Establishment of K-12 School District Approved by Electors

PLAN WINS IN VILLAGE AND TOWNSHIP AREAS; TO TAKE EFFECT JULY 1

Electors of the Kewaskum area school district in a referendum held Tuesday approved the establishment of a common school district, kindergarten through 12th grade (K-12 plan) to serve this area.

Voters in the village of Kewaskum approved the measure by a one-sided vote of 135 to 22 and those in the eight townships or portions thereof served by the district approved it 206 to 126. Approval in both the townships and the village was necessary for passage.

The new district will be known as the Kewaskum Community Schools, Joint District No. 2. It will serve the village of Kewaskum and the towns of Kewaskum, Barton, Farmington and Wayne in Washington county; parts of the towns of Ashford and Auburn in Fond du Lac county, and parts of the towns of Mitchell and Scott in Sheboygan county.

Approval of the referendum automatically dissolves the Kewaskum, Farmington, Beechwood and Wayne elementary school districts and the Kewaskum Union high school district presently serving the area and consolidates them into one unified common school district. The order takes effect on July 1, 1966 with the first district meeting scheduled at the Kewaskum Community High school on July 25, at 8 p. m.

Under terms of the referendum the new school district will be served by a board of seven members to replace the separate boards serving the various district at present.

Despite some expected opposition in various townships, only one township, Wayne, voted down the proposal. The vote there was 46 for the K-12 system and 56 against. The vote in all townships affected was light. Although some townships have only a few eligible voters, a heavier vote was anticipated. One township, Ashford, failed to attract any voters.

The complete vote follows: Fond du Lac county—T. Ashford, yes 0—no 0; Auburn, yes 13—no 0; Sheboygan county—T. Mitchell, yes 3—no 0; T. Scott, yes 38—no 13; Washington county—Barton, yes 12—no 3; Farmington, yes 70—no 37; Kewaskum, yes 23—no 17; Wayne, yes 46—no 56; Village of Kewaskum, yes 135—no 22. The overall total vote was 489.

Car Runs Into Meat Market Show Window

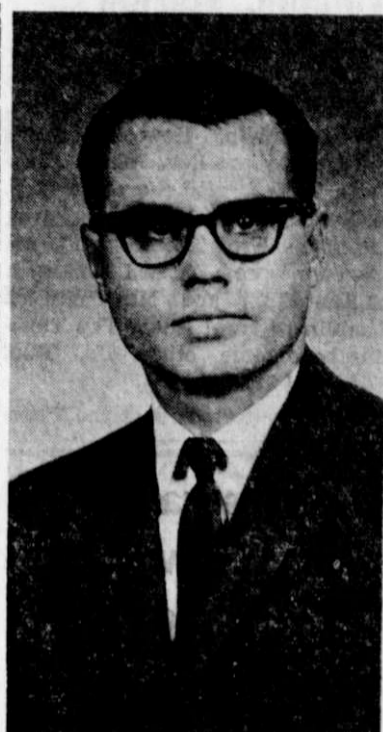
In an unusual accident at 3:55 p. m. Tuesday at the intersection of Main st. and Fond du Lac ave., an auto driven by Lucille L. Nischke, 49, Kewaskum, sideswiped another car, crossed the intersection and crashed into the show window of the Yost Meat Market.

Mrs. Nischke reported to Chief of Police Roland Pleidl that she was westbound on Main st. and her brakes failed when she reached the intersection. Her vehicle sideswiped another car driven by Margaret E. Nohr, 41, R. 3, West Bend, also westbound, mounted the safety island at the intersection, continued across the highway, mounted the sidewalk on the west side of Fond du Lac ave. and crashed into the show window.

The large show window and three front basement windows in Yost's "drive-in" meat market were smashed, the show window sill was damaged and there was other damage to the front of the building. The right front of the Nischke auto was also damaged in the crash, as was the left front door of the Nohr vehicle.

Local Graduate Is Killed in Vietnam Action

GEROLD SCHAEFFER OF MARINES LOSES LIFE

Pfc. Gerold L. Schaeffer, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert P. Schaeffer, 1710 Barton ave., West Bend, was killed in action at Da Nang, Vietnam, on Friday, June 10, according to word received by his parents.

Gerold was born July 8, 1944 in the town of Farmington, attended St. Michael's school and Kewaskum High school. He enlisted in the U. S. Marines on Nov. 23, 1963. He completed recruit training on Feb. 4, 1964 at the Marine Corps recruit depot at San Diego, Calif.

