## Referendum on Reorganization of School District Tuesday, June 14

A special referendum election on the establishment of a K-12 system (kindergarten through 12th grade) in the Kewaskum school area has been ordered for Tuesday, June 14. If approved, the plan would dissolve the present union high school district and the four separate elementary districts and establish a new common district to be known as Kewaskum Community School, Joint School Dist. No. 2.

If approved, the order will take effect on July 1, with the first district meeting slated at the Kewaskum Community High school at 8 p. m. on July 25.

The area in question is comprised of the village of Kewaskum, Farmington and Wayne and a portion of the town of Barton in Washington county and parts of the towns of Ashford and Auburn in Fond du Lac county and Scott and Mitchell in Sheboygan county.

The K-12 plan would establish a seven member school board as provided by state statutes to govern the newly created common school district, eliminating separate boards in each elementary school district and for the high school.

Under the K-12 plan the separate Kewaskum, Farmington, Wayne and Beechwood elementary districts as well as the present Union High school district would be combined into a common school district governed by the seven member school board.

The referendum was ordered by the Waukesha-Washington county Agency No. 16 school committee in conjunction with local boards of education, in keeping with the state-wide plan of consolidating such school districts.

Balloting is scheduled from 9 a. m. to 7 p. m. in the normal polling places in the area unless otherwise specified. For the sake of convenience, electors in small areas affected where only a few electors will be casting ballots will be requested to cast ballots in neighboring districts. Announcement of the official polling places, a facsimile ballot and notice of the referendum election will be found on pages 6 and 7 of this issue.

## Four Kewaskum Students Receive Degrees at UW

Four students from Kewaskum were among the 3,600 students who were candidates for degrees at the University of Wisconsin's June commencement at Madison this year, held at Wisconsin's historic Camp Randall Monday morning (June 6) on the campus.

They and the degrees for which they were candidates are:

Robert N. Kroncke, 1407 Fond du Lac ave., Bachelor of Arts; Aldwin H. Seefeldt, R. 1, Doctor of Law; Norman E. Rodenkirch, R. 1, Master of Science; Richard N. Groh, 1254 Roseland dr., Bachelor of Business Administration.

About 3,600 students were scheduled to file across the commencement platform to receive diplomas, but since the university commencement was held as final semester examinations come to a close and before all final grades could be compiled, it is possible that some students who were candidates for degrees may not have actually completed all of their scholastic work by commencement day.

The graduating students come from homes in all of Wisconsin's 72 counties, from 49 other states and the District of Columbia, and from 51 foreign lands scattered throughout the world. The 1966 June commencement brings to over 158,000 the number of degrees granted by the University of Wisconsin at Madison during its 117-year history.

Six men outstanding in education, government service, industry, science and journalism received honorary degrees at the commencement.

The graduation ceremony highlighted a weekend of intensive commencement activity on Wisconsin's campus Sunday and Monday, June 5-6. A reception in honor of the graduates, their parents, and alumni was held Sunday evening, and Sunday afternoon the All-University Honors Convocation cited about 500 students for their fine academic achievements during their university careers.

## \$25,000 Renovating Project Approved by Peace Church

## To Begin Summer School Classes; Ninety Enrolled

Summer school classes at Kewaskum Community High school will begin on Monday, June 13, for a six week session and will continue to July 22. Ninety students have enrolled for summer session classes.

Classes will be held in the mornings for two hour sessions, 8 to 10 and 10 to 12. Classes are open to students living in the Kewaskum Community High School, Jt. No. 2 school district, who have completed the eighth grade or are presently high school students.

Students who enroll in classes for enrichment purposes will not receive credit but will have the course and grade noted on his permanent high school record. Some courses offer make-up credit. The fee for materials will be \$3 for each class.

Courses offered (if there is sufficient student enrollment and qualified teachers secured) include home economics, beginning typing, shop-industrial arts, reading improvement, field biology, introduction to general science, English fundamentals, math fundamentals and beginner's band.

## Little Girl Catches Big Fish

A special congregational meeting was held on Sunday, June 5, at Peace United Church of Christ, Kewaskum, to consider preliminary sketches drawn up by Architect Bray of Sheboygan for a renovation and decorating program at the church. The estimated cost of the entire project is \$25,000.

The congregation, by majority vote, approved the projected program with the provision that 75% of the estimated cost be secured in pledges prior to proceeding with the building.

The project includes expansion of an improved foyer and cloak room facilities into a 100 coat area and lounge area, increased storage facilities for chairs and tables in the basement, stabilizing of the balcony as well as painting and carpeting of the sanctuary.

Ralph Ley, Chicago, a former Wisconsin pastor, followed by a reception for Dr. and Mrs. Ley; an address by Dr. Robert Stanger who has served as interim president for the past year, and an address by Dr. Perry D. LaFevre, dean at Chicago Theological seminary, on "Creating and Renewing the Church," the theme of the meeting.

Business to be accomplished includes elections, adoption of a 1967 budget, and a review of the 1965-66 program.

After it is marked it should be folded so that the inside cannot be seen, but so that the printed indorsements and signatures of the ballot clerks on the outside may be seen. Then the voter should pass out of the booth or compartment, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him his ballot to be placed in the box, and pass out of the voting place.

A voter, who declares to the presiding officer that he is unable to read, or that by reason of physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot, can have assistance of two election officers in marking same, to be chosen by the voter; and if he declares that he is visually handicapped, he may be assisted by any person chosen by him from among the legal voters of the county.
