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\$500 Scholarship At Beauty School Won by Local Girl

JOYCE BRUESSEL IS ONLY CLAIROL WINNER IN STATE



Joyce Rose Bruessel of Kewaskum has been awarded a \$500 scholarship by Clairol to attend the beauty school of her choice.

A graduating senior at Kewaskum Community High school this year, Miss Bruessel resides with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Bruessel, on R. 2. Miss Bruessel is one of 25 Clairol scholarship recipients in 19 states, and the only winner in Wisconsin.

A member of the National Honor society, Miss Bruessel "was not only outstanding academically, but also very active in the Future Homemakers of America, school newspaper, and other extra-curricular groups," according to Ernest Mitchell, assistant principal of Kewaskum Community High school.

In her scholarship application, Miss Bruessel stated, "It is the type of job that will enable me to hold a part-time position while my children are growing up. Not many careers offer this unique advantage. The skills I have learned will not be forgotten in ten years. A career in beauty culture opens a world of ideas and creativity to anyone interested in accepting its challenges."

The judges of the Clairol scholarship project were: Mrs. Sylvie Schuman Reice, editor of Ingenua Magazine; Harry Lewis, director of trade and technical education of the New York City Board of Education and president of the Department of Vocational Education of the National Education association; and Sam Napers, president of the National Association of Cosmetology Schools.

The judges expressed the "enormous difficulty in selecting the winners" by pointing to the more than a hundred applications from members of the National Honor society as examples of the exceptionally high caliber of the applicants.

Winners were selected on the basis of personality and aptitude, as indicated by the applicant's statement and the school's appraisal, as well as financial need.

Boy, 3 1/2 Has Close Call When Tractor Plunges 14 Feet

Little Dean Backhaus, only 3 1/2 years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. Loran Backhaus, Jr. of R. 2, Kewaskum, fortunately escaped serious injury and possible death Tuesday afternoon when a tractor he was riding crashed through a barn door and fell 14 feet to the ground below at the Backhaus farm on Hwy. 45 about one mile north of Kewaskum between 3 and 4 p. m.

There was no one present when the mishap occurred. The boy's parents reported that they believed the switch was turned on on the tractor in the barn but they could not say whether the engine was running or not. While playing on the tractor, Dean apparently shifted the vehicle into gear in some manner. The tractor moved ahead, crashed through a barn door, and fell with him 14 feet to the barnyard below.

Luckily the little boy fell into soft mud and manure and this with the fact that the tractor landed with him between the fender and wheel prevented him from being crushed or more seriously injured. He suffered cuts, contusions and a severe bump on his head but no bones were broken.

The boy's father brought him to this village, from where he was removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance. The front wheels of the tractor were broken off and front of the vehicle damaged in the mishap.

CARR HELPS IN RECOVERY OF GEMINI SPACECRAFT

Normally operating as a unit of the Atlantic Fleet's Destroyer Force, Lawe returned to this duty following the Gemini mission.

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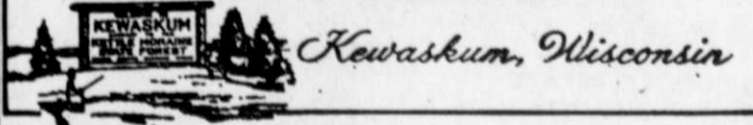
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Rites Held for Gustave Marialke

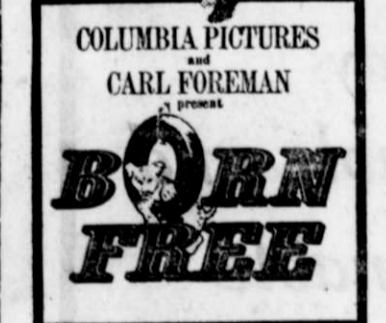

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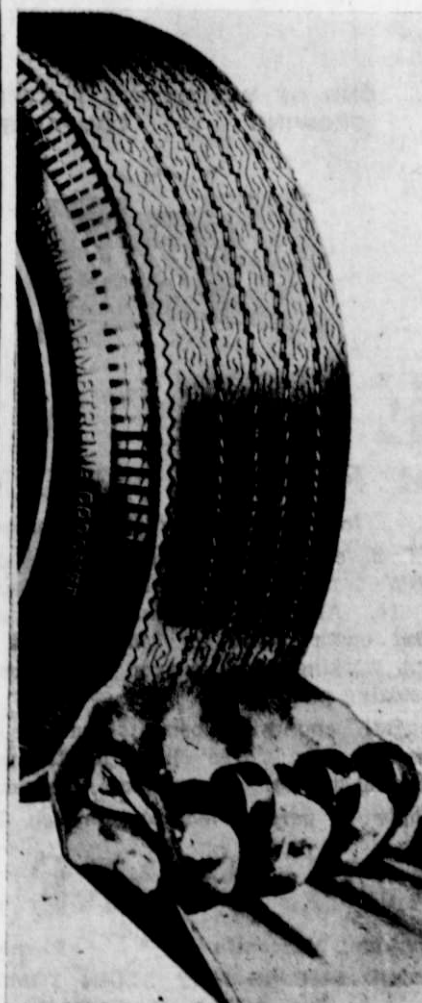
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