He served overseas in Okinawa and Vietnam for 13 months before returning to the states in July of 1965. He returned to Vietnam about a month later. A twin brother, George, is also serving in the Marines and is stationed at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. He also served 13 months in Vietnam.

In addition to his parents and twin brother, he is survived by a sister, Mrs. John (Arlene) Vixmer of Port Washington and another brother, Robert, at home. Another brother, Richard, preceded him in death. A brother-in-law, uncles, aunts, nieces and nephews also survive.

Funeral services are pending at the Schmidt Funeral home, West Bend, awaiting the arrival of the body from Vietnam.

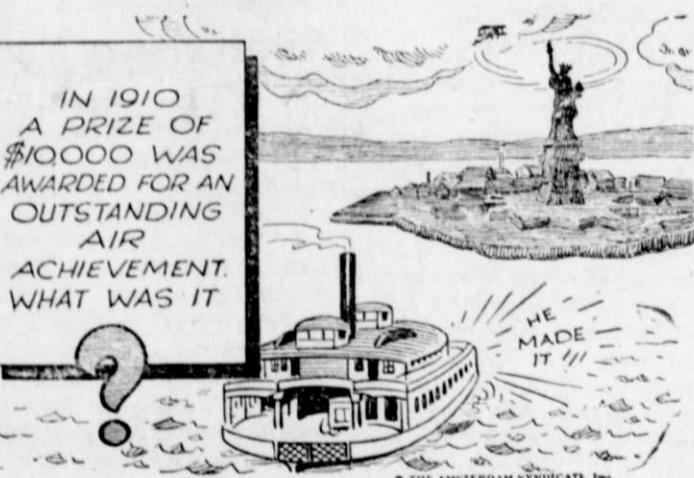

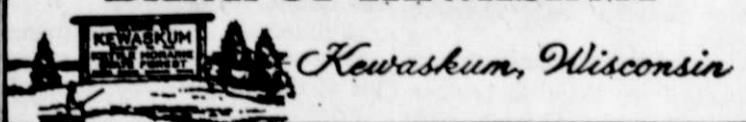

Cyclist Killed When Auto Rams Tree at Dundee

A 28-year-old motorcyclist died of internal injuries Sunday afternoon after his light cycle had left Hwy. 67 near Dundee and crashed head-on into a tree.

The younger Moon told Officer Johnson his brother's address was rural Campbellsport, but Johnson said a Motor Vehicle Department check listed the address as 1540 Birch drive, Waukesha. Moon was a janitor for Briggs and Stratton Motors, Milwaukee. Both men were reported thrown from the cycle when it hit the tree.

Hanson got off to a shaky start. His control was off and when he got his pitches across the Lithias connected. Hanson claimed he was slipping off the steep mound when delivering his pitches in the first innings. He gave up 10 hits, fanned 8 and passed only 3, and

blanked the winners in the last 6 frames.

Veteran Kenny Frank paced the Lithias with three singles, while Cahoon and Secfeldt each got 2. Dan Coulter collected Kewaskum's only safety but at least one other drive should have been scored a hit instead of an error by the official home score marker.

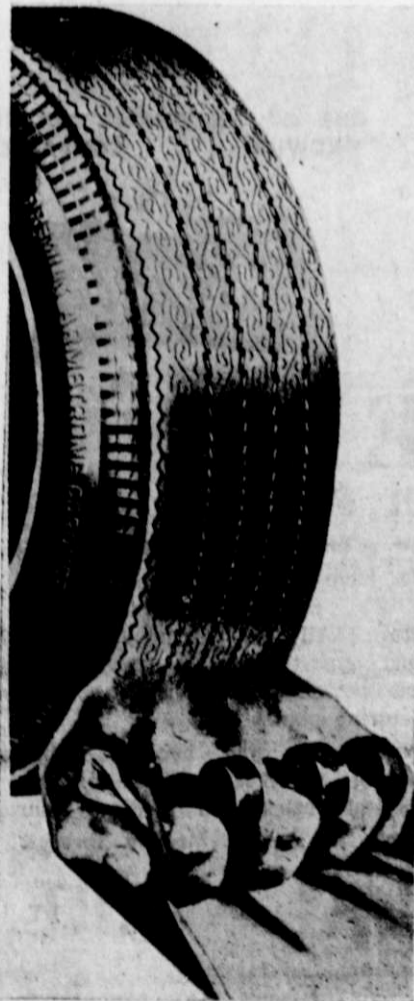
