CARR HELPS IN RECOVERY OF GEMINI SPACECRAFT

Machinist's Mate Third Class Charles R. Carr. USN, son of Mrs. Deloris Carr of R. 2. Kewaskum. stood by to help in the recovery of Gemini (GTA-9) astronauts and spacecraft with Task Force 140 in the Atlantic aboard the destroyer USS W. C. Lawe.

Special equipment was installed on the Lawe to facilitate handling of the spacecraft during recovery operations. Her crew had undergone extensive training in spacecraft recovery techniques since her selection for this mission.

Normally operating as a unit of the Atlantic Fleet's Destroyer Force, Lawe returned to this duty following the Gemini mission.
