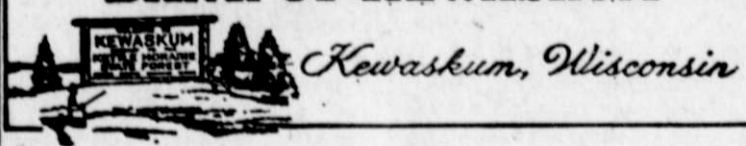
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A Thought for Memorial Day

bound train was made up of 78 cars. The lead diesel of the two powered unit was badly damaged by the impact.

County sheriff's deputies who investigated stated that Leroy Will, Fond du Lac, fireman on the diesel, was at the controls when the mishap occurred. He was not injured but two other trainmen were hurt. Injured were the engineer, Orvis Brockway, 52, Fond du Lac, who incurred back injuries, and Raymond Schmitz, 42, Fond du Lac, train brakeman, who suffered injuries to his left foot and arm. Another trainman, Harold Kohl, R. 1, Fond du Lac, the conductor, was also uninjured.

The heavily loaded truck was hauling washed sand to the Rasmussen Construction Co. black-topping plant about five miles south of Fond du Lac. The truck had just left the pit and reportedly was traveling south parallel to the tracks before it swung to the left to cross the tracks.

The crash raised the county death toll for 1966 to 13 compared to five on the same date last year.

Coulter, who also resided at 1215 S. 7th ave., West Bend, the past two months, was born at Campbellsport on Sept. 29, 1944. He resided in the town of Wayne most of his life. The young man was a veteran of three years service with the U. S. Marine Corps, part of which time he served overseas.

Surviving are his father and step-mother, Mr. and Mrs. William J. Coulter, Sr. of R. 3, Campbellsport; two sisters, Ramona (Mrs. Edward Dreher, Jr.) of Buffalo Grove, Ill. and Sharon (Mrs. Norbert Rosbeck) of West Bend; three brothers, William J. Coulter, Jr. and Daniel of West Bend, and Timothy of Mount Prospect, Ill.; nieces, nephews and other relatives. His mother, the former Katherine Urban, predeceased him in October, 1952.

Funeral services will be conducted at Salem United Church of Christ, Wayne, at 2 p. m. Friday, May 27, with burial in the church cemetery. The Rev. Herbert Feierabend will officiate. The casket will be closed. The body is in state at Miller's Funeral home, Kewaskum, since 2 p. m. Thursday and will be at the church from 12:30 p. m. until the time of services Friday. Members of the Robert G. Romaine American Legion post, Kewaskum, will officiate at graveside rites.

and interrupted electric and telephone service. Lightning also struck a tree at the Jack Andre residence just north of the village and knocked out power and phone service. A four-car garage on the Louis Heisler property on Main st. was shifted several inches by the winds and rain. A large tree limb was felled on the Holy Trinity parish property on Main st. and the remaining portion of the tree was cut down Thursday. Lawn chairs, garbage cans, cartons and other debris was strewn about and many small tree branches were blown off.

The community of St. Michaels east of Kewaskum had much storm damage to homes and outbuildings as well as the church and school. A corner of the roof of St. Michael's school was loosened and children from one of the grades were removed to another classroom when a pane of glass in a skylight apparently loosened and a fire escape door was blown from

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its hinges.

A stained glass window in front of the church was blown out and the roof of the church was also damaged. Roofs of homes, garages and chimneys in that area were damaged. Farm machinery, outdoor benches were blown around and swings at a private home were blown down. Several windows were blown in and a garage was blown from its foundation at one home. The roof of Serwe's tavern in St. Michaels was reported damaged considerably.

The heavy rains also washed sand, gravel and mud across highways and washed out portions of lawns and caused much other damage.

Forty-eight thousand, five hundred persons were killed in 1965 on the nation's highways, according to a report by The Travelers Insurance Companies. In addition, 4,100,000 others were injured in traffic accidents last year.
